Voters' wish confirmed as new deputy mayor is appointed by council



New deputy-reeve André Byham

It's only his second term on Chapleau Township council, and his fellow councillors have rubber stamped what the voters said in the last election. André Byham, who topped the polls November 13, is the new Deputy Mayor.

The appointment came on a unanimous vote at the first formal meeting of the newly elected council last Wednesday. The motion was moved by the former deputy mayor K.J. "Bud" Swanson and new

councillor Doug Greig.

A councillor, who is recognized for his willingness to spend long hours at the job, Byham says he is excited and ready to take on even more work.

"It's a chance to make a difference," stated Byham in an interview with *THE EXPRESS*, adding, "It's a chance to be more involved at a higher level."

While the position of Deputy Mayor isn't laid out in a formal fashion in any of the municipality's statutes, it appears the

principle duty is to sit in for Mayor Earle J. Freeborn during any absence in the next four years. Mayor Freeborn was re-elected in the November 13 vote.

In addition, the Deputy Mayor is also asked to represent the Mayor and the municipality at various public functions. He could also be asked to sit in at gatherings of municipal organizations such as the Northeastern Mayor's Group, continuing a previous practice.

Deputy Mayor Byham said his bottom

line has been to represent the people of Chapleau and he views his appointment as a means to represent the people of Chapleau even better. "I will be working hard with the Mayor," he stated.

While looking forward to new challenges during the new mandate, this also means fulfilling projects initiated by the previous council. Insisting his view was no reflection on any previous council, the new Deputy Mayor stated, we are going to be pushing forward finishing work other councils have started."

Nancy Lavoie, spokesperson for the group of tenants, was pleased to hear that the

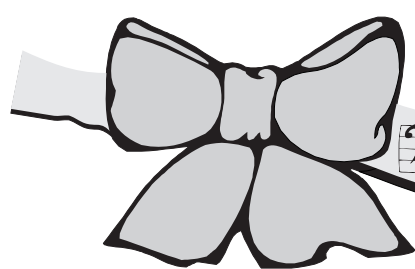


Group of tenants protesting untimely notice to vacate the premises.

Business owners asked to assist in clean-up

A letter from a concerned citizen has the Chapleau municipal council considering whether a system in place in the community of Hearst could be adopted here.

In a letter on the agenda of council at its regular meeting last Wednesday evening, local resident Hélène Pineau addressed what she described as an ongoing problem with the grounds surrounding the Post Office.

"Anyone going by is bound to notice the area is always strewn with litter and garbage of every kind - despite the fact that a garbage bin has been conveniently placed for collecting this refuse," she wrote.

She added her concern is not a complaint about the owners of the building, rather it stems from a lack of civic pride with groups of individuals who loiter there and treat the area as their own private garbage dump.

The council members made several suggestions about dealing with the problem, which some observed is not confined to the Post Office area.

Mayor Earle J. Freeborn recommended asking downtown business owners to cooperate with council, while councillor K.J. "Bud" Swanson suggested a letter to the owner of the Post Office requesting his co-operation.

Deputy Mayor André Byham brought to council's attention a successful program in the community of Hearst where senior citizens have been employed to solve the problem. According to the deputy mayor that community pays retired persons a minimum rate for helping to keep the community clean. "The people are proud because they are taking care of their community," he said.

The issue of liability was a concern of councillor Swanson's while at the same time he said, it's a good idea and I'm all for it."

