Two devastating fires in three days



December 3rd, at approximately 8:00 A.M. the fire department was once again called to a fire at 91 Dufferin St. The fire which seems to have been started by a wood burning stove, once again had engulfed the building and the house could not be saved.

The good work of the firefighters prevented major damage to adjacent buildings and properties.

No injuries were reported but the loss for all these tenants was great. Investigations by the Ontario Fire Marshall was not needed as foul play was ruled out in both cases.

Fundraising events to help the victims were in the planning stages as early as Tuesday.

The Chapleau volunteer fire department was overburdened in the last week with two major fires within our community.

On Saturday, December 1st, the fire department was summoned to a fire at

92 Lorne St. South.

Flames had engulfed the building prior to the firefighters arriving. The building housed four tenants and is a total loss.

In order to save the house adjacent to the burning building, the fire department made use of the Chapleau Public Utilities bucket truck to hose down the flaming roof.

One year ago, the Liberal Party chose a new leader who presented a progressive vision for a richer, fairer, and greener Canada - a leader with conviction,

He pressured the Conservatives into backtracking from its disastrous interest deductibility plan for Canadian companies and called on the government to reform its tax code, making Canada more competitive on the world stage. In addition, Mr. Dion proposed an alternative policy when the Conservatives broke their electoral promise on Income Trusts.

For a fairer Canada, Mr. Dion presented a bold and comprehensive plan to dramatically reduce the number of Canadians living below the poverty line by at least 30% and cut in half the number of children living in poverty in five years. The Globe and Mail

called it "...the most comprehensive anti-poverty package seen at the federal level in some time." Mr. Dion continues to oppose, along with most Canadians, reinstating the death penalty. He promised to bring back the Court Challenges Program to advance equality in Canada and is committed to seeing more women in politics by promising one third of Liberal candidates in the next federal election will be women. In addition, he is committed to bringing back the Kelowna accord for Aboriginal People.

For a greener Canada, Mr. Dion unveiled a Carbon Budget plan to curb greenhouse gas emissions in Canada while at the same time create jobs. This plan builds on Mr. Dion's accomplishments as former Minister of the Environment when he presided over the United Nations Climate Conference in Montreal, not quitting until all 182 countries had reached a deal. His plan has been endorsed by the Green Party Leader Elizabeth May.

After more than seven months of planning, the 2007 CP Holiday Train is again ready to raise awareness, money and food for Canadian food banks. On Wednesday, December 5th, 2007 the Holiday Arrived in Chapleau to an enthusiastic crowd of both young and old. The magical 'train of lights' began its spirited cross-country journey in Beaconsfield, Quebec, eventually completing its trek in Port Moody, British Columbia on December 18th.

Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia, in more than 70 communities, will again experience the Holiday Train's important mission in the fight against hunger. At each stop alongside the Canadian Holiday Train will be Operation Lifesaver's mobile classroom sharing the message of public rail safety.

At the same time as the Canadian Holiday Train, a second identically-decorated Holiday Train will be rolling across 40

