The forest industry is being significantly challenged due to the current economic conditions: historically low lumber selling prices, combined with export taxes on products shipped into the USA markets that also include restrictive export quotas, and the current exchange rate of the Canadian dollar, are negatively impacting most mills resulting in negative cash flows.

> While the forest industry and surrounding

communities struggle with announcements of mill closures, the Chapleau mill continues to operate. The dedication and high performance of the local employees, our improved fibre costs and our strategic capital investments, has enabled the mill to continually improve its competitive position. Tembec Acquires local Co-Generation Plant

n Wednesday August 15, 2007 Tembec Forest Products Group announced the acquisition of the 7.1 MW Chapleau Co-Generation plant.

In an interview

with Mel Jones General Manager of Tembec Chapleau Mill, he stated:

"The Chapleau Co-Generation plant is situated adjacent to our sawmill and is essentially an integrated facility. The Co-Gen's fuel source is supplied directly from our sawmill residuals and in turn we receive steam that supplies our lumber drying and mill heating requirements. During the past three years, we have worked together to increase the reliability of residuals fibre and steam supply. Active efforts in this have improved the Co-



Gen's operating performance, during this time we realized that further significant opportunities existed that would increase the profitability of both facilities. Acquiring the Cogeneration plant will now allow us to implement synergies that will lower our processing costs."

The Co-Gen facility employees 12 unionized and 2 staff employees and will now be integrated into Tembec's Sawmill operational accountabilities. The unionized employees are represented by local 1-2995 of the United Steelworkers Union. The Tembec unionized personnel are in the same union, but a different local. In an interview with Harris Hiscock Co-Generation Plant

Manager, he stated:

"Weare pleased with the acquisition by Tembec and view this as a positive move that will help secure the future of our facility and the stability of our workforce, combining the two facilities as a single unit will benefit both parties."

100% accuracy exceeding our estimated operating targets," stated Eric Tremblay Planer Supt.

Technology: The software system was developed in Finland and consists of color scanning cameras and lasers that send digital imaging information to the optimization software processor, allowing each board to be automatically positioned for trimming and recovery of market requirements. Each board is analyzed and processed for the highest possible saleable \$ dollar value and yield with specific customer requirements. The installation also includes a new fully automatic lug loader, board turner and 16' foot trimmer with 1' foot saw spacing and

The system is

lumber graders or operators required (the old manual grading system was operating at 85 boards per minute and required three operators per shift).

" The technology is incredible, and is on the cutting edge within our industry. It's just amazing to work with this technology, we have been operating the system for 14 weeks now, and have already installed a few software upgrades that continue to allow the tweaking for recovery gains" stated Claude Goudreau QC / Optimization Supervisor.

Installation: The system was installed during the last two weeks of April/07 and commenced start up on May 7/07. Over 35 contractors from Chapleau, Sault Ste thin kerf saws. Marie, Timmins and Quebec were involved capable of processing and on site for a 4-week up to 200 boards per period. minute with no human Benefits: Improved

grade and trimming accuracies have resulted in achieving increased selling prices and mill nets, thus increasing our annual cash flow and profitability. The return on investment has been better than forecasted.

Vision and Strategic **Direction:** Tembec purchased the mill in Dec/03 and immediately made a commitment to manage and operate the mill with a long-term vision developing a strategic direction that would position the mill as a low cost competitive business unit.

During 2004-05 the mill completed phase 1 spending over \$ 3 million in capital investments installing two high-speed Nicholson debarkers, VFD drives on the planer, kiln steam improvements, kiln moisture controls and the acquisition of three extra kilns complete with the required connections.

During 2005 the sawmill moved to a three-shift operation and increased the total workforce level. The mill now operates efficiently with 123 employees

" Our mill is currently operating in its 29th month of a three-shift operation, that continues to be successful, and has allowed the Chapleau mill to become the most profitable sawmill within Tembec's eastern Canadian division. The Chapleau operation was awarded the Presidents cup award for achieving the lowest cash cost mill during 2006 fiscal operating year. This recent investment will further allow our cash cost to improve adding another boost to our morale" Stated Eric Bazinet Sawmill

Production Supt. Labor Relations: The investment has been received by an overwhelming degree of support by our workforce, "We are very proud of our mill and the results that we have been able to achieve, Tembec's commitment to invest capital in our mill during these difficult times, compliments and further recognizes our efforts here. Labor relations are excellent as we continue to strengthen our longterm partnership," Stated Remi St.Martin Union Steward for Local 1-2995 United steel workers.

Funding: The Chapleau project has qualified for 10% Ontario Prosperity fund that was set up by the Ontario Government to help forest companies invest in their own future and the future of the communities that depend on them.

