
Commencing in September

John McClellan, affectionately known as 'Old Mac' ruled Chapleau High School with iron hand but was also friend and tutor to students for 30 years

When he retired in 1956, hundreds of citizens packed the auditorium in the old Town Hall, to honour John 'Mac' McClellan, who had been a teacher and principal at Chapleau High School for 30 years. Arranged by the Chapleau High School Board, the town hall was filled to capacity as tributes were paid to 'Old Mac' as he was affectionately known although no student would ever call him by his nickname to his face.

The program opened with the singing of "O Canada" with Judy Gibson, a CHS student at the piano. A bouquet of roses was then presented to Mrs. McClellan.

J.G. "Jiggs" Goldstein was master of ceremonies and he read many congratulatory letters and telegrams from those who were unable to attend.

Township councillor Ernest Lepine brought a message from the municipality while D.O. Payette, high school board chairman spoke of the wonderful co-operation over the years between Mr. McClellan and the board. Mr. McClellan was presented with a television, Hi-Fi radio and record player by Jim Broomhead on behalf of the citizens of Chapleau while Mrs. McClellan was presented with a beautiful engraved silver bracelet by Mrs. Muriel E. Morris (my

mother)

who attended Chapleau High School during the McClellan years, he most assuredly defined the school which was summed up in a tribute in Chapleau Trails, edited and published by Dr. William R. Pellow. The tribute noted in part that " on his tip toes he could peer into the classroom and monitor the behaviour or lack of same with classes led by some very junior teachers. If it was wild enough inside the classroom he opened the door and made an appearance and settled the rowdies down. He was like a bull with a red flag waving in front of him. He fumed, belted out commands, restored law and order, then left."

It also noted that he "ruled with an iron hand... and often lashed out with a sarcastic tongue, but as a "true teacher his goals were positive"

and he was able "to force enough education down our throats to enable us to realize and appreciate the rudiments of a solid education."

At the retirement party, Mr. Payette spoke of Mr. McClellan's work over the years with Number 1181 Chapleau High School Cadet Corps, thanking him for his contribution. The writer in Chapleau Trails sums it up: "He was the commander in chief of the cadet, the bugle corps and the girls gymnastic team. Inspection day he was king."

A veteran of World War I, Mr. McClellan was a member of Branch Number 5 of the Royal Canadian legion, and although he may best be remembered for his work with the cadets, he also coached juvenile hockey in Chapleau and both he and his wife were avid golfers. After his retirement CHS hockey teams in the 50s competed against outside teams for the John McClellan Trophy which was established by the Students Council in his honour.

Mr. McClellan

was a fan of the Toronto Maple Leafs, and Keith "Buddy" Swanson recalled him in an article for the school's 75th anniversary newspaper in 1997. Referring to Mr. McClellan, Buddy wrote: "Our principal, 'Old Mac' as he was nicknamed became an instant friend as well as tutor when he found out I was a Maple Leaf

"One sunny October afternoon he told me to take the afternoon off and come back to report to him on the World Series game that was on that day. I remember it well because Bob Feller was pitching for the Cleveland Indians. He hurled a two hitter, but lost 1-0.

fan (and a ball fan to

boot).

Mac's tough demeanour at times belied the fact that he was a great guy and a big influence on me... Under his steady principalship the school flourished."

Buddy also noted that Mr. McClellan had much more success with the cadets and bugle band than some of the lab experiments he tried to teach that didn't work. Buddy was a member

of the class of 1952.

Writing in the same newspaper, Lillian (Crozier) Robinson noted that "...it seemed as if we all feared him, yet we loved him for his devotion to each student. He truly seemed interested in our academic growth and exerted so much of his own energy to motivate us" adding that "upon reflection it seems that this man made an everlasting impact on us all. Patience, resolve, dedication and tenacity were all demonstrated in his teaching." Lillian was also a member of the Class of 1952.

Mr. and Mrs. McClellan retired to Whitby, Ontario, where for many years they hosted an annual Chapleau picnic, a must attend for many of his former students from CHS.


I became a Grade Nine student at CHS in 1955-56, Mr. McClellan's final year there but looking back on it, I agree with Buddy and Lillian's comments. Let me give the last word on "Old Mac" to the unnamed person who wrote the tribute to him in Chapleau Trails: "We owe him so much and although it is too late to say so one on one, we salute you "Old Mac" and thank you most sincerely and graciously. 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Ontario Weather Review:June 2010

remember June 2010 for its active weather and heavy downpours. Across the province, mean temperatures were near normal and precipitation totals were above normal.