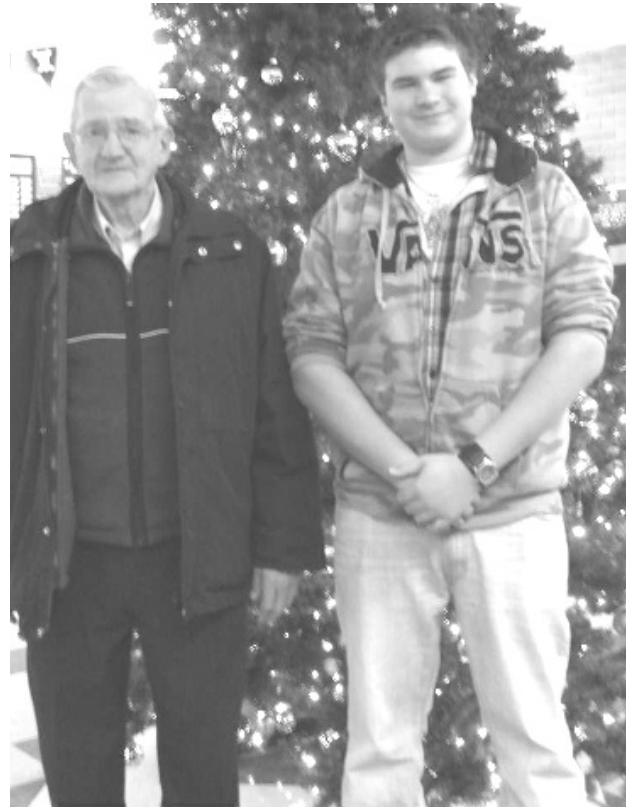

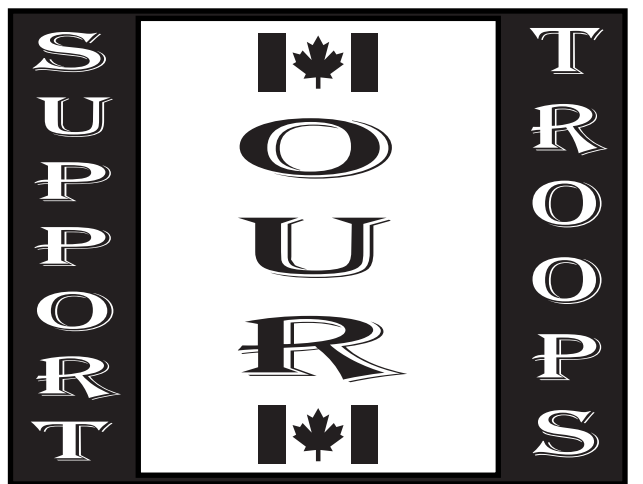



McGuinty government introduces legislation that would ensure faster access to OHIP coverage, job protection for reservists

CNW/ - The McGuinty government is standing with those who serve in the military and the reserves by introducing legislation that would, if passed, provide immediate access to OHIP for eligible military families and protect the jobs of reservists who are called up to duty.

"When asked to make sacrifices on our behalf, our men and women in uniform do not hesitate, so when it comes to accessing government services, they and their families shouldn't have to wait," said Premier Dalton McGuinty.

"Compared to what they do for us, these are modest measures, but it is our hope that they will make military families' lives a little easier, and provide our soldiers with some peace of mind."

The legislation, if passed, would also remove the 90-day waiting period for

services insured under OHIP for military families. Military families transferred to Ontario from other provinces or from overseas are sometimes required to pay physician fees up front during the waiting period. The new policy is expected to benefit approximately 8,500 military family members each year.

"People who serve our country should not have to face an additional burden of paying fees up front for publicly funded health care for their families. This legislation, if passed, would ensure that military families have immediate access to coverage for the full range of provincially funded health care services," said Deputy Premier and Minister of Health and Long-Term Care George Smitherman.

The proposed legislation would also ensure that military reservists have job

protection while on a tour of duty either at home or abroad. There are about 12,000 reservists from Ontario, with several hundred serving abroad at any one time.

"Job-protected leave for reservists would acknowledge the service and sacrifice these citizens render their country and community. Ontarians who put their lives on the line to serve our country should never have to worry that their civilian jobs back home are on the line," said Labour Minister Brad Duguid.

Premier McGuinty met with military families today to outline the changes and thank them for their service and sacrifices.

"Canadian Forces members and reservists do a tough job, often in difficult conditions. They stand ready to protect us - we have to make sure our province stands with them," he said.



Sudbury author pens murder book



Bill McLeod, a retired Cambrian College business professor has just released his latest book. *Murder in the Schoolhouse: Sudbury, Ontario's Last Hanging* is the true story of the 1954 shooting of Steve Klapouschak, a teacher in the one-room schoolhouse in

Dalton, Ontario. Dalton is a whistlestop on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway 344 kilometres west of Sudbury.

Robert Bruce Ducsharm, a 23-year-old drifter was executed for the murder in the Sudbury jail in June of 1956. It was the seventh and

last hanging in Sudbury.

Bill McLeod first told part of the story in his 2004 book *The Chapleau Game Preserve: History, Murder and other Tales*. Since 2004, Mr. McLeod has uncovered more than 2,600 pages of new material on the case including the

transcripts of the trials and other long-forgotten police documents.

It took two trials to finally send Ducsharm to the gallows. The guilty verdict in the first trial was thrown out because of prosecutorial errors and judicial blundering. They didn't make any mistakes the second time.

Like many murders, there was another intriguing tale within this story as well. It involved a strange and mysterious man named John Naegel, a friend of the teacher. Naegel worked at Renabie Mine, about 20 miles from the site of the murder. He is believed by many to have been the real killer. Unfortunately, Naegel was killed in a mining accident seven weeks after the crime. He was

also rumored to have tipped a canoe on Lake Ramsay which resulted in the drowning of a man who was alleged to have owed Naegel a substantial amount of money.

