"The Big Bang"

"Contemporary atheism marches behind the banner of science," says Dinesh D'Souza, "The central argument of leading scientific atheists is that modern science has refuted traditional religious conceptions of a divine creator." He states:

But of late atheism seems to be

losing its scientific confidence. One sign of this is the public advertisements that are appearing in billboards from London to Washington DC. Dawkins (an atheist) helped pay for a London campaign to put signs on city buses saying, "There's probably no God. Now stop worrying and enjoy your life."

Such advertisements now appear in Canada.

Norman L. Geisler and Frank Turek in their book I Don't Have Enough Faith to Be an Atheist point out that Albert Einstein had always believed that the universe is eternal: it did not have a beginning: it has always been. If the universe did not have a beginning it did not need a beginner. God

was unnecessary. But Einstein's theory of General Relativity showed him that indeed the universe had a beginning. The three components of the universe, time, space and matter, all came into being at the same instant. Scientists dubbed it the Big Bang.

Agnostic David Berlinsky affirms, "Whatever its name, as far as most physicists are concerned, the Big Bang is now part of the established structure of modern physics."

Our human minds cannot imagine that before the instant of creation there was no time, no space and no matter. Einstein's theory shows that to be true. The universe was indeed created out of nothing.

What caused the Big Bang? Atheistic scientists have been scrambling to show that it was not God. Even Einstein called his theory

"irritating." Another scientist admitted he had searched diligently in the hope he might find a loophole.

The more scientists search, the more they find facts that point to an intelligent design. An intelligent design requires an intelligent designer. Atheist Steven Hawking wrote "So long as the universe had a beginning, we could suppose it had a creator." "God forbid!" Berlinsky chides.

Imagine the point of a pin. The instant before creation, the entire universe existed in a space smaller than the point of that pin. Then the Big Bang and all of the heavenly bodies were flung out from that point. Impossible! But that is what Einstein's theory says

happened and that is what the scientific community accepts.

In the bronze medal game, Matheson beat Timmins to win the consolation trophy.



Your headline and ad copy must grab attention immediately and hold the reader's attention long enough to get your message across.

Be descriptive, the more information you provide to the reader, the better the responses will be to your ad. Choose words that are captivating, colorful, expressive, and descriptive. Words like EARN, SAVE, GET, FEEL, DO all encourage the reader to take action.

·Start your ad with the item for sale, service you are offering, or job title of the person you seek to hire.

·Keep your sentences short and easy to read. Don't try to get all the

company or product into your ad.

·Always include the price of an item for sale.

·Avoid abbreviations; they make your ad harder to read and less effective.

·Use larger type, white space, or decorative characters, such as stars, to bring attention to your ad. Within printmedia, sometimes words and images are the only means to effectively grab a reader's attention.

Run your ad for an ample length of time. Continue to make small modifications to your ads and test them.



Special to the Ontario Federation of Snowmobile Clubs: As with any new activity, getting started in snowmobiling may seem intimidating. Perhaps the most basic question is: "Will I like it?" The only way to find out is by trying it yourself. But don't just jump on a sled and ride off without a little orientation and basic training. Ask your guide or another experienced rider to walk you around the sled and show you the controls and how everything works. You need to talk about what to expect, trail etiquette, hand signals and what to do if you are having a problem or discomfort. You should pre-arrange frequent breaks so that you'll never have to ride for too long if something needs attention or fixing. Make sure your guide has rear view mirrors so he/she can

keep any eye on you. Each of us has only one first ride; so above all, don't allow yourself to be pushed beyond what's comfortable for

Before any ride, remember to eat well so your body has the fuel to stay warm. Take highenergy snack with you and nibble regularly to keep your body furnace stoked. Keep hydrated by drinking lots of water and dress warmly in outwear made for specially snowmobiling. Many firsttimers have suffered from cold through a ride because they tried to get away with regular outdoor or even ski clothing. Whatever you wear, always put on clothing that is already warm...donning cold gear drains body heat and creates a chill before you even start.

