

New Chief of Staff named at Chapleau General Hospital

The Chapleau General Hospital has a new Chief of Medical Staff.

The appointment of Doctor Chris McKibbon who is the chief of staff at the Sudbury Regional Hospital, was revealed at the last regular meeting of the board of Services de Santé de Chapleau Health Services.

The position became vacant earlier this year, when Doctor Frank Broomhead indicated to the board that following a lengthy tenure as the hospitals Chief of Medical Staff he wished to have a replacement.

The New Chief of Medical staff was selected after the Chapleau Board

made a request to the Sudbury Regional Hospital.

The Board passed a resolution granting the new doctor privileges at the hospital.

Doctor McKibbon is an internist and rheumatologist.

While the incoming chief of medical staff is practicing in Sudbury the Board was told he would attend its meetings. The Chapleau hospital boasts the latest in information technology and enables instant communications such as video conferencing.

The Board also said it intends to honour Doctor Broomhead for his many years of service as head of the medical staff.

Board member, Mayor Earle J. Freeborn noted Doctor Broomhead has served in the position for 30 years and recommended a letter of appreciation from the board.

It's likely their will be a more formal ceremony to acknowledge Doctor Broomhead for his years of service.

Acting for the last time as the Board's interim chair, Lucy Bignucolo said Doctor Broomhead's thirty years was "quite a commitment," and he should be thanked in an appropriate manner.

New council on forest industry announced

Chapleau Mayor Earle J. Freeborn says he supports the move to establish a provincial council to advise the Provincial government on the forest industry's future.

"If good things come out of it, then it certainly will be good for Chapleau," said the Mayor, although he also said he felt there should have been municipal representation on the Council from Northeastern Ontario.

The newly appointed established group named the Minister's Council on Forest Sector Competitiveness is to provide advice on strengthening Ontario's forest industry said Natural Resources Minister David Ramsay.

"With the many challenges facing our forest industry, we long-term plan," said Ramsay in a news release. "This council can help is create a more secure future for the forest products industry, workers and n o r t h e r n communities."

The 17 Council members have been asked to work together on recommendations that will contribute to a secure future for the forest products industry. The council is scheduled to submit a report a n d recommendations to the minister in the spring of 2005.

The council includes representatives from the municipal sector, the forest industry and First Nations. A secretary will help steer the council's deliberations.

The Mayors of Hearst, Thunder Bay and Kenora make up the municipal

need to put in place a representation. The council includes six top level forestry company executives, two from First Nations, two labour delegates and an environmental delegates from the Canadian Parks and Wilderness Society.

> "I look forward to receiving the Council's suggestions on the best way to strengthen and diversify our forestbased economy," said Ramsay. "By building a stronger forest sector, we can help communities across Ontario prosper."

> Mayor Freebon said he would support something positive coming out of the Council's findings.

DES RÉSULTATS HORS-PAIR à L'ÉCOLE SACRÉ-COEUR

Grâce à la mise en place d'une variété de méthodes et de stratégies d'enseignement, les résultats des tests provinciaux de mai 2003 ont monté à l'école Sacré-Coeur. En effet, il semblerait que les projets spéciaux "J'aime lire", "J'aime écrire" ou "J'aime les maths" ont porté fruit.

En lecture, en écriture et en mathématiques troisième année, les résultats ont monté de plus de 20%. Il faut noter que les résultats de sixième sont meilleurs de près de 30% dans les trois matières à notre école, donc une hausse significative dans chacune des trois disciplines.

Les clubs de lecture après les heures de classe, la lecture collective de romans dans plusieurs classes, "Ensemble, nous allons réussir" et l'intérêt particulier porté aux mathématiques ont donné plus d'assurance aux élèves, et en ajoutant les programmes intensifs, les résultats sont très positifs. NEW REPORT TACKLES ONTARIO'S OBESITY EPIDEMIC

The Sudbury & District Health Unit welcomes the release of a new report on obesity from the office of Dr. Sheela Basrur, Ontario's Chief Medical Officer of Health. "Healthy Weights, Healthy Lives" was written in light of rising obesity rates in Canada.