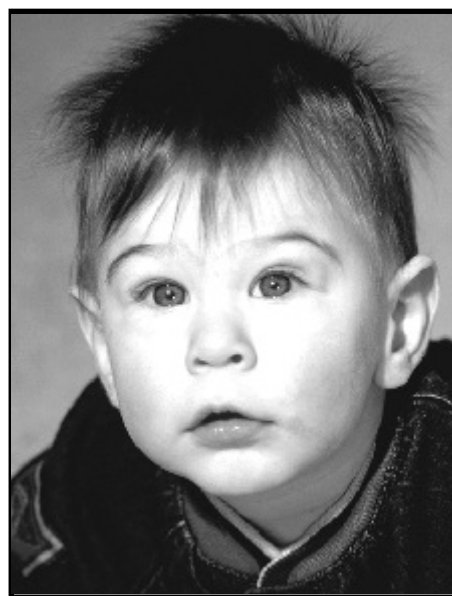

Protecting Yourself from Identity Theft

These days, information is power. Criminals now prey on people stealing their personal information. Identity theft occurs when someone uses your personal information without your knowledge or consent to commit a crime, such as fraud or theft. Identity thieves steal key pieces of your personal information either physically or in other ways, without your knowledge and use it to impersonate you and commit crimes in your name.

In addition to names, addresses and phone numbers, thieves look for social insurance numbers, driver's license numbers, credit cards, banking information, bank cards, calling cards, birth certificates and passports. Thieves can use this information and invade your personal and financial life. They use stolen identities to go on spending sprees, open new bank accounts, divert mail, apply for loans, credit cards and social benefits, rent apartments

and even commit more serious crimes.

There are several ways they can get their hands on this information, including removing mail from your mailbox; fraudulently redirecting your mail; stealing personal and private information from your wallet, purse, vehicle, computer or website; retrieving personal information in your garbage or recycling bin by "dumpster diving;" posing as creditors, landlords or employers to get a copy of your credit report or access to your personal information from other confidential sources; tampering with automated banking machines and point of sale terminals; searching public sources, such as newspapers, telephone books, and records open to the public; and buying the information from a dishonest employee working where personal and/or financial information is stored.

What can you do to protect yourself?

To start, be sure when you

are travelling to store your birth certificate and other valuable documentation in a safe place. If your birth certificate is stolen, report it immediately to the Office of the Registrar General at (416) 325-8305. Do not carry your birth certificate, or even a copy of it, in your wallet or purse. This also goes for your driver's license and Social Insurance Number.

At home, you should always store any cards and documents containing personal information in a secure place, and shred them after they expire. Review the balances on your statements from banks, credit cards and companies regularly, and report any discrepancies right away. Once a year,

get a copy of your credit report from the two national credit reporting agencies, Equifax Canada and TransUnion Canada, which will tell you what information the bureau has about your credit history, financial information, any judgments, collection activity and who has asked for your information.

What do you do if your identity is stolen? In the event that you have become a victim of identity theft, you need to take immediate action. First, contact each financial institution, credit card issuer or other company that provided the identity thief with unauthorized credit, money, goods or services. Next, contact Equifax Canada and TransUnion

Canada to ask for a copy of your credit report, and discuss whether you should have a fraud alert placed on your file, asking that creditors call you before opening any new accounts or changing your existing accounts. The third step you need to take is to contact your local police department and ask them to take a report. If a police report is available, include it in all correspondence with financial institutions, credit issuers, credit reporting agencies and other companies. After talking to the police, report the incident to PhoneBusters National Call Centre at 1-888-495-8501. Phone Busters

gather information and intelligence about identity theft and provides advice and assistance to victims. Finally, if your credit cards or government-issued documents (such as your driver's license, birth certificate or passport) have been lost or stolen, notify the issuing authority immediately to have the document cancelled and a new one issued.

No one should live in fear of identity theft. However, everyone should take steps to protect themselves, and know what to do in the event that identity theft occurs.

Do you know what impaired driving means?

That impaired driving means driving when your ability is affected by alcohol or drugs. It is a crime and you can be convicted under the Criminal Code of Canada. As a result, you may lose your licence, be fined, or spend time in jail.

Drinking and Driving is a deadly combination. One drink can reduce your ability to concentrate and react to things that happen suddenly when you are driving. The more alcohol in your blood, the more trouble you have judging distances, and your vision may become blurred.

Any drug that changes your mood, or the way you see and feel about the world around you, will affect the way you drive. Besides illegal drugs, some drugs that your doctor may prescribe for you and some over-the-counter drugs can also impair your driving.

