Softwood deal has been struck

ONTARIO SUPPORTS SOFTWOOD FRAMEWORK

Arrangement Better Reflects Ontario's Interests

TORONTO Ontario is pleased with the announcement of a framework that would lead to the resolution of the current softwood dispute, Natural Resources Minister David Ramsay said today.

"A lot of work went into negotiations that have led to this framework, and we have steadfastly defended Ontario's interests throughout the process," said Ramsay. "While this arrangement would

require each jurisdiction to make some concessions, Ontario got a critical element a more reasonable share of softwood exports." Ontario had opposed an initial version of the proposed framework

that would have reduced the volume of lumber that the province could export to the U.S. to levels well below historical levels.

"We will lend our support to this arrangement as it will

help end a long-standing dispute that has severely affected our forest industry," said Ramsay. "I would like to thank Ontario's team in Washington, led by Mr. Michael Kergin, for their efforts in representing

our province."

Ontario looks forward to working with the federal government and other provinces to finalize the formal agreement and develop an implementation process.

Daniel has worked with a group of artists since 1998. They share their techniques and critics. He says he loves to create and touch many aspects of the art of painting.

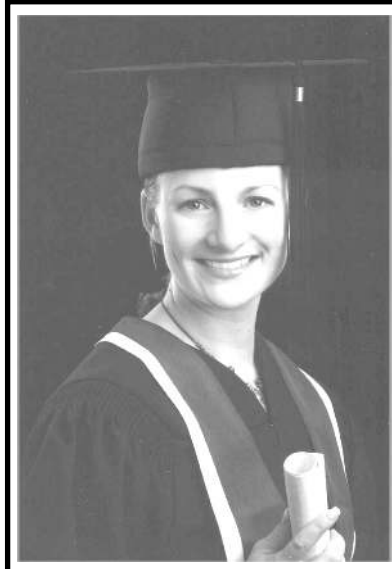

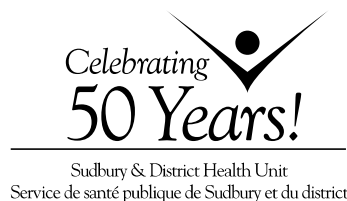

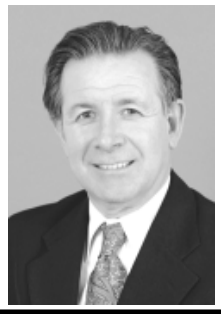

**St. Denis Calls on Government
to Honour Fallen Soldiers**

The Conservative government has decided it will no longer honour fallen Canadian soldiers and their families by lowering the flag on the Peace Tower. I strongly support the Canadian Forces in their mission to bring peace and stability to Afghanistan and elsewhere in the world. My colleagues and I recognize the courageous sacrifices they make as they carry out their duties. It is important for us to realize that there is a very real cost to the important mission our men and women are undertaking in Afghanistan. Trying to hide from the public the realities our troops face in Afghanistan is disrespectful to our forces stationed there, and to all Canadians. Canadians do not need to be sheltered from the realities of our various peacekeeping and peace-making missions they deserve facts and the opportunity to honour those killed in the line of duty. In my opinion, it is the government's responsibility to ensure a full and open discussion about the mission in Afghanistan its status, its effectiveness and, ultimately, its consequences. This discussion includes symbolism such as lowering the flag in Ottawa as a gesture of respect. I truly feel that Canadians support our troops and want to share in their glory and grief.

The Conservative government argues that traditionally all fallen soldiers are honoured on Remembrance Day. Their position is that the practice of lowering the flag and allowing media access to military funerals is not a tradition, and it is up to

the government to decide whether or not to lower the flag. In fact, it is up to the government to decide, and for this reason my colleagues and I have called on the Prime Minister to honour our soldiers and their families by lowering the Canadian flag.

