Consortium announced for Chapleau biomass power plant

The Township of Chapleau hosted a major announcement today concerning the Project Consortium that will build and operate a renewable energy project to be located in the municipality. The

"Chapleau Biomass Project" will be a major boost to the local economy and will support the renewable energy targets of the Province.

Mayor Earle J. Freeborn, celebrated the announcement, remarking that "This is exactly what our community needs: local entrepreneurs bringing in global companies with the capacity to build world class projects. Yes, small communities like Chapleau can enjoy the quality jobs and many

other benefits of participating in the renewable energy sector."

The Chapleau Biomass Project is planned as a ten Megawatt (10 MW) power plant using wood-fibre biomass as the primary feedstock. The system will be based on gasification of the feedstock to produce a synthetic gas. This "syn-gas" is then cracked and cleaned with a gas reformation process assisted by leading edge plasma torch

technologies. An array of gas-fired reciprocating engines generate the electricity sold to the provincial grid.

This particular system was selected due to its best-of-class environmental performance along a wide range of important considerations, including air emissions.

The Project Consortium includes M & L Waste Management Ltd. (Chapleau); Sunbay Energy Corporation (Toronto); Toromont-CAT, a Division of Toromont Industries Ltd. (Ontario); PRM Energy Systems Inc. (Arkansas); and Europlasma, SA (France).

Representatives of the companies were available for comment. Larry Lacroix, President of M&L, remarked that "After several years dedicated to project planning, we now have a top-level project implementation team in place. There are many steps ahead, but many successful mile-stones have been achieved and today was one of the most important."

Glenn Keenan, Vice President of Power Systems for

Toromont-CAT noted that "Our company has a long history in Northern Ontario, with precisely the heavy equipment and power generation systems that will be used here." He continued: "The Chapleau Biomass Project is a is an exciting opportunity for Toromont-CAT. It will benefit from all of our resources in power plant design, construction, operations and maintenance for the life of the plant."







The Chapleau Biomass Project will now enter the formal permitting phase, with site prep to begin in the

Spring. Once all permits are in place, a construction period of twelve to eighteen months will follow with a commercial operation date in late 2010 or early 2011.

A series of announcements to follow will provide further details on final site selection, partnerships with local First Nations, and industry partners from forestry and railways.


A follow up article about the project will be published in the January 10, 2009 issue of the Chapleau Express.

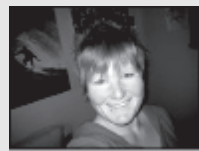

On January 7th, 2009, a unique and innovative *new* drop-in center for young people is opening in the heart of our small northern Ontario town. The "VAULT": a place where the youth of Chapleau will have a place to chill...a hang out to call their own!

Annnonce d'un consortium pour la mise sur pied d'une centrale bio-électrique à Chapleau

Le Canton de Chapleau a été à l'honneur mercredi suite à l'annonce qu'un consortium y allait assurer la construction et la gestion d'un projet de centrale électrique à base d'énergie

renouvelable. On s'attend à ce que le 'Projet de biomasse de Chapleau' rehausse l'économie locale tout en répondant aux objectifs provinciaux en matière d'énergie renouvelable.

Très heureux de l'annonce, le maire de la municipalité, M. Earle Freeborn, déclara: «Ce projet est tout indiqué pour notre collectivité : des entrepreneurs d'ici qui recrutent l'apport de

compagnies internationales pour bâtir un projet d'envergure mondiale. En effet, une petite localité comme Chapleau pourra jouir d'emplois de qualité et de bien d'autres bénéfices grâce à sa participation au secteur de l'énergie renouvelable.»

On prévoit que le Projet de biomasse de Chapleau ait une capacité de 10 mégawatts alimenté à la biomasse ligneuse. L'usine se servira de cette matière de base pour produire un gaz synthétique, surnommé 'syn-gas', qui sera retransformé au moyen de technologies de pointe utilisant les chalumeaux à plasma. Une série d'engins exploités au gaz fabriqueront l'électricité pour être revendue aux réseaux électriques provinciaux.

