Chapleau's legacy alive and well

 Thanks to Martin Payne, Chapleau's historical buildings come to life in a realistic manner. Over the years, Mr. Payne has created model replicas of Chapleau's well known landmarks and has donated them to the community, the latest being of the original Chapleau Public

School built in 1922. Meticulously detailed, the models can bring one back in time. "Here was the nurse's office" said Mayor Freeborn with a twinkle in his eyes pointing to the upper left hand of the Chapleau Public School replica. "And here was the principal's office" he added, with a somewhat more

somber look, pointing to the upper right hand of the model. The models are all done to HO scale which translates to 1 foot equaling 87 feet. The models are built to scale from photographs. Future projects include the Churches of Chapleau, the old Sacred Heart Separate School and the Indian School which was

located at the Gionet farm, close to where McDougall Fuels are presently located.

"I do this to thank Chapleau for the wonderful memories that made my childhood that much more special" says Payne.

Mr. Payne's father, Gord lived in Chapleau from 1910 to 1928 then moved on to Owen Sound and Windsor. He worked for New York Central Railway on the Windsor-Welland route for 44 years.

Starting in the 50's the family would make an annual summer trek to Chapleau where they would stay at Pellow's Cottages, now owned by Hugh Kuttner.

Martin served in the U.S. Air Force between 1965 and 1972 and was deployed to Vietnam.

Mr. Payne which holds Canadian and US citizenship now resides in Millville, Pennsylvania with his wife

The two real reasons Mr. Harper wants an election – Deficits and Ethics

With recent election speculation and derogatory “Kangaroo court” comments from Prime Minister Harper on Parliamentary committees, Canadians have every right to question the sincerity of his “Stand up for Canada” plan which included legislating fixed

election dates – a bill which was adopted last year with the first fixed election date set for October 2009.

It's quite understandable that Mr. Harper would like Canadians to forget his own statement that “fixed election dates prevent governments from calling snap elections for short-term political advantage” at a time when his own party wants to sideline the

“In and Out” scandal investigations by Election's Canada and the Ethics committee.

So why is Harper changing his mind regarding his own legislation and would want to engineer his own defeat to trigger a fall election?

Firstly, Mr. Harper, while criticizing the work of the Ethics committee which is reviewing the “In and Out” scheme the conservatives used in the 2006 election to improperly exceed spending limits, is really concerned about the possibility of charges by Elections Canada. He would rather just avoid this

altogether by having an election before the reports are complete.

Secondly, as is customary, every November the federal Finance Minister presents a report to Parliament and to Canadians on the health of our economy. Recent reports indicate 55,000 jobs were lost in July and that the Conservatives have squandered the federal surplus and have actually been running a deficit so far this year. It is no wonder that Harper would prefer to be on the election trail rather than having to explain

this year's failing report to Canadians of the Conservatives mismanagement of the economy. It is very likely the country has returned to deficit. Despite Harper trying to convince Canadians that he wants nothing more than to govern, the truth of the matter is that the Conservatives want an election this fall. Harper wants to avoid legitimate questions and investigations in the House of Commons regarding several

Conservative controversies.

Stéphane Dion and the Liberal Party are not going to let the Conservatives orchestrate an election before Canadians get some answers on the alleged in-and-out Conservative election financing scheme and determine if the Conservatives have a strong plan to create jobs, improve the economy and to maintain Canada's record of annual surpluses.

in recreational activities. These activities included swimming at the YMCA, canoeing at RYTAC, an evening of karaoke, mini-olympics competition, bowling, and campfires. This week, we're offering you tips to be more eco-friendly in your yard. A lot of water can be saved by doing these simple tips:

- + It isn't necessary to water the lawn on a daily basis. Actually watering the lawn daily isn't necessarily good for your grass. To know if you need to water your lawn, step on it. If the grass doesn't bounce back, it's time to water it;
- + When you water your lawn, do it at night or in the morning. It isn't as warm during the night and in the morning therefore there is less evaporation, insuring that all the water is getting to your lawn;
- + Plant perennials flowers instead of annual flowers. Annuals might be pretty, but they are not ideal for the environment. Their growth requires more fertilizer and water then perennials and they only last one season rather then growing back every year.
- + Make your own garden. We often hear that it is preferable to buy local products, so to have a garden in your yard puts this in practice. Your vegetables won't need to be transported and if you use ecological fertilizer, you know that they are good not only for your health but also for the environment.

