## Solidarity shown in demands for a national inquiry in missing women

This past week, the Premiers and Territorial leaders met with Aboriginal leaders at the Council of Federation meeting held at Niagara-on-the-Lake. Michèle Audette,

president of the Native Women's Association of Canada (NWAC), along with other Native representatives, called on the all Premiers and leaders to support their call for a National Inquiry into the missing and murdered Aboriginal Women across Canada.

Last fall, the Ontario Association of Interval and Transition Houses (OAITH) marched in solidarity with our Aboriginal sisters to Parliament Hill demanding, once again, that the Federal Government establish a

National Inquiry into 582 documented cases of missing and murdered Aboriginal women. At that time, our demands were supported by several opposition parties but ignored by the Harper government.

"Aboriginal women and girls continue to fall victim to the most extreme forms of violence – leading to their going missing or being found murdered. We need real action. Now is the time for the Harper government to join the rest of Canada and support a national public inquiry into this

issue," states Audette. Violence against women happens in all cultures and religions, in all ethnic and racial communities, at every age, and in every income group. But Aboriginal women (First Nations, Inuit and Métis) are eight times more likely to be killed by their intimate partner than non-Aboriginal women.

Shelters and other violence against women services were pleased to see Premier Kathleen Wynne (current Chair of the Council of Federation) announce resounding

support for the National Inquiry. We remain hopeful that the Federal Government will recognize the important leadership of Aboriginal groups and act immediately to establish the National Inquiry and restore adequate funding to NWAC and other agencies working to end violence against women in Canada.

To date, the federal governments' response to the tragedy of the missing and murdered Aboriginal women has been abysmal. In 2011, the United Nations Committee on the

Elimination of Discrimination against Women recognized the seriousness of this issue and launched their own inquiry. This committee—the UN'S main authority on women's human rights—cites the Canadian Federal Government's continuing failure to take effective action in connection with the murders and disappearances.

We demand that the Canadian government call for a National Inquiry into the missing and murdered Aboriginal women of Canada.

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# If Canadians Vote to Abolish the Senate, Politicians Must Listen

This commentary was first published in the Monday, July 29th edition of the Toronto Star.

We've nearly been trampled in recent days by a veritable herd of Canadian academics, falling over one another to remind us that the Canadian Senate cannot be abolished.

After all, they tell us, the Senate's existence is guaranteed by the Constitution, only Parliament and the provincial legislatures can amend the Constitution and Parliament includes 102 senators who would never vote themselves out of a job. To make matters worse, five of the ten provinces are so vastly over-represented in the Senate, they would never, in a million years, agree to get rid of it.

This learned analysis, while technically correct, fails to adequately weigh one singular truth: Canada is a democracy.

If Canadians vote in a national referendum to abolish the Senate, the academics will be proven wrong.

We now live in the 21st century, as opposed to the U.S. civil-war era, when the Senate was created.

It was the U.S. civil war, to that point, that heavily influenced the Fathers of Confederation, most notably Sir. John A. Macdonald.

“(Macdonald) shared a widely held belief that the Civil War was, in some sense, the inevitable bloody outcome of mob rule and presidential despotism,” wrote his biographer Donald Creighton.

“Macdonald's resistance to democracy was comprehensive,” echoes Richard Gwyn in his more recent study of Canada's constitutional architect. “He advocated ‘some division of the classes,’ justifying limiting the vote to property owners by the argument that political decisions should be influenced by the views of those with some education and some stake in the system itself rather than by ‘the unreasoning masses.’”

Macdonald made it clear on more than one occasion that his distaste for American-style democracy knew no bounds. He insisted that a prospective senator must own real estate to qualify for membership – a qualification that exists, inexplicably, to this day.

And Macdonald insisted on substan-

tial real estate holdings – \$4,000 – the equivalent of hundreds of thousands of today's dollars: “a large qualification should be necessary for membership in the Upper House, in order to represent the principle of property,” he said in 1865. “The rights of the minority must be protected, and the rich are always fewer in number than the poor.”