Ontario has cracked down on some of the worst offenders on our roads drinking and drivers suspended for Criminal Code convictions.

These drivers

put others at risk and must be held accountable and responsible for their actions.

Ontario leads the way in combating drinking and driving through some of the toughest laws and programs in North America, including:

Immediate licence suspension

Drivers who provide a sample over the legal limit (.08) or refuse a breath test, will have their driver's licence suspended immediately for 90 days under Ontario's Administrative Driver's Licence Suspension (ADLS) Program. This 90-day suspension is separate and distinct from any criminal charges a driver faces in court.

Stiff Fines for Driving Under Suspension

\$5,000 - \$25,000 for a first conviction

\$10,000 - \$50,000 for subsequent convictions

Consequences of Conviction

In addition to the monetary costs facing convicted drinking drivers, the following penalties apply: An impaired driving

conviction under the Criminal Code (CC) results in a suspension under the Highway Traffic Act (HTA) and a driving prohibition under the Criminal Code.

One year on a first conviction;

Three years on a second conviction;

Life on a third conviction, which may be reduced to 10 yrs if certain conditions are met; and

Life on a fourth conviction with no possibility of ever having an Ontario driver's licence again.

Mandatory Alcohol Education and Treatment Program

Drinking drivers are required to take more responsibility for their actions. They have to get their drinking problem under control if they want their licence back.

Convicted drinking drivers must successfully complete all three components of Ontario's Back on Track alcohol education treatment program before their licence can be reinstated.

Back on Track: Participants pay \$475

(plus GST) to cover the cost of the program and should register immediately upon conviction as the program can take 11 months to complete. The three components of the program are:

(1) Assessment: Determines the extent of the drinking and driving problem and whether an education or treatment program is most appropriate.

(2) Education or Treatment Program: Driver must successfully complete the appropriate program aimed at preventing drinking and driving. These programs focus on how alcohol affects driving performance, the consequences of impaired driving and ways to avoid drinking and driving.

(3) Follow-up Interview: Takes place six months after the completion of the education or treatment program to revisit the skills obtained and goals set.

Vehicle Impoundment

Under Ontario's Vehicle Impoundment Program, driver's who are caught driving while their licence is

suspended for a Criminal Code conviction will have the vehicle they are driving impounded for a minimum of 45 days.

Regardless of whether the vehicle is rented, leased or loaned to a friend or family member, the vehicle will be impounded. The vehicle owner will be liable for all towing and impoundment costs.

NEW Ignition Interlock

An ignition interlock is an in-car alcohol breath-screening device that prevents a vehicle from starting if it detects alcohol on the breath of the operator.

Anyone convicted of an impaired driving offence committed on or after December 23, 2001 is subject to Ontario's Ignition Interlock Program.

After serving the current provincial sanctions, those eligible to have their driver's licence reinstated will have an "I" condition placed on their Ontario driver's licence for at least one year, with longer terms for repeat offenders. This condition requires any vehicle they drive be equipped with an approved ignition interlock device.

Drivers who choose not to install a device, must not drive until the condition is

removed from their licence.

Drivers subject to an ignition interlock condition are responsible for all installation and maintenance costs for the device.

Once drivers complete their minimum interlock period without any program violations, they must apply to the Ministry of Transportation to have the condition removed.

Vehicle owners should be aware that if they knowingly allow a person with an interlock condition to drive their vehicle, they will be subject to penalties under the Highway Traffic Act.

A convicted offender faces the following costs, at a minimum:

- Legal Costs (estimated range) \$2,000 - \$10,000
- Criminal Code fine \$600
- Back On Track program \$475.
- Licence reinstatement fee \$150.
- Increased Insurance (\$4,500 extra per yr for 3 yrs) Estimate \$13,500.
- Ignition Interlock \$1,300.
- TOTAL MINIMUM COST (plus taxes on some items) 18,025.
- Drinking and Driving is an expensive gamble. Please Don't Drink and Drive!

