A Successful Disastrous Day!



On Tuesday, November 22nd, an accident occurred at 10:30 a.m., resulting in twelve teenage casualties. Fortunately, this accident was a simula-

tion, designed to help local organizations test their plans and processes for responding to mass casualties. The 'victims' of the accident included a dozen local high school students from Chapleau High School and École secondaire catholique Trillium, who portrayed the casualties from a bus accident.

The Ontario Provincial Police, Ambulance Service and Fire Department all responded quickly to the scene of the acci-

dent, controlling the scene, assessing patients, providing emergency medical care, and transporting the casualties to the hospital's emergency department. Upon arrival at the emergency department, the casualties were triaged, with diagnostic tests and examinations ordered, and injuries treated, according to the script of injuries that they sustained during the accident.

OPP Staff Sergeant Dan Dawson

attended at the accident scene, and he observed that, 'This is the first time that we've ever done something like this in Chapleau, and it was a great learning experience for everyone involved. It was a perfect opportunity for everyone to see how each other works side by side, and it was nice to work together as a team.'

The mock disaster was declared over at 1 p.m., and lunch was provided for the students who participated in the mock disaster, before they attended a debriefing session.

Following conclusion of the disaster, individual organizations conducted internal debriefing sessions for staff involved in the process, to gather their observations on how processes can be improved. The multi-agency Mock


Disaster Planning Group met on Friday, November 25th, to review performance in the handoffs and communication between agencies.


Gail Bignucolo, Chief Executive Officer for Services de santé de Chapleau Health Services said, 'As a result of this exercise, our organization's processes for responding to mass casualties will be improved. I would like to thank all of our partner organizations


for participating in this mock disaster with us, and would also like to acknowledge Lacroix Bus Lines for generously donating the services of a bus to transport students to the scene of our mock disaster. The students who portrayed our casualties did an extraordinary job, and the staff on duty during the event are commended for their enthusiasm and willingness to learn and help the organization to improve.'



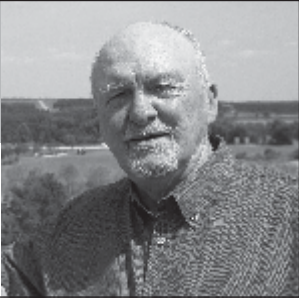

Louis and Jeanne Longchamps active in Sacred Heart Roman Catholic church in Chapleau for over sixty years

Chapleau Moments

In the early 1920s, shortly after Jeanne and Louis Longchamps arrived in Chapleau, there were only four automobiles, one of which the citizens had given as gift to Dr. J.J. Sheahan, who practised medicine in the community from 1907 until his death in 1942.

Louis Longchamps arrived in Chapleau on August 1, 1922, with his brother Albert while Lorenzo would follow a few years later.

Dr. Sheahan received his car on July 21, 1921 while the others belonged to Father Romeo Gascon, Edgar Pellow and Len Perfetto.

In the spring of 1916, Octave Morin came to Chapleau from Bic, Quebec, in Rimouski County to work as a carpenter for the Canadian Pacific Railway. In 1925 his wife Claudia and children Andre, Albert, Marie, Jeanne, Antonio, Marianne, Gerard, Cecile, Philippe and Lucienne joined him in Chapleau. Their first home was near the old horseshoe bridge where Zenon and Amanda Rioux later lived.