Ce système a été choisi en raison de son rendement exceptionnel au plan environnemental, tel qu'en matière d'émissions atmosphériques.

Le consortium est composé de : M&L Waste Management Ltd. de Chapleau; Sunbay Energy Corporation de Toronto; Toronto-CAT, une division de Toromont Industries Ltd. Ontario; PRM Energy Systems Inc. d'Arkansas aux É-U; et Europlasma, SA de France.

Des représentants des compagnies participantes étaient sur place pour offrir leurs réactions. Larry Lacroix, président de M & L Waste Management Ltd, déclara : « Après plusieurs années de planification, nous avons maintenant une équipe de pointe pour assurer l'exécution du projet. Il y a encore plusieurs étapes à franchir mais l'une des plus importantes vient de se réaliser. »

Affirma Glenn Keenan, président-adjoint de Power Systems pour Toromont-CAT:

« Notre compagnie jouit d'une association de longue date avec le nord de l'Ontario, avec justement l'équipement lourd et les systèmes générateurs qui serviront dans ce projet. » Il ajouta : « Le Projet de biomasse de Chapleau est une opportunité excitante pour notre compagnie. Il fera appel à toutes nos ressources en matière de dessin technique, de construction, d'exploitation et d'entretien tout au long de la durée de la centrale. »

Le projet se situe à présent à l'étape d'approvisionnement de permis. On s'attend à ce que la préparation du site s'amorce au printemps. Lorsque tous les permis auront été accordés, les travaux de construction s'ensuivront pendant environ 12 à 18 mois. La date de lancement de l'usine est prévu pour fin 2010 ou début 2011.

D'autres annonces suivront au cours de l'évolution du projet en matière de choix du site, partenariats avec les Premières Nations, l'industrie forestière et l'industrie ferroviaire.

Quilts of success

More than 10 beautiful wall-hung quilts depicting what it means to quit smoking were on display at the Sudbury & District Health Unit in Sudbury on Thursday, December 11. The quilts were assembled using over 100 squares created by people from across northeastern Ontario who have quit smoking

or by those whose lives have been touched by another person's decision to be smoke-free.

Community members were presented their assembled quilts to take them back to their communities to be put on display. "Wherever these quilts are displayed, they will symbolize and recognize people's efforts to be smoke-free and serve as a visual reminder that a smoke-free life is a real

possibility," said Leila Tikkanen Pilon, Regional Coordinator of the North East Tobacco Control Area Network (TCAN).

In partnership with the North East TCAN, the Sudbury & District Health Unit had encouraged people to embark on a 'Quit Quilt Quest'. To date, quilts have been created in all five of the health unit areas that make up the Tobacco Control Area Network.

As part of the quilt showing, people

who have quit smoking also shared their cessation experiences, including Dianna Watson of Copper Cliff, grand prize winner of the Driven to Quit 2008 Challenge. In addition, the Canadian Cancer Society shared details about the Driven to Quit 2009 Challenge and Smokers' Helpline, and the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health shared information about its upcoming Stop on the Road cessation workshops.

Tobacco use is the number one cause of preventable disease and death in Ontario, killing over 13 000 Ontarians every year. There are over 1.7 million smokers in Ontario over the age of 15, and almost half of them (43 per cent) made a serious attempt to quit over the course of a year.

