## Local lumber pioneer passes on



Lucien Lafrenière 1924 - 2012

n August 8th, 2012 the last original local lumber pioneer passed away at 88 years of

Paul Tremblay arrived in Racine Lake in order to establish a sawmill to salvage timber from a forest fire. Edouard Demers came in a few weeks later.

After building a small temporary sawmill to produce lumber to build the main mill and buildings, Lucien Lafrenière got the first job as sawyer.

As lumber was produced, the necessary buildings were built to face the fast approaching winter. Edouard Demers was put in charge of the priority building, the "cookery". The men spent their first winter in a half tent - half

wood bunkhouse.

In 1960 a plywood plant was built in Panet Township which is still known as the Lafrenière mill site. In 1964 the plywood plant was destroyed by fire. In November of the same year the sawmill in Racine Lake was in turn destroyed by fire. The rebuilding of both a plywood plant and a lumber mill at the same time was too great of a task. In 1965 the sawmill was rebuilt and commenced production.

In the next few years the building for the plywood plant was rebuilt but remained empty as the approval to harvest poplar was denied by the Department of Lands and Forest as they estimated that there wasn't enough poplar available to sustain a plywood plant, a decision that never sat well with Mr. Lafrenière.

The Chapleau mill burnt down in 1969 and a new mill was constructed in the vacant cement block plywood mill building. This mill was in operation under the Lafrenière ownership until 1992 at which time A & L Lafrenière Lumber Ltd. was sold to Green Forest Lumber of Toronto.

Mr. Lafrenière along with his wife

Rolande made Chapleau their home, raising their family of seven. He was an integral part of Chapleau's economic well being for 43 years employing thousands over the years in an era where employees were not numbers, and in a lot of cases lifelong friends and where handshakes were better than written contracts.

Mr. Lafrenière was a lifelong aviation enthusiast. Having received his pilot's license at 18 years of age, he flew his aircraft until he was 84. At 49 he was successful in acquiring his helicopter pilot's license. He flew helicopters for 19 years.

In 1975 the first function of its kind to be performed in Northern Ontario, provincial police commissioner Harold

H. Graham, of Toronto, recognized the contributions of Lucien Lafrenière to this community by awarding him the fourth Commissioner's Citation, the first such award to be made to a northern resident.

An inscription on the citation explains that the award was made to Lafrenière owner of A & L Lafrenière Lumber, "for having provided invaluable aid in time of tragedy or need, giving freely of his expertise and specialized facilities. Lafrenière has on numerous occasions rendered service for the well being of fellow members of the community by his participation in search and rescue operations without thought of favour or recompense, his contribution has always been for the public good."

According to police, Lafrenière's participation in search and rescue operations could be traced back at least 15 years. Over that period, he has provided any assistance warranted when someone was lost in the bush.

Police said that Lafrenière has supplied a plane and boats to searchers as well as participating in these rescue attempts. On occasion, he has been known to pull his employees off the work-site and assign them to participation in rescue attempts.

Mr. Lafreniere use to jokingly say that two would be needed to replace him on his departure. On May 10th, two days after his death, twin greatgrandchildren were born to André and Kara Lafrenière son to Robert and Anne Marie Lafrenière.

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

## Robert Fife of CTV News meets Bishop Tom Corston 44 years later at the 90th anniversary reunion of Chapleau High School



Over the next 44 years they went their separate ways but they met at the 90th anniversary reunion festival of CHS, where Tom, now the Rt. Rev. Thomas A Corston, the Anglican bishop of the Diocese of Moosonee, invited Bob, now the Ottawa Bureau Chief of CTV NEWS, to participate in an



ecumenical service.

Thomas A.
"Tom" Corston, born and raised in Chapleau, Ontario, the son of Frances (Jardine) and the late Henry "Chicken" Corston, was elected the ninth Bishop of the Anglican Church Diocese of Moosonee at a synod in Timmins in July 2010...

He had been serving as an archdeacon in the Anglican church and also Rector of the Church of the Epiphany, Sudbury, Ontario, in the Diocese of Algoma.

Growing up in Chapleau, Tom was active in St. John's Anglican Church, as AYPA president, which is a parish in the Diocese of Moosonee, he now leads.. Tom becomes the first Chapleau boy to have become an Anglican priest to have been elected a Bishop. Tom was also a president of the Students' Council at CHS.

He graduated from Lakehead University with the Bachelor of Arts degree and Wycliffe College with a Master of Divinity degree. He was ordained a deacon in the Anglican church in a service at St. John's Anglican Church, Chapleau, in 1974, and became a priest a year later.

He started his ministry in the Diocese of Moosonee and then served in several parishes in Atlantic Canada and Ontario.

Tom's grand-parents John and Lydia (Swanson) Corston, came from James Bay in the Diocese of Moosonee to Chapleau in 1907 where his grandfather began work with the Canadian Pacific Railway. They established their family home on Grey Street.

