Chapleau Post declares 'something out of the ordinary seen' as Mrs. Maud Hands becomes first woman elected to Chapleau council for 1948 term

Chapleau **Moments**

W h e n Chapleau voters went to the polls in 1947 to elect a reeve and council, it followed "the most keenly interested nomination meeting in years", according to a report in the Chapleau Post.

In those days a nomination meeting would be held in the Town Hall on a Friday night in November with those nominated given until nine p.m. on Saturday night to qualify as candidates for a one year term on council. There were 69 people proposed to fill the office of reeve and four council positions for 1948, including Mrs. Maud Hands, who holds the distinction of becoming the first woman to be elected as a councillor in Chapleau.

As the nine p.m. Saturday deadline approached, it appeared that B.W. "Bubs" Zufelt may become reeve by acclamation, as at 8:30 p.m. he was the only one who had qualified. However, the Chapleau Post reported that shortly before the deadline Edgar Pellow appeared and qualified to be followed a minute later by Frank Edwards, who was the incumbent.

The two, coming so close together and so late in the evening, it looked as though each of them was waiting for the other to qualify," the Post noted.

Referring to Mrs. Hands, the Post said "something out of the ordinary was also seen" as she became the first woman nominated who qualified to run in a Chapleau municipal election.

When nominations closed there were three candidates for reeve and three for the four councillor positions.

As the election campaign got underway, the Chapleau Board of Trade published a letter in the Chapleau Post giving its views on the election. Note the emphasis on electing "men" in the following excerpt from its letter.

"Chapleau is now apparently on the eve of one of its most progressive moves in its history; important industries are building up all around us; major adjustments to our town makes it a better place to live ... matters will require the attention of only the best men we can get, sound thinking men with experience

in handling financial matters, and common sense in looking after the welfare of their fellow men.

"Successful reeves and councillors are always men who have progressive ideas and who have made a success of their own life -- they can contribute something lasting to the community."

Major issues in the 1947 municipal election included a new water tank to replace the one built in 1910, a new intake pipe for the pump house, a sewage system and a municipal insurance plan. Interestingly, all these projects were undertaken plus some others as Chapleau moved into the 1950s and experienced a boom period.

In the most keenly contested election in years, the Chapleau Post reported that B.W. Zufelt was elected reeve with a majority of 45 votes over Edgar Pellow while incumbent Frank Edwards placed third.

Newcomer Walter Steed led the polls in the race for council seats while J.M. Shoup and J.O. Cahill tied for second place while Mrs. Hands made history, becoming the first woman elected to Chapleau council.

Born in England Mrs. Hands first came to Canada to be with her husband Ambrose Evans, who was later declared missing in

action during World War I. She had returned to England and stayed there training as a nurse and midwife, and nursing wounded soldiers until the end of the war in 1918. According to a piece in Chapleau Trails by Joy (Evans) Heft, she came to Chapleau with encouragement of the Evans family to work with Dr. J.J. Sheehan who was badly in need of assistance. Chapleau Trails was edited and published by Dr. W.R. Pellow.

She later married Fred Hands, a widower, and they lived in a house on Queen Street, across the lane from my grandparents Harry and Lil (Mulligan) Morris in the area that became known as there as well as at

Healy where they had a camp for many years.

Mrs. Hands worked with Dr. Sheehan and was also at Lady Minto Hospital for years. She was also very active at St. John's Anglican Church in the Women's Auxiliary and as superintendent of the Sunday school for many years. In 1968, as I wrote in my book 'Sons of Thunder.. Apostles of Love" it was the end of an era at the church when Mrs. Hands retired as leader of the Junior Girls Group.


The church honoured her by renaming the Senior Women's Group the 'Hands Group.' But Mrs. Hands was not retiring completely as she would continue to raised their family in of their parish. Mrs. Hands also

attended Trinity United Church with her husband and assisted with activities there

She was also active in the auxiliary to Branch 5 of the Royal Canadian Legion and during World War II and after it was a prominent hard working member of the Chapleau Branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society, serving as its president.

With the election of the council for 1948, Chapleau was headed into some very active years for the municipality, and it was perhaps very fitting that an outstanding citizen like Mrs. Hands, who was devoted to the health and welfare of the citizens was a mem-Little England. Ontario Weather Review: July 2010

Unlike July 2009, which was cold and rainy, this July was characterized by warm temperatures and highly variable precipitation totals.

The mean temperatures for most Ontario locations were between two and three degrees above normal. In several cases, it was the warmest July in half a century. Petawawa broke its record for the highest mean temperature this month.