Historian John Boyko's new book, *Blood and Daring*, gives a flavour of Canada in the 1860's, when the Senate was created. Boyko reminds us that while 33 Canadian newspapers supported Lincoln and the Union in the conflict, 84 sided with the slave-owning Confederacy. After one Confederate victory in 1862, townsfolk in New Brunswick celebrated by holding parades.

Time has marched on. Slavery is dead, its death purchased with the lives of half a million Americans. Canadian attitudes toward slavery have changed as well.

Yet, we still sit passively and watch, while a law passed by a majority in the House of Commons, is denied passage by the Canadian Senate, an unelected assembly of landowners. The

Senate vote, constitutionally permissible in the eyes of the Senate's civil-war era creators, has been correctly characterized as “an abomination.”

It's instructive that the architect of the recent abomination, Conservative Senator Hugh Segal, supports a national referendum on abolishing the Senate. So did Jack Layton, who called the Senate “outdated and obsolete, a 19th-century institution that has no place in a modern democracy in the 21st century.”

Saskatchewan Premier Brad Wall, no old drinking buddy of Jack Layton, would just as soon skip the referendum and proceed directly to Senate abolition, reflecting the views of 86 per cent of his party members. Tom Mulcair, inheritor of the Layton legacy, is actively campaigning for Senate abolition. Even Ted Morton, once an Alberta elected Senator-in-waiting, is getting ready to throw in the towel on the Senate (as a possible first step towards reform) – after nearly 30 years dedicated to the cause of reforming the wretched bordello of back-scratching.

The Senate is a disgrace to Canada. The Senate doesn't make our nation better, it makes it worse. And unelected assembly of landowners has no legitimate right to rule over the rest of us, no matter what the Constitution says. The Senate is a constitutional institution, to be sure. But then, so was slavery in the U.S. and the slave trade, in Britain, in the 19th century.

If Canadians, in a national referendum, direct our politicians to get rid of the Senate, then politicians would be well advised to listen to the voters.

## Chapleau Moments

Six adventurers made a canoe trip from Chapleau to Moose Factory in July 1932 recording their progress in writing as they travelled. Their chronological account was kindly made available to me by Dorothy Turner, and I am delighted to share parts of it as the Chapleau Cree First Nation hold their annual Traditional

Gathering and Pow-Wow on August 17 and 18.

The young men were Donald White, Oliver 'Doc' Potts, Howard Cachagee, Mike Turner, Fred McAuley and Vince Crichton. In 1968, Vince typed out an account of the trip from the notes and sent it to Mike Turner, Dorothy's uncle, with the follow-

ing comment written on the top of the first page: "Mike. I hope I have recorded this properly. Vince".

They left Chapleau on July 1, 1932, by train for Missanabie with two canoes and all their equipment. "We arrived at Missanabie about 8:30 p.m. and immediately started on the first lap of our canoe journey. We camped a couple of miles north of the railroad track... After a late supper we sat around the camp fire, telling stories, as the fuel turned into dying, glowing embers. The night was clear and cold and after making our canoes and provisions safe from marauding animals we turned in with high expectations of the morrow."

"Shortly after sun up the next morning we were having breakfast of bacon and eggs. The aroma of the repast with the boiling coffee whetted our desire for the adventure and it was not long before we were on our way. Loading up our big freight canoes with equipment and three men to a canoe, we were content to let a small three horsepower engine do most of the work for the first day.

"The night had been cold and frosty. The surface of the lake was like a sheet of glass and covered with millions of mosquitoes, presumably killed by the frost of the previous night.

After a seven mile run up Dog Lake, they portaged to Crooked Lake a distance of about 150 yards. "All along Crooked Lake we saw

moose and bear and in almost every bay either a live or dead beaver house."