Bob, who was born in Chapleau, is the son of Margaret and the late Clyde Fife. Bob's grandfather George Fife was manager of the Chapleau Electric Light and Power Company and served as reeve of the Township of Chapleau from 1938 to 1942. Bob's father Clyde was later the manager and then of Chapleau Hydro.

After graduating from CHS. where like Tom, he had served as president of the Students' Council,

Bob attended the University of Toronto where he earned the Bachelor of Arts degree.

In 1978, Bob started his journalism career in the parliamentary bureau of NewsRadio and then he worked for United Press International. He then became a senior political reporter for the Canadian Press and later spent 10 years as Ottawa Bureau Chief and political columnist for the Sun Media chain. At one point in the 1980s Maclean's magazine called Bob the best investigative reporter in Canada.

After the National Post was founded he joined it in 1998, and he became Ottawa Bureau Chief for CanWest News Services and the National Post in 2002.. He has won the Edward Dunlop Award for Spot News and two National Newspaper Citation of Merit for political reporting.

In 1991, Bob's first book, 'A Capital Scandal' which he wrote with John Warren came out. In 1993, Bob's second book, 'Kim Campbell: The Making of a Politician' was published. She became the first female prime minister of Canada. Both books remain a must read for a better understanding of politics in Canada.

However, it has been since Bob became Ottawa Bureau Chief of CTV News in 2005 that he has become a household name in Canada.

At the end of the service, a photo op was arranged where Bob and Tom would pose for a photo, although in so doing, I neglected to let them know that the 1968 photo would play a role in this column. Thanks to Dr Bill Pellow for arranging for the photos to be taken. My email is mj.morris@live.ca.



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## SoccerFest 2012: Updates

SoccerFest is only one week away. This is my first time planning a major event and it is turning out to be interesting. First off, I want to say that all upto-date information is posted on the main page of the soccer league's website: www.chapleausoccer.c a. I hope to address all questions with today's article. It is a bit lengthy, I'm sorry, but there is a lot of info to cover.

Who, what, when, where, how, and why: SoccerFest is run by the Chapleau Soccer League as a final celebration and goodbye to summer. It also caps a successful year of soccer as I iterated in my previous article "Soccer Still Strong in Chapelau". SoccerFest is my way of saying thank you to everybody. Once again, attending and participating in SoccerFest is free. Only the BBQ requires money; more on the free tickets in a bit.

SoccerFest will be held at the Field of Dreams behind CHS/CPS on Saturday, August 25th from 5:00pm to 8:00pm and on Sunday, August 26th from 9:00 am to 7:00pm.

#### **Rec Soccer Matches:**

Recreation soccer matches will be held for 11v11 or 6v6 games depending on registration numbers for each group. There are currently 5.5 hours of field time reserved. 6v6 games can be played two at a time. The age groups are: 5-6, 7-9, 10-14, and 15+ (high school and adults). 4 year olds are welcome to the 5-6 group but with caution. Parents can use the registration form to ask for their child to be moved up or down in age groups. We will try and accommodate you. Prizes and their criteria will be decided based on registration numbers so please register as early as possible.

R/C Show: There are no age restrictions for competing in the R/C show; however I do caution parents to supervise their children to ensure their vehicle is under control and doesn't damage another competitor's vehicle. There is some risk that your R/C vehicle may be damaged, breaks

down, or be destroyed during the event. The soccer league will not be responsible for repairs or replacement. The limitation of liability does not apply to other competitors. You can be held responsible if you intentionally break another person's R/C vehicle. Qualifying will be held because there is a limit to the number of vehicles that can run at once (typically three or four). If you miss your race, you will be disqualified. You are allowed to loan your vehicle to another person who is not registered to compete if you are busy at another event when your race is called. There will be AA, AAA, and 9V batteries at the event. We are currently working on a generator and other types of batteries to be present.

#### **All-Star Competition:**

These are great spectator events. The all stars are broken down into groups: 4, 5-6, 7-8, 9-10, 11-12, 13-14, 15+. In this event, children are only permitted to move up age groups not down. The event list so far is:

- -Fastest Sprint
- -Marathon Run
- -Longest Throw-In
- -Most Accurate Cross -Best Goal Celebration Team
- -Best Goal Celebration Individual

Some events will take place at the same time as others. We will work the age groups so everyone has the opportunity to participate in everything. Both the sprints and marathon will be on grass with cleats. No steel cleats are permitted. The Breakaway Challenge and Best Goal Celebration will be judged by guest, celebrity judges.

#### Training Camps:

Youth training camps will provide children of all ages with skills they need to grow and succeed in soccer. This event is highly recommended for youths moving into a new division next year. This event is also ideal for someone who has never played soccer before. Don't miss on this opportunity. Children of all ages are invited to the training camps.

**BBQ:** The BBQ prices are still being set. I hope to have them available soon. Proceeds from the BBO will fund SoccerFest. Even if you will not be entering in the events, we encourage you to come out and support Chapleau Soccer by eating at our BBQ. You can find out when it is open by checking the schedule posted online at chapleausoccer.ca and click on "SoccerFest Schedule".

