Local entrepreneur's vision set to become reality

huge piles of slash wood waste left in the surrounding woodlands were a great opportunity. An opportunity, now in its final stages of realization, which, upon completion, will see Chapleau, enter the new world of Green Technology.

Laurent (Larry) Lacroix had already made his mark locally, after arriving here 1988 as the new owner of a bus line with contracts to transport local school

students. He subsequently served as a member of the Township Council, was an active member of the Rotary Club and the Snowmobile Club and most recently acquired the local bus line in neighboring Wawa.

However, it was those piles of wood waste, and a burning desire to create jobs in a community which had seen hundreds of traditional forest jobs lost due to sawmill closures, that led Lacroix to team up with another local entrepreneur, René Tremblay to form a new company, M&L Waste management.

Partnered with some of the world's leading industrial companies tied to the burgeoning green economy, the local businessmen are set to embark on a green project using woodfiber biomass as the primary woodstock designed to produce clean energy in the form of ten-megawatts of electricity to be sold to the provincial grid. The complex is to be located on the old A&L Lafrenière Lumber mill site, which has been vacant for several years.

In production, the complex is expected to employ 34 direct jobs and an additional 100 spin off jobs and will represent a direct economic impact on Chapleau of approximately \$2.5 million annually. The project will require a \$56 million investment, half of that in Ontario.

The Bio Energy Project had some creative beginnings, which were related during the recent project announcement at meeting of the local business and industry leaders.

Lacroix recalled that like so many of us, my wife and I love to drive around and take in all of Chapleau's natural beauty. At the same time they noticed all the slash left behind by the forest industry. "I started doing research on what we could use this waste for. It truly was a resource that we could use to develop a project."

Coincidentally, the Municipality was revamping its approach to economic development, away from the Chapleau Crown Game Preserve resulting from a provincial government decision to allow hunting (albeit restricted) there. This coupled with a downturn in the world economy and the resulting drop off in tourism conspired to remove the glow from the Game Preserve dream. This in turn led to Mayor Earle J. Freeborn's decision to form The Chapleau Economic Renewal Committee (CERC), which was supported by the municipal council. Its mission was to create an atmosphere conducive to attracting and promoting renewal opportunities within Chapleau in order to create jobs and new business. It recommended the

Township Council provide "Investment Readiness Funds" to the newly formed M & L Waste Management, to enable it to explore the possibilities of its biomass project.

In stepped local entrepreneur and engineer Bill Ivey who guided the company through its study and subsequent partnership with the other members of the new consortium. These members include SunBay Energy Corporation of Toronto, Toromont Cat, PRM energy systems of Arkansas and a company based in France, Europlasma SA. Under the proposal Toromont would be the operator of the plant.

Speaking to the recent Chapleau gathering SunBay Managing Director Jordan Oxley said this project is really going to happen."Toromont won't put their name to a project that will fail," adding "this project is a major achievement." It was noted Toromont has a long history in Northern Ontario with the heavy equipment and power generation systems that will be used in the Chapleau plant.


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

behind, with numbers that doubled their normal values for the month. Along with the record-breaking snow, total precipitation records were established in Elliot Lake, North Bay, Sudbury and Wiarton.

The wet month of December also helped set new annual records for precipitation. This was the wettest year on record for North Bay, Peterborough, Toronto Pearson and Wiarton.

Overall, it was a very chilly month for most of the province, with Northwestern Ontario experiencing temperatures running 3 to 5 degrees below normal — conditions not experienced since 2000. Southern Ontario, meanwhile,

experienced average temperatures within a degree of normal values.

Severe Weather

December was a particularly active month in Ontario for severe weather. In the wake of a storm system that moved through northern Ontario on December 14-15, which dumped 15 to 25 centimetres in many localities, a bitterly cold arctic air mass moved into northwestern Ontario. Temperatures in many localities, including Kenora, Red Lake, Fort Frances and Thunder Bay, were much colder than normal for this time of year. Temperatures sometimes struggled to get to minus-25 Celsius for daytime

highs and then plunged to minus-36 Celsius for night-time lows in some locations. By December 18, the very cold temperatures had worked their way into northeastern Ontario as well, to remain into the Christmas period.

Due to the cold temperatures and northerly winds behind a succession of low-pressure systems, the typical "snow belt" areas adjacent to the Great Lakes experienced a more active December than normal, with snowsquall warnings in effect on a total of 11 days between December 4 and December 22.

