New Website helps eliminate service gaps for families of individuals with special needs

new website has been Limplemented in the Sudbury & Manitoulin District in an effort to help connect families of individuals with special needs to screened respite workers and respite options in their area.

The website (www.respiteservices .com) is a provincial program which was originally developed in Toronto almost 3 years ago and has since moved across the province. It is funded by the Ministry of Children and Youth Services and the Ministry of Community and Social Services and is co-hosted by the

Sudburv & Manitoulin area. The site offers a listing of respite options and respite partners. It also contains a calendar of events section that lists events and workshops available to both families and workers, most of which are free of charge as well as a resource section.

This section offers a listing of various books and links geared to both families and workers that cover a multitude of issues ranging from physical disabilities to autism and mental health needs.

Furthermore, within respiteservi ces.com there is a program called CHAP (Community Helpers part of the website. It facilitates the connection of individuals with disabilities and CHAP workers through a family registry and worker database. Being able to find respite workers has been a large gap for families in the area and the CHAP program aims to close that gap by matching families to screened respite worker who meet the family's identified need. The CHAP Program is currently available for the children's sector only. It remains under development for the adult sector and will be available in the future.

Conservatives muzzle dissent

In Canada's federal system of government, quasijudicial commissions are established to perform a role, much like a court, to regulate different sectors and enforce Canadian laws. Like a court, these commissions are completely independent and should be free of political interference. The Canadian Nuclear Safety Commission and Elections Canada are two such commissions.

Since the Conservative government took office two years ago, Mr.



Harper has set a dangerous precedent intimidating officers of such commissions and potentially putting the safety of Canadians at risk.

When the Canadian Nuclear Safety Commission's president Linda Keen (a former President of the international Convention on Nuclear Safety) did her job enforcing the nuclear safety license requirements at the Atomic Energy Company Ltd. in Chalk River after it repeatedly failed to meet safety standards, the Conservative Minister of Natural Resources fired her because he was embarrassed his government did not act sooner on this file. Listening to his own nuclear safety expert the Harper government then passed emergency legislation to restart the Chalk River nuclear facility even though it had not completed its safety upgrades and was 1,000 times more dangerous.

But Ms. Keen is not alone among the list of independent commission officers fired for doing their jobs.

Adrian Measner was fired as President and CEO of the Canadian Wheat Board after following the direction of the farmer-elected Board of Directors. Johanne Gelinas was fired as Environment Commissioner after publicly commenting

that she had not received sufficient information from the Conservatives about their so-called environment plan. Andrew Okulitch was fired as a scientist with the Geological Survey of Canada after refusing an order to turn federal correspondence into political propaganda for the Conservatives. Jack Anawak was fired as Ambassador of Circumpolar Affairs. Karen Kraft Sloan was fired as Ambassador for the Environment. Bernard Shapiro was forced out as Ethics Commissioner after several run-ins with Prime Minister Harper.

Jean-Pierre Kingsley was "forced out" as Chief Elections Officer after making the Conservatives admit they violated election financing laws. It is important to note that the Conservatives have

Ontario disapppointed by further U.S. actions on softwood lumber

U.S. assertions that provincial programs contravene the Softwood Lumber Agreement signed last year, Natural Resources Minister Donna Cansfield said today.

"Our programs do not contravene the Softwood Lumber Agreement," said Cansfield. "It is frustrating that the U.S. softwood lumber industry continues to play games with this important issue."

This week, the U.S. government filed a second request for arbitration pro2006 Softwood Lumber Agreement. The filing deals with aspects of six programs set up by the governments of Ontario and Quebec to address forestry and forest industry issues.

The Ontario programs that are the subject of the request are the Forest Sector Prosperity Fund, the Loan Guarantee Program and a forest access roads program. The first request for arbitration is related to the method Canada used to calculate allowable export

Ontario rejects ceedings under the volumes. Ontario agrees with Canada's method of calculation. The matter was heard on December 12, 2007, and a decision is anticipated in February.

"The Ontario programs that the U.S. reviewed in consultations with Canada predate the Softwood Lumber Agreement and are actually quite similar to U.S. federal and state programs," said Cansfield. "It would be most unfortunate if the agreement, which was intended to settle disputes, should now

become a tool to challenge pre-existing forestry programs on both sides of the Canada-U.S. border." Ontario is committed to working with the federal government in responding to this second softwood lumber arbitration challenge and expects the federal government will effectively defend Ontario's position in the arbitration hearing.

The Canada-United States Softwood Lumber Agreement was implemented October 12,2006.



surviving a fire

CNW - Following Monday's house fire on the Oneida First Nation near London, ON, in which two people died and a third was injured, Ontario Deputy Fire Marshal Doug Crawford

is urging all Ontarians to install working smoke alarms in their homes.

"This is another tragedy that did not have to happen," said Crawford. "It is absolutely vital that



everyone have working smoke alarms in their homes.

Smoke alarms can save lives by providing occupants with the early warning required to escape a fire."