Make sure you look every week for tips that you could do every day to live in a better, greener environment.

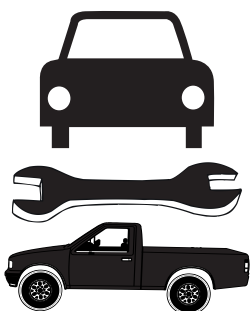

learning visual. Memory is connected to visual images. Children can better understand and get excited about things they see first hand. Teaching children about a topic like history is one thing but showing photos, videos, or graphs to illustrate will help get

them interested.

Care. Give them something to think about beyond daily lessons. Kids are motivated by things they can throw their minds and hearts into. Find a cause kids can be passionate about and encourage them to get involved. Christian Children's

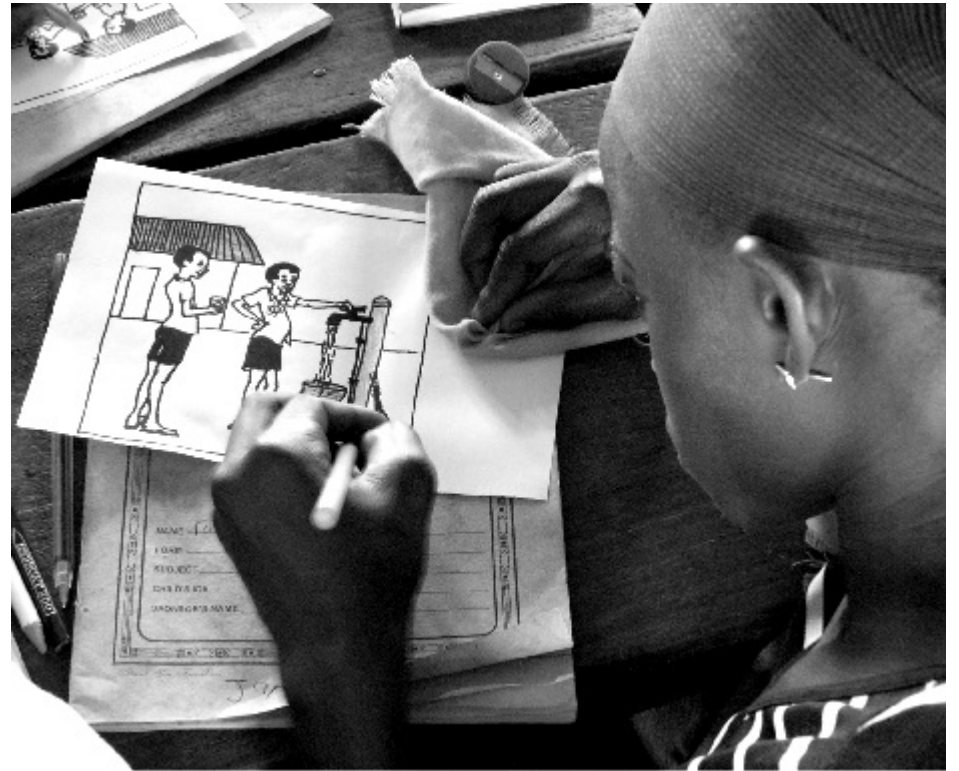

Notre temps...

- Pour la majeure partie de la province, les températures moyennes d'hiver vont entre -13 °C et -4 °C. Celles du grand nord de l'Ontario tombent à -47°C.
- Pour la majeure partie de l'Ontario, les températures moyennes de printemps et d'été vont de 10 °C à 27 °C. Dans le Sud de l'Ontario, les températures peuvent dépasser 40 °C.