Louis Longchamps,

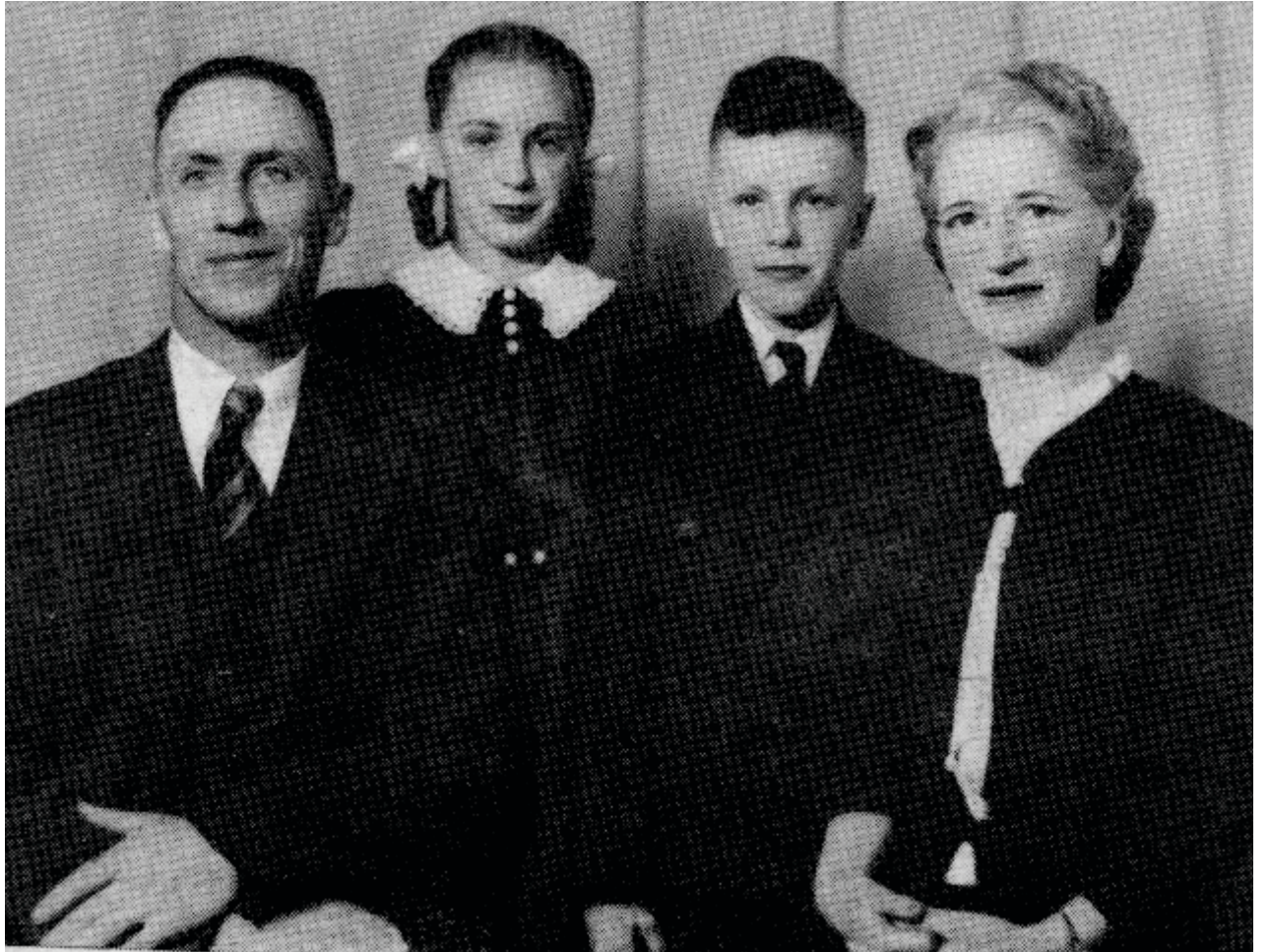
age 19, arrived in Chapleau on August 1, 1922, with his brother Albert while Lorenzo would follow a few years later.

Mr. Longchamps started working for the CPR as a carpenter where his first foreman was Arthur Grenier and then Octave Morin.

But his father Charles Longchamps had earlier worked on the construction of the CPR and was one of the workers present when William Van Horne, the company president, visited the Jack Fish site in 1884.

He became acquainted with Mr. Morin's daughter Jeanne, and they were married on October 20, 1930 at Sacred Heart Roman Catholic Church in Chapleau. They celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in 1980.

During the first years of his marriage Mr. Longchamps worked at Nipigon on a new bridge there, returning to Chapleau and living at 16 Lorne Street near the present post office from 1940 to 1978. I so well recall that Mr. and Mrs. Longchamps chose to become among the first occupants of an

apartment in Cedar Grove Lodge when it opened in 1978.

They had two children Louise, who married Angelo Mione, and Jean Louis 'Johnny' who married Joan Bryson.

Mr. and Mrs. Longchamps were very active in the life of Sacred Heart Parish for more than 60 years.

Mrs. Longchamps was the founding president of the Ladies of Ste. Anne, established in the parish in 1958.

Mr. Longchamps was part of the parish team which dug out and built the church basement when Father Marchand was parish priest in the late 1950s.

In an interview in the Chapleau

Sentinel marking the 100th anniversary of the parish, Mrs. Longchamps recalled that envelope boxes that were still in place on church pews at Sacred Heart, were all made by her father, Octave Morin. She remembered that Father Gascon would visit her father as he worked on them and admired his patience.

As I was working on this story, I could not help but reflect on the members of the Longchamps and Morin families, and the contribution they made to life in the community from their arrival in a place with four automobiles in the early 1920s and on. My email is mj.morris@live.ca

The loss of supply management for the Wheat Board could be the beginning of the end for family farms according to Carol Hughes. With fears that the fate of the Wheat Board may signal the end of similar milk and egg marketing boards,

Hughes took the government to task for ignoring the will of smaller producers and coming down firmly on the side of big agricultural producers instead.

