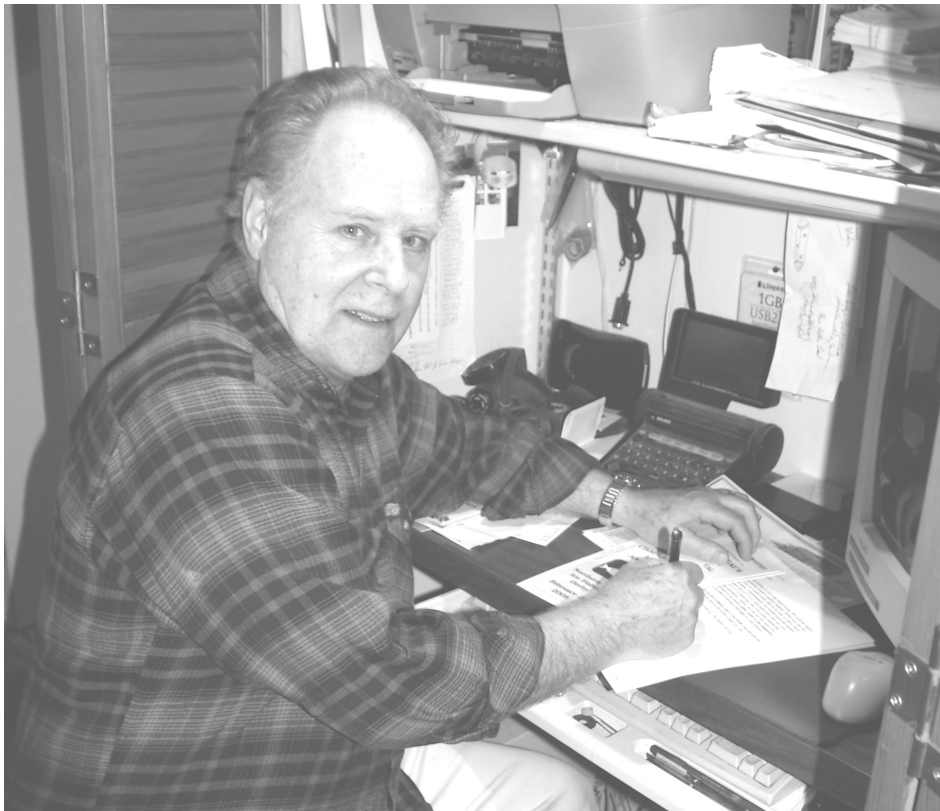

Northern Pike ice fishing derby fast approaching

Chapleau's 12th Annual Northern Pike ice fishing derby is fast approaching. The ever popular event has, in

the past, attracted participants from throughout North America and continues to do so.

"The Chapleau Northern Pike Ice Fishing Derby sounds formidable to anyone who has never been in a derby such as this before, but just ask anyone who has been in it and they will tell you how simple this one is" says project coordinator Bill Groves.

"If you have never been in a contest

before, don't let that stop you from entering and possibly making this an annual tradition at your house. We have oodles that have been in every one of our 11 derbys because it is organized and simple to win even against experienced fishermen. Luck plays a huge part in being in the right place at the right time." he adds.

Cash prizes for this year's derby exceed \$20,000.00. People who wish to

participate in this one day event, have until Friday, February 22 at 9:00 P.M. to purchase their tickets. No entry tickets will be sold on the day of the event. So don't be disappointed! Buy your tickets early.

This year the participants will be fishing on the Chapleau River and Mulligans Bay. The checking station will once again be at the Civic Centre. Participants are reminded that they have to turn in their numbered tag to the check in station prior to going out fishing and to pick it up when they leave the ice.

To assure qualification of your pike, it must be brought to the check-in station alive, where they will check your license, measure the fish and apply an entry numbered tag to it.

Food and beverages will be available all day in the Lobby of the arena. The bar will be open on Friday from noon until 9:00 p.m. and on Saturday at 3:30 p.m. A buffet dinner will be available from 4:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m.

Last year the

committee made it simpler by moving the derby onto the Chapleau River right here in town. Now the participants all fish in one area making it competitive for any participant.