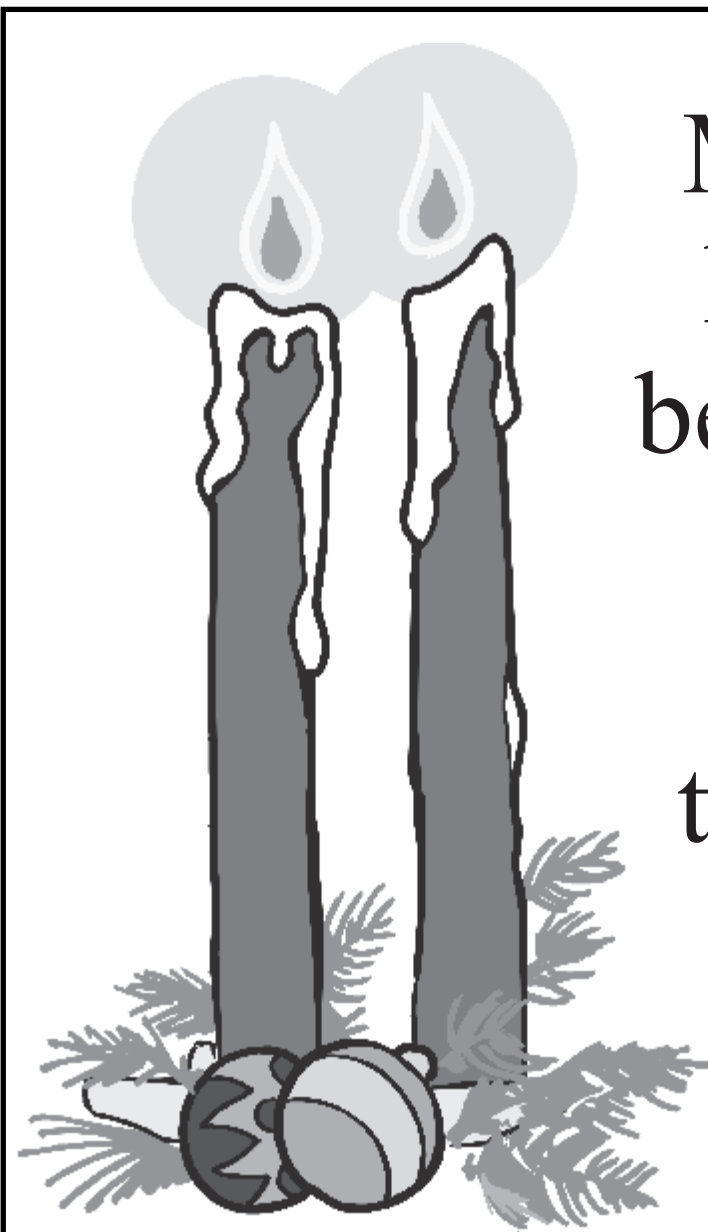

Good Time to Buy A Sled

Special to the Ontario Federation of Snowmobile Clubs: Maybe you haven't bought a new sled for several years. Perhaps you are a new snowmobiler looking for that first sled. Or maybe it's time to add another sled to your family fleet. Whatever your reason, the 2009 model year is a good time to make your purchase.

Why? Snowmobile technology has improved dramatically this decade, so sleds deliver

more and better performance, handling, ride, ergonomics and amenities than ever before. What's more, the manufacturers have further defined and refined sled categories with feature and benefit packages specifically targeted to various riding styles and preferences: mountain, trail, crossover, touring, performance and utility.

If you have a sled older than model year 2003, you are missing out on most of these advances and advantages. Today's sleds are a quantum leap ahead and make riding a pure pleasure. Let's look at a few of the benefits...

With wildly fluctuating oil prices, fuel economy is top of mind. Each manufacturer now offers engines that

provide substantially reduced fuel and oil consumption, so you can ride farther on each litre. But be careful, even within any given brand's line-up, some sleds deliver better fuel economy than others. So if lowering your fuel cost and emissions is a high priority, make that one of your main criteria when shopping for a 2009 sled.

Every brand now has at least one solid 4-stroke engine choice, but it may or may not be offered in the category of sled you prefer. Only Yamaha offers a full line up of 4-stroke sleds. But 4-stroke isn't the only way to go. Some 2-strokes, including Ski-Doo's SDI, and its even more efficient new ETEC, get as good or better gas mileage...and ETEC rules when it comes to the lowest 2-stroke oil consumption.

