Anyone visiting the arena lately has noticed the "SPARKY" sign in the lobby.

This sign and its fire safety messages is part of the safety campaign conducted by the Chapleau Fire Dept.'s Fire Safety Team.

At 55, Sparky is still at the heart of NFPA's safety message.

NFPAs favorite spokesdog celebrates an important milestone this spring. It's been 50 years since Ted Royal

of the Advertising Council created Sparky the Fire Dog(R) to represent NFPA's fire safety education mission.

Born on March 18, 1951, Sparky was an instant hit with the public, especially children. In 1953, he starred in a fire prevention campaign that reached more than 68 million radio listeners and almost 3 million television viewers. He even appeared on a series of bread labels produced by the Marathon

Corporation, in cooperation with a joint NFPA Advertising Council fire safety campaign in the early 1950s.

Today, Sparky enjoys his own educational web site at www.sparky.org and a line of licensed products ranging from lapel pins and plush dolls to a talking robot, available online at www.sparkystuff.com. He's also the top dog in North America's annual Fire Prevention Week campaign each October, which NFPA

has officially sponsored for nearly 80 years. Fire departments throughout North America take advantage of Sparky's appeal and reputation, enlisting him to help communicate important safety messages to the people they protect.

Watch for another 'SPARKY' sign and messages in the future.

How did we survive?

According to today's regulators and bureaucrats, those of us who were kids in the 40's, 50's, 60's, or even maybe the early 70's probably shouldn't have survived. Our baby cribs were covered with bright colored lead-based paint. We had no childproof lids on

medicine bottles, doors or cabinets, and when we rode our bikes, we had no helmets. (Not to mention the risks we took hitchhiking.) As children, we would ride in cars with no seat belts or air bags. Riding in the back of a pickup truck on a warm day was

always a special treat. We drank water from the garden hose and not from a bottle. **Horrors!** We ate cupcakes, bread and butter, and drank soda pop with sugar in it, but we were never overweight because we were always outside playing. We shared one soft drink with four friends, from one bottle, and no one actually died from this.

We would spend hours building our go-carts out of scraps and then rode down the hill, only to find out we forgot the brakes. After running into the bushes a few times, we learned to solve the problem.

We would leave home in the morning and play all day, as long as we were back when the street lights came on. No one was able to reach us all day. No cell phones. **Unthinkable!**

We did not have Playstations, Nintendo 64, X-Boxes, no video games

at all, no 99 channels on cable, video tape movies, surround sound, personal cell phones, personal computers, or Internet chat rooms. We had friends! We went outside and found them. We played dodge ball, and sometimes, the ball would really hurt.

We fell out of trees, got cut and broke bones and teeth, and there were no lawsuits from these accidents. They were accidents. No one was to blame but us. **Remember accidents?**

We had fights and punched each other and got black and blue and learned to get over it.

We made up games with sticks and tennis balls and ate worms, and although we were told it would happen, we did not put out very many eyes, nor did the worms live inside us forever.

We rode bikes or walked to a friend's home and knocked on the door, or rang the

Invitation to Participate/Intent to Undertake an Environmental Study Report

The Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) Ontario Parks invites public comment on a proposal to undertake the construction of a Private Forest Access Road through P1546 addition to Chapleau-Nemegosenda Provincial Park to access wood resources on private land. Private Forest Company Scierie Landrienne Inc., as a first choice, has requested to build an 820-meter all weather gravel road in D'Arcy Township. The road will be used solely for access to perform forest management activities over the next 20 years. To prevent unauthorized access gates and/or berms, and/or signs will be used to control vehicular traffic.

As per the Class Environmental Assessment for Provincial Parks and Conservation Reserves any alternative routes to access this private land must be identified to the public. The alternate route, Scierie Landrienne's second choice, requires access across crown land and the construction of a permanent bridge on the Chapleau River in D'Arcy Township north of D'Arcy Lake.

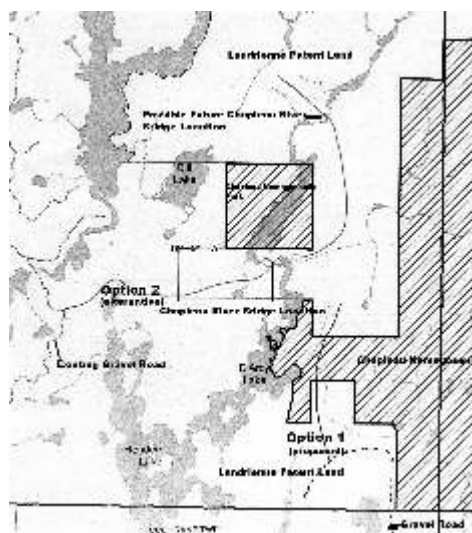
Comments must be received within the 30-day comment period, which expires on August 29, 2006.

These proposals require an evaluation of the potential effects in accordance with the Class Environmental Assessment for Provincial Parks and Conservation Reserves in addition to meeting the requirements under the Environmental Guidelines for Access Roads and Water Crossings. An Environmental Study Report (ESR) will be prepared and made available for public review. The public will have the opportunity to participate and comment, in the future, on the draft Environmental Study Report and the Final Environmental Report.

