# Improvements to Hydro One power lines

aim to increase reliability of service want to make outages a thing of the past

Local officials met recently with Hydro One and learned a program to upgrade the line bringing hydro electricity to Chapleau is proceeding.

This was welcome news to the members of Chapleau Township Council and the Chapleau Energy Services Corporation, who have been faced in the past with dealing with power outages as the result of failures of fixtures on the 115 KV line which stretches from near Wawa approximately 80 kilometers to Chapleau.

In a move which is designed to go a long way towards

improving the reliability of its supply, Hydro One has embarked on a five year plan to upgrade 535 line poles. It will replace the aging wood cross arms, which have been identified as the cause of some of the failures Chapleau industry and residents are all too familiar with.

A progress report on the line upgrading came at the request of the township council.

One of the issues discussed at the recent meeting centered on the amount of time it takes to repair damage to the line.

"We got assurances that the proper material for repairs would be kept in Chapleau,


which wasn't a priority in the past," stated Mayor Earle J. Freeborn. He added he was pleased with the outcome of the meeting with Hydro One officials. "Our good rapport with Hydro One continues," stated the Mayor.

The meting was also told almost 200 of the old wooden cross arms in the system have already been replaced with the new metal devices.

The power line was constructed in 1955 when a generating station on the Nebskwashi River on the southern outskirts of Chapleau went out of service.

# BMO branch closure to be subject of public meeting here September 2nd Township council goes all out to keep office open

The impending closure of the Bank of Montreal branch office in Chapleau will be the subject of a public meeting set for in the evening, in an September 2nd.

BMO announces the meeting, to be held at the Moore Arena, community hall commencing at 7 o-clock

In its invitation to the public, the advertisement states: "BMO will be

holding a public meeting to exchange views on the Nov. 5th closure of our branch located at 12 Birch in Chapleau."

All are welcome to attend Thursday

September 2nd, 7-9pm at the Chapleau Community Centre Moore Arena, 1 Maple.

In the meantime, the Township municipal council continues its efforts to prevent closure of the BMO branch, and at the same time, is attempting to attract other financial institutions to set up here. The Township has a vital interest in keeping the BMO office here open. It's the Township's bank of record and has been in the community for over a half century. Mayor Freeborn and council have been pulling out all the stops in their efforts and have been notified that its MP, Brent

St. Denis, has expressed his concern over the closure to Federal Finance Minister Ralph Goodale.

In adding his concern to the many in Chapleau and Wawa, where the BMO branch is slated for closure, St. Denis calls on the finance minister to undertake a detailed examination of the situation and see what can be done to ensure that the people of Chapleau and Wawa have suitable banking options. There are two banking alternatives in Chapleau with the Royal Bank and the Northern Credit Union offering full financial services.

# Another step forward for Canadian lumber producers

Conservative Party critic for natural resources John Duncan said in a news release that the recent victory at the WTO on softwood lumber strengthens the Canadian position and shows that we should fight for free trade at international trade tribunals and refrain from caving to American demands to negotiate a non-free trade compromise.

The WTO ruled once again that the United States violated international trade rules in their calculation of softwood duties.

"The WTO ruling is another step forward for Canadian lumber producers, forestry workers and

communities affected by this trade dispute," said Duncan. "It is a further example that we are winning the legal fight at international trade tribunals. We must stay the course and fight for free trade in lumber."

Duncan also expressed concern that the Liberals appear desperate to negotiate a short-term solution at a high cost to softwood stakeholders. "The Liberals seem all too willing to sell out our long-term interests for a short sighted deal, which would be a grave mistake. The only fair trade in softwood lumber is free trade," stated Duncan.

Thanks to former resident Martin Payne, pictured left in the photo, the Chapleau Museum boasts two more h2o scale models of historic sites. Township CAO Allan Pellow is holding the replica of the old pump house, while Payne shows the high school.

A labour of love for a former resident has turned into an accurate and growing portrayal of the history of this community.

Martin Payne, whose family has deep roots in Chapleau dating back to 1910, has been building scale models of some of the community's most historic buildings.

Last week he added two more to the collection which is housed in the museumvisitors' welcome center.

The latest additions to the ever growing display, are scale models of the pump house and the Chapleau High School. They were turned over to the museum last week and join the other models Payne has built, replicating the CPR Van Horne Train station, the the life of the early community, particularly aunt May who was active in the Anglican Church.

Payne, who has spent most of his adult life in Montouresville, Pennsylvania, he has many fond memories of Chapleau.

He has a strong desire to preserve the history of Chapleau and does this by building the models.

It's meticulous work, requiring hundreds of hours. Many more hours are spent researching.

Payne receives some help from his students at the high school and middle school where he teaches landscaping and architectural design.

And while he used old photos and recollections of the local residents Payne also incorporates local materials as much as can. For instance, the sand used in the model of the pump house was taken from the Chapleau River and many of the trees and shrubs are bits of local greenery retrieved during his summer visits.

Payne also does commnission projects for industries and many companies.

#### Assessment of the Pineland-Martel Forest near Chapleau. Foleyet and Gogama, Ontario for FSC Certification

The SmartWood Program of the Rainforest Alliance will conduct a forest management assessment of the Domtar Inc. forestry operations on the Pineland-Martel Forest in the Chapleau, Foleyet and Gogama area in September and October of 2004.

SmartWood will assess aspects of Domtar's management of the Pineland-Martel Forest based on the draft Forest Stewardship Council (FSC) of Canada National Boreal Standard (Draft 3.0, January 16, 2004). Based on the assessment, SmartWood will determine whether Domtar will receive FSC certification on these forests.

Five assessors, including two foresters, a biologist, a socio-economist and an aboriginal specialist will conduct the assessment between September 27 and October 29, 2004. They will be on-site from September 27 through October 1.

# **Province proposes to eliminate** hunting of wildlife in captivity

The province is proposing to eliminate the hunting of wildlife in captivity, Natural Resources Minister David Ramsay announced in a press release.

"Many Ontarians have expressed strong views against hunting in captivity and feel it's inconsistent with Ontario's hunting heritage," said Ramsay. "We have heard those concerns and are acting on them."

Between 10 to 25 game farms in Ontario offer hunting opportunities for captive wildlife such as wild boar and non-native deer. An estimated 200 to 400 animals are hunted in captivity each year, mainly by hunters who are not residents of Ontario.

The province is posting the proposal to amend the Ontario Hunting Regulations to eliminate hunting of wildlife in captivity on the Environmental Bill of Rights Registry for 30 days for comment. To view the proposed change, visit:

There will be no changes to hunting practices this year while the proposal is being considered and reviewed. Any changes would take effect in 2005.

If the proposal leads to regulation changes, Ontario would join Manitoba and British Columbia as provinces that prohibit hunting wildlife in captivity.



## Preparation of the Spanish River Valley Signature Site Strategy Management Options

In August 2002, the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources, Ontario Parks initiated management planning for the Spanish River Valley Signature Site to develop a strategy that, once approved will guide resource stewardship, development and operations. A management options document has been prepared for review in the current stage of the planning process. It is available for inspection until October 8, 2004.

The Spanish River Valley Signature Site includes two Provincial Parks - Spanish River and Biscotasi Lake and three enhanced management preas (EMA) - Sinominda & Kennedy Loke EMA, Acheson Lake EMA and Swonn Lake EMA. The site is situated opproximately 30 km northwest of Sudbury and 100 km south of Chapleau.


