New business opens with an optimistic start

On Monday, March 20th, 2006, the Snack Shack at 29 Lorne Street opened for business at 6:30 a.m..

Business

owner, Gerald Cote, who is originally from Chapleau, saw that the building was going to be available when he visited at Christmas. He looked into leasing the downtown location for a restaurant and

after 2 months of renovating the inside of the building by himself, he has begun serving breakfast and lunch.

The hours that the restaurant will be open are from 6:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., six days a week. It will be closed on Sundays.

The Snack Shack will be concentrating on standard breakfast, such as bacon/ham and eggs, as well as lunch. The lunch items range from pizza slices to subs, and soups.

Mr. Cote is hoping to be able to accommodate the business lunch crowd, in addition to the

students, since he is centrally located. "I'm hoping to serve people a good dinner, or breakfast if they have the time." Mr. Cote shared.

The restaurant currently seats 32 customers but can expand to 40 with added chairs. The opening day was a success. "I didn't expect how many people came in today. I hope it lasts. It is hard to start something here but I took a chance anyway," Cote explained.

Presently, Gerald has only one staff member besides himself. His niece, Lisa, serves most of the

lunch items, while Cote cooks the breakfasts and works the cash.

The Snack Shack offers homemade baked goods such as pies and muffins which can be enjoyed with a coffee or taken home. Lisa,

the baker, is busy making sure that the display always has something freshly baked and tempting.

The owner is hoping to expand the selection of pastries and may even add to the menu in the future.

Province offers funding for summer youth employers

Province gives Chapleau \$300,880 for roads or bridge upgrade

The Province of Ontario has announced in the 2006 Budget that it is providing a one-time investment of \$400 million to help municipalities

primarily outside the GTA, with special emphasis on rural and northern communities, invest in municipal roads and bridges.

Funding will

be provided immediately so that high priority projects can get underway as soon as possible in the upcoming construction season.

This \$400

million investment builds on other major initiatives already under way to support municipal infrastructure, including the \$900 million Canada Ontario

Municipal Rural Investment Fund (COMRIF) and financing assistance provided through the Ontario Strategic Infrastructure Financing Authority

(OSIFA).

Municipalities will determine their own roads and bridges priorities.

Chapleau will receive \$300,880.00.

Keeping immunizations up to date

(NC)—Canadian parents now have access to a number of important vaccinations for children. Recently, provincial governments across the country have begun funding for newer vaccinations for diseases such as pneumococcal disease, meningitis and chickenpox.

The number of vaccines can be confusing, so proactively seeking out the routine immunization schedule in their province and speaking with their doctor can help parents stay on track.

It's important to stay on schedule because vaccines strengthen your child's immune system to protect them from specific diseases, and following the routine schedule helps protect your child from disease sooner. Many provinces provide immunization cards, which allow you to track the vaccines your child has received and identify when future vaccines are scheduled.

Some vaccines are given as a series to provide the best possible defence against infection, and delayed

doses might lead to missed doses, which could leave your child at risk for disease. The pneumococcal vaccine Prevnar, for instance, offers 97.4 per cent protection when given as part of the Health Canada approved series of four injections.

"It's really important for parents to make sure their child has access to the full series of injections," said Dr. Dion Neame, Associate Medical Advisor for the Meningitis Research Foundation of Canada and Chief of the Department of Paediatrics at McMaster Children's Hospital in Hamilton, Ontario. "Getting vaccinations on time is also crucial".

The National Advisory Committee on Immunization recently updated its Recommended Immunization Schedule for Infants, Children and Youth. Each province has a specialized schedule, so talk to your doctor to find out when your child is due for the recommended vaccines.

**Healthy Harvest Honey
Chicken Macaroni with Cheese**

Ingredients

- 200g Catelli Healthy Harvest Whole Wheat macaroni
- 30 mL (2 tbsp) olive oil
- 2 onions, finely minced
- 2.5 mL (1/2 tsp) dried oregano
- 2.5 mL (1/2 tsp) dried parsley
- 2 chicken breasts, skin and bones removed, in pieces
- 60 mL (1/4 cup) honey
- 2 x 798 mL cans diced tomatoes, drained
- 250 mL (1 cup) grated cheese

Instructions

- Cook macaroni according to package directions.
 - In a pot, heat oil and sauté onion, oregano and parsley 3 minutes. Add chicken and continue cooking 3 minutes.
 - Add honey, mixing well to coat chicken, and cook 3 minutes until caramelized.
 - Add tomatoes and simmer 15-20 minutes or until liquid is almost evaporated. Add macaroni, mixing well.
 - Pour into a baking dish. Sprinkle with cheese and broil in oven until cheese melts and browns lightly.

