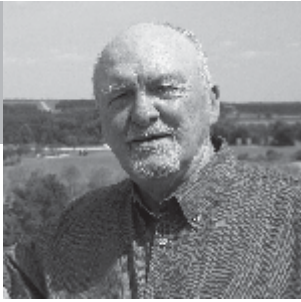

# Elmer Rosenberg recalls rescue from slush puddle on Sultan Road among challenging moments during years in Chapleau

Elmer Rosenberg, who taught History at Chapleau High School for three years, leaving to take a position in Southern Ontario in 1980, contacted me recently. I was so delighted and surprised, as Elmer was one of my best buddies during his time at CHS. He found me on the Internet, that great people finder.

When he told me that he had written a story about an experience on the Sultan Road, I asked if

I could share it with my readers. He agreed, and here it is -- and I am sure that many had similar experiences to Elmer while travelling on the highways and roads in the Chapleau area. I know I did. Elmer calls it "The Road Not Taken" with credit to the great American poet, Robert Frost.

### The Road Not Taken By Elmer Rosenberg

I've just completed year one of retirement and had the time and opportunity to reflect back on my career in education and especially my first years as a teacher in Chapleau, Ontario. I was aware of Chapleau's existence but I had never ventured that far west along Hwy 101 from my home town of Timmins, Ontario.

After completing high school in Timmins, I moved to Toronto and was hoping to land a teaching position in southern Ontario after completing university. As luck would have it, the only job offer I received was from Chapleau High School. Far away from the familiarity and comforts of home, my three years as a brand new teacher presented several challenging moments.

However, the majority of students at Chapleau High were polite and friendly even if they weren't always interested in the lessons I taught. I'm certain their lack of enthusiasm had more to do with my ability as a first year teacher than the quality of the students there.

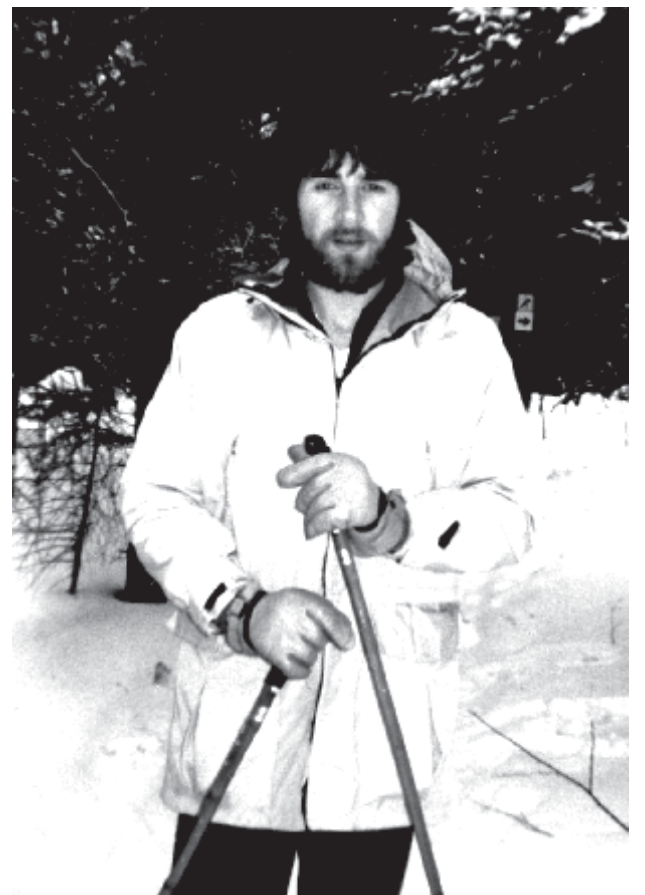
I have many wonderful memories of my stay in Chapleau and was always grateful for the opportunities afforded me and a deep appreciation for the people I met. One incident in

particular stands apart in my memory and speaks to the generosity and spirit of the people of Chapleau and area.