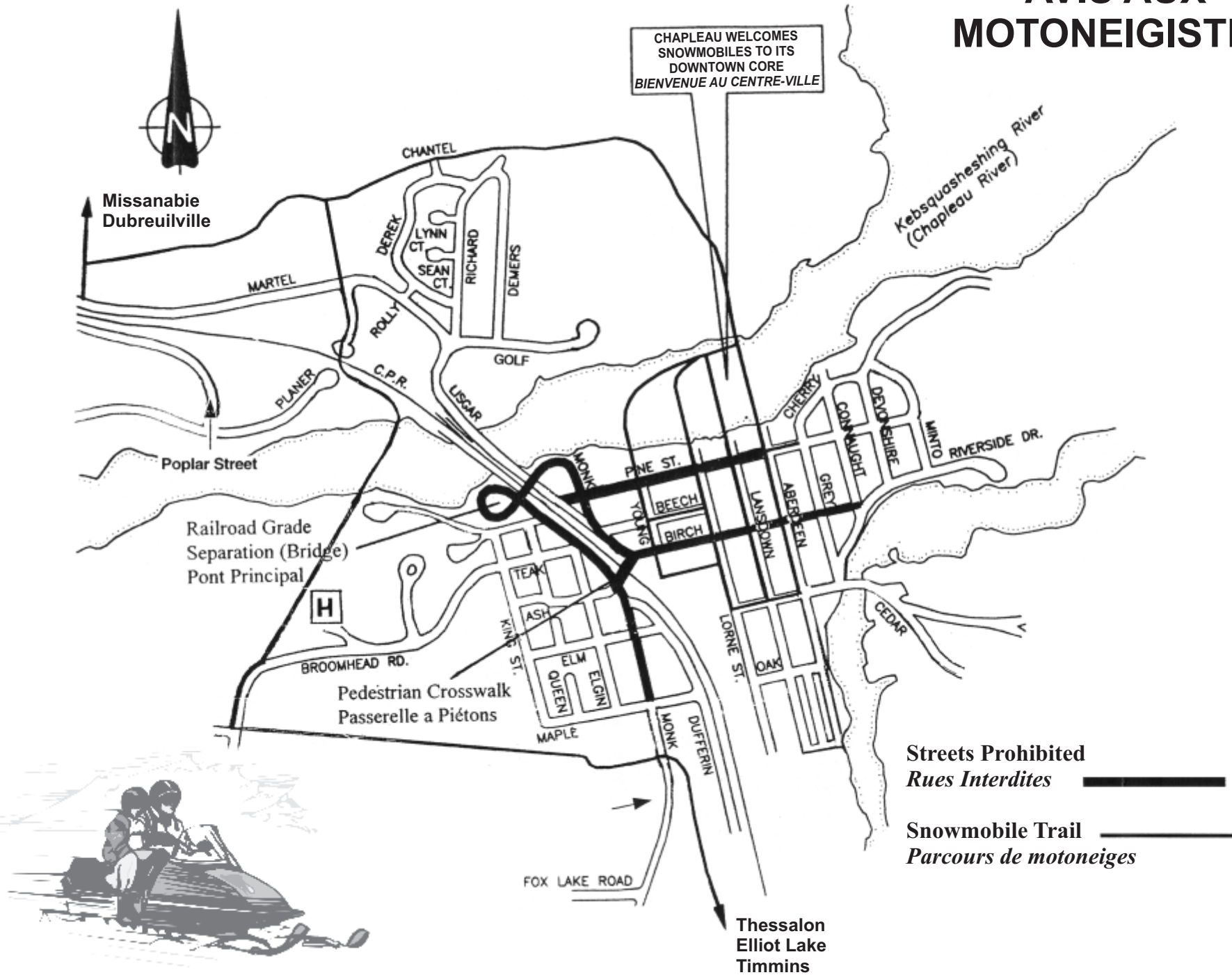
