# Proposal would continue efforts on tourism and Crown Game Preserve

he Chapleau Regional \_ Development Corporation (CRDC) says it is ready to continue working on developing Chapleau Crown Game Preserve and growing the local tourist industry.

The decision was announced at a Township Council meeting last Monday evening and comes on the heels of the decision by the Council to create a new organization, Chapleau Economic Renewal Committee (CERC) to assume the primary role in e c o n o m i c development and hire an Economic Development Officer.

"I am very pleased that you are continuing," stated Mayor Earle Freeborn

detailed presentation by the CRDC. Mayor Earle Freeborn said Monday the new Economic Renewal Committee, which includes all of council, and three members from the community at large as well as resource persons, will be ready by February 1.

In stating its intention to continue efforts, now concentrated on the Chapleau Crown Game Preserve and Tourism development, the CRDC requested approximately seventy-five thousand dollars in funding for this year. That request will go before the new Economic Renewal Committee, following the procedure laid out in an organizational chart attached to the by-law creating the government's FedNor

at the conclusion of a new economic renewal committee. Mayor Freeborn suggested the CRDC appoint a three-person delegation to make its presentation.

"The CRDC is continuing, we are not closing down the doors," stated the Corporation's vice chair, Michel Sylvestre in his opening remarks to a twenty minute powerpoint presentation to the municipal council detailing work the CRDC has done in connection to the Game Preserve and tourism development.

In a partnership between it and the Township of Chapleau which started in 2004, the CRDC was able to secure approximately \$400,000 in funding from the federal program and the province's NOHFC program for its Crown Game Preserve project. The Township of Chapleau also funded \$115,000 and added approximately \$90,000 towards an Economic Development Officer and administration costs.

In total, over \$530,000 was put into phase one of the Game Preserve project. "In only a year after the project was launched, we have seen genuine results from our efforts with hundreds of inquiries, visitors and increased interest in the Chapleau Crown Game Preserve," stated Sylvestre in his presentation. The project has erected 4 wildlife-viewing stations with an MNR approved strategy for attracting wildlife to

them. It also maintains four picnic sites with bear-proof garbage cans and picnic tables, interpretive signs and trails.

The CRDC has also erected 5 large roadside signs at key locations in the province and the gateway sign is in place. A brochure and map promoting the Game Preserve have been produced and distributed to various tourist centers

And in a move to cash in on "Geocaching" which Sylvestre described as "the most rapidly growing outdoors recreational activity in the world," the Game Preserve is now the location of 10 of the devices.

In addition to membership in several regional tourist

associations, the CRDC h a s experienced success in persuading local businesses to join in co-operative marketing ventures.

The Town of Chapleau, through its various committee, boards and councils over the years, has strived to establish itself as the Gateway to the World's Largest Crown Game Preserve. It has been part of the Strategic Plan and one of our goals in tourism. The Township of Chapleau and the CRDC have finally done just that.

"With the uncertain future of the forest industry, Chapleau must start depending more on tourism," concludes the CRDC proposal for funding.

few people other than a handful of scientists took much interest in space weather. Then a massive hydro blackout hit Quebec, and a geomagnetic storm was quickly identified as the cause.

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Since then, more and more people have been paying attention to space weather. They have been learning that it affects much more than just hydro systems. It can debilitate the electronic systems in satellites and disrupt radio communications and navigation systems. It can make a compass give incorrect readings. It has even been suggested that it can affect human health.

So, what causes all this? It starts with storms on the sun that throw out huge waves of electrically charged particles. Depending on their speed, the particles can reach the earth in a matter of hours or days. The particles from the sun disrupt the earth's magnetic field and increase ionization in the ionosphere, 100 to 1,000 kilometres above the Earth. The storms on the sun reach a peak every 11 years, at which time there is high potential of human activities being disrupted.

The particles from the sun can affect just about anything on earth that requires or reacts to electrical charges. For example, electrical currents might flow through pipelines to the surrounding ground, increasing the rate of their corrosion. Circuits in satellites' electronic equipment might start to issue incorrect instructions.

The Global Positioning System might give people misleading readings of their location. And jet pilots flying over the North Pole (as more and more of them do these days) might suffer from excessive radiation exposure.

Does that mean that we are helpless in the face of geomagnetic storms? Not at all. Natural Resources Canada operates its Geomagnetic Laboratory to help us anticipate and reduce the impact of geomagnetic storms. The lab operates a system of 13 observatories across Canada, including in the Far North. That system, in turn, is part of a worldwide network that predicts and measures geomagnetic storms.

uses highly precise instruments — so precise that the grass around the observatories is left uncut because the metal in a lawn mower would disrupt their magnetic readings.

The output of this network enables diverse stakeholders

The system worldwide to take preventive measures to fight the impact of space weather. Stakeholders include telecommunications firms, geological surveyors, electrical power system operators, air and marine navigators, and pipeline operators.

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# Introducing the Chapleau Rescue Ring

The Chapleau Rescue Ring (CRR) is a small local pet rescue organization that is feverishly attempting to stop the shooting to death of pets in Ontario.

The municipality of Chapleau has for the past number of years instituted a policy where they house stray cats and

dogs in the pound for 3 business days. After this time the lost, homeless pet is driven out to the municipal dump where they are shot to death and

disposed of.