I began my return trip to Chapleau late on Sunday morning after spending the 1979 March break in Toronto visiting family and friends. The weather was mild but there was still a considerable amount of snow on the ground as I travelled north. In an attempt to save time and distance, I decided to take the Sultan Industrial Road from Hwy 144 to Sultan and then proceed on to Chapleau.

For the uninitiated, the Sultan Road is a private road built by the E. B. Eddy Company and used primarily by logging and lumber trucks. This gravel road begins at Highway 144 and travels west through uninhabited bush to the tiny community of Sultan (population of about 50 people and approximately 60 kilometres from Chapleau). A previous decision to take this road saved me time, but in the end, cost me the price of a gas tank replacement.

Now, the road was snow covered, so I geared up to give it another try. Unfortunately, I didn't take into consideration the mild temperatures during the day. As I turned off Hwy 144, patches of slush on the road confronted me. My car breezed through

the first few. I had a bad feeling but foolishly kept going. Then I met a much larger patch, containing more water than snow.

I accelerated to gain as much momentum as possible without losing control of my vehicle. I made it to the other side of what was now more like a pond than a patch of slush. I was wishing that I had taken the paved road and driven the extra miles to Hwy 101 but there was no turning back at this juncture.

Darkness was descending and I had yet to see another car or truck on the road. My anxiety level was increasing with every patch of slush I encountered and they seemed to be getting

larger and more numerous. Then I came to the mother of all slush puddles at the bottom of a hill. Not a pond this time but more like a lake. Even though I was able to gain considerable speed, my car came to a stop somewhere at the half way point.

I stepped out of my car to survey the situation and found myself in about a foot of slush and water. Not only was I stuck but now I was wet as well. In an attempt to ease my way out of this mess, I got back in the car but the engine refused to turn over when I engaged the ignition.

Here I was, in the middle of a Northern Ontario bush, far from civilization, **Cont'd on P.10**

# Protecting Canadians' privacy should be a priority for this government

We live in an era where privacy is an important concern for people. Ask anyone who has their bank card compromised and you will find out how easy it is to have important information fall into the wrong hands. With that in mind it seems only natural that the government should lead by example and set the bar by which other efforts can be compared against. Sadly that bar has not been set that high.

government lost a hard drive containing the personal information for Canadians with student loans last winter, we saw how easily breaches can happen. The recent report from Canada's Privacy Commissioner (Jennifer Stoddart) showed the problem is not limited to that event and indicated the government could be doing more to protect the sensitive information of Canadians.

It is the government's duty to protect the privacy of Canadi-

ans. Despite that, in the last seven years the personal information of over one million Canadians has been compromised. There have been over 3,000 privacy breaches and most incidents were never reported to the Privacy Commissioner or properly tracked. That is too many red flags and exposes a worrisome pattern in how federal departments handle personal information.

In February, New Democrats urged the Conservative-dominated Privacy Committee to study mandatory government data breach

reporting, but the idea was quashed. This government clearly hasn't taken privacy issues seriously enough and Canadians are being put at greater risk of identity theft and other online fraud as a result.

As I mentioned, the problem came to the forefront last year when it was revealed that Human Resources and Skills Development Canada put the personal information of over 600,000 Canadians at risk. In addition to that, a Public Works and Government Services Canada breach has compromised the

privacy of another 350,000 people and there are many unreported and less sensational breaches too.

In her report to Parliament, Jennifer Stoddart singled out several departments with a weak approach to data breaches including Fisheries and Oceans and Public Safety who the Commissioner says may lack adequate reporting mechanisms for alerting her office about data loss. Apart from reporting these events, she is recommending better reporting, security and tracking protocols.

Uniformity of approach is an obvious problem as departments do not have a uniform method for reporting breaches. While some departments report these to

the Privacy Commissioner on a consistent basis, others almost never do. That was the case for all 28 breaches that occurred at Public Safety since 2009.

This may be one of those issues that is easy to dismiss as unimportant until it affects you. Yet, it is also something that can be easily tackled by a government that believes it is important. The Privacy Commissioner's recommendations offer a basic outline of what is needed. Departments that are actually doing a good job of protecting data and reporting any breaches prove the goal is not impossible and likely have some best practices to share as well. It is just a matter of the government instructing them to do it.

