Top marks for cooperative training program

Could mean more locals will stay to work

As its name implies, the cooperative training program at Chapleau High School is an example of how the school and supportive local businesses come together to obtain beneficial results.

A luncheon, which turned out to be a delicious dinner prepared by the school's hospitality class at the High School, Friday, January 21, honoured the students and the nineteen local employers who welcoments to the program which recently came to a successful close.

Under the tutelage of the school's coop teacher, Ellen Jardine, the program offers students experience which may help them choose a career which, for some, will mean one in their home town.

"Many employers have told me they'd much rather hire someone from Chapleau to train and raise in their employment field than take someone from other cities, who get trained and then leave our community," said Jardine.

She noted only 40 percent of students are entering university or college which means 60

percent are entering the apprentice fields, updating, or are directly entering the work force.

Thanking the employers, she said the placements are part of a "Designing Your Future" program at the school which begins with five weeks of self discovery exercises in preparation for the world of work.

She described the Co-op program as a "win-win" situation. "Because of the experience of the job placement, many of these students have found part time work and are now sure of the field that they wish to pursue."

The luncheon marking the end of the four month long program also was addressed by Chapleau High School principal Ross Hyhrochuk who told the employers they provided the students with a unique opportunity to learn about their day to day activities.

"Their experience with you will be a determining factor in what many students may chose to do work wise as soon as next year," he stated. "I want to thank you personally for the important role you play in the success of our s c h o o l 's C o - o p program."

For student Megan Morin, who

devoted her daily three hours over the past three months to the Chapleau Child Care Centre it was an experience which taught her how important it was to be with children. "It's what I want to go away to college for," she said.

One of the employers participating in the Co-op program, Jacques Martel of Chapleau Auto Parts, agreed it was valuable for both his firm and the student.

"It does take a little bit of time," Martel said, adding, "some individuals are very good." He explained that after a month at the store, where experience includes motor maintenance and repair, and public relations, the students find what they like.

That firm's mechanic Mike Lasanté praised the student's interest. "It seems like we show them once and they know the ropes."

Another similar program is about to commence at École Secondaire Trillium.

Commencing this February 7th, a new program to assist those in need in this community, will commence.

It will be provided from the Chapleau Pentecostal Church.

This letter is addressed to the person who abandoned a cat in the Old Fort Road area of Mulligan Bay last summer or fall. I thought you might like a report on how your pet is doing.

No doubt you thought someone would take your pet in and everything would be lovely. This didn't happen. By the time we became aware of its presence, it had gone wild and wouldn't allow anyone near it. As a result it is impossible for anyone to feed it or provide a warm place for it to stay.

Your cat is now freezing and starving. Last night it spent a couple of hours gnawing on frozen meat scraps I leave out for birds. It didn't get anything to eat because cats aren't equipped to eat frozen meat. When it left here it would have to find some protection from the cold because at -30 Celsius it wouldn't last the night outside. I don't know where that could have been.

So far, it hasn't been eaten by a lynx or fox, both of which are

common out here and both are hungry too. If it can avoid the predators, it appears its fate is to die scared, starving, and freezing before this winter is over. Is that what you expected when you dropped your cat in the bush? I can't imagine what this poor animal did to cause you to treat it with such cruelty. I wish I knew who you are.

Thank you Mr. Editor for the space in your paper. Maybe it will help people understand the consequences of abandoning their pets in the bush.



Produced in Chapleau "How-To" CD is a hit

A made in Chapleau CD is already at the top of the hot list in many communities as requests for the "Howto" manual on disk pour in.

Produced by

Gail Donivan, the CD, produced in both of Canada's official languages, is an offshoot of another successful local venture, the Chapleau Nature Festival.

Donivan has

been deeply involved in the organization and production of the Festival, which has become a major summer event in Northern Ontario during the last week of July.

After it was

decided to produce a CD designed to assist similar-sized and remote communities in developing special events and festivals, the required financial assistance was obtained from FedNor and the Federal governments Human Resources Initiatives program, as well as Centre Culturel Louis-Hémon. The Centre has been the sponsoring organization of the Festival in its first three years.

The total cost of the CD project was estimated at \$140,000. Although the CD, which is designed as an "Event Builder" has just been released, requests from small communities

across the country are coming in as word about it spreads.

The idea for the CD was born after Donivan, and Culturel Centre administrator Diane Jean attended

seminars on Festivals as they planned for the Chapleau Nature Festival.

"Everything at the seminars had to do with large communities," said Donivan. So, they figured something was required for smaller communities and laid out the plans for the CD and were successful in obtaining funding.

The Event Builder works as an interactive manual. It includes a wealth of template and sample documents, and a variety of user-friendly features that make it a valuable organizational tool that can be used to build successful community events or festivals.

There has been some positive local reaction to the announcement the provincial government

has announced six new funding programs under the North to be opportunity Ontario Heritage Fund there, "stated (NOHFC) directly

"There appears Chapleau Deputy affecting Northern Mayor Bud Swanson.

First review of the announcement locally shows there may be money for forest related projects, something the

municipality has been pushing for.

They will complement other government initiatives such as the Northern Ontario Grow Bonds pilot project and the GO North Investor local MNDM office at Program.

In an interview, Deputy Mayor Swanson said the youth oriented programs may help northern communities keep more of their youth.



Domtar profits hit by rise of Canadian dollar

The high Canadian dollar and duties on exports to the U-S led to another drop in profits for Domtar Inc.

The company, which is closing its mill in Chapleau in March in a deal with Tembec, announced a net loss in 2004 of \$193 million compared to a loss of \$10 million for the previous year.

"These are trying times for companies with a large manufacturing base in Canada whose products are sold in US dollars.

Although Domtar has grown its U.S. presence to approximately 50% of its asset base over the last five years, the Company has nonetheless suffered from the sharp increase in the value of the Canadian dollar, leading it to post a loss for 2004.

Domtar has also faced unprecedented cost increases for purchased wood and freight, as well as more duties on softwood lumber exports to the U.S.

Since May 22, 2002, Domtar has made and expensed cash deposits of \$145 million for export duties.

The combined effect of all these factors represents a reduction of \$262 million in operating profit when compared to 2003.

"In fact, these headwinds were so strong that they more than offset benefits from improved market conditions and restructuring initiatives. including an announced reduction of 8% of our work force," stated Raymond Royer, President and Chief Executive Officer of Domtar.

The \$53 million improvement in operating profit excluding specified items in the Wood segment was mainly attributable to significantly higher selling prices for lumber.

Partially mitigating the rise in operating profit were the negative impact of a weaker US dollar, higher countervailing and antidumping duties imposed on our softwood lumber exports to the U.S., higher road construction and maintenance costs.