To stay warm, moisture management is key. That's because moisture of any kind conducts cold. As perspiration, it's part of the body's temperature regulation system, making your skin cooler as it evaporates. This is okay in the summer, when you want to cool off, but in the winter, valuable body heat is wasted to rewarm your skin. The longer the moisture stays in contact with your skin, the more heat is lost and the colder you become.

When snowmobiling, the problem is what happens to that moisture. Because the outside air temperature is cold, you don't want to add an inner cooling effect from any moisture lingering near your skin. That's why you should wear merino wool or one of the new high tech fabrics such as polypropylene as your first layer of clothing. These fabrics actually move moisture away from your skin towards the outside. If the next layer you wear is fleece and your snowmobile jacket is a breathable, waterproof material such as Gore TexTM, that moisture is quickly transported to the exterior of your suit, where it evaporates without bothering you.

One of the biggest mistakes snow-mobilers make is to wear cotton while riding. Most everyday sweat suits, tshirts, jeans, underwear and socks are made of cotton. Cotton has many excellent properties, but it also retains moisture like a sponge. When you perspire wearing cotton next to your skin, you get that clammy feeling for the very long time it takes to dry. The trouble with being clammy is that every second means more body heat is being lost, so it's easier to catch a chill.

Once you're dry on the inside, it's also important to keep moisture out. If water from rain or melted or wet snow penetrates your outerwear, you will get wet on the inside too. This moisture has the same effect on your body temperature as perspiration, but it's more dangerous because in order to get inside, it has probably soaked your best layers of insulation. Once these layers are wet, you'll lose body heat considerably faster and they will take a long time to dry.

There's no better way to keep water out than a snowmobile suit made with one of several waterproof. breathable materials, coatings or treatments that are on the market today. They also have the added benefits of letting body moisture escape and being generally lighter weight and less cumbersome to wear.

Better yet if your outerwear is also windproof and seamsealed. These properties will keep wind chill out and significantly reduce

the cold effect of air moving against you from the forward momentum of your sled.

natural connection between the fact that the universe had a beginning and the hypothesis that it had a creator." Berlinsky says that such remarks "travelled far afield," even to the New York Times.

"Physicists quickly came to their senses," says Berlinsky. He scoffs, "They discovered elaborate reasons to avoid the obvious, not the least of which, the fact that the obvious

was obvious... Here was a connection that any primitive could at once grasp: The universe had a beginning, thus something must have caused it to begin."

Berlinsky mocks, "In this, the physicists were immeasurably aided by the philosophers... who aided the work at hand by writing very elegant papers demonstrating that if the universe had a beginning; it was not a beginning that really began."

D'Souza says, "Science is the search for natural explanations for natural phenomena, and what could be more embarrassing than the finding that a supernatural intelligence transcending all natural laws is behind it all?"

Hughes introduces bills to improve employment insurance



OTTAWA - Carol Hughes tabled two bills today that would make important changes to Employment Insurance. The changes would see a longer benefit period for workers over 45 years

Other changes would allow claims to be filed based on 360 hours of insurable work. increase the amount of benefit to 55% of the workers highest-paid 12 weeks that the claim is based upon, reduces the qualifying period before receiving benefits and removes the distinction made in qualifying period on the basis of regional unemployment rate.

"N o r t h e r n Ontario communities were looking for these changes and had great hopes for the budget to bring them about," said Hughes. "Since the government has not seen fit to take the bull by the horns on this, we will take action ourselves."

The impact of these bills would be especially appreciated

of age who permanently lose their jobs after ten years in the workforce. Other changes would allow claims to be filed in the smaller communities of Northern Ontario who feel the effects of job losses more acutely than larger centres.

"For workers in many of the communities in Northern Ontario there isn't a large pool of jobs to pick from when they find themselves out of work," she said. "They are the ones

who pay the freight on this program, it only makes sense that the program is able to suit their needs."

The bills will be debated during the time allotted to Private Member's business and should come up shortly as Mrs. Hughes has been selected fifteenth in the order of precedence for those debates.