At this time of the year, it is not uncommon to receive up to half of the month's rainfall amount from just a few storms, due to convective precipitation. Because these precipitation events can be highly localized, locations such as northeast Ontario, the Far North, and some areas south of Lake Huron received less total precipitation than normal in June. This month's small number of storms did produce significant amounts of rainfall for many locations.

On June 5-6, southern Ontario received rainfall amounts ranging from 20 to 52 millimetres. On June 16, northeast Ontario received between 15 and 44 millimetres of rainfall, with the highest amounts being reported in the Sault Ste. Marie-Algoma districts. Southern and eastern

Ontario also received significant amounts, with the most rainfall in Georgian Bay area. At the end of the month, thunderstorms soaked the GTA and parts of southern Ontario on June 27. This resulted in a new record maximum monthly precipitation for June being set at Lester B. Pearson Airport. The 53.2 millimetres of rain brought the monthly total to 191.6 millimetres, breaking the prior mark of 169.2 millimetres established in 2000. The highest total rainfall amount anywhere in Toronto during a June was set in 1870, when a total of 205.5 millimetres was recorded in downtown Toronto. The monthly total precipitation marks for June were also broken in Wiarton and Kingston.

Severe Weather

After a relatively quiet start to the spring, violent thunderstorms made a frequent and destructive return in June. One of a series of powerful thunderstorms that tracked over eastern Ontario on June 5 was responsible for generating the first tornado of

the season in Ontario. At approximately 5 p.m., a Fujita Scale One tornado (with peak winds between 120 and 170 kilometres per hour) caused damage to a number of barns, grain bins, silos, mobile homes, and houses in the communities of Dalkeith and Ste-Anne-de-Prescott, about 20 kilometres to the southeast of Hawkesbury.

One day later, during the early morning hours, yet another severe thunderstorm moved over Essex County and spawned a Fujita Scale Two tornado (with peak winds between 180 and 240 kilometres per hour) that impacted the communities of Harrow and Leamington. Hundreds of properties sustained damage along a path of damage approximately 40 kilometres long. Because this event happened at approximately 3 a.m., it area residents to become aware of it ahead of time. It was a reminder of the usefulness of having a Weatheradio.

Weatheradios are receivers that utilize special frequencies and provide weather information from Environment Canada on a 24/7 basis. Many radios can be configured in standby mode and then would come to life with a piercing tone when severe weather watches and warnings are issued. These radios can be purchased at many electronics stores and come in a variety of models.

The third and fourth tornadoes of the season followed on the evening of June 23. The Midland area to the northwest of Barrie was hit at approximately 6:30 p.m. by a Fujita Scale Two tornado that caused extensive damage to a trailer park and to end of town. There was an intermittent path of damage 25 kilometres long and 300 metres wide at its widest point with this tornado.

As the thunderstorm that spawned the Midland tornado continued east, it generated another tornado in the Washago area to the north of Orillia at approximately 7:00 p.m. This tornado was rated as a Fujita Scale One tornado and had an intermittent track of damage about 10 kilometres long and about 60 metres wide at its widest point.

Damage also occurred late on the evening that day in a campground to the east of Amherstburg, in Essex County. This damage was deemed to have been caused by a microburst, which is a localized gust of damaging winds from a severe thunderstorm. Based on the damage

caused, the peak winds with this microburst were estimated to be between 120 and 140 kilometres per hour.

Finally, another series of powerful thunderstorms rolled through southern Ontario on June 27. The Ontario Storm Prediction Centre received reports of funnel clouds, large hail and heavy rain, resulting from a severe thunderstorm moving through Essex County. Crop damage from hail and heavy rain was reported around the Staples area in eastern Essex County. In addition, some barn and tree damage was reported in this area as well. A survey of the damage concluded that it was due to a microburst with winds between 120 and 150 kilometres per hour. The total path of intermittent damage was around 10 kilometres long and about 3 kilometres wide at its widest point.



\$3,050 Fine For Illegal Wolf Hunt

A Chapleauarea tourist operator and his hunting guest have been fined a total of \$3,050 for charges related to illegal wolf hunting.

Gus Miller, of Durand, Michigan, was convicted under the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Act and fined \$1,000 for wolf hunting without a licence, \$300 for possessing wildlife unlawfully hunted

ing a conservation officer. He is also prohibited from hunting in Ontario for a period of two years.

Jack Kwiatkowski, of Waymart, Pennsylvania, was also charged and fined \$400 for failing to provide Black Bear Hunting Validation Certificates to his hunting guests, \$750 for wolf hunting without a licence and

and \$500 for obstruct-\$500 for obstructing a conservation officer.

> The court heard that on September 16, 2009, Miller was returning to Shenango Lodge after a day of bear hunting when he was approached by a conservation officer during a routine stop. The officer determined that Kwiatkowski was operating a bear hunt and failed to provide Miller a Black Bear Hunting Validation Certificate.