The tradition of remembering our soldiers on Remembrance Day is tremendously important and will continue. However, traditions can change. In 2004 the previous Liberal government started a new tradition, one that calls for the Canadian flag to be lowered when a soldier dies while serving his or her country. Lowering the Flag recognizes that our military personnel make the ultimate sacrifice when they serve our country and it reminds us of the dangers our soldiers face each day. Because Parliament belongs to all Canadians, lowering the flag on the Peace Tower is a way for every Canadian to share the family's grief. I believe that it is the least we can do to honour their memory.

Though I feel very strongly that our fallen soldiers should be honoured and recognized, I do see room for compromise. One prominent Elliot Lake Legionnaire, Bob Manuel, has suggested that on the day following a soldier's death, the flag be lowered at 11am for a brief ceremony including a reveille. Such suggestions are welcome and I encourage all my constituents to call, write or email me your suggestions and participate in this important debate.

**Coalition for Fair Lumber Imports Applauds
Softwood Lumber Settlement**

WASHINGTON, April 27 /CNW/ -- The Coalition for Fair Lumber Imports today expressed its support for settlement of the dispute regarding unfairly traded Canadian softwood lumber on the basis announced by the U.S. and Canadian governments.

Coalition Chairman Steve Swanson stated, "We applaud the tireless efforts of the Bush Administration officials who negotiated a means of offsetting Canadian unfair lumber practices. We look forward to working closely with them to ensure that an agreement is administered and enforced effectively to establish a fair competitive playing field for U.S. sawmills, mill workers and

family timberland owners across the United States."

Swanson continued, "We especially want to thank President Bush and Prime Minister Harper for their personal leadership and the Bush Administration team, USTR-Designate Ambassador Susan Schwab and USTR General Counsel Jim Mendenhall, for their skill and dedication. We understand that there have been very tough, marathon negotiations over the last two weeks and the determination and skill of the U.S. negotiators were crucial to arriving at settlement that is balanced and fair. Ambassador Schwab could not have been better at advancing United States economic interests while understanding

what the Canadian governments and industry could accept. She demonstrated the talents needed to be chief U.S. trade negotiator."

The Coalition has long sought to end Canadian provinces' sale of timber (standing trees) to Canadian lumber companies for small fraction of the timber's market value. This subsidy has cost multitudes of U.S. jobs and scores of competitive U.S. sawmills. The Coalition initiated unfair trade proceedings before U.S. agencies in 2001, and the U.S. government has maintained countervailing (anti-subsidy) and antidumping duties on Canadian lumber since that time.

"All we have ever

asked is that Canadian timber and logs be sold in open and competitive markets," said Swanson. He concluded, "We hope that the Canadian governments take this opportunity to move to market sales."

**Softwood lumber 'framework' agreement
has no legitimacy, say Steelworkers**

TORONTO, April 27 /CNW/ - With more than 55,000 members in the forest industry across Canada, leaders of the United Steelworkers (USW) say the hastily announced framework agreement with the United States on softwood lumber was made at the expense of and without consultation with workers and their communities.

"This deal affects communities across the country differently," said USW National Director Ken Neumann. "It's a deal Stephen Harper has negotiated in haste to prove to Canadians that he has a better relationship with the Bush Administration than the Liberals. But what it amounts to is caving in and accepting less than what international trade bodies have ruled we are entitled to."

Neumann added that

the union asked International Trade Minister David Emerson for a meeting on the softwood lumber dispute as far back as February and did not receive even a reply to the request, let alone a formal refusal to meet.

Ontario/Atlantic Director Wayne Fraser said the deal, which contains quota limitations, is an insult to forestry workers in Ontario, where mill closures have devastated northern communities.

"Not one forestry-dependent community has been consulted in any

meaningful way," said Fraser. "Stephen Harper, who knows his government has a short mandate, is trying to do as much as possible in a short time-frame for the US and its forest companies. He is willing to prove his loyalty to George W.

Bush and corporate interests at the expense of working people and their communities. It's a sell-out financed by Canadian taxpayers."

USW Western Canada Director Steve Hunt said the details of any comprehensive agreement on softwood must include a program, based on a portion of any funds regained from the US government's tariffs, for forest industry training, employment and revitalization.

"Forest companies are interested in short-term profit," said Hunt. "We have to make sure there is a focus on the long-term viability of the industry, a focus that protects workers and communities who depend on it."