The CRRworks via an agreement with the municipality of Chapleau, where they contact the CRR before the kill date so that foster care can be arranged for the pet. The cat/dog is then taken into care and evaluated to be either adoptable or unadoptable, and if adoptable a loving forever home is searched for. If a home can not be found that is deemed appropriate, or the animal is unadoptable volunteers are used to transport the pet to a Humane Society where either adoption or humane euthanization (via injection or gas) is performed.

A letter was submitted to Mayor Freeborn and council i n D e c e m b e r requesting they revisit disposal method. The letter pointed out to the town that the Ontario Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (OSPCA) deemed shooting to death an inhumane method of euthanization. The response received from the town stated that they adhere to the standards set by the Ministry of Agriculture, so regardless of OSPCA standards they will continue with their present method of killing.

As a founder of the CRR I realize we can not save all of the poor homeless cats and dogs from a humanimposed death. In consideration of this

their present stray pet disposal method. The letter pointed out to the town that the Ontario Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (OSPCA) deemed shooting to death an inhumane unfortunate reality, euthanization should be performed in a method that does not incite terror and/or pain, and be performed by the township in which the stray pet was found

Please be a responsible pet owner and not only spay and neuter your pet(s), but keep them leashed for everyone's safety.

# **National Non-Smoking Week** is a Good Time to Quit

With National Non-Smoking Week upon us, it is a great chance for Ontarians to quit smoking or to support friends, family members and colleagues who are making the important decision to quit. Smoke-free is the wave of the future, and Ontario is on the crest of that wave.

Don't become a statistic, now more than ever I am encouraging you to quit smoking.

Here in Ontario, an astonishing 1.6 million people still smoke and 16,000 die each year from the effects of tobacco products.

Smoking kills and we should all do our part to kick the habit and encourage loved ones we know to quit smoking.

As a result, tobaccorelated diseases cost the Ontario health care system at least \$1.7 billion a year, result in more than \$2.6 billion in productivity losses, and account for at least 500,000 hospital days each year.

The province cares about families, and is willing to take action to protect their health. The Smoke-Free Ontario Act is a strong example of that. So too is our \$8.8 million investment in preventing youth from using tobacco products.

We have not done this alone. The local health unit has done an excellent job protecting the health of people in Algoma-Manitoulin by enforcing the Smoke-Free Ontario Act and encouraging people to quit smoking.

Ontario's tobacco consumption has fallen by 18.7 per cent or more than 2.6 billion cigarettes since 2003. It's hard to imagine 2.6 billion cigarettes, but if you can imagine them laid end-to-end, that is long enough to circle the equator almost five and a half times or reach more than half way to the moon.

Although great strides have been made with Smoke-Free Ontario, there is still more to do. That is why we will continue to work closely with our health partners to help smokers quit.

Ontarians can learn about the dangers of tobacco and get tips on how to quit smoking from January 22-26, which is National Non-Smoking Week in Canada. To kick off the week, the Canadian Cancer Society will launch the 2007 Driven to Quit Challenge, a provincewide challenge to help Ontario smokers quit smoking. # Light-weight Car Weighs in Heavy on Benefits

Need to lose some weight? So does your car.

And researchers at Natural Resources Canada (NRCan) believe magnesium will lighten the load.

A light-weight car means fuel savings for consumers and reduced carbon dioxide emissions for the planet. In fact, with every 10 percent of weight taken off a vehicle, fuel efficiency improves by five to eight percent.

Scientists at NRCan's CANMET Materials Technology Laboratory (CANMET-MTL) are working with the US Automotive Materials Partnership and the China Magnesium Center to study how magnesium can improve car design and efficiency.

The obvious environmental and economic benefits are what's fuelling the Magnesium Front End

Research and weight is over the front Development project. Magnesium is the lightest of all engineering metals. The use of magnesium can reduce the weight of the front end of a vehicle by 60 percent or 40 kilograms.

"Magnesium is 33-percent lighter than aluminium and 75percent lighter than the steel used in conventional cars," says Dr. Jennifer Jackman, the Director at CANMET-MTL and Canada's representative on the project's Steering Committee. "But even though it's lighter, a redesigned front end will ensure that, in the event of an impact, passenger safety is not compromised in an accident."

"It has a high strength-to-weight ratio," she adds, which means that while it's light, it can perform as well as steel. "It's also recyclable," she says.

Normally, 55

axle and 45 percent over the rear axle. If you design the front end using the lighter magnesium, the weight evens out, which improves the drivability of the vehicle.

But how much of a dent will a car with a magnesium front end make in your wallet?

Dr. Kumar Sadayappan, a CANMET-MTL Research Scientist and the Canadian Leader of the project, has some good news.

"We're working toward developing a magnesium front-end structure that can be designed and manufactured at approximately the same cost as the current steel structure," he says.

This is great for consumers. And, since Canada is already the world's leading supplier of magnesium parts for automobiles, an a u t o m o t i v e applications will also help Canadian companies remain competitive globally. Among the Canadian companies involved in this five-year, US\$22million project are Magna International Inc., Meridian Technologies Inc. and Trimag Inc. The universities of Sherbrooke, McGill, Concordia, Ryerson, Waterloo, McMaster, Windsor and British Columbia, and American and Chinese institutions will also