In her speech on the bill that will dismantle the Wheat Board late Monday,

Hughes stands up for supply management as government imposes its will on majority of grain farmers

Hughes took the government to task for endangering family farms while limiting debate on legislation that will have such a severe impact on these smaller producers.

“They are only telling us half the story. They are not telling the whole truth,” said Hughes. “They are not warning of the dangers that may come to prairie communities when smaller farmers lose their farms.” The

bill to dismantle the Wheat Board is proceeding despite a vote from farmers who will be affected that showed the majority wish to keep the single desk seller for wheat and barley. Smaller producers fear they will be unable to receive the price on international markets that they are able to achieve with the protection of the farmer-controlled Wheat Board.

“Mr. Speaker, the government now has the responsibility to say directly to those 38 261 farmers, who spoke out in a dignified democratic fashion,

and say – I don’t care about your opinion,” said Hughes.

“It should not be this way. We should not be shutting farmers out of this debate. We should not be telling them that their opinion does not matter.”

The bill is being rushed through parliament as one of many that have had debate limited by time allocation. The Conservatives are on pace to set a new record for using this debate-killing tactic. It took the Chretien Liberals 122 sitting days to set the current high-water mark, but the Conservative are

on pace to smash this in 40-45 days.

“Mr. Speaker, there is a reason why we have a process in the house,” Said Hughes. “It is so that good, smart decisions prevail. It is a process designed to avoid rash decisions and to provide peace, order, and good government for the people of Canada.”

Despite opposition in the House and from the majority of grain producers, the bill passed third reading in the House of Commons and will now be debated in the Senate.

Carol Hughes défend la gestion de l’offre tandis que le gouvernement impose sa volonté à la majorité des Producteurs de céréales

Retirer la gestion de l’offre à la Commission canadienne du blé pourrait être le début de la fin pour les fermes familiales, selon Carol Hughes. Craignant que le sort de la Commission canadienne du blé n’annonce la fin imminente d’autres commissions semblables de commercialisation des oeufs et du lait, Mme Hughes a fustigé le gouvernement conservateur, qui fait fi de la volonté des petits producteurs et se range manifestement du côté des gros producteurs.

Dans sa déclaration à propos du projet de loi qui vise à démanteler la Commission canadienne du blé, en fin de journée lundi, Mme Hughes a blâmé le gouvernement pour mettre en péril les fermes familiales et limiter le débat sur une mesure législative qui aura un très grave impact sur les petits producteurs.

« J’ai bien peur que les conservateurs ne nous disent que la moitié de l’histoire. Ils ne nous disent pas tout, a déclaré Mme Hughes. Ils ne nous avertissent pas des

dangers que peuvent courir les collectivités des Prairies quand les petits agriculteurs perdent leurs exploitations. »

Même si les fermiers visés ont voté en majorité pour la conservation de ce système de vente à guichet unique du blé et de l’orge, le projet de loi chemine. Les petits producteurs craignent de ne plus pouvoir obtenir, sur les marchés internationaux, les prix que l’intervention de la Commission, contrôlée par les agriculteurs, leur permettait de toucher.

« Le gouvernement a maintenant le devoir de dire directement à ces 38 261 agriculteurs qui se sont exprimés de façon digne et démocratique qu’il ne se soucie aucunement de leur opinion, a déclaré Carol Hughes. Il ne devrait pas en être ainsi. Nous ne devrions pas exclure les agriculteurs de ce débat. Nous ne devrions pas leur dire que leurs opinions sont sans importance. »

À l’instar d’autres mesures législatives sur

lesquelles le débat a été limité par le biais de motions d’attribution de temps, le projet de loi est examiné à toute vapeur par le Parlement. En recourant ainsi à la tactique du bâillon, les conservateurs sont en voie d’établir un nouveau record. Il avait fallu aux libéraux de Jean Chrétien 122 jours de séance pour établir la marque actuelle, mais il semble que les Conservateurs l’écraseront en environ 40 ou 45 jours.

Mme Hughes a déclaré à la Chambre : « si un processus a été établi à la Chambre, c’est pour que les bonnes décisions, les décisions intelligentes, l’emportent. Ce processus vise à empêcher que l’on prenne des décisions précipitées et à apporter la paix, l’ordre et la bonne gouvernance aux Canadiens. »

En dépit de l’opposition et de la majorité des producteurs de céréales, le projet de loi a franchi l’étape de la troisième lecture à la Chambre des communes. Il sera à présent débattu au Sénat.