The derby has had big prize winners as young as 9 years old. The \$100 entry fee plus GST is the same for all competitors, therefore all prizes are available to all who enter.

This year the Ontario free fishing day just happens to be on February 23, 2008 and any Ontario citizens may fish this day without a fishing licence. Great Eh?

Even if you have never tried this type of competition before but have done some ice fishing this is the derby to get involved with. It is well organized and happens all on one day. Fishing starts at 7am until 4 pm. (Drill your holes, bring your own bait, turn in your winning fish). Buffet dinner at the arena, at your convenience, from 4:30 pm until 6:30pm. Prizes start at 7:00pm. Everyone entering a legal length pike wins a

prize even if it's not in the top 10. Many random drawn prizes donated by local businesses are given out.

After the presentations, a local music group will be performing for those who want to sit around with their friends and talk about the ones that got away. The arena ice surface, is where all the activities take place, including the presentations, the dinner and bar. Then it's home to bed and back to regular life come Monday. But the talk will go on about the enjoyment everyone had while attending a well run ice fishing derby and planning to get involved in one of the best planned and organized ice fishing derby which happens to be in Chapleau, Ontario.

Harper's poor management could lead to deficit in 2008

In November, Prime Minister Harper unveiled the Conservative government's unrealistic Economic and Fiscal Update that recklessly anticipated federal budget surpluses for years to come. This week, however, the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives (CCPA) published a report that suggests the federal government could post its first budget deficit

in a decade

The CCPA said in a press release that "it would not take much of a drop in economic growth before the budget returned to deficit" and that the Conservatives Economic and Fiscal Update "does not fully consider the very real possibility of an economic downturn." The government needs to prepare for the impacts on Canada from the housing crisis and the credit crunch in U.S.

The fact that

the minority Conservative government has consistently put Canada's economy in jeopardy is alarming. From the beginning of Mr. Harper's mandate, he has created market uncertainty as he mislead investors by promising not to tax Income Trust's only to flip flop and cause a great deal of damage to the retirement savings of seniors and \$20 billion in one day investment losses.

In November, Mr. Harper's ill advised policy to cut the GST by 1% has done little to stimulate consumer confidence and spending. Dale Orr is an economist of Global Insight Canada said "People can very carefully calculate how much they're saving,

and it's really not that much. You're talking literally nickels and dimes." Craid Wright, the Chief Economist for RBC Capital Markets said "I'd be surprised if you'd find many people who would agree that the GST cut was the best way to spend \$5.5 billion per year."

In addition, Mr. Harper was forced to backtrack on his "interest deductibility" policy that put Canadian companies competing internationally at a serious disadvantage a policy that would have had devastating effects on jobs here in Canada.

While the Liberal Party believes in lowering taxes, Liberal Leader Stephane Dion knows that tax cuts must be

fiscally responsible so as not to jeopardize the Canadian economy. It is the Liberal Party that has a strong economic record, bringing Canada out of deficit after the former Mulroney Conservative government left Canada with a recession and massive budget deficits. It would amount to an economic tragedy if all the hard work of past governments and Canadians from coast to coast to reverse the

Mulroney era deficits would now be lost.

With this sort of track record, it makes one wonder if Conservative governments are good economic managers.

Refrigerator Roundup Yields 50,000 Units Province-Wide

CNW - The Great Refrigerator Roundup, a free province-wide program to remove old, inefficient appliances, has surpassed the 50,000-unit milestone.

The program is a partnership effort by the Ontario Power Authority (OPA) and 75 local electricity distribution companies (LDCs) across Ontario. The appliance retirement program saved an estimated 11 megawatts in its first seven months to the end of 2007, creating a sound footing for the 2008 campaign.

Some key facts about one of the largest programs of its type in North America:

- Started in June 2007, the program comfortably exceeded its first-year goal of 47,500 units.

- For every 10-12 fridges removed, one typical Ontario home is effectively removed from the grid forever.

- More than 95 percent of the material from each unit collected is sent to be recycled and the appliance is permanently decommissioned.

- Over 90 percent of the participants in

the program told an independent survey that they approved of the program and would participate in other conservation programs.

