Legion and Canadian Ranger Sgt. Peter Moon.

The new veteran's flag was designed by Patrick Cheechoo from Mattawa First Nations. Patrick is also a Deputy Grand Chief candidate.

Beardy said that the Aboriginal participation in Canada's war efforts has been proportionately higher than any other group of Canadians, noting that many Aboriginal soldiers used their traditional hunting skills to serve as snipers and scouts and others used their Cree language to serve as code talkers to communicate sensitive military plans in a language the enemy could not understand.

The NAN Veterans Flag features an Elder veteran holding an eagle staff along with a goose, bear, the rising sun and seven eagle feathers representing honour for veterans, unity and sovereignty of NAN First Nations and the seven sacred teachings.

"This image is a tribute to the Cree, Ojibway and Oji-Cree war veterans from Nishnawbe Aski Nation as depicted by the goose and the bear," Beardy said. "Additionally, the goose and bear, along with the eagle staff, signify the connection that First Nations people have with Mother Nature, all living things, our culture and our traditions."

Native Soldiers - Foreign Battlefields-Decorated by Destiny

Considering his father's overseas exploits, one would think fate had chosen Charles Henry Byce to be a military hero. His mother, Louisa Saylors, a Cree from Moose Factory, Ontario, had married Henry Byce, a non-Native from Westmeath. When Charles was born in 1917 in Chapleau, the First World War was still raging, and his father was fighting in Europe, meriting two decorations for valour: the DCM plus France's Medaille militaire. Two decades later, 23year-old Charles Byce joined the Lake

Superior Regiment (Motor) – the "Lake Sups" – and began a remarkable journey, practically tracing his father's path. When it was over, Byce had become the only man in his regiment to earn both the Distinguished C o n d u c t M e d a l (D C M) a n d th e Military Medal.

Byce earned his first decoration for valour – the MM – in the Netherlands in January 1945. By that time, the Allies had established themselves in France and Belgium and, in another month, would launch an offensive for a final push over the Rhine into Germany.

Before dawn on January 21, Acting Corporal Byce and 23 other Lake Sups set off in row-boats to cross the Maas River. Their mission was to sneak behind enemy lines and bring back German prisoners so information on enemy units could be gathered. Byce headed a five-man team charged with providing cover for the reconnaissance group.

Soon after it had landed on enemy territory, the reconnaissance group was fired upon from three German positions. Byce personally located two of them and silenced them with grenades. He also managed to obtain information from a German prisoner before the group started back.

The patrol escaped safely and, afterward, Byce became one of more than 1,200 Canadians to receive the MM. His citation commended the corporal for his "coolness" and "devotion to duty" and credited him with the mission's success. earn the DCM during the Second World War. The Rhineland Campaign was well under way, but enemy defences still blocked the Allied path into Germany. This was the enemy's last major line of defence and it would not be broken easily. Counterattacks were fierce and numerous.

On March 2, 1945, the Lake Sups engaged in the most difficult fighting the regiment had known. At 4 a.m., Acting Sergeant Byce and the rest of C Company set out to occupy a group of buildings south of the Hochwald Forest. By 6 a.m., they had accomplished their goal, but the day's first light revealed their location to the enemy. C Company was bombarded with shells and mortar. All of its tanks were destroyed and casualties mounted quickly. The victims included every

officer - even the company commander. Meanwhile, four enemy tanks were approaching. The regimental history explains what happened next:

In the confusion and general disorder the enemy closed in upon C Company's position. Grimly the Lake Sups held on, the perimeter of their defences becoming smaller and smaller, and their escape corridor to the rear, narrower and narrower With ferocity and courage [Sergeant] Byce, now commanding the remnants of C Company, fought as long as he could; then gathering what few men he was able to find about him he made his way back through the bulletstrewn escape alley.

It was 3 p.m.

afternoon behind his group, sniping at enemy infantry so they could not trace the company's withdrawal.


Again, his citation was impressive:

The magnificent courage and fighting spirit displayed by this NCO when faced with almost insuperable odds are beyond all praise. His gallant stand, without adequate weapons and with a bare handful of men against hopeless odds will remain, for all time, an outstanding example to all ranks of the Regiment.

Byce and the Lake Sups had a dvanced into Germany by the time the war in Europe ended on May 8, 1945. The following month, he was sent to England. He returned to Canada in September 1945.

Some six weeks later, Byce became one of only 162 Canadians to when Byce ordered the retreat of his men. He spent the rest of the





For more than 50 years of its history, Chapleau was relatively isolated from the outside world with the Canadian Pacific Railway providing the only means of transportation to and from the community. The longest drive that anyone could take in 1947 was about 35 miles out of town, and owning a vehicle in Chapleau was not common. As a boy I can recall watching the occasional vehicle being unloaded at the CPR freight sheds, but I was very fortunate as my good friends Mr. Brownlee and Mr. Hopper would take me for rides to Bucciarelli Beach, and my uncle, B.W. "Bubs" Zufelt always had a vehicle for his Chapleau Bakery.

In 1948 a disastrous forest fire struck and the provincial government made available opportunities to lumber companies which brought J.E. Martel and Sons Lumber Ltd. and A and L Lafreniere Lumber Ltd. to Chapleau, and others to the area. A



highway became essential and Highway 129 essentially a turkey trail through the bush was completed to Thessalon in 1949. But a highway was a highway and it was a first step in improving Chapleau's transportation links with the outside world -- and provided adventure stories for years from those who travelled Highway 129. Maybe it still does!