Southern Ontario was locked into a particularly active storm track between December 17 and the end of the month. A series of storm systems rode the jet stream from the American southwest up into the lower Great Lakes area. The first four of these storm systems, on December 17, 19, 21 and 24, each left various areas in southern Ontario between 10 and 25 cm in their wake. In combination with significant winds and blowing snow, each was also responsible for significant travel chaos at this busy time of year. However, subsequent storm systems brought with them much milder air.

On December 27, a low-pressure system tracking

Ross was born January 30 1928, North Bay On. He died at 10.30 a.m. December 23, 2008, London Ontario in Victoria Hospital. He was 80 years old.

Ross attended North Bay collegiate to become an electrician.

The Canadian Pacific Railway was hiring young men to form the staff to maintain the RR signal system just being introduced. Ross joined up. He worked for several years with the CPR with postings in Sultan, Ramsey, White River, Chapleau and Espanola as a Signal Maintainer. He was gang foreman for the installations of signals on the White River and Nemegos subdivisions. Ross was Chairman of his Union. For a short time he hired on as a Brakeman working out of Schreiber.

For several years he and his two boys Doug and Jim owned and operated a trucking and mail delivery service in Chapleau.

When Ross moved to Espanola he owned a poolroom and snack bar. Then he came to London and was employed with the University of Western Ontario as a Hall Clerk at one of the new dormitories on campus. He retired and moved to Dorchester. He joined the Moose and the Legion. He wintered in Zephyr Hills Florida. He loved to play poker, cribbage and pool. He was quite good at all three.

Six years ago he suffered a massive heart attack and was in a coma for 8 weeks. When he recovered he suffered some dementia and was placed in a long term facility. All the staff just loved him. Ross was a personality person. Until death he was humming a tune. He loved to dance. In the forties he was a natural.

He was Worshipful Master of the Masons in Chapleau, Lorne Lodge 622 in 1966.

He was predeceased by his wife Marion Nixon Pellow and daughter Catherine Pellow Woods and a son Rev. Robert Pellow and a great grandson Austin.

Ross is survived by two brothers. Dr. William R. Pellow, DDS of London and Harry A. Pellow, B. Arch Toronto and their respective families.

He is survived by son Douglas his daughter Tammy, son Chad and Grandson Justin, Patricia and Richard Dickson, Grandsons Tyler, Cody and Nikolas, Kim and Shawn Beland, Grand Daughter Kayley and Breann. a new year's message

from Mayor Earle J. Freeborn

Your Council completed the second year of a four year mandate. We look forward to the challenges of the next two years. The dedication and hard work of your Council and the administrative and municipal staff will make the job both interesting and rewarding.

The year 2008 has seen improvements to Devonshire and Cherry Streets where at long last the water, sewer, storm sewer and asphalt infrastructure has been replaced. Asphalt patching repairs were completed to many of our streets such as Monk Street, Aberdeen Street, Lansdowne Street, Lisgar and Teak Streets as well as asphalt repairs to the tarmac at the airport. Ongoing equipment improvements at the water and

sewage plants and the purchase of two new half ton trucks for our Public Works Department. Improvements have been made to Maple and Queen Streets and Broomhead Road with the application of new gravel. We have purchased a new brush cutter for the airport and a new condenser and oil separator for the ice plant at the Moore Arena. We were required to dig a new cell at the new landfill site and closure work on the old site. The list is a long one as this Council in very involved in keeping our community in good repair.

There are new and exciting things scheduled to happen in 2009. The new Cedar Mill "Niska North" is planning to begin operations. There is a new project on the horizon, the "Chapleau Bio-Energy Project" spearheaded by M & L Waste Management, a local firm who have announced their intentions to construct a Bio-Energy Plant on the old A & L Mill Site. Congratulations to the Chapleau Economic Renewal Committee for their support in giving the Bio-Energy Project momentum. Once again "Hats Off" to the managers and workforce of our local lumber mill who have kept our mill working throughout this time of uncertainty related to the Canadian lumber industry. It is because of their dedication and concern for our community that has kept our economy stable. Our local CP Rail Operations continues to provide meaningful jobs for many of our citizens which our community has come to depend on. We are truly fortunate to have these industries in Chapleau as our major employers. We must not forget our local business enterprises who serve our citizens everyday with personal care and are really the heart and sole of the community.