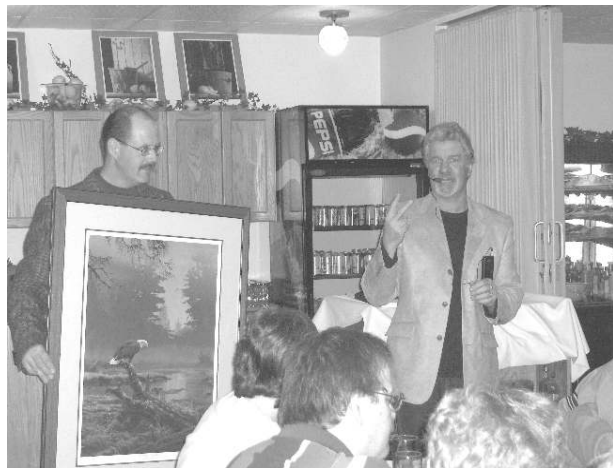

Internet telephony brings lifestyle advantages

University and College Students: Large phone bills are often a fact of life for students attending schools away from home. Most university residences now offer high-speed Internet access, so VoIP phone service is a significant, cost saving option. For one low flat rate, students can enjoy calling all their friends and family across North America. Another useful feature of VoIP is its mobility. As long as a student can find high-speed access, they will have their VoIP service. Because the phone number is contained within the VoIP phone adapter, students can keep the same phone number year after year so everyone can reach them. Approved 2006-2007 Annual Work Schedule Superior-Martel Forest

The Chapleau District of the **Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR)** has approved the Tembec Industries Inc. 2006-2007 annual work schedule (AWS) for the Superior-Martel Forest Management Unit. The annual work schedule will be available for inspection at the ministry's Chapleau District Office and Tembec Industries Inc. Office (see address below) beginning April 4, 2006.

The AWS describes the forest management activities (e.g. road construction and maintenance, timber harvesting, renewal and tending) that are scheduled to occur on the Superior-Martel Forest between **April 19, 2006 and March 31, 2007**. These activities are consistent with the approved Superior-Martel Forest Management Plan.

The following are some of the operations that are scheduled on the Superior-Martel Forest that may be of particular public interest:

Commercial thinning is being conducted on a trial basis.

Fuelwood is available for harvest on this management unit.

A mapped summary of the scheduled forest management operations is available along with information on the location of fuelwood areas at the ministry's Chapleau District Office (see address below).

There are no prescribed burns planned on the Superior-Martel Forest during the term of the 2006-2007 AWS other than slash pile burning within recently harvested areas. Areas have been proposed for the aerial application of herbicides.

Tembec Industries Inc. is responsible for tree planting on the Superior-Martel Forest. Please contact Tembec Industries Inc. directly for information regarding tree planting job opportunities.

For information on the locations of and licence requirements for obtaining fuelwood for personal use, please contact the MNR Chapleau District Office. For commercial fuelwood opportunities, please contact Tembec Industries Inc.

The approved annual work schedule and any subsequent revisions will remain available for public inspection throughout the one-year duration of the AWS. For further information on the annual work schedule and requests to obtain an annual work schedule operations summary map, please contact:

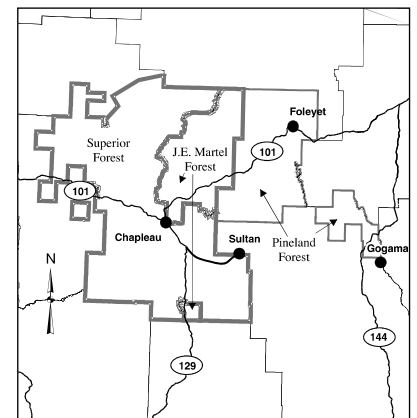

La deuxième activité était présentée par le centre culturel Louis-Hémon et Réseau Ontario: spectacle émouvant de