"This report will mean additional energy for the momentum on obesity prevention that is already underway in Sudbury & District," says Dr. Penny Sutcliffe, Sudbury & District Medical Officer of Health.

"In October 2003, the Sudbury & District Board of Health proactively passed a motion supporting obesity prevention and the promotion of healthy weights." As a result, the health unit created the Nutrition and Physical Activity Action Team, dedicated to

developing innovative strategies that promote physical activity and healthy eating.

Some of these strategies include workplace policies, understanding food labels, and trail development.

Community involvement is an important part of ensuring that obesity programs are successful.

Obesity rates for the Sudbury & District

area are higher than for the rest of Ontario. The 2003 Canadian Community Health Survey found that 37 per cent of over 18 year olds is overweight and 18 per cent is obese in the Sudbury & District area. The numbers for Ontario are 33 per cent and 15 per cent, respectively.

"While obesity is a complex issue that requires a great deal of attention, we believe that the recommendations made in Dr. Basrur's report can make a difference by looking at community needs in a variety of settings that include homes, schools and workplaces," says Dr. Penny Sutcliffe, Sudbury & District Medical Officer of Health.

"Healthy Lives" lays out a plan to promote healthy weights in Ontario by encouraging physical activity and healthy eating to stop obesity.

The report recognizes that obesity is caused by a number of interrelated factors that need to be addressed at all levels.





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

Canada and Ontario Make **Major Investment** in Municipal and r Infrastructure

All Ontario municipalities of less than 250,000 can now apply to the Canada-Ontario Municipal Rural Infrastructure Fund (COMRIF) to improve their public

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infrastructure. The Governments of Canada and Ontario recently signed an agreement to each provide up to \$298 over the next five years to improve public infrastructure in small urban and rural municipalities throughout the province.

Participating communities will be expected to contribute one third of the cost of any project, bringing the total investment in s u s t a i n a b l e infrastructure up to \$900.

The investments will help communities improve water and sewage treatment and waste management, fix local roads and repair bridges, as well as help address other health and safety priorities.

Other funding categories include: public transit, municipal energy improvement, cultural, recreational and tourism infrastructure, and connectivity.

The agreement provides that the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) will work with the Governments of Canada

and Ontario to ensure the program offers maximum benefits to Ontario communities and will continue to promote increased awareness of the program.

Up to 1% of the fund will be available to help municipalities improve and increase their capacity to manage their infrastructure assets.

This funding could be used, for example, to help communities enhance knowledge of their existing infrastructure assets, better evaluate life-cycle costs associated with the infrastructure they own and operate, better assess the capacity of current

infrastructure and identify future needs, better plan and make infrastructure funding decisions, and better train municipal staff in long-term infrastructure management.

This is a novel approach to better managing infrastructure that was agreed to during the negotiation of this agreement.

The signatories to the agreement also l a u n c h e d www.comrif.ca, a website where interested communities will find program information and be able to apply on-line for funding.

Communities will also be able to apply with a CD ROM-based application or a paper application.

Applications will be processed through a COMRIF Joint Secretariat, which has been established to streamline program delivery.

COMRIF is part of the Municipal Rural Infrastructure Fund (MRIF), through which the Government of Canada will invest \$1 billion in priority infrastructure projects across Canada.

The MRIF builds on the success and lessons learned from previous programs, especially the \$2.05 billion Infrastructure Canada Program and complements programs such as the \$4-billion Canada Strategic Infrastructure Fund, which addresses larger infrastructure needs, primarily in urban areas.

Ontario's communities and regions have benefited from many infrastructure projects funded through these programs.

COMRIF will advance Ontario's commitment to building strong communities and a safe, healthy and prosperous province.
