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Bear bins pose new problems as Township forced into stronger action

combination of events has resulted in a dramatic drop in the number of bears entering the community this summer, however the municipality is faced with a growing problem around those bear bins meant to discourage the bears in a safety measure. And it is going to clamp down on those who insist on abusing bins and have created a new set of problems.

The heavy wild blueberry crop and lush forest growth has provided the local bear population with plenty to eat and they have stayed away from the community. At the same time, the municipality continued to maintain fifteen heavy steel bear bins in the event the animals wandered into town. The units were located for use by

residents in their immediate area of town.

However, with one problem out of the way, it appears it's been replaced by another, which left unpoliced, could lead to more serious health and safety issues. It centers around piles of personal garbage, which have been stuffed in, and around the bins and they contain waste not meant for the units.

These include mattresses, large cardboard packing boxes, carpeting, roofing paper and nails, loose metal, dog feces, small appliances and car batteries. Some was stuffed in the trash bins, although much of it was left lying around creating additional problems. And in one instance, a bag of fish entrails was dumped, leading to health concerns

considers the practice, the Township in some sleuthing by its by-law enforcement officer, has successfully traced some of the waste to its origin and issued a warning. However, officials stated it is prepared to lay charges under its anti-littering by-law, which would lead to serious consequences, including a financial penalty. The Township is calling on the public to cooperate so it will not have to take such drastic steps.

Officials ask that if the bin is full, users should take the refuse back home. If persons do have certain waste to dispose of there is an easy and efficient procedure as the municipality does have a protocol in place. For disposal of large items such as mattresses all it takes is a phone call to the municipal office and it will be picked up. Construction waste is



OPP solves plane crash investigation



Shown above is a Fokker Super Universal airplane similar to the one involved in the accident on St. Julien Lake in 1937. The plane was first introduced in 1928. A total of 123 airplanes were built. 80 by Atlantic Aircraft, 29 by Nakajima Japan and 14 by Vickers Canada.

The Superior East Wawa OPP along with the assistance of the Air Dale Services, the Bush Plane Museum of Sault Ste Marie Ontario and a number of calls from the public have now been able to identify the plane involved at

the crash site located on St. Julien Lake, northeast of Dubreuilville.

Information obtained from a web site called the Golden Years of Aviation revealed that the plane in question was a Fokker Super

Universal and that the plane had crashed on St. Julien Lake during a landing back on the 19th of December 1937.

The OPP want to thank the public for their assistance in solving this investigation.





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Keep flying and stinging insects out of summer fun



(NC)—Mornings by the pool, afternoons at the barbecue, nights at the ice cream store. Just another summer day for people — and for pests. According to the experts at Orkin/PCO Services, flying and stinging insects arrive in full force in summer to enjoy the warm, sunny days.

"Yellow jackets, mosquitoes and flies are just a few flying insects that homeowners might see this summer," said Bill Melville, quality assurance manager for Orkin/PCO Services.

Birdbaths, ornamental ponds, and puddles from pools and sprinkler systems offer prime breeding spots for the pests. These flying furies can breed in a tiny amount of standing water, even as small as a thimble.

To help prevent flying and stinging insects from ruining your summer fun, Orkin/PCO Services recommends the following measures to make homes and yards less attractive to the pests:

- Keep food in tightly sealed containers when picnicking.
- Cover soda cans. Yellow jackets often enter cans unseen.
- Empty and wash garbage cans regularly

to keep pest-attracting food and beverage residue from building up.

- Fit screens and tighten seals properly on doors and windows.
- Remove puddles of stagnant water to eliminate potential mosquito breeding spots.

• Monitor for nests frequently and call a licensed pest control professional immediately for safe treatment and removal.

Selon un sondage, certains enseignants paient eux-mêmes les fournitures scolaires

(EN)—Selon un nouveau sondage réalisé par Bureau en Gros et la firme Stratégies Angus Reid, 34 % des élèves canadiens retourneront à l'école cet automne sans même avoir les fournitures scolaires de base, et plusieurs enseignants les achèteront euxmêmes afin de rétablir un certain équilibre en classe. Le sondage démontre que l'on s'attend de plus en plus à ce que les professeurs paient pour les fournitures scolaires.

Un enseignant sur cinq affirme que tous ses étudiants commencent l'année scolaire sans avoir les outils dont ils ont besoin

Les enseignants affirment que le nombre d'élèves qui commencent l'année sans le matériel dont ils ont besoin est plus élevé qu'il y a cinq ans.

Le Québec et l'Ontario semblent vivre des situations opposées en ce qui concerne les fournitures scolaires. Selon les enseignants de l'Ontario, 41 % des étudiants commencent l'année scolaire sans avoir les outils essentiels, tandis que les enseignants du Québec attirment que 28 % des élèves sont dans la même situation.

Même si le coût des fournitures scolaires est un facteur majeur de ce problème, les résultats du sondage suggèrent également qu'il semble y avoir confusion à savoir qui est responsable de l'achat de certaines four-

nitures scolaires.

20,000 tonnes not going to landfill

Ontario can divert 20,000 tonnes of polystyrene a year from going to landfill. Waste in the form of quick service food con-tainers, foam coffee cups, clamshells, crystal drink con-tainers, meat trays, yogurt cups and white cushion packaging used to protect fragile goods, can now all be recycled.

That's 20,000 tonnes! That's enough to create a hole as big as eight Olympic sized swimming pools in a landfill.

Not one bit of this valuable material has to be sent to landfill because it is 100% recyclable!