USW Quebec Director Michel Arsenault said the forest industry is an integral part of the history of Quebec and

communities need to be consulted on international deals that affect them.

"Stephen Harper thinks he can woo Quebecers with quickie deals made with the Americans," said Arsenault. "He is sadly mistaken."

Norm Rivard, chair of the Steelworkers-IWA (woodworkers) Council, said the deal as outlined is incomplete and unfair.

"If this is considered to be 'tentative' then working people and communities that will depend on an appropriate resolution to this longstanding dispute must be consulted about its details," Rivard said. "Our members will be around longer than the Harper government and must be consulted on decisions that affect their future."

gouvernement d'honorer les
soldats tombés au champ d'honneur**

Le gouvernement conservateur a décidé de ne plus mettre en berne le drapeau du Canada sur la tour de la Paix pour honorer les soldats morts au champ d'honneur et leurs familles. Je suis souscrit tout à fait à la mission des Forces canadiennes qui est d'apporter la paix et la stabilité en Afghanistan et dans d'autres pays. Mes collègues et moi reconnaissons les vaillants sacrifices que font nos soldats dans l'accomplissement de leur devoir. Il faut bien comprendre que la mission a un coût bien réel pour les hommes et les femmes qui participent à l'importante mission en Afghanistan. Tenter de cacher au public les dangers auxquels font face nos troupes en Afghanistan constitue un manque de respect envers nos militaires en mission là-bas et envers tous les Canadiens. Les Canadiens n'ont pas besoin d'être tenus à

l'écart de la réalité des diverses missions de maintien de la paix de leur pays : ils méritent de connaître les faits et d'avoir la chance d'honorer leurs concitoyens morts dans l'accomplissement de leur devoir. À mon avis, il incombe au gouvernement de faire en sorte qu'il y ait un débat véritable et ouvert sur la mission du Canada en Afghanistan, sur la situation actuelle, sur l'utilité de cette mission et, à terme, sur ses conséquences. La mise en berne du drapeau est un geste symbolique de respect. Je crois fermement que les Canadiens appuient nos troupes et veulent partager leur gloire et leur tristesse.

Le gouverne-

ment conservateur soutient que la tradition veut que tous les soldats morts au champ d'honneur soient honorés le jour du Souvenir. Il prétend que la mise en berne du drapeau et que l'accès des journalistes aux funérailles militaires ne constituent pas des traditions, et que c'est au gouvernement de décider si le drapeau doit être mis en berne. En fait, cette décision revient bien au gouvernement, et c'est pourquoi mes collègues et moi avons sommé le Premier ministre de mettre en berne le drapeau canadien pour honorer nos soldats et leurs familles.

La tradition qui consiste à commémorer le

décès de nos soldats le jour du Souvenir est extrêmement importante et elle se poursuivra. Toutefois, les traditions naissent et meurent. En 2004, le gouvernement libéral précédent avait instauré un nouvel usage, celui de mettre en berne le drapeau national lorsqu'un soldat canadien mourait au service de son pays. La mise en berne du drapeau est une façon de reconnaître que nos militaires font le sacrifice ultime lorsqu'ils servent notre pays et nous rappelle les dangers qui guettent nos soldats chaque jour. Puisque le Parlement représente tous les Canadiens, la mise en berne du drapeau sur la tour de la Paix est une façon pour tous les Canadiens

d'exprimer leur tristesse. Je crois que c'est le moins que nous puissions faire pour honorer la mémoire de nos soldats disparus.

Je crois sincèrement que nos soldats morts au service de notre pays devraient être honorés et reconnus. Toutefois, je vois qu'il y a place pour le compromis. Un légionnaire éminent d'Elliot Lake, Bob Manuel, a proposé que le jour suivant le décès d'un soldat, le drapeau soit mis en berne à 11 h durant une brève cérémonie avec coup de clairon. J'encourage tous mes électeurs à me transmettre leurs idées à ce sujet, et à m'appeler, à m'écrire ou à m'envoyer un courriel pour prendre part à cet important débat.