At the beginning of the month, Southern Ontario experienced its first real heat wave in approximately three years. From July 5 to July 8 inclusive, temperatures were in the low- to midthirties, with humidex values well into the forties. Peterborough recorded the peak humidex value of 45 on July 8. Humidex values of 44 were recorded at Toronto Pearson on July 5, in London on July 7, and in Peterborough on both July 5 and July 8. During that period, extreme UV index readings of 11+ were forecasted at a few locations. This is a very rare occurrence in

Canada.

In terms of precipitation, there were many rainfall events of high intensity but short duration during the month, resulting in torrential downpours. Some events led to localized flooding, such as in the Kitchener/Waterloo area on July 23. The number of locations with unusual precipitation readings, both wetter and drier than normal, illustrates the variability in precipitation throughout the province.

Northwestern

Severe Weather

This month brought tragic reminders of the dangers of lightning, with three fatalities linked to lightning strikes. The first occurred on the Grand River near Brantford on July 17; the second occurred near Walpole Island, north of Lake St. Clair,

on July 23; and the third occurred in the Hamilton area on July 28. Any thunderstorm can be deadly and it is important to remember the lightning safety rule: if you hear thunder, get into the best shelter available, and stay in that shelter for a full 30 minutes after the last rumble of thunder to ensure the storm has moved well away from your location.

Earlier this month, a reassessment of available information from the Harrow and Leamington areas in Essex County, from the early morning hours of June 6, led to the conclusion that four separate tornadoes occurred during this event as opposed to the one tornado that was originally confirmed. The four tornadoes were: a Fujita Scale Zero tornado (peak wind up to 110 kilometres per hour) in the Crystal Lane area to the southwest of Harrow, a Fujita Scale One tornado (peak winds of 120 to 170 kilometres per hour) south of Harrow, a Fujita Scale Two tornado (peak winds of 180 to 240 kilometres per hour) southeast of Harrow, and a Fujita Scale One tornado to the south of Leamington.

Essex County continued to be an active spot for strong thunderstorms this month as yet another tornado (Fujita Scale Zero) was confirmed in the Amherstburg area on July 23. Other a r e a s a r o u n d

Amherstburg also experienced some minor damage due to downburst winds of approximately 90 to 100 kilometres per

However, Essex County wasn't the only part of the province to experience severe thunderstorms during the month. On July 20, a number of powerful thunderstorms popped up across central and northern Ontario. One of these thunderstorm cells moved over St. Joseph Island, to the southeast of Sault Ste. Marie, and spawned a Fujita Scale Zero tornado.

Northwestern Ontario also saw noteworthy thunderstorm activity, from a series of storms on July 26-27. Of particular note were the storms over the Kenora area, from the late evening hours of July 26 until the early morning hours of July 27. One rain gauge just west of Kenora recorded a little more than 90 millimetres of rain. This represents approximately a month's worth of rain falling in the course of a few hours.

Downburst winds, which are localized, damaging gusts of wind sometimes produced by thunderstorms, occurred at a number of locations across the province during July. These included the Elk Lake area, in the Timiskaming District

(on July 6); Beachburg, near Pembroke (July 12); Berwick, northwest of Cornwall (July 17); portions of Huron County (July 21); the 1,000 Islands area near Gananoque (also July 21); and portions of Huron County again (July 28), which all experienced some tree damage and/or minor structural damage due to downburst winds.

By the end of the month, the tornado tally for this season in Ontario stood at nine, with five of these occurring in Essex County. Ontario averages 11 tornadoes each year during the summer severe weather season, which runs from late April until early October.



This important

piece of legislation will safeguard the right of present and future generations of Canadians to a healthy and ecologically balanced environment. By confirming the Government of Canada's public trust duty to protect the environment under its jurisdiction, we can ensure all Canadians have access to adequate environmental information, justice in an environmental context and effective mechanisms for participating in environmental

decision-making. It will provide adequate

legal protection against reprisals for employees who take action for the purpose of protecting the environment, and enhance the public confidence in the implementation of environmental law.

Perhaps the most important aspect of Bill C-469 is that it would hold the Federal Government accountable for any infraction of their own laws that causes damage to the Canadian environment. It would place power back in the hands of Canadian citizens if something were to happen to our natural environment, and place this and subsequent governments in an actionable position if they don't play by the rules.

Although the

bill received full support from all opposition parties, it was disheartening that not one Conservative member chose to support the bill. It's unfortunate that, after making all of the flowery campaign promises about holding government accountable for their actions, the Conservative government has once again shown its true colours by voting against another crucial

environmental issues. Not only did the Conservatives vote against the bill, but, prior to the vote, they attempted to have the bill, C-469, withdrawn because of claims that it could cost them money. However, Speaker of the House Peter

Milliken overturned the move to block the bill, stating "the bill provides a new means by which the Crown can be proceeded against where it has failed to meet its legal obligations."