Now because of state-of-the-art technology, the first of its kind to be deployed in North America, we have the capacity to recycle 100 per cent of the polystyrene used in

the province. Not only that, but the material is re-manufactured into new consumer goods, creating green jobs for Ontarians and sustained demand for used polystyrene.

"There were those who said it couldn't be done. Well, the industry has figured out a way, and today this province has the facilities and capacity to recycle every scrap of polystyrene and completely remove the material from the waste stream. In fact, we can't get enough poly-styrene," said Joe Hruska of the Environment and Plastics Industry Council (EPIC).

Polystyrene is one of the most versatile packaging materials. It is 100% recyclable, hygienic, and an excellent insulator. It offers significant health and

safety benefits for consumers of food packaging, and in most cases, has a lower environmental profile than alternatives. Two types of polystyrene – high impact and expanded – are commonly used; high impact for yogurt and cottage cheese containers, clear bakery and produce containers, clear drinking cups, and cutlery; expanded for clamshells, meat trays, egg cartons, plates, coffee cups and packing material.

This new recycling program for polystyrene represents a new approach to help municipalities divert valuable materials from landfill. This is recycling with a difference; no more shipping out of province. Polystyrene useful products like recycling comes with built-in markets right in Ontario's own backyard which plays very well with rising oil and transportation costs.

Ontario's newly expanded polystyrene recycling capacity includes two markets. Grace Canada of Ajax recycles the white cushion packing material used to protect electronics, furniture and other fragile items. The Canadian Poly-styrene Recycling Alliance (CPRA), located in Toronto, Mississauga and Port Hope, recycles blue box polystyrene collected at curbside - food packaging and beverage containers.

The recycled polystyrene is made into valuable and

picture frames, coat hangers, seedling trays, cornices, moldings, base boards, and office supplies. Grace Canada uses it to make life-saving fire-proofing materials used in construction.

The only reason why there isn't 100-per-cent polystyrene recycling in Ontario is because some municipalities have not included the material in their recycling programs.

"Did you know that almost every nonmetal picture frame is made from recycled polystyrene now? People don't realize that polystyrene, their used food packaging, can be recycled and remade into amazing consumer products. Just give us your used yogurt containers, clamshells, cake and produce trays and create jobs right here in Ontario. There really is little reason for not including polystyrene in recycling pro-grams," said Hruska. "Every muni-cipality in Ontario now has the opportunity to do the right thing for the environ-ment. We're urging them to get on board."

Workload volume is one of nine "working conditions that matter" on which the study focused to arrive at the conclu-sion that working conditions are more favourable overall for secondary public school teachers. The report suggests that since teacher working conditions are student learning conditions, better working conditions should be the focus for school improvement.

The study was undertaken by Kenneth Leithwood, a professor at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education (OISE) at the University of Toronto, on behalf of the Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario (ETFO). Evidence for the study was collected from phone interviews with a small number of teachers who had recently worked in both elementary and secondary schools and from survey responses from 3,000 elementary and secondary teachers.

Almost all teachers who had worked in both elementary and secondary schools indicated that workload volume in elementary schools was more demanding than it had been in secondary schools.

"ETFO's own research shows that elementary public school teachers worked over 115 hours longer than their secondary colleagues this school year," noted ETFO President David Clegg.

"One of the key reas ons why elementary teachers have a greater workload is that they receive far less preparation time than secondary school teachers," Clegg said.

"This results in elementary teachers having 37 minutes less time every day for lesson preparation, marking and student assessment. Less preparation time means teachers have less time to tailor their efforts to best meet the

n e e d s o f e a c h individual child," said Clegg.



Keeping your money safe

CFIB-As a small business owner you know you can lose a great deal of money from theft. Theft takes many forms from shoplifting and counterfeit cash, to debit/credit card fraud

and robbery loss. Cash is the most attractive item for thieves and, although you cannot eliminate theft completely, you can use a combination of measures to protect

your money.

Prevention starts with you. CFIB has gathered the following tips to help keep your money safe: The cash register: Close the cash drawer once a transaction is completed. Keep only sufficient cash in the register to adequately handle transactions. Place stickers in plain view, indicating that only small amounts of money are kept in the register. Count the cash in a secure location, ideally after closing, when the doors are locked. Leave empty cash drawers open after hours to prevent damage from thieves. Encourage payment by debit or credit card in order to handle less cash when possible. Inform customers that you only open the cash register for trans-

actions and that you do

not give change. Prevent customers from seeing where petty cash is kept.

Safes: Put a safe in the back of your business or install a small safe under the cash register to transfer large bills, out of sight by customers. Place a larger safe in a well-lit location elsewhere, shielded from public view, to deposit large sums, expensive products, card readers, etc. Anchor the safe to the floor to prevent thieves from removing it. Affix stickers on the safes, indicating that employees are unable to open them. Change the combinations of the safes regularly. Don't expect a "fire safe" to do the job of a "burglar-resistant" safe.

Deposits: Have someone accompany you to the bank for deposits. Conceal your deposit bag. Vary your time and your route. Make bank deposits daily. If possible, during selling hours, check the amount of cash in your registers and remove all excess cash from each register several times a day.

Money for

deposits should not be held on your premises over night or over the weekend. If possible, avoid having the same individual make the deposits. Drive to the bank rather than walking. If necessary, do not hesitate to use a firm that specializes in transporting cash. Lastly, train your employees. Let them know what may happen and what steps to follow if a robbery should occur. Remember to report crimes or suspicious activities to the police. They need your help so they can help you in crime-proofing yourself and your community. 