The Liberal Government of Ontario will be lobbied by your Council throughout our mandate for the inclusion of the Ramsey Industrial Road into the Northern Ontario Highway System. Your Council has applied for infrastructure funds under the "Building Canada Fund - Communities Component" for a 2009 project. If we are successful with this infrastructure application it is our plan to renew services and asphalt on Monk Street.

Your Mayor continues to represent Chapleau at the Manitoulin-Sudbury District Social Services Administrative Board at monthly meetings held in Espanola. Chapleau is also a member of the Mayors group that meets monthly with neighbouring communities of Wawa, Hornepayne, Dubreuilville, White River and Manitouwadge, where issues of regional concern are discussed and collectively addressed with different levels of Government.

Il y a également le nouveau "Projet bio-électrique de Chapleau" lancé par M & L Waste Management, une entreprise locale qui vient d'annoncer la construction d'une centrale électrique alimentée par la biomasse sur le vieux terrain de Lafrenière Lumber. Félicitations au comité du Renouveau économique pour avoir prêté main forte à ce projet bio-électrique. Encore une fois" chapeau" aux directions et aux travailleurs de notre scierie locale qui ont maintenu une exploitation continue malgré l'incertitude qui sévit au sein de l'industrie forestière. working closely with the First Nation Communities and recognized the Chiefs of the three communities in the area for their encouragement in the project.

There has also been cooperation and assistance provided by Paul Bernier, Chapleau District Manager for the provincial Ministry of Natural Resources,

and Denis Rochon, Chapleau Development Officer with the Provincial Ministry of Northern Development and Mines.

Ivey's expertise is a key component in the proposal to develop the Biomass project. He has enjoyed success in the past as a member of the team that established Chapleau's Co-Generation plant, the first of its kind in

Ontario using wood waste from the local mills generating 7MW of electricity efficiently since 1987. In his remarks Mayor Freeborn described Ivey as a citizen of this community who is known and respected in North America for his electrical engineering endeavours.

The recent announcement has this community once again leading the way in the forest-based economy and befitting from new technologies.

While the original co-gen plant uses wood waste from the nearby Tember lumber mill to generate electricity, the new one, based on

proven technology originating from Europe will, in addition to using material from the forest, utilize scrap railway ties and then turn it into a fuel gas that will be reformed and cleaned by passing through a device called a plasma torch. The plasma torch reconstructs the

reconstructs the chemicals in the gas to give it a higher heating value. It then goes to Caterpillar gas engine generators to produce power. "It's exceptionally clean in terms of air emissions," Ivey said.

M a y o r Freeborn supported the theme of Chapleau's economy advancing new technology in his remarks to the lunch gathering for the December 17th announcement when he described it as a very special day in the history of our community. "A day, which will be remembered as the day that Chapleau became a place where new technology was being showcased in North America. This technology will positively affect our business leaders and the citizens who live here.

According to the Consortium news release, the Biomass project will now enter the formal permitting phase with site preparation to begin in the spring and once all permits are in place, the construction period will last between twelve to eighteen months with the plant expected to be up and running and pumping local produced electricity into the provincial power grid in late 2010 or early 2011.



a snow blower. For best results - check engine oil levels and tire pressure on a regular basis. As a safety measure, add a light for any after dark activity.

Ice breaker. To rid your walkway of ice, without salt, opt for an eco-friendly removal product like EcoTraction. Eco-Traction is made from volcanic minerals and is 100 per cent safe for people, property and the environment.

It's better to overdress. Layer up your winter garb for outdoor work like shoveling and snow blowing. As you start to warm up, remove the layers to make sure you don't over heat.



Come and support your GIRLS TEAM required! You don't need to take weeks of lessons or spend umpteen hours practising, because operating a snowmobile is very user-friendly.

Regardless of the make or model, all snowmobiles have the s a m e basic characteristics - two skis with suspension up front; a front mounted engine to power a rotating rubber track underneath the seat; a rear suspension system under the seat and within the track; handlebars for steering; and a fuel tank. What's different from brand to brand and model-tomodel is variations in how each of the major components accomplishes its task. So a "performance" or "muscle" sled will usually have more finely-tuned power,

stiffer suspension and aggressive features like a sports car while a touring model will have more middle of the road power, a cushier suspension set up and a more comfortable seat, similar to a family sedan. As with buying a car, shop for the features best suited to your riding expectations, style and experience level that come within your budget range.