McLeod also explores a disturbing parallel between the Ducsharm conviction and the 1959 conviction of Steven

Truscott and Truscott's 2007 exoneration.

The book sells for \$24.95 and is available at several bookstores and from Bill McLeod at his Sudbury address; 15 Eden Point Dr.

Thirty-One Community Groups in Algoma, Cochrane, Manitoulin and Sudbury Receive More Than One Million in Grants

Community organizations in Algoma, Cochrane, Manitoulin and Sudbury will benefit from grants recently ratified by the Board of the Ontario Trillium Foundation. Ontario Minister of Culture Aileen Carroll noted that funding totalling \$1,151,000 will help 31 organizations meet local needs in the arts and culture, environment, human and social services, and sports and recreation sectors. "For 25 years, the Ontario Trillium Foundation has built healthy and vibrant communities, one

community organization at a time," said Minister Carroll. "Ontarians live better lives today because of the good things community organizations do in their communities."

OTF, through the work of the Algoma, Cochrane, Manitoulin and Sudbury Grant Review Team and its Chair Huguette Roy-Perron, is investing in the charitable and not-for-profit sector. This funding plays a tremendous role in financing improvements to community facilities and helping organizations build

their capacity, train volunteers and expand their programs.

In Algoma, Cochrane, Manitoulin and Sudbury, OTF grants make a difference. **Chapleau Education and Training Coalition Inc. will receive \$103,000 over three years to assist with the operation of an innovation centre in the Chapleau area.** It will provide access to job-related training, career counselling, job-search support and entrepreneurship opportunities for residents. Club de ski de fond de Hearst Cross-Country Ski Club will be awarded \$65,000 over one year to replace existing trail grooming equipment, which will enable the club to provide safer and better groomed trails and help promote skiing in the community.

OTF is an agency of the Government of Ontario. Its annual funding was boosted to \$105 million from

\$100 million in 2007 and will be further increased to \$120 million in 2009-2010.

This enhanced funding has resulted in an increase to the maximum amount available for capital grants and the creation of a \$2 million Future Fund, which will focus this year on strengthening the impact of organizations working on environmental issues.

The Chapleau Figure Skating Club will receive \$5,600 over one year to purchase an on-ice jump-training harness and a new sound system, which will enhance figure skating training and performances.

The Chapleau Gymnastics Club Inc. will receive \$14,400 over one year to replace old and worn gymnastics equipment. The safety of participants will then be enhanced and the continuation of a quality recreational and competitive gymnastics program

will be ensured in this small rural community.

The Township of Chapleau will receive \$13,600 over one year to purchase furnishings and

equipment for a new teen drop-in centre in Chapleau. A safe and supervised location for recreational activities will then be provided for youth in the area.

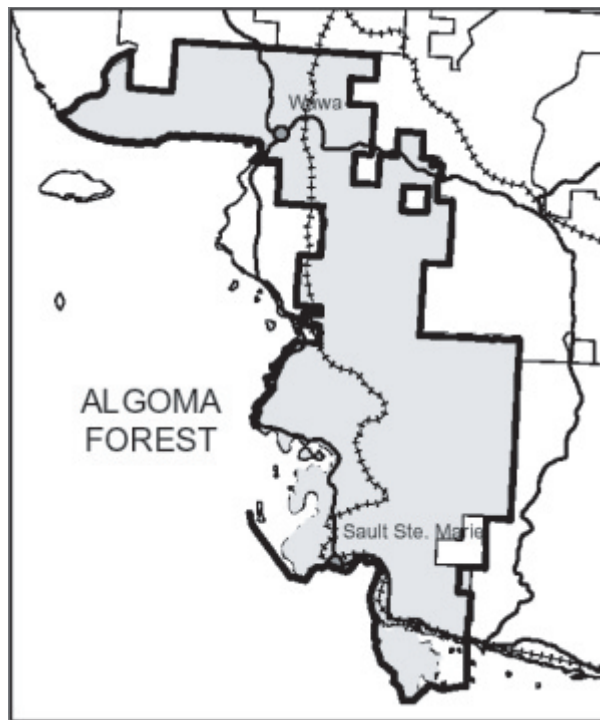

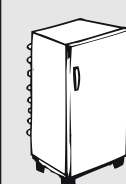

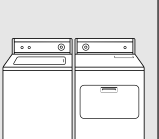