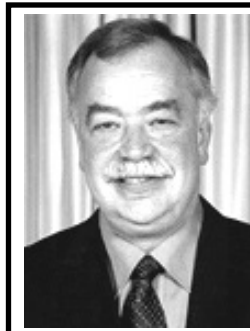
- En superficie, l'Ontario est la deuxième province du Canada. Il a plus de 2 000 km de longueur et occupe plus de 10 % du territoire du pays
- L'Ontario est plus grand que la France et l'Espagne réunies et plus grand que les deux plus grands états des É.-U., l'Alaska et le Texas, combinés
- Algoma-Manitoulin la circonscription du député Mike Brown est presque la même grandeur que la province
- Deux tiers de l'Ontario sont recouverts par le bouclier canadien. C'est la roche la plus vieille de la terre, du granit précambrien formé il y a des millions d'années
- Deux tiers de l'Ontario sont boisés
- « Ontario » est un terme Iroquois soit « Onitariio » ou « Kanadario », que l'on pourrait traduire par « beau » ou « miroitant » en parlant de l'eau ou d'un lac. L'eau recouvre environ un sixième de l'Ontario

Keeping children active can improve academic performance



(NC)—With the end of summer looming, parents may consider decreasing the number of activities their child participates in to ensure their child can focus on academics.

However, a recent survey conducted by Ipsos-Reid on behalf of Kumon Math and Reading Centres has found that children that are engaged in extra-curricular activities

experience academic benefits beyond their less-active counterparts.

According to responses from more than 1,200 Canadian parents, the number of nights a student participates in extra-curricular activities does not negatively impact academic performance. Of those parents surveyed whose child participates in extra-curricular activities on two or more school nights, 84 percent were identified by their parents as academically at or above average grade level.

"Extra-curricular activities are important. They challenge children to explore their talents and interests, develop responsibility, and encourage time management skills as students learn to balance schoolwork, extracurricular activities, social life, health, and for many older students, a job," explains Dr. Donna McGhie-Richmond, education specialist

with Kumon Math and Reading Centres. "The survey findings point out that the majority of students who perform well in school have achieved a balance between homework demands and extra-curricular activities. This is key to their achievement."

The amount and type of extra-curricular activities will depend on a number of factors including the age of your child.

•Kindergarten to Grade 2: The early school years are a time for your child to adjust to school routines and explore individual interests. Non-competitive sports and other physical activities such as dance or gymnastics are good bets, as well as enhancing your child's creative side with art or music classes.

•Grades 3 – 6: Team sports are now a good bet at these grade levels. Your child is old enough to remember and follow rules and typically has the maturity to handle a bit of competition.

•Grades 7 – 12: Pre-teens and teenaged children can be steered toward activities such as clubs of interest, volunteering, and leadership activities at school (e.g., school newspaper) or in the community (e.g., Scouts or Guides). Part time jobs are popular with this age group. While your child will enjoy the extra money and independence that accrues from having a job, now more than ever striving for and maintaining a balance among school work, extra-curricular activities and a job is critical.

Parents can help by encouraging their child to become involved in extra-curricular activities whether offered at school or in the community. Here are some tips:

•Explore the options that are available at your child's school and in the community. Talk to your child's teacher and other parents. You will be surprised to learn how many

activities are free or have a nominal charge.

•Talk to your child about his or her interests and once you have researched possibilities, discuss those options with your child.

•Ensure that your child is not over scheduled and has enough 'down' time during weekdays. This varies from child to child, but some signs of possible over scheduling include irritability, tantrums, regular complaining about the activity itself, a recurring illness such as stomachaches, and a sudden drop in grades.

Remember, children who have developed good study habits from a young age, are doing well in school and are not spending time struggling with their homework will have more free time available to pursue after-school activities. Educational programs such as Kumon help children develop good study habits so they can free up time to explore other interests.