"This is a good news story, particularly in light of what our community has been

challenged with these past few years. I am extremely excited about the long term benefits that this will secure, Tembec continues to be an excellent corporate citizen while playing a key role in our economic recovery and remaining one of our key engines within our community" Stated Mayor Earle Freeborn. McGuinty Government strenghtens forest industry Forest Sector Prosperity Fund Supports Investment That Will Create Jobs For Northerners

The Ontario government is strengthening the forest industry by investing in Tembec through the Forest Sector Prosperity Fund. Natural Resources Minister David Ramsay announced today.

"I applaud the news of this investment and the impact it will have on securing the jobs of the workers at the Tembec facility in Chapleau," said Mike Brown, MPP for Algoma-Manitoulin. "This funding will increase the mill's competitive edge in a difficult market."

The govern-

ment is making available a grant of up to \$3.36 million to Tembec to support recently completed upgrades and further possible capital improvements at its Chapleau sawmill that will allow the mill to optimize use of wood and wood by-products. This investment will strengthen the competitive position of the sawmill and help secure about 150 existing mill jobs.

"As a government, we're investing in the businesses that help prosper," said Ramsay. "Through the key factor in our

Prosperity Fund, we are supporting a key engine of our economy – the forest sector - making that sector more competitive, as well as creating good jobs in the North."

"This investment will allow us to increase our operational efficiency, our product recovery and the value of our products on the marketplace," said Dennis Rounsville, vice president, President Forest Products Group of Tembec. "The government's contribution through Northern Ontario the Forest Sector Prosperity Fund was a

deciding to move ahead with these important upgrades."

The Forest Sector Prosperity Fund is part of the McGuinty government's over \$1billion five-year plan to help forest companies invest in their own future and the future of the communities that depend on them.

This is just the latest example of how the McGuinty government is working to create a stronger and more prosperous forest sector. Some other initiatives include:


Black bear season opens across Northern Ontario

The bear hunting season opens tomorrow in Northern Ontario, Natural Resources Minister David Ramsay announced today.

"I know how important hunting is to Ontario's culture and recognize its contribution to the economy, particularly in the north," said Ramsay. "That's why we have expanded the bear hunt and provided increased hunting

opportunities." As part of a sustainable wildlife management program, in 2004, the government extended the bear hunt by a little over two weeks by setting a consistent closing date of October 31 in the north. In addition, since 2004 resident hunters have been allowed to buy a second bear seal in areas where healthy bear populations can be maintained.

Resident and



non-resident hunters are currently harvesting nearly the same number of bears as were harvested ten years ago.

are reminded that a mandatory questionnaire must be completed and mailed to the ministry on or before December 15. This applies to all

hunters who purchased a black bear hunting licence, whether they hunted for bear or not.

Cats and dogs can be wonderful companions, but they are not always welcome in gardens. Here are some tips for damage control:

First, don't be too quick to lay the blame on your own or your neighbours' pets. Look carefully for clues. Dogs can trample beds and dig big holes, but cats are stealth hunters and will generally move carefully between

Cats make usually respect a plants. shallow scrapes in the soil, but they usually fill them in again. If you find several small holes dug, lilies knocked over, or tulips and crocuses not appearing in the spring, a chipmunk* is the most likely culprit. Birds, especially blackbirds and robins, make shallow scrapes like a cat, but they scatter the soil without backfilling the scrape. Birds also scatter mulch, or get into freshly planted beds and pull up or knock over any plants that are not firmly rooted in. They can cause a lot of damage to flower beds, but they can be deterred with windmills or mobiles. Or cats.

barrier, and a low fence of open-mesh chicken wire can keep a dog off the flower beds. The mesh is easy to see through, so people don't notice the fence much when admiring the garden. Dogs prefer to urinate on strong-smelling plants or on prominent places. A low, solid edging can act as a barrier for target areas, or you can create decoy target areas by placing a tempting 'marking post'. This could be a small boulder placed at the corner of a hedge, or a pungent, hardy herb such as Tansy strategically placed so as to take the brunt of the onslaught while still looking

Cats have a different understanding of territory than dogs, and don't tend to see fences as boundaries. Fortunately, they also cause less damage. They might find loose soil makes a good litterbox, so avoid using potting soils in beds. You can also put down rough bark or chip mulch, which they won't like the feel of, or spread strips of chicken wire over the bed and cover it lightly with soil to prevent digging. Plastic rabbit-guards can be used to prevent cats using trees as scratching posts.

Some people have taken to setting live traps for cats, but be aware that if you bait a trap with meat or fish, you might attract more than cats! Also,

sense of smell, and baited traps will bring cats to your yard that would not otherwise have visited; you might gain several new trespassers for each one you catch.

There are many sprays or pellets advertised to keep pets away, but they are rarely as effective as the ads suggest. By far the safest and most effective deterrent, if pets are a real pest in

motion-sensor sprinkler. Whether it is your own or a neighbour's pet, few animals will risk a soaking more than once.

* Note: If you plan to set traps for chipmunks, use a cylinder trap. Never set mouse or rat traps in the open where other animals, birds, or small children might be injured by them.