During the licence inspection, evidence was discovered that a wolf had been shot on September 14, one day before the season opened. Kwiatkowski had suggested that his guests hunt wolves and purchase appropriate licences after the fact if successful. The wolf hide was intentionally hidden in a bag behind a cabin away from the view of the officer. For a period of time, both Miller and Kwiatkowski denied knowing anything about the hunted

Justice of the Peace Theodore Hodgins heard the case in the Ontario Court of Justice, Chapleau, on June 9,

2010.

Non-residents may hunt wolves and coyotes during the open season, September 15 to March 31, under the authority of a small game licence accompanied by a wolf/coyote game seal. Hunters can purchase up to two wolf/covote game seals for a calendar year. More information is available in the



Navy Celebrates 100 Years of Outstanding Service

The Queen's float-by inspection of our navy in Halifax last week added some pageantry to the yearlong celebration of the Royal Canadian Navy's 100th anniversary. As a nation with a rich maritime tradition that boasted the third largest navy in the world at the end of the Second World War, there is much for us to celebrate about the past one hundred years.

Locally, I was fortunate to be on hand this Canada Day as the township of North Shore received a framed photograph of their namesake ship, the HMCS Algoma, which honours the municipality's legacy and connec-

tion with Canada's Navy. I was also able to recognize the Centennial celebrations and honour Naval Veterans at this year's Decoration Day Ceremonies on Manitoulin Island.

For many Veterans, the navy offered a chance to serve their country while making a good living. Those who served in the navy, and the merchant marines, in the theatre of war took part in a large portion of what became defining moments for our country. It was our central roles in both World Wars that helped Canada move past the status of (former) colony and truly become a nation in the world's eyes.

The role of these men and women were not confined to World Wars and should be celebrated in a way that remembers this. In addition to the highprofile work done guarding North Atlantic, war-time convoys, our Navy has also patrolled those waters for submarines during the Cold War, helped keep shipping lanes free from pirates in the Arab gulf and delivered hands-on assistance in the aftermath of natural disasters such as those in New Orleans and, more recently, in Haiti. Veterans' Affairs has a theme for the Navy's centennial celebrations,

"Bringing the Navy to Canadians."

Considering the number of land-locked communities that might not fully appreciate the important role the Royal Canadian Navy has performed, the theme is a good one.

Planned activities for celebrations include major international fleet assemblies in Victoria and Halifax; a group of naval warships will visit Toronto during the Canadian National Exhibition and an increased number of port visits are planned for both coasts and in the St. Lawrence and Great Lakes.

As we celebrate the anniversary we can also remember the support that is given to our Navy and its Veterans as well. The Navy League of Canada which operated 24 hostels in seaport areas during the Second World War that provided quarters, amenities and special clothing supplies for visiting seamen from all Allied nations, also established the Navy League Cadet Corp , an important element of our Navy Today, the culture. Navy League of Canada has a presence in more than 260 Canadian gommunities. Their youth programs benefit 15,000 young Canadians every year.

Perhaps of more importance to our yeterans are the hundreds of Royal Canadian Legions that offer support and vital links to veteran's peers in our communities.

As we celebrate the Navy's centennial, reflecting on its past and preparing for its future we can keep in mind the Royal Canadian Navy's centennial slogan: Commemorate, Celebrate, Commit.

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Une inspection des pêcheurs de dorés entraîne 120 accusations

Le ministère des Richesses naturelles a porté 120 accusations et a donné 333 avertissements durant une inspection de trois semaines des pêcheurs de dorés du Nord-Est de l'Ontario.

Des agents de protection de la nature ont inspecté 6 690 pêcheurs entre le 15 mai, jour d'ouverture de la pêche au doré, et le 5 juin. Les agents ont vérifié que les pêcheurs respectent la Loi sur la protection du poisson et de la faune et les règlements

de la pêche de l'Ontario.

Les accusations concernaient les infractions suivantes :

- Pêche sans permis;
- Pêche avec un nombre de lignes dépassant la limite autorisée;
- Surpêche de dorés;
- Pêche dans une réserve de poissons;
- Transport et emballage inadéquats de poissons.

Au total, 99 poissons pêchés illégalement, dont des dorés, ont été confisqués. De plus, les agents ont porté des accusations et donné des avertissements pour des infractions à la Loi sur les permis d'alcool, aux Règlements sur les petits bâtiments et à la Loi sur les véhicules tout terrain. Ces infractions concernent surtout la présence d'alcool à bord de véhicules motorisés ou d'embarcations. Comme il était interdit de faire du feu en plein air durant cette période, les agents ont

porté des accusations pour des infractions à la Loi sur la prévention des incendies de forêt.