An Environmental Bill of Rights For All Canadians

The Federal NDP has been fighting consistently to ensure we have proper environmental regulations in Canada. Just months ago, we managed to pass the NDP Climate Change Accountability Act, which allows us to see real reductions in greenhouse gas emissions, with a 25% reduction of 1990 levels by 2020, and 80% below 1990 levels by 2050.

Locally, we've seen our share of victories and problems with regards to environmental protection. Blind River has recently been granted funding for the establishment of the Blind River Solar Generating Facility. The facility will produce

enough electricity to power 1,500 homes per month.

However, we are also in the midst of the tragic draining of the upper reaches of the Mississagi River by Brazillian-owned Brascan. This is destroying access to Tunnel Lake and Rocky Island Lake, among other regions, all due to a foreign company wishing to ensure they stay profitable. Fish spawning has been disrupted, habitat that has been enhanced to support stocking efforts is high and dry and the lives of many residents have been stunted.

Many seem to believe that economy trumps the environment, which always brings to mind an old Aboriginal proverb: "Only when the last tree has died and the last river has been poisoned and the last fish has been caught will we realize we cannot eat money."

Be sure to factor in medical expenses – "People don't like to think about it, but medical expenses such as nursing and attendant care, increase during the retirement years," says Conner. If you are concerned about your critical illness insurance or long-term care insurance. "The earlier you buy this type of insurance, the less expensive it is," he adds.

Seek professional advice - "It's important to have a good investment advisor to help you deal with market fluctuations and to preserve your capital, especially during the early years of retirement," says Wainer. 

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CPP changes could affect you

The Canada Pension Plan (CPP) is changing, with some new rules taking effect as early as 2011. The changes will affect people about to start collecting CPP retirement benefits, as well as those already drawing them. Here are some tips on how the changes might affect you from Chartered Accountant Tina Di Vito, head of the BMO Retirement Institute in Toronto.

You won't have to stop working to collect CPP early – "Currently, you have to stop working or significantly reduce your earnings in order to quality for CPP retirement benefits before age 65," says Di Vito. "Beginning in 2012, this requirement will be eliminated."

The changes

may benefit you if you had little or no income for several years –

"The calculation of CPP retirement benefits includes a general adjustment that allows for a dropout of a certain number of low earning years," explains Di Vito. "Currently, the dropout percentage is 15 per cent. It will increase to 16 per cent in 2012 and to 17 per cent in 2014. This change will improve your CPP benefits if you have had several years of low or no income."

You will be able to contribute to CPP while receiving benefits – "Under the current rules, once you start receiving CPP retirement benefits you are not required to make further CPP contributions, even if

you return to work," explains Di Vito. "Beginning in 2011, if you are taking CPP retirement benefits before age 65 and continue to work, you and your employer will be required to make CPP contributions. After age 65, you may choose to continue to make contributions, and, if you do, your employer will also be required to contribute. Additional contributions may increase your CPP benefits."

The calculations for early and late take-up of the CPP are changing – "Under the current calculations, your CPP retirement benefit may be reduced or increased by up to a maximum of 30 per cent, depending on when you start collecting," says Di Vito. "As a result of the changes,

your CPP retirement benefit may be reduced up to a maximum of 36 per cent or increased up to a maximum of 42 per cent, depending on when you start collecting." Changes to the early pension reduction will be phased in over five years, beginning in 2012, while changes to the late pension augmentation will be phased in over three years, beginning in 2011. "This may be an important consideration if you have to decide whether to start receiving early CPP benefits in the next few vears."

Think carefully about when to draw your CPP bene-

fits – "If you need the CPP income, your decision will be different than someone who doesn't need it," advises

Di Vito. "Consider how long you think you might live, given your personal health and family history." Also keep in mind that if you take CPP benefits early and keep working, you will have to keep contributing until age 65.

Compare how you will fare under the current and new rules – "The new rules create an even greater incentive to delay taking your CPP," Di Vito says. "But if you're under 65 and

won't be returning to work, taking your CPP under the current rules will be more beneficial."

Talk to your Chartered Accountant - "Your personal income tax rate, your sources of retirement income and incomesplitting opportunities will influence what is right for you when it comes to the opportune time for you to draw your CPP retirement benefits," says Di Vito. "A CA can help you develop your best CPP strategy by considering all aspects of your personal situation."