At the end of the lake they made another portage over the height of land to Missinaibi Lake. This height of land separates the waters flowing into Lake Superior from those flowing into James and Hudson Bay.

Upon reaching Baltic Bay they took a route to the northeast arm arriving at a long peninsula varying in width to three miles.

"It terminates abruptly in a granite cliff, towering in places to well over two hundred feet. This is known as Fairy Point. Many years ago, the Cree and Ojibway banded together for self protection from bands of Iroquois and drove an armed band over the cliffs to complete destruction. Looking closely at the cliffs one can discern Indian pictographs of centuries ago which only time can eliminate."

They arrived at Brunswick House to explore the remains of the once thriving Hudson Bay Company Post. They note that most of the buildings were in ruins but some still some were standing, the remains of an old boat were on the shore and along the beach and in the ruins were old rifles and flintlocks with the stocks nearly eroded completely away.

They also visited a cemetery to which pilgrimages were still made "every few years to keep the hallowed spot of their loved ones clean and in

good order."

By the end of the first day, they had run rapids and travelled about 60 miles making camp at Peterbell on the Canadian National Railway.

They enjoyed a "well earned supper of fish, bannock, jam and tea" and then "crawled into their eiderdowns and with the sky for a roof, slept as only those on the trail can sleep, seldom being troubled by the mosquitoes and black flies.

The next day after shooting rapids calling one a "thrilling experience" Donald White remarked, "It gives you a tingling feeling, shooting rapids like these." (Perhaps someone can ask

Donald if he recalls the remark).


The adventurers reached the Hudson Bay Post at Mattice on the CNR and decided to spend the day there washing their clothes and darning socks.

After supper, the Indian Chief, who they do not name, came down to their tents and invited them to a dance being held at his home that evening. The cost for all six was 25 cents. When the chief was asked what it was for, he replied "to buy coal oil for the lamps".

They found themselves at the chief's home "Listening to music from two violins and a moose hide drum. Everyone danced jigs **Cont'd on P.4**

and reels which included the Midsummers Night and the Rabbit dance. To top off the evening's entertainment, Fred (McAuley) who is a violin player of no mean ability gave the folks a lesson in step dancing which was received with loud cheers and hand clapping."

The only mishap of the trip appears to have been while shooting the rapid below the Black Feather where a canoe hit a submerged rock, but they made shore all

right and got it fixed. But, while they were making dinner, in opening a packsack they discovered that a top had blown off a can of jam.

"What a mess. Howard and Fred cooked dinner while the rest washed every article and including the packsack and repaired the canoe."

As they neared the end of their trip, here is part of one of the vivid descriptions provided. "We shot Frenchman's rapid and then portaged Frenchman's gorge. It is a very

beautiful place. The gorge is cut out of red granite and the square cut rock is topped with black spruce.

"What a place to stop and ponder over the beauties of nature that the north is so profusely endowed with."

On the final day they travelled the broad expanse of the Moose River, past the mouth of the Abitibi and Kwataboahegan rivers and reached Moose Factory about four in the afternoon. They had made the trip in six days, apparently a record time which was still stood in 1968 -- they note only two other parties had made the

trip and it took them about two weeks.

For the next two weeks they stayed in Moose Factory visiting and relaxing. "We loafed and rested." Some of the adventurers were recruited to play ball for the Moose Factory team.

They returned to Chapleau via the moose, up the Mattagami, and then

into the Kapuskasing River to the town of Kapuskasing. From there they continued to Elsas on the CNR to the northeastern corner of the Chapleau Game Preserve, into the Nemegosenda River to Trout Lake and into Twin, Round, West, LeBlanc, Emerald and Loon (Borden) lakes. A portage of a mile took them into the Chapleau

River and home.

It took them 12 days and was a much harder journey. Over the years, notes were lost of the return trip.

