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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Recent events that shocked our small community of Chapleau reminded everyone of how fragile life really is.

My name is Pauline Lecuyer and I am a clinician employed with Child and Family Centre. I work with children under eighteen in mental health. In my experience, I have encountered many clients who have been involved in underage drinking and drug activity. My first year working, a youth of only 13 years old was caught dealing marijuana. This may not be a shocker to some because unfortunately in today's society it has almost become a norm for children to be involved in drugs whether it is alcohol or illicit drugs. That's the problem, it is not normal for children to be turning to drugs. So much money is spent each year on addictions and most clients seeking help in rehab will return. What does this mean? Rehab does not work for most addicts. So, you may ask yourself then what is the solution? As a clinician, I know the key to solving addictions is prevention. It is not rocket science it is simply common sense. If we

spend money on prevention we will see a decrease in crime, addicts, and mental health.

This summer 2011, Chapleau was named the WFN: World Fishing Network's Ultimate Fishing Town Canada. The small village of nearly 2,500 residents succeeded at voting day and night to win the title and a donation of \$25,000 towards fishing related cause.

"The drive and determination of the community and its supporters across the country won the fishing crown for Chapleau. I am overwhelmed with excitement and pride that our community has been named WFN's Ultimate Fishing Town Canada," said Charley Plourde of the Chapleau Fishing Advisory Committee. "Chapleau has been hard hit by the downturn in the forestry industry and is working hard to rebuild itself through economic diversification. Being named WFN's Ultimate Fishing Town puts Chapleau on the map as a fishing destination for anglers around the world and creates an

opportunity for Chapleau's tourism industry to thrive." (Morris, Michael J. 2011).

Chapleau is also the home to the Chapleau Crown Game Preserve one of the world's largest wildlife preserves. There is so much to be proud of in this community but we suffer in other aspects due to being geographically isolated from other communities. We need to be proud of at least trying to put as much effort as we did to be named the World Fishing Network's Ultimate Fishing Town Canada into prevention.

So, you may ask what I mean by prevention. It is simple. Our community needs to support the well-being of the youth in our community. By this I mean, getting the children involved in extracurricular activities to avoid having them run off to parties and having alcohol and drugs easily accessible to them. For example, something as simple as a public pool would benefit all ages from 0 to 90+ years old. There are many benefits to having a public pool: swimming lessons may be provided, physiotherapy in the pool is very helpful, keeping the youth active in the pool by having organized water sport tournaments, having the elderly escape the old age home or the hospital for an hour a week, spending time as a family in the long winter months, and simply just going there to relax. It saddens me to know that in order for children to receive swimming lessons, we have to drive two hours away. But what saddens me most, is that we allowed our community to get to this point where we have almost nothing to offer to the youth. It's no wonder our youths turn to other means to have fun.

Some may think "Well, a pool won't solve kids from going out partying at all hours of the night." and you know what? You are absolutely right! What will solve kids from partying? Something like a bowling alley where kids can go to hang out. A bowling alley will not only benefit the youth but adults as well. What are the benefits to having a bowling alley? Once again, it gets people off the couch and be active. Having the bowling alley open until 2:00 am and having a place for the kids to go to instead of a home where parents are nowhere to be found sounds like a great solution to me. Or having a cinema where the youth can take their dates out for an evening would also be an

As mentioned above, and I stick to this, I said: "prevention will decrease the crime rate, the number of addicts, and most importantly decrease the number of clients seeking help for mental health". Now, I must say, I love my 'job'. Helping the youth is very rewarding but, by giving the youth the option of choosing to go bowling, swimming or watch a film instead of attending a party to get 'wasted'...I'm all for that. Yes, it can potentially affect the numbers of client attending the centre but, knowing that the kids have an opportunity to either turn their life around or to prevent a youth from getting into drugs makes me feel a lot better than keeping my 'job'. By having kids being active and socializing with others will only make them feel better about themselves in and out. By providing options for kids will prevent them from engaging in illegal activities and therefore reducing the crime rate. Doesn't this sound great? The problem is money. How do we get money to make this happen? Determination, support, hard work, and motivation are all qualities in which our community has proven

When he started attending Chapleau High School in September 1947, Keith J. 'Buddy' Swanson wrote that it became the 'focal point' of his young life until he graduated from Grade 13 five years later.

In a memory lane article for the ESCHS Souvenir Edition newspaper marking the school's 75th anniversary in 1997, Buddy noted that although there were many wonderful memories of all his five years at Chapleau High, "the first year in Grade Nine was extra significant".

I have been researching potential articles about CHS as the 90th reunion festival celebration approaches in 2012, and had planned to share Buddy's memories. However after receiving an email from Jennifer, Buddy's daughter this week, I decided this would be an appropriate time.

Jennifer, who is Jennifer David now, wrote in part "I just wanted to let you know that... I am hoping you can make an announcement or send an email, or include it in your (Chapleau) Express article this week, that The Globe and Mail has agreed to publish a story on my dad for their 'Lives Lived' column. It will appear in the Globe's edition this coming Friday, August 26.