By the Fifties, the "other side of Main Street" between Young and Lorne Streets was being developed led by A.J. Grout, the president of Smith and Chapple Ltd, and by 1958, the downtown had a new look. Smith and Chapple expansion was the major factor but Cecil Smith opened the new Fox Theatre replacing the Regent Theatre which then became the Royal Bank of Canada branch. By 1955 the Bank of Montreal had arrived and was located at Birch and Young Streets across from the Algoma Hotel. Simpson's (now Sears) opened a catalogue store and so did Eaton's. The

Dominion store moved down the street after BMO arrived to Birch and Lorne to a relatively new building that had been built by Charles W. Collins first as a car dealership then a bowling alley and pool room.

And Chapleau got its new post office, considered a gift from Lester B. Pearson, our member of parliament for Algoma East later to become prime minister of Canada. The township council was also busy at this time bringing Chapleau a sewage system, paving some of the roads and building the Chapleau Memorial Community Arena. My Uncle Bubs, mentioned above, was the reeve of Chapleau while most of this activity was taking place between 1948 and 1955.

The CPR had built a diesel repair shop at Chapleau, and the economic future looked bright.

Wow! I gave you that glimpse of Main Street Chapleau mostly from my memory and referrals to my 1984 book Sons of Thunder ... Apostles of Love, the history of St. John's Anglican Church.

Let me return to Smith and Chapple expansion in the fifties to provide one example of the type of economic confidence there was in Chapleau during the Fifties. In the Mid-North News of December 11, 1958 there was a two page spread on the company revealing that it employed an estimated 130 people, making it a large employer.

The original store was founded on the site where Village Shops is today by A. MacNeice Austin about 1895. In 1958 it housed the pharmacy, jewellery, ladies wear, men's wear, groceries, hardware, restaurant, gifts and general office. Mr. Grout was president while Gene Bernier was assistant general manager, Earle Sootheran was vice president, Ron Serre, credit manager and R.L. "Bob" Warren was the secretary treasurer.

On the other side of the street in the

new building a garage and car dealership, furniture, plumbing and heating, electronics, and wholesale hardware were located. And the company was using one of the forerunners of the internet to connect to Toronto wholesalers and its locations in other communities using a teletype machine. Marie Chambers was in charge of this operation.

Some of the managers of the day were Joe Shannon in men's wear, Mel Ennis in furniture and funeral director. Dick Lapp in the ladies wear, Dave Johnson in

hardware, Bill Payette in sporting goods, Marion Ennis in the restaurant, Colin Barlow in the garage, Adams Andrews in plumbing and heating, William Walker as advertising manager, Larry Downey as wholesale manager and Norman and Lauretta Veit in meat and groceries. Roy May was managing the store by the CPR station.

And yes, I am a Smith and Chapple alumnus. I worked in the men's wear, furniture, garage and meat and groceries part-time while attending high school and university.

Attawapiskat First Nation slows traffic at 101 and 129 junction to bring attention to crisis in their community

On Tuesday, August 11, 2009 members from the Attawapiskat First Nation with support from the Chapleau First Nations and the visiting delegates of the NAN Keewaywin Conference held a peaceful traffic slowdown demonstration at the junction of highway 101 and highway 129.

Support was evident as most vehicles honked their horns as they passed thru.

On July 25, 2009, 90 members of the Attawapiskat First Nation were evacuated from their community to the town of Cochrane, Ontario when sewage back up contaminated eight of their housing units. The Chief and Council had declared a state of emergency; however their declaration fell on deaf ears. Both the Department of Indian Affairs and Emergency Measures Ontario did not consider the sewage problem as an emergency and therefore would not support the evacuation of the families. The Chief and Council then took matters into their own hands and evacuated their members at their own expense.

"It is shameful that our community members have no other way to have their voices heard than to

A valid full class G driver's license is required, along with a clear criminal reference check. stand along a highway, but the federal and provincial governments have turned a deaf ear on us in our time of need," said Attawapiskat First Nation Chief Theresa Hall.

In a 1992 agreement between the federal and provincial governments, both levels of governments have agreed that the Chief and Council of a First Nation community would have the authority to declare a state of emergency. But in this latest crisis, Canada and Ontario have both turned their backs on the Attawapiskat First Nation.

There is no current timeframe for when the 90 Attawapiskat residents will be able to return home. Deputy Chief Theresa Spence indicated "there is much work to be done in the community before the people return home. Our staff are working hard to ensure that the homes are safe and that appropriate temporary accommodations are available soon." Greg Shisheesh, one of the community liaison officers, indicated that there is growing concern about the health and wellbeing of the people that have been evacuated to



Cochrane. "With the H1N1 pandemic we are very concerned that there may be a serious outbreak soon. Each member that has been evacuated and here in Cochrane needs to h a v e a h e a l t h assessment done prior to their returning home."

There is growing concern unrest with the leadership and community members due to the current and historic grievances that the community has filed with the governments, but still no action is seen. The leadership has expressed a desire to have a meeting with both levels of government and De Beers Canada on the following points: 1. The Attawapiskat First Nation deserves a safe community. The infrastructure of the community needs to be assessed and remediated. the condition and serious lack of housing in the community needs to be resolved. 2. The Attawapiskat First Nation deserves the same standard of education as any citizen in Canada. The community has been without a proper elementary school for the past 10 years. 3. The Attawapiskat First Nation desires to be out of the state of poverty that it currently is in. The wealth of the De Beers Victor mine is not reaching the com-

the munity.

The leadership of the Attawapiskat First Nation demands that the federal and provincial governments and De Beers Canada meet with the community immediately to begin addressing the above points. Grand Chief Stan Louttit is imploring both levels of government and De Beers Canada to work with the First Nation in addressing important community issues. "A

peoples can only take so much. Why is it that we have to resort to some form of civil disobedience to have our voice heard?" stated the Grand Chief. The Attawapiskat First Nation is a remote community on the west coast of James Bay with a population of 1,800 on reserve and a total population of 2,300 and is approximately 700 kilometres north of Timmins, Ontario.