### Inspection of Approved Aerial Herbicide Spraying Martel Forest and Pineland Forest

The Ontario **Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR)** invites you to inspect the MNR-approved aerial herbicide spray project(s). As part of our ongoing efforts to regenerate and protect Ontario's forests, selected stands on the **Martel Forest** and **Pineland Forest** (see map) will be sprayed with herbicide to control competing vegetation starting on or about: **August 1, 2013** (EACOM Timber Corp.) and **July 15, 2013** (Tembec). On the Pineland Forest the herbicide VisionMax silviculture herbicide, registration number P.C.P. 27736 Pest Control Products Act will be used. On the Martel Forest Vision\* silviculture herbicide, registration number P.C.P. 19899 Pest Control Products Act, Vantage\* silviculture herbicide, registration number P.C.P. 26884 Pest Control Products Act and/or Forza silviculture herbicide, registration number P.C.P. 26401 Pest Control Products Act will be used.

The approved project description and project plan for the aerial herbicide project is available for public inspection at the EACOM Timber Corp. (Pineland Forest) and Tembec (Martel Forest) offices and on the MNR public website at [ontario.ca/forestplans](http://ontario.ca/forestplans) beginning **April 1, 2013** until **March 31, 2014** when the annual work schedule expires. Ontario Government Information Centres in Chapleau and at the Timmins District Office provide access to the Internet.

Interested and affected persons and organizations can arrange an appointment with MNR staff at the MNR District or Area office to discuss the aerial herbicide project.

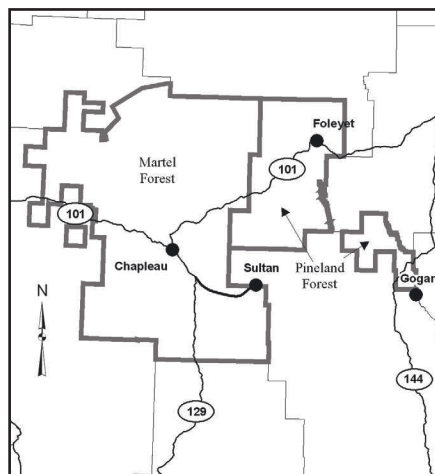

# Signs of Hope Out of Ottawa

If Stephen Harper owned a dart board, it would probably have a well-punctured photo of Mike Duffy pinned in the middle of it.

Not only has the Prime Minister's

personal approval rating taken a beating over Senator Duffy's expense claims, he's lost the best chief of staff he ever had. And his Conservative party is now in second place, just ahead of the NDP in the polls, well back of the hated Liberals.

Over at the Canadian Taxpayers Federation, we're thankful that Senator Duffy and his colleagues, senators Pamela Wallin, Patrick Brazeau, and Mac Harb are being made to account for their expense claims.

We're also pleased that the Senate, after decades of denial, is bringing in Canada's Auditor General to examine the books of every senator. Senators, and MPs for that matter, need to be accountable for their spending.

They need to put the details of their spending – including their receipts and contracts – online for all Canadians to see. MPs are still dragging

their feet on that issue, despite the downside of big scandals when Canadians accidentally find out about corruption through leaks to the media.

If Harper's dart board is getting a workout, another reason is the good work he's done that's gone unnoticed because of the scandals.

Taxpayers are naturally more concerned with horror stories than they are with good news – they expect things to run smoothly, after all – that's why they pay taxes. And journalists deliver the news that most concerns voters. Case in point, over the past few years we've read quite a few shocking stories about the growing cost of the federal government's payroll.

In the first five years after Stephen Harper became Prime Minister, federal payroll costs soared from \$29 billion to \$42 billion. In the same period, the average cost of keeping just one employee on the federal payroll ballooned from \$86,000 to \$111,379.

Perhaps worse, on any given day, 19,000 federal government employees are off sick. That's more employees than actually report to work at the Canadian operations of auto makers General Motors and Chrysler, combined.

And despite obvious incompetence and malingering in federal offices, the government in 2011 fired just 99 staffers for incompetence and 54 for misconduct, from amongst more than 250,000 or just 0.06 per cent.