When the Competition Tribunal dismissed a complaint from major Canadian retailers against credit card processing fees recently it wasn't as surprising as it was disappointing. For consumers and small business it means business as usual which includes hefty interest rates and transaction charges.

The Competition Bureau stated that it is up to the government to take action to better protect consumers and small businesses. That likely means there won't be any action since the Conservatives have refused to take strong regulatory action in the past.

# Time to regulate credit card companies

It is disturbing that the Tribunal found evidence of anti-competitive behaviour in the marketplace but still dismissed the complaint. Anti-competitive behaviour rigs the deck to ensure maximum profit for credit card companies but that comes with a significant price tag. It hurts our economy and distorts business decisions, especially for small businesses that offer this convenient service to attract customers.

Ultimately, the current arrangement leads to higher prices for consumers and smaller profit margins for businesses. Whether a transaction is made with a credit card or not, the price will include an adjustment to compensate for the fact that Canadian businesses face the highest merchant fees of all major economies.

When first elected the Conservatives promised tough regulations for credit card companies. Instead of creating an environment that forced these companies to actually compete in the spirit of a free market economy, they have created a voluntary code of conduct with predictable and disappointing results.

New Democrats have consistently advocated changes to merchant fee regulations for credit card companies. The evidence of price fixing should be enough to force the government to take action. It is an opportunity to take a stand that would in no way cripple these

lenders but make a difference for businesses and consumers.

In Northern Ontario small businesses face more challenges than those in larger urban centres. Many operate on tight budgets and would benefit from a reduction in the cost of handling credit card transactions. These businesses create wealth and jobs in our communities unlike credit card companies

who act as siphons that move money out – which is one thing if it is being done in a fair and competitive manner and quite another when it isn't. This should be a simple problem to address. What is required is a government that has the fortitude to enforce regulations on an industry that shows no desire to change a thing – except for raising their fees and rates.

**THE HISTORY CHANNEL**

- On **Aug. 5, 1957**, rock 'n' roll television show "American Bandstand" goes national with teens dancing and rating records on a scale from 35 to 98. The show was broadcast from Philadelphia to 67 ABC affiliates across the country. Dick Clark was host, a slot he held for 27 years.
- On **Aug. 6, 1890**, at Auburn Prison in New York, the first execution in history by electrocution is carried out against William Kemmler. It didn't go as planned.

With the first charge, the current failed. A second charge was required for two minutes before Kemmler was declared deceased.

- On **Aug. 7, 1944**, under the threat of Allied bombing during World War II, the German car manufacturer Volkswagen halts production of the "Beetle." Volkswagen, under the control of the British military, began turning out Beetles again in December 1945.
- On **Aug. 8, 1986**, actor, writer and director Spike Lee's first feature-length movie, "She's Gotta Have It," opens in theaters around the United States. The movie launched Lee's career and established his reputation as an outspoken filmmaker who often tackled controversial subjects.
- On **Aug. 9, 1969**, members of Charles Manson's cult kill five people in movie director Roman Polanski's Beverly Hills, Calif., home, including Polanski's pregnant wife, actress Sharon Tate.

Polanski was not the cult leader's intended target. Manson, an aspiring musician, chose the Polanski house because he had once unsuccessfully tried to get a recording deal from a producer who used to live there.

- On **Aug. 10, 1978**, three teenage girls die after their 1973 Ford Pinto is rammed from behind by a van and bursts into flames. It was known as far back as 1972 that the Pinto's gas tank, which sat behind the rear axle, was particularly vulnerable to damage by rear-end collisions.
- On **Aug. 11, 1856**, a hurricane hits Isle Derniere, a resort community on the Louisiana coast, killing more than 400 people. The storm first brought blinding and torrential rain, then storm surges and finally a tidal wave. Upward of 150 people were carried off with the wave, with some bodies ending up 6 miles away. On

Two Chelmsford men have been fined \$3,000 for fishing violations.

in the Ontario Court of Justice, Chapleau, on June 26, 2013.