- Refrigerator, freezer and window air conditioning technologies have dramatically improved over the past 20 years. A typical fridge built in 1986 uses 1,500 kWh, costing \$180 per year, while a new ENERGY STAR (R) rated fridge will use approximately one-third of the electricity.

- The program is one of 18 conservation programs offered by the OPA; the organization expects to have 27 programs running in 2008 to help Ontario to save 1,350 MW by 2010 and 6,300 MW by 2025."

Virtually all residential customers had access to the program and their rating of it was overwhelmingly positive, says OPA Vice President Conservation Programs and Sector Development Paul Shervill. "Much of the credit belongs to the

participating LDCs, which have ensured we are well-positioned to save more electricity in 2008."

"I've called on everyone to think, believe and act when it comes to conservation," says Ontario's Chief Energy Conservation Officer Peter Love.


"The Great Refrigerator Roundup shows Ontarians are prepared to act when given an effective opportunity to conserve electricity."

"The Great Refrigerator Roundup is a tremendous example of what can be achieved when we work together," said Energy Minister Gerry Phillips. "These kinds of programs remove barriers, encourage people to take part, and can add up to real megawatts of conservation."

Old, inefficient appliances consume two or three times the amount of electricity of newer models, adding strain to Ontario's power system. All reusable metal and plastic from the retrieved units is recycled, with the bare minimum remaining

It's tough to get the snowmobiling media to agree on anything. But it appears BRP has the magic touch. Last spring, every national snowmobiling magazine cover in

North America featured the same Ski-Doo sled. And in one way or another, every magazine also exclaimed that this sled is the best thing to happen to snowmobiling in

2008. Some even said it was the best thing, period.

Regular readers of this column know that I rarely write about the performance or technology of snowmobiles. In fact, the last time I made an exception was in 2003, when Ski-Doo changed the way we ride by introducing the REV platform. The REV's rider forward position combined with its lower, more centralized mass to

deliver unmatched handling, and for most of us, a much more comfortable and natural riding position. However, some riders, especially those with longer legs or knee problems (or dare I say, who are overweight), found the REV position too radical and uncomfortable.

Fast forward to 2008. Ski-Doo has taken what is still arguably the leading platform in the industry and made it light years better. In so doing, they have once again caught most of the competition flat-footed. Welcome to REV-XP, a total track to ski redesign that will once again change the way we ride...

Without getting into all of its advanced technology, what you need to know is how REV-XP will improve your riding. First off, Ski-Doo REV-XP sleds feature flexible ergonomics, thanks to more legroom. One benefit for riders is that you can sit even farther forward than on a REV, or stretch out a little more by moving back on the seat. This is a major advantage over REV on long rides and for touring. The new flexibility also means that you are better able to influence how a REV-XP sled handles by using "body English".

But be careful, because the most dramatic benefit of REV-XP is weight loss. So when you move your body, expecting to exert the same degree of influence on how a REV-XP handles as you did on any previous sled, you're in for a big surprise! You'll find yourself way over compensating until you get used to how light REV-XP really is.

Yes, Ski-Doo engineers have subjected their new REV-XP sleds to a strict diet. We're talking at least 50 pounds lighter than their own 2007 REV sleds, and as much as 100 pounds or more compared to equivalent models from the other manufacturers. That makes REV-XP sleds a breeze to handle, and with the best power to weight ratio in the industry, REV-XP delivers unbeatable performance, too.

A radical new sled should look the part, and REV-XP's computer designed exterior is not only eye-catching, but it also offers superior aerodynamics and wind protection. So what about riding it?

I rode both Summit X and the MX Z last winter, and was as blown away as everyone else in the snowmobiling media. It is difficult to describe how much better riding a REV-XP sled is; it's so far ahead of the rest of the pack that nothing compares. REV-XP is in a class all its own. And you know what, as a touring and trail

rider, the best news for me about REV-XP is that it's available for 2008 as a GSX model for mainstream trail riding! I've already ordered one and every mile of every ride will be hugely better for it. Who knows, I may just keep going and never come back!