The Canadians Taxpayers Federation has been vocal, calling attention to the dangers

of low productivity and rising costs. The Parliamentary Budget Officer projects that if something isn't done, the average cost of one federal employee will reach \$129,800 by 2015.

Fortunately, the Harper government has recently announced concrete steps to tackle poor performance and phoney sick days.

Treasury Board president Tony Clement announced that government employees will now need to meet performance objectives. There will be mid-year performance evaluations, and annual written performance assessments.

Staffers who fall short will get a game plan to improve their performance and a deadline. If they succeed, everybody wins. If they fail, then they will be demoted or terminated. Imagine!

"Either poor performers improve and become productive

employees or we will let them go," Clement said. "We owe it to Canadians and we owe it to the vast majority of committed, hard-working public servants to make sure everyone is pulling their weight."

It's refreshing to hear these words coming from the mouth of a federal cabinet minister.

To translate these words into effective action will be difficult. To reward hard work and punish fraudulent sick claims, to save taxpayers' money and raise the productivity of federal employees, will require determination, persistence, and the focused attention of federal politicians, senior executives, managers and front-level workers.

Taxpayers need to hold them to account if should they fall short on their promises. But this is a worthy initiative, and it deserves our praise.

Sadly, the long weekend ended in tragedy for 2 people in OPP-policed jurisdictions. 2 people lost their lives in motor vehicle collisions, however the OPP report that there were no fatal boating or all-terrain vehicle inci-

dents on OPP patrolled waterways and trails.

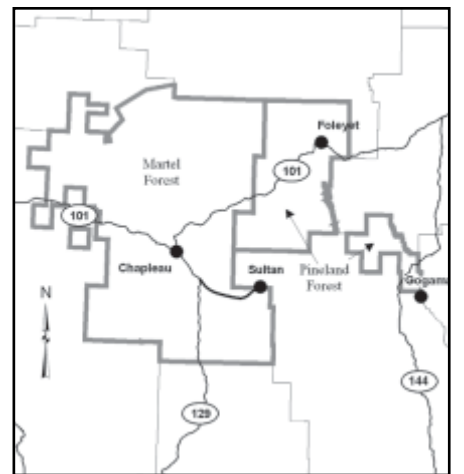
The OPP laid a total of 7,032 charges throughout the province for speeding, 98 impaired driving charges, 308 distracted driving charges and 1,593 charges were laid for seat belt violations.

While the Canada Day Long Weekend is over, the OPP is asking the public to make reducing deaths and serious injuries on roads, waterways and trails a shared priority year round.

getting colder and more desperate. I debated whether I should start walking or spend the night with my car. As I pondered the situation, another vehicle approached and drove around me through to the other side.

Two young fellows got out of their jeep, approached me and without asking if I needed help, started assessing my predicament. One went to the back of his vehicle, pulled out a tire and attached two chains to the opposite sides of

the tire. He attached the end of one chain to my car and the other to their jeep. The driver returned to his jeep, put his vehicle in reverse and backed up close to the tire.

He then drove forward causing the tire to act as a large rubber band. My car inched forward. The driver repeated this action for what seemed like an hour until my car was on higher ground. By now, it was completely dark and cold and we were all wet.

Although I was out of the water, I was unable to start my

car. One of my rescuers raised the hood and began tinkering with the engine. In the dark, he took off the distributor cap - who knew cars had distributor caps - and wiped it dry. Within a few minutes the car was running

As it turned out, I was only a few miles from Sultan and not far from paved highway. I offered the two young men money as a token of my appreciation but they wouldn’t hear of it. I regret and am ashamed to say that I never learned their names.

These words don't accurately convey the time and effort these young men exerted to help a complete stranger without any expectation or acceptance of financial reward. This memory has stayed with me for 35 years and on occasion, has inspired me to help other people in distress.

At the time, I wished that I had avoided the road less traveled but now I'm thankful that I made the decision to turn off Hwy 144 towards Sultan. I feel the same way about my decision to take a teaching position in Chapleau.