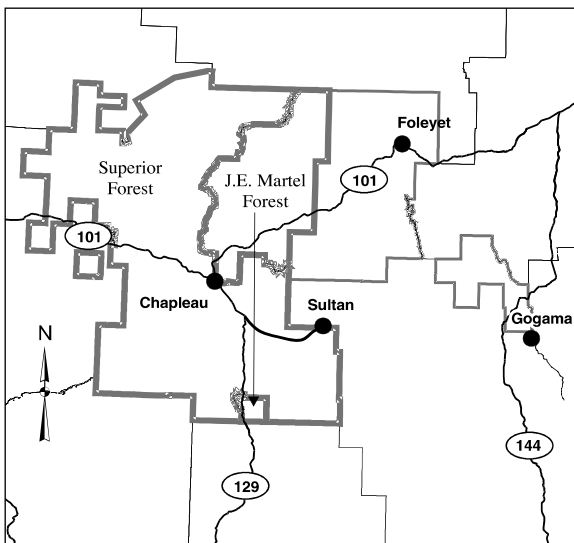

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80th Anniversary Profile Conrad Tremblay

In the summer of 1944, Conrad Tremblay was eighteen years old and working in the Locomotive Shop of the CPR in his hometown of Chapleau. On July 15 he used his CPR pass to head to Toronto where he enlisted for active service in the war. He was then given one week to return home to put his affairs in order.

After that, it was basic training in Simcoe where he was to be for the next two months. Conrad has been a life-long Toronto Maple Leafs fan, so it was a thrill for him to discover one of his hockey idols, Syl Apps, was to be his

training corporal. He credits Apps with getting him in shape. When he enlisted he weighed 115 lbs., but when he left basic training he had put on twenty-five pounds and some muscle. He explains it by saying that at the end of their daily obstacle course, Syl Apps would always ask who wanted to do it all again and Conrad would volunteer since it was this hockey great leading them in it.

Another two months would be spent on advanced training at Iperwash. Then it was on to Nova Scotia in late December to take a ship (the New Amsterdam) overseas. Another month was

spent in England with two weeks training on the Salisbury plains. Once in Xanten, Germany, Conrad joined the Royal Hamilton Light Infantry (the Rileys) in the Hockwald Forest. His first day in the front lines was a quick introduction to the realities of war as his duties consisted of burying the dead of the RHLI. He spent the rest of the war in the front lines and aided in the liberation of Holland in the spring of 1945.

While in Holland, near Assen, he met a fellow Chapleauite, Cecil McAdam. They had a few brief minutes to exchange good-



natured kidding and news of Chapleau. A few days later, he met another Chapleauite, Regis Creighton, who informed him that Cecil had been wounded in the face and was being sent home.

At the beginning of May 1945, Conrad and his unit were just outside of Oldenburg, Germany. He was told that he was being sent to Holland to take a course to become a mines and booby-trap expert. That evening, they received news on the army radio that a cease-fire was being declared the next morning at 8:00. Tremblay then went to his platoon commander and stated that since the war was over, that meant he would not be traveling to Holland for the

course. The curt reply was that in the army, an order was an order until it was rescinded. The next day he traveled in the back of a truck from Germany to Holland only to be officially told that the course was cancelled and he could travel back to Germany.

He then became part of the Army of Occupation with the North Shore New Brunswick. At that time, he was told he would be driving a flame-thrower mounted on it. He replied that he had never driven a vehicle in his life. Naturally, the reply was to learn quickly.

He returned to Chapleau in June of 1946. However, the joy of the reunion with his family would be short-lived since his

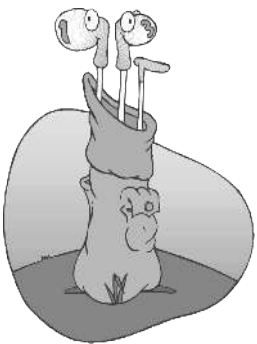
forty-seven year old mother died several weeks later following gall-bladder surgery, leaving nine children, the youngest of which was only three years old.

Like so many other veterans, Conrad was never complacent about the freedom enjoyed in Canada. He has been active in the Legion since 1946, holding many offices and was Service Officer for twenty-seven years. He was a member of the hospital board for thirty three years, as well as a member of the fire department for thirty six years, the last five of which he served as Fire Chief. He has been retired from the Post Office since 1991 and is enjoying his retirement in Chapleau.

Gardening from the ground up

THE GREEN THUMB

Words of Encouragement for the Rest of Us

Some people just seem to have a 'green thumb', a knack for growing lush, thriving plants. Perhaps it is a gift, perhaps they are born with it, but does that leave any hope for the rest of us?

I say, if you think you haven't got a green thumb, a brown thumb is the next best thing. To have a brown thumb, all you have to do is get to work and get your hands dirty!

Plants want to grow - just look at how quickly weeds come along if you ignore them! The job of the gardener is simply to encourage them.