Today's clean, advanced technology snowmobiles are as quiet, reliable and state of the art as automobiles. And like autos, new sleds offer many features and benefits to make your riding as comfortable and enjoyable as possible. Typically, new participants should look at a "touring" model in the popular 500 to 600cc range, that comes with electric start, reverse, thumb and hand warmers, high windshield, and mirrors. Touring sleds normally come in one rider (1-up) or two rider (2-up) configurations, each respectively designed for carrying a solo rider or a rider plus passenger. One or two persons can use two-up sleds, while two should never ride on a sled only built to handle one.

Operating a snowmobile is much like driving a car, except that the throttle and brakes are operated with hand levers, not foot pedals. To steer, you simply turn your sled's handlebars in the direction you want to go. To back up, select reverse gear. Once you grow accustomed to the feel of the throttle, the brake and to manoeuvring on snow, you can get started.

So maybe you're wondering ...where can I buy my own snowmobile? The best place to start is to familiarize yourself with the new snowmobiles available from the four sled manufacturers — Arctic Cat (arctic cat.com), Polaris (pola risindustries.com), Ski-Doo (ski-doo.com) and Yamaha (yamahamotor.ca).

After that, buying a snowmobile is much like purchasing a car. Each of the four sled brands has a network of dealers where you can select from current and used sleds, solicit expert advice and get service done. Just as with buying an automobile, these dealerships are conveniently located around Ontario and also offer parts, accessories and clothing. Dealers are also a good source of snowmobiling information about snowmobiling and how to contact the local snowmobile club.

Typically, the four manufacturers introduce their new model line-ups each spring with special offers and packages, while the main selling season is the fall of each year. There are often good deals to be had the closer to winter you buy. Dealers typically have a mix of current, new noncurrent and used sleds for sale.

Maybe you would prefer to start with a pre-owned sled. Besides at dealers, many used sleds are for sale privately in newspapers and buy and sell publications. One convenient way to buy a used snowmobile

is to visit SLEDS 2BUY.COM, Canada's classified powersports web site for non-current or used snowmobiles. It's a user friendly way for you to shop, compare and buy on line from an affordable selection that otherwise might not be accessible or available to you.

northward across from northwestern Ontario to James Bay initially brought a mixture of snow, ice pellets, freezing rain and rain to varying locations in southern,

eastern, central and northeastern Ontario. However, the strength of the southerly flow brought warm air and record to near-record high temperatures to many areas across the province, which in

combination with the rainfall was responsible for flooding concerns in many areas. The next day, December 28, v e r y high southwesterly winds behind a cold front,

gusting as high as 110 km/h, battered much of southern and central Ontario. These caused power outages to hundreds of thousands of residents.

Anglers encouraged to stay safe on the ice

McGuinty Government Wants All Winter Anglers To Check Ice Hut Regulations

With colder months ahead, anglers are reminded to play it safe on the ice.

To ensure a safe and enjoyable experience, anglers should:

- · Advise others where they plan to fish and when they plan to return
- · Wear appropriate clothing, such as a floater suit
- · Carry appropriate equipment, like a set of ice picks
- Register ice huts where required, except tent-style huts with a base area of less than seven square metres
- Checkice thickness regularly with a spud bar or auger as they move further out on the ice.

"Ice fishing is a popular winter activity for thousands, but people need to play it safe and stay off the ice unless they're sure about ice conditions," said Natural Resources Minister Donna Cansfield. "Anglers should also be familiar with the regulations about registering ice huts."

QUICK FACTS

- · Ice does not freeze at a uniform thickness across most lakes and rivers, particularly at the start of the winter season when near-shore ice is often much thicker and safer than ice further out.
- over flowing water, springs, pressure cracks, old ice holes or around the mouths of rivers and streams can be weaker than surrounding ice.
- The strongest ice is clear blue in colour. White or opaque ice is much weaker, and ice with a honeycombed look should be avoided.
- Added precautions must be taken when travelling on frozen lakes or rivers. Snowmobiles require at least 20 centimetres of clear blue ice and most light vehicles require 30 centimetres or more. Double these amounts if the ice is white or opaque.
- A layer of heavy snow on a frozen lake or river can insulate the ice below and slow down freezing.