During 2007 our leadership team. Services de santé de Chapleau Health Services (SSCHS) held community consultations with various stakeholders, including patients and families, community residents, community health partners, volunteers, physicians, staff and

After compiling the data from these consultation sessions, the Board used this valuable information in the formation of the Strategic Plan for SSCHS. The following key strategic directions were identified: 1) To

provide cost effective healthcare excellence in the community; 2) To establish an Integrated Quality Management Program; 3) To ensure sufficient professional human resources to fulfill our mission.; 4) To increase access to community based services for Chapleau and surrounding area; 5) To work with community partners to ensure appropriate accommodation for our aging population; 6) To provide effective Governance and Leadership.

While the Strategic Plan is undergoing final review and approval, leadership and staff are already hard at work on several different goals and objectives that will lead SSCHS to meeting our plan. Some of these initiatives include: 1) Working outside our hospital

mandate by recruiting and securing consistent physician services for the community medical clinic. Funding to operate a community medical clinic is not included in a hospital budget, therefore this puts our hospital in a serious financial and human resource deficit; 2) Active ongoing involvement in physician and other health professional recruitment; 3) Building partnerships with college and university health professional programs; 4) Community consultations regarding senior services; 5) Expansion and enhancement to SSCHS senior community service programs; 6) Revamping of disaster plans; 7) Enhancement of quality management programs; 8) Continuing to meet

national standards for accreditation; and 9) Professional education and training programs for staff and board. Once the Strategic Plan has been finalized copies will be available to

NOTICE OF APPLICATION AND HEARING FOR AN ELECTRICITY DISTRIBUTION RATE CHANGE

Hydro One Networks Inc. has filed its completed application with the Ontario Energy Board, received on December 18, 2007, under section 78 of the Ontario Energy Board Act, 1998, S.O. 1998, c. 15 (Schedule B), seeking approval for changes to the rates that Hydro One Networks Inc. charges for electricity distribution, to be effective May 1, 2008. The Board has assigned the application file number EB-2007-0681. The Board's decision on this application may have an effect on all of Hydro One Networks Inc.'s distribution customers.

Any change to Hydro One Networks Inc.'s distribution rates will cause Hydro One Networks Inc.'s delivery charges to change. Delivery charges are one of four regular items on residential and general service customers' electricity bills and vary depending on the amount of electricity consumed.

Hydro One Networks Inc. is seeking approval of \$1,067,000,000 as the 2008 revenue it requires to provide electricity distribution. Hydro One Networks Inc. indicates that if the application is approved as filed, an average customer would experience an increase of less than 1% on the total electricity bill.

Hydro One Networks is also seeking to simplify its rate structure by harmonizing (consolidating) the rates for its 88 acquired utilities and its existing legacy rates, over a four year period. This will result in 12 common rate classes for all customers at the end of four years.

Hydro One Networks indicates that, if the application is approved as filed, the 2008 total bill impact will range from a decrease of 11.0% to an increase of 9.8% for residential customers consuming 1000 kWh per month. For general service energy-billed customers consuming 2000 kWh per month the total bill impact may range from a decrease of 21.5% to an increase of 8.9%. Hydro One Networks has forecast that the harmonization plan will have slightly lower annual impacts from 2009 to 2011.

At the end of the four year harmonization period, the majority of Hydro One Networks' customers will see a total bill increase of less than 5%. However, some customers with community-specific rates may experience bill impacts greater than this. Hydro One Networks' customers can confirm if this applies to them by checking their "service type", which appears on page 2 of their Hydro One Networks bill beside the words "Your electricity charges". How to Participate

1. Send a Letter with your Comments to the Board

Your letter with comments will be provided to the Board members deciding the application, and will be part of the public record for the application. If you wish to make an oral presentation to the Board, your letter should include this request. Your letter must be received by the Board no later than **30 days** from the publication or service date of this notice. The Board accepts letters of comment by either post or e-mail at the addresses below.