To grow well, a plant needs food, water, light, and space to grow in. A gardener first

decides what plants to let grow, and where they should grow. You might decide to work with some plants that volunteer, like wildflowers and tree seedlings, or with perennials (plants that come back every year) in an existing garden bed, or to import some plants from seeds or pots.

Importing plants is the option that takes the most planning, because you must decide what will grow in your chosen spot. Assuming that the possible plants will grow in our climate, the next important consideration is light. Fortunately most plants and seed that come from stores have a tag showing how much light they need, so this is only a matter of choosing a sun-loving plant for a sunny spot, or a shade plant for a shaded spot. Next, look at the soil. Is it shallow? Sandy? Peaty? Again, plant labels usually tell you what kind of soil each plant prefers.

Having the plant in the spot takes care of two needs - light and space - leaving just two more needs to meet: food and water. Food is easy enough if the plant likes the soil it's in. You can give it a boost by adding compost once or twice a year. As for water, as a general rule the soil should be slightly moist just under the surface. Plants need more water while they're settling in, and also on hot, dry days. It is the roots that need the water, so water the soil around the plant.

With those four basic needs met, all that remains is to defend them. Other plants will try to creep in and take up the space, crowd out the light, and use up the food and water. Take them out, roots and all, and then that problem is solved.

So you see, even if you haven't got a green thumb, you can still get into gardening. The plants will do the growing themselves, all you have to do is help them along.

St. Denis weighs-in on Mid-East conflict

Prime Minister Stephen Harper must move away from his position on the Middle East crisis in favour of one which enables Canada to maintain its historic role as a bridge builder in the region. My Liberal colleagues and I are very concerned about Mr. Harper's change in Canada's traditional position of working with all sides in the Middle East to bring them together in a dialogue. Canada has always been able to act as an intermediary, but we can only serve in that capacity if both our comportment and our actions enable us to play that role.

Opposition Leader Bill Graham recently urged Prime Minister Harper to look to the G-8 communiqué as a starting point for a balanced approach to help all parties in the region come together. The communiqué recognizes Israel's right to defend itself but states that the most urgent priority is to

create conditions necessary to end the current violence, including the return of three kidnapped Israeli soldiers and an end to Israeli military operations. He said Israelis have always thanked us for the moderating role we have been able to play, and he urged the government not to take actions which will eliminate the possibility to build peaceful coalitions in the future. Mr. Graham also echoed the concerns of many Canadians that the government was too slow in evacuating the thousands of Canadian citizens stranded in Lebanon. He pointed to the fact that Great Britain, France and the United States began their evacuation process much sooner

than Canada. The Conservative government has a responsibility to take into account the larger geopolitical issues in the Middle East when establishing Canadian foreign policy. What is presently taking place in Lebanon is destabilizing the possibility of a democratic government there and Canada should be expressing a greater concern for that element if we want to be able to help Israel and help the region return to peace. I fear we will not be able to be helpful in the long run if we do not recognize the complexity of the factors at play here. Mr. Harper has to get a better hold on what Canada is trying to achieve.

1 new forest fire yesterday

DETAILS:

It was a quiet day in the East Fire Region yesterday with 1 new forest fire in the North Bay area. There are currently 8 active forest fires in the Cochrane, Hearst and Wawa areas. No

problems are anticipated with these fires at this time.

As of April 1st 2006, there have been 359 forest fires in the East Fire Region.

There are currently 7 FireRanger crews from the East Fire Region in the West Fire Region assisting with their escalated fire situation.

Precipitation throughout the region is allowing well deserved relief time for FireRangers and staff. During this time, staff will take time to recycle equipment. Although the fire hazard is currently low the Ministry of Natural Resources would like to remind public that before burning check with your municipality to be advised of their burning regulations. Please use care and caution with outdoor fires. Never leave your fire unattended and make sure it is completely extinguished before leaving.

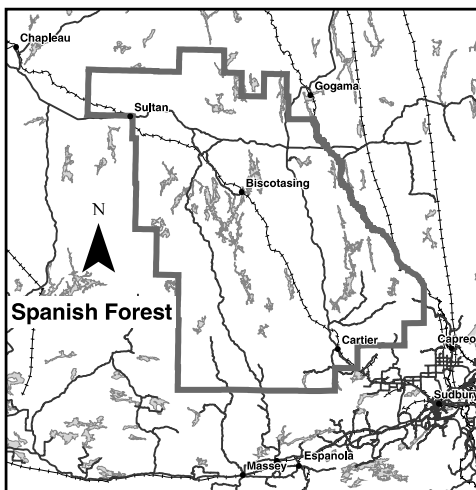

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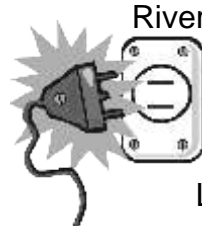

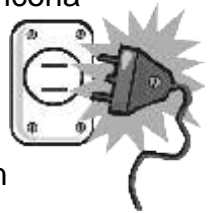