Free Tickets: Please note that there are some things available at the BBQ that cannot be purchased with tickets. Once we have the

prices set, we will publish a list of items and include which items can be purchased using a ticket. All registered players of the 2012 soccer season (either spring or summer) are entitled to 2 free tickets. Those who played in both programs will not receive additional tickets. Coaches are entitled to 2 free tickets. Participants who register for SoccerFest events will receive 1 additional free ticket. Volunteers will receive 1 free ticket as long as they did not also register for SoccerFest events. You can only receive one additional ticket.

Volunteers: Volunteers are needed to make SoccerFest successful. High school students are encouraged to get their community service hours by contributing to the event. Volunteers, in addition to their free ticket, will also be entitled to free bottles of water during the event. There are many positions to fill including judges, linesmen/women, referees, BBQ cooks and servers, event organization, and more. Please speak with Tim Barnes at the Chapleau Village Shops to register to volunteer.

Other Activities: To keep younger children busy, officials will be organizing mini-games for them. 

## Ontario Weather Review: July 2012

July 2012 was a record-breaking month for northwestern Ontario and part of the Far North. Throughout the province, monthly mean temperatures were above normal values by as much as 3.5 degrees Celsius. In Pickle Lake, the new mean temperature record replaced one that was set in 1933. In southern Ontario, the mean temperatures were high, but did not exceed those of 2011.

Single-day records were set this month in various locations. Southern Ontario set new maximum temperature records on July 6, with temperatures in the mid-thirties. July 17 was another recordbreaking day for Southern Ontario and the National Capital Region, with temperatures that reached the mid- to high thirties. Windsor Airport reached 37.8 degrees Celsius on that date.

In contrast to all the record temperatures, only Ottawa set a new record for driest July ever, receiving only 14.6 millimetres. Taking into account several stations in the vicinity of Ottawa, the previous record was 19.2 millimetres in 1875. Elsewhere in

the province, no new marks were set for total precipitation. Overall, dry periods punctuated by heavy rainfall events were a reminder of the highly localized nature of convective precipitation. Rainfall amounts ranged from below-normal to above-normal values. It might be misleading, however, to say that some locations recorded normal to above-normal values when one or two rainfall events were responsible for the high amounts received. Such shortterm heavy rainfall events, falling onto dry ground in a short period of time, do not penetrate into the soil enough to be benefi-

#### **Severe Weather**

July was a very busy month with respect to strong thunderstorms. The activity began early with a severe thunderstorm that moved through the southern parts of Essex County in extreme southwestern Ontario during the evening hours of July 1. This storm produced heavy rain, gusty winds and hail up to the size of ping-pong balls. The hail was responsible for crop damage of approximately \$1 million.

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Just one day later, on the afternoon of July 2, a series of thunderstorms moved across northwestern Ontario. One storm in particular moved over Sioux Lookout at 4:45 p.m. Central Daylight Time and produced hail up to an amazing nine centimetres in diameter – or almost the size of a softball. This was some of the biggest hail the province has seen in the last few years.

On July 15,

heavy thunderstorms rumbled across southern Ontario. The heaviest rainfall was in the Toronto area. Some locales reported rainfall amounts from that event as high as 88 millimetres, while others only received a few millimetres. Localized flooding was reported in portions of portions of Scarborough. As the storm moved through the Whitby area, a lightning bolt hit a tent during an outdoor event, injuring 17 people that were inside the tent. This event was a strong reminder of the danger posed by all thunderstorms due to the lightning they generate. It also provides a good opportunity to restate the lightning safety rule, which says that you should seek solid shelter when you hear thunder and remain in that shelter for 30 minutes after the last rumble of thunder, thus ensuring the storm has moved well away from

On July 23, during the late morning hours, a number of severe thunderstorms developed around and

your location.

to the north of Lake Nipissing. Reports were received of some tree damage caused by these storms in the communities of Verner and West Nipissing near North Bay, with other damage being reported to the east of North Bay towards Mattawa. As these storms continued to move southwards during the afternoon, they spawned additional bursts of damaging winds -through Renfrew County, in particular – in and around the community of Calabogie. An Environment Canada damage survey team later estimated that thousands of trees were flattened in this area due to winds in excess of 120 kilometres per hour. The storms then continued to track through the Ottawa area and Lanark County in the mid- to late afternoon hours causing spotty areas of tree damage as they went.

With respect to tornado activity during July, Environment Canada confirmed three more tornadoes to bring the total count

so far this year to six. Two tornadoes occurred in Eastern Ontario on July 17, one to the west of Brockville in the Athens area and the other east of Cornwall near the community of Summers-town. In both cases, the events were relatively shortlived and didn't cause long tracks of signifi-

cant damage. The third tornado of the month occurred on July 22 near the community of Embro in Oxford County. This event was also very short-lived and did no appreciable damage. Ontario normally gets 13 tornadoes in a season that runs from late April until early October.