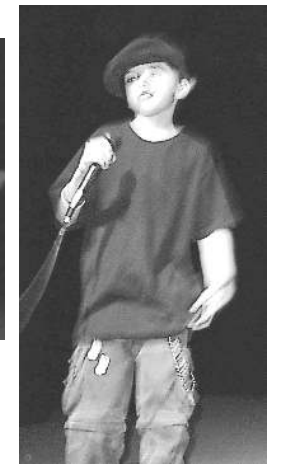
Laurence Jalbert. Il y a un article de ce spectacle ailleurs dans le journal.

together as an outlet for their creativity, to practice their skills, and a chance to compare interpretation and technique.

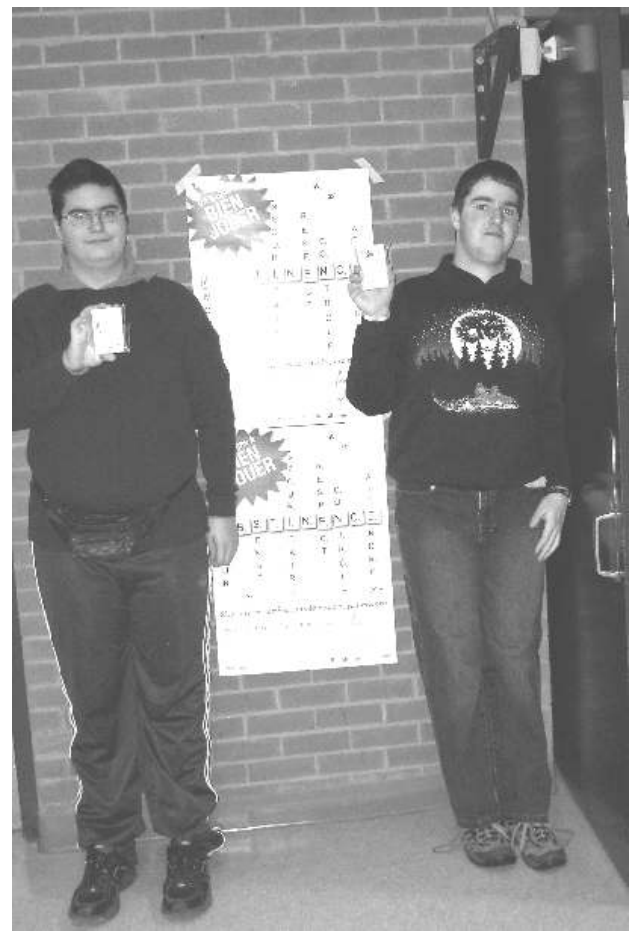
We may possibly see an art exhibit featuring these sketches of local citizens sometime in the future.

Rich & delicious manicotti can be calorie conscious

Spinach Manicotti

1/4 cup shredded (175 mL) part-skim mozzarella cheese
 1 1/2 cups light ricotta (375 mL) cheese
 1 1/2 cups low-fat (375 mL) cottage cheese
 1/4 cup grated fresh (50 mL) Romano cheese
 1/2 tsp dried Italian (2 mL) seasoning
 10 oz box frozen (300 g) chopped spinach, thawed, drained and squeezed dry
 1 egg white (1)
 1 clove garlic, minced (1)
 8 oz box uncooked (240 g) manicotti shells
 non-stick cooking spray
 3 cups Ragu spaghetti (750 mL) sauce



Preheat oven to 350° F (180° C). In a large bowl, combine 1/2 cup (125 mL) of the mozzarella with all of the ricotta, cottage cheese, Romano, Italian seasoning, spinach, egg white and garlic. Stir well and set aside. Meanwhile, cook manicotti according to package directions, omitting salt and fat; do not overcook. Drain and rinse under cold water. Lightly coat a 13 x 9-inch (33 x 23 cm) baking dish with cooking spray. Place manicotti in baking dish, spoon cheese mixture evenly into cooked pasta, and top with tomato sauce. Bake, uncovered, in preheated oven 25 minutes. Sprinkle with the remaining 1/4 cup (50 mL) mozzarella cheese and bake 10 more minutes, or until cheese melts. Serves 8.

Project Chapleau runs an Open House at Legion!