2. Become an Observer

Observers do not actively participate in the proceeding but monitor the progress of the proceeding by receiving documents issued by the Board. You may request observer status in order to receive documents issued by the Board in this proceeding. If you become an observer, you need to contact the applicant and others to receive documents that they file in this proceeding and they may charge you for this. Most documents filed in this application will also be available on the Board's website. Your request for observer status must be made in writing and be received by the Board no later than **10 days** from the publication or service date of this notice. The Board accepts observer request letters by either post or e-mail at the addresses below; however, two paper copies are also required. You must also provide a copy of your letter to the applicant.

3. Become an Intervenor

You may ask to become an intervenor if you wish to actively participate in the proceeding. Intervenors are eligible to receive evidence and other material

submitted by participants in the hearing. Likewise, intervenors will be expected to send copies of any material they file to all parties to the hearing.

Your request for intervenor status must be made by letter of intervention and be received by the Board no later than **10 days** from the publication or service date of this notice. Your letter of intervention must include a description of how you are, or may be, affected by the outcome of this proceeding; and if you represent a group, a description of the group and its membership. The Board may order costs in this proceeding. You must indicate in your letter of intervention whether you expect to seek costs from the applicant and the grounds for your eligibility for costs. You must provide a copy of your letter of intervention to the applicant.

The Board may choose to proceed with this application by way of written or oral hearing. In addition, the Board may give consideration to hearing this application in phases. The Board will not hold a written hearing if a party satisfies the Board that there is good reason for holding an oral hearing. Your letter of intervention should indicate your preference for a written or oral hearing, and the reason for that preference.

If you do not have a user ID, please visit the Board's website under e-filings and fill out a user ID password request. Hydro One Networks Inc. a déposé une requête dûment remplie auprès de la Commission de l'énergie de l'Ontario le 18 décembre 2007 aux termes de l'article 78 de la *Loi de 1998 sur la Commission de l'énergie de l'Ontario*, L.O., c. 15, Annexe B, en vue d'obtenir l'approbation des tarifs qu'Hydro One Networks Inc. exige pour la distribution de l'électricité à compter du 1^{er} mai 2008. La Commission a assigné à la requête le numéro EB-2007-0681. La décision de la Commission concernant cette requête peut avoir un effet sur tous les consommateurs de services de distribution d'Hydro One Networks Inc.

Toute modification des tarifs de distribution d'Hydro One Networks Inc. entraînera une modification des frais de livraison. Les frais de livraison sont l'un des quatre articles qui figurent systématiquement sur les factures d'électricité des consommateurs résidentiels et des services généraux et qui varient en fonction de la quantité d'électricité consommée.

Hydro One Networks Inc. demande l'approbation de besoins en revenus de 1 067 000 000 \$ pour la distribution de l'électricité en 2008. Hydro One Networks Inc. indique que si la requête est approuvée telle que déposée, le consommateur moyen constatera une augmentation inférieure à 1 % sur sa facture d'électricité totale.

Hydro One Networks demande également l'autorisation de simplifier sa structure tarifaire en harmonisant (par consolidation) sur une période de quatre ans les tarifs des 88 services publics qu'elle a acquis et de ses tarifs actuels existants. À la fin de ces quatre années, 12 classes tarifaires communes existeront pour tous les consommateurs.

Hydro One Networks indique que si la requête est approuvée telle que déposée, les consommateurs résidentiels qui utilisent 1 000 kWh par mois constateront un effet allant d'une diminution de 11,0 % à une augmentation de 9,8 % sur leur facture totale de 2008. Pour les consommateurs du service général qui utilisent 2 000 kWh par mois, l'effet sur leur facture d'énergie pourra aller d'une diminution de 21,5 % à une augmentation de 8,9 %. Hydro One Networks a prévu que le plan d'harmonisation aura des effets annuels légèrement plus faibles de 2009 à 2011.

À la fin de la période d'harmonisation de quatre ans, la majorité des consommateurs d'Hydro One Networks verront une augmentation totale de moins de 5 % sur leur facture. Cependant, certains consommateurs bénéficiant de tarifs propres à une communauté pourront constater des effets plus importants. Les consommateurs d'Hydro One Networks pourront confirmer s'ils sont dans cette situation en vérifiant leur « *service type* », lequel est indiqué à la page 2 de leur facture, à côté des mots « *Your electricity charges* ».