While the cause of Monday's fatal fire is still under investigation, investigators are confident there were no working smoke alarms in the home. A woman confined to a wheelchair and her 18-year-old daughter died in the fire, while a 1/-year-old daughter was able to escape the blaze. The father remains in hospital. "Fires can happen at anytime, anywhere and people need to protect their families and homes," continued Crawford. "Please ensure that your smoke alarms are working. They can provide the precious seconds people need to

get out safely."

It's the law in Ontario to have working smoke alarms on every storey and outside all sleeping areas of your home. Failure to comply with the Fire Code smoke

alarm requirements can result in a ticket for \$235 or a fine of up to \$100,000. Fire departments across the province are being urged to take a more aggressive approach to

enforcing the smoke alarm requirements.

Already in January 2008, 13 people have died in fires across Ontario as compared to six fire fatalities in January 2007.

MOMENTS FROM THE PAST Man jailed for 30 days for stealing CP train

A man charged with stealing a CP Rail train worth \$9.75 million has been sentenced to 30 days in jail and put on probation for three years.

George James, 32, of no fixed address, pleaded guilty to theft over \$200 in the January incident.

C r o w nattorney Naeen Rauf told the court that James boarded an eastbound freight train after it was left unattended in

a Chapleau rail yard, three-engine train about 130 kilometres (80 miles) northeast of Sudbury.

The lead engine was put into gear and the train started to move. But Pat Connelly, a company employee, jumped onto the moving train and stopped it by pulling on the emergency brake. Otto Gilks, another employee, subdued James until Ontario Provincial Police arrived. The 81-car and

travelled about a kilometre, or two thirds of a mite.

Sudbury provincial court Judge Guy Mahaffy said he considered the theft a serious one because of the "potentially terrible danger" to other trains on the rail system.

"Buy tickets the next time," he told James. "Don't take the train yourself." Toronto Star, Saturday, April 2nd, 1983.



Special to the Ontario Federation of Snowmobile Clubs: Getting cold can take the pleasure out of snowmobiling, so here's the scoop on staying warm. It starts with eating well to fuel your body and staying hydrated all day with water, juice or energy drinks. Then it's what you wear...

When dressing for snowmobiling, there is one key principle to remember — retain the heat, release the moisture. The more heat your clothing preserves, the less hard your body has to work to replace it. The more moisture your clothing moves away from your skin to transfer outside, the warmer you will be, because WET = CHILL. Your body naturally emits perspiration throughout the day and under exertion, you sweat. That's why fluid replacement intake is vital and why layering is so important.

While protecting against cold, wind and wet, layering provides you with optimum versatility and flexibility to vent or modify according to conditions. With layering, you can adapt for excess heat and moisture caused by sudden exertion or for temperature changes throughout a long day of riding. Have you ever started to get a chill near day's end? Adding a layer (or putting one back on) will help. Your base laver rests against your skin. While providing minimal insulation value, its primary purpose is to move moisture out, so this "long underwear" needs to be light, quick drying and quick wicking (nonabsorbent, trans-ferring wet away). Synthetic fibres are most popular, such a polypropylene.

Your next layer(s) provides heat retention by trapping warm air as insulation. This is usually a midweight layer (or two, depending on the temperature and amount of exertion) possibly followed by a heavier one, such as polar fleece. Typically, these layers measure in grams; higher numbers denote greater warmth. Avoid cotton fabrics in all of your layering garments because

cotton absorbs and holds moisture, and provides poor insulation. So no Tshirts, sweats or blue jeans, please!

Your exterior layer retains inner warmth and prevents external cold from entering. This outer shell should be waterproof (not just water resistant), breathable (releases moisture) and windproof (protection against wind chill), such as GortexTM. Be sure to choose a jacket that also has multiple vents for flexible inner climate control and that is large enough to go over your other layers without being snug. Regular winter and even ski jackets won't do the job...get gear made to specifically combat the unique challenges of snowmobiling. Dressing your extremities properly also contributes to your snowmobiling comfort. While riding, you may want a balaclava under your full-face helmet, the best choice for keeping your head and face warm. Since an uncovered head acts like a chimney for heat loss, always wear a hat while outside. For your feet, select a name brand, lightweight, waterproof boot, such as Baffin, made with multiple layers of insulation and removable liners so you can air them out overnight. For your hands, waterproof is also a must and mitts are the warmest, especially combined with handle bar muffs and electric hand and thumb warmers. If you choose gloves, ensure that they are not too tight and have extra insulation on the backs, which are directly exposed to the cold wind. Even if you make all the right buying choices for snowmobiling, and dress appropriately each day, you can still need an extra boost of heat sometimes. So always carry a selection of chemical toe, hand and body warmers just in case. And remem-

ber, some folks are more susceptible to cold than others, so take extra care to ensure their warmth and comfort. Plus, it's a good idea to carry a half empty "day bag" to make it more convenient to add or remove layers and provide energy snacks and drinks on the trail. Now you're ready to go snowmobiling! 