She added that

if people are unable to get a copy of The Globe and Mail she has been told that people will be able to view it on their web site at: www.tgam.ca/ facts on Friday. Be assured Jennifer that I will spread the word as best I can, and I hope all who read this piece will do so also.

Back to Buddy at Chapleau High School!

Buddy recalled that in Grade Nine, for the first time, he was able to make new friendships, which lasted all his life.

He was impressed with the fact that having had the same teacher for two or three years in elementary school, "I was quickly amazed at the fact that we got a new teacher practically every hour in high school.

"And I never realized the Public School had so many good looking girls who were now in high school." Buddy had attended the Separate School.

For Buddy, the real highlight of his first year at CHS was initiation.

"It lasted a week, and included having Joe Serre push me down Main Street in a baby carriage, dressed accordingly. And those big bad Grade 13 guys were always lurking to make life miserable for us grade niners at initiation time".

During his years at CHS, upstairs in the Royal Canadian Legion Hall, there was a snack bar and pool table set up. This was a favourite gathering spot for the students.

"Sometimes we rode around town in the rumble seat of Henry Korpela's car." (As an aside, I have been told that Henry may have been the first CHS student to have his own car and bring it to school. If others have memories, please let me know.)

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Summer electronics recycling tour collects materials, raises awareness throughout Northern Ontario



Reel to reel beeing returned!

Closer to home, when the tour visited Chapleau and Devon on June 22. 3.82 tonnes of discarded electronics were diverted from landfills.

The Recycle YourElectronics.ca program is run by Ontario Electronic Stewardship (OES), a non-profit industry organization tasked with diverting electronic waste from landfill and educating and encouraging responsible reuse and safe recycling of unwanted electronics. RecycleYourElectroni cs.ca now accepts 44 types of electronics across a provincewide collection network of hundreds of OES-approved collection sites.

"It's important for all Ontarians to know that e-waste is not garbage; it contains hazardous materials that don't belong in landfills. It also includes valuable materials that can be safely recycled to manufacture new products," said Pierre Prim, Director of Operations, Ontario Electronic Stewardship. "We were excited to engage northern Ontarians in their communities as our research indicated a need for increased awareness about endof-life electronics. The response was very positive and residents were enthusiastic about putting the information to use at work and at home."

The tour was supported by advertising and community outreach to encourage residents to attend one or two-day events along with their endof-life electronics in communities including: Atikokan, Blind River, Capreol, Chapleau and Devon, Cochrane, Dryden, Elliot Lake, Espanola, Fort Frances, Geraldton, Kapuskasing, Kenora, Manitouwadge, Marathon, New Liskeard, Nipigon, Pic Mobert, Rainy River, Red Rock, Sault St. Marie, Sioux-Lookout, Smooth Rock Falls, Spanish/Massey, Sturgeon Falls, Sudbury, Thunder Bay

Timmins, Wawa.

"We are focused on our mission of diverting ewaste from Ontario's landfill," said Prim. "Our Northern tour has helped us spread this message across the region, while providing information and a convenient, easy way for individuals to safely and securely recycle their ewaste. For those who missed a tour stop, I recommend visiting www.recycleyourelectronics.ca to source a collection site

near you." Prim will be in Thunder Bay on Tuesday, August 23 at the Ontario First Nations Technical Services Corp. (OFNTSC) Conference where he will discuss the importance of recycling end-oflife electronics while acknowledging the success of tour stops in

First Nations communities. The conference is the largest meeting of Canada's First Nations technical professionals, bringing together industry experts from across Canada.

About Ontario Electronic Steward-

Ontario Electronic Stewardship (OES), a not-forprofit industry organization, oversees the responsible reuse and recycling of waste electronics through a program that includes hundreds of collection sites and numerous other affiliate sites across the province, including municipal, retail, not-for-profit and commercial sites. To date, OES has

collected more than 67,000 tonnes of endof-life electronics – if stacked in tractortrailer loads parked end-to-end, would stretch all the way from Toronto to Gravenhurst. Every Ontario resident and business is encouraged to safely recycle their electronics free of charge.

The program was developed with Waste Diversion Ontario on behalf of the Ontario government under the Waste Diversion Act. The OES electronic waste recycling program accepts 44 items of electronic waste including computers, televisions, DVD players, hand-held devices and more.





anymore because I lost everything in the fire," she said. "That was about 10 years worth of work put into one studio, and it was a lot of work that I lost."

Reeling from the loss, Pellow found a solution to the desperate situation.

"I was feeling

quite down about this after the fire, and basically I wasn't getting that creativity out," said Pellow. "So I took everything that I was feeling and put it into my new line and went with what I felt, what I grew up with... all my crazy little stories and travels and stuff — I just poured it

all into the line."

She describes the fire as a pivotal point in her decadelong career.

"In so many ways it changes you and makes you stronger, like a phoenix rising from the ashes. What came out of all this was nothing but good."

According to Pellow, her new line generated a huge reaction and she started getting more contracts with stores, with her work now featured in 20 to 30 stores across Canada.

"It just started going crazy," Pellow said, noting that it was a whirlwind of activity with orders coming in from her website and Facebook page. 




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