If you choose from among the most fuel-efficient sleds available in 2009, you aren't in much danger of falling behind in new engine technology any time soon. What's more, since these are

also the cleanest powerplants on the snow, you'll be doing your bit for the environment...and that means virtually no more smoke or smell.

Many 2009 sleds will also make you a better rider. Advances in rider ergonomics mean that today's sleds are dramatically more responsive and easier to steer and manoeuvre. If you're riding a sled that's even five years old, the difference now is night and day. Led by the Ski-Doo REV and REV-XP platforms, many models of all brands now feature rider forward and rider-centric positioning. This puts the rider weight more towards the front for better handling, plus it moves your butt farther away from the rear suspension, which has also seen major improvements.

The result is a smoother, more stable ride that's more comfortable and enjoyable, with less steering effort. My wife is a big fan of the rider forward position because it's much less demanding and

fatiguing than older configurations. My aging bones love it because they take considerably less abuse...and I can ride longer days without feeling muscle-weary. And if you have back troubles, the rider forward position is much more natural and spine-friendly. In fact, with my suspension dialled in properly, I can ride my touring sled with a smile on my face regardless of trail conditions. And on tour, when surfaces can vary from day to day, this is a huge bonus!

Finally, among 2009 models you'll discover some of the lightest sleds on the snow. Not only does lighter weight make a sled more responsive and easier to ride, it's also easier to boondock, lug around, get unstuck and transport around. Again, I know many women who especially appreciate the lighter weight models.

No doubt, snowmobiles will continue to progress and advance. But it's unlikely that we will see as many quantum

leaps ahead in the next year or two as we have in the past five or six. So that makes it an auspicious time to buy into the leading edge of today's technology curve...and get ride of your old sled before it becomes totally obsolete!

Make it a HEALTHY Holiday

The holidays often bring together family and friends at lots of social gatherings. All that togetherness can increase the chance of spreading viruses and bacteria that cause colds, influenza and norovirus.

Handwashing, when done properly, is still the single most

effective way of preventing the spread of infectious diseases.

Follow these four simple steps to keep your hands clean:

1. Wet your hands with warm running water.

2. Add liquid soap, and rub your hands together, making a soapy lather. Do this

away from the running water for at least 15 seconds. Wash the front and back of your hands, as well as between your fingers and under your nails.

3. Rinse your hands under warm running water. Let the water run back into the sink, not down your arms to your elbows.

Turn off the water with a paper towel and place it in the garbage.

4. Dry your hands thoroughly with a clean towel.

“There is more to handwashing than you think. By washing your hands with soap and water, you wash the dirt off of your skin. The soap lather

suspends both the dirt and germs, which then get washed away,” says Burgess Hawkins, a manager in the health unit's Environmental Health division.

Improper handwashing allows bacteria and viruses to be spread through food and objects that an infected person touches.

When your hands are not visibly dirty, alcohol-based hand sanitizers also work very well at killing germs on your hands.

ongles.

3. Rincez les mains sous l'eau chaude et laissez couler l'eau dans le lavabo et non le long de vos bras. Fermez le robinet à l'aide d'une serviette en papier et placez cette dernière dans la poubelle.

4. Séchez complètement vos mains à l'aide d'une nouvelle serviette de papier.

« Le lavage des mains est beaucoup plus important qu'on ne le pense. L'eau et le savon enlèvent la saleté qui se trouve sur la peau des mains. La saleté et les germes en suspension dans la mousse coulent ensuite dans le lavabo » explique Burgess Hawkins, un gestionnaire de la Division de la santé environnementale du Service de santé publique.

permet aux bactéries et aux virus de se déposer sur les aliments et les objets que touche une personne infectée.

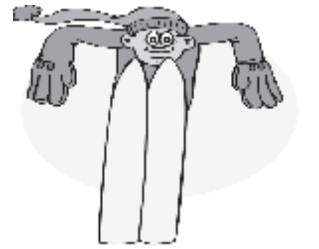
