Township Council calls on Feds to intercede in BMO closure

In the wake of the announcement by the Bank of Montreal that it will be closing its Chapleau Branch in November; The Chapleau Township Council, at its regular meeting last Monday, authorized Mayor Freeborn to take action. Printed below is a letter which has been sent to a number of officials including MP Brent St. Denis and Bill Knight, the head of the Financial Consumer Agency of Canada.

Dear Mr. Knight:

I write today on behalf of my Council and the citizens of Chapleau to express our dismay at the announced closure of the Bank of Montreal branch in our community which is scheduled for November 5, 2004.

It has been brought to our attention that the Bank of Montreal is also closing numerous other branches of their banking institution. According to the Bank of Montreal announcement, the Chapleau branch will be consolidated with their Timmins main office located at 27 Pine Street South in Timmins. The many customers of the Bank of Montreal in Chapleau, including our Municipal account, will be inconvenienced by this closure. Although we have two other banking facilities in our community, this closure will reduce our banking options and result in the loss of valuable jobs at a time when our community is already in crisis. Like many Northern Ontario communities, Chapleau is struggling to maintain its business infrastructure at a time when the Northern economy is

under siege with business closures, layoffs and the out-migration of our youth and professionals.

You are no doubt aware that earlier attempts to merge with the Royal Bank of Canada were thwarted by the Federal Government. Recently, information has reached us through the media that the Federal Government has become more receptive to the idea of bank mergers. I suspect that the closure of branches by the Bank of Montreal now are the early signs of the overall renewal of their merger strategy.

It is noteworthy that no reason for the closure is given in the attached letter from James S. McMillan, Sr. Vice-President, Eastern and Northern Ontario. Nowhere in the closure letter does it indicate that the Chapleau Branch is not

profitable. Therefore, it is obvious that this tactic in closing small branches is being done to save any future merger from having to shoulder the blame after the fact and facilitate a smoother merger transition in the process.

We strongly urge you to intercede on our behalf on the unnecessary closure of branches in small communities like Chapleau where their presence has been a foundation for our local economy for the past 50 years. I look forward to your response to this request, at your earliest convenience.

a family-fun golf competition, while families will converge to the Saturday afternoon Downtown Street Extravaganza with

sidewalk displays, street performances, games, draws, and much more.

The Collins Art Gallery will host a wildlife and landscape art

exhibition throughout the Festival week, with the official opening on the evening of Wednesday, July 21. This year's featured exhibit will

showcase paintings by the very talented Vikki Meyer-Burkholder and photographs by Como Lake Resort owner Sue Burk. An exhibit you will not want to miss.

And of course, back by popular demand, the inflatable Playdium at the curling rink, and the craft show and demonstration in the curling hall.

Festival Passes remain on sale at the Chapleau Village Shops, Collins Home Furniture, Aux Trois Moulins Confectionery, Grove's Department Store, and the Centre Culturel Louis-Hémon. V.I.P. Laying the foundation for prosperity in the North

It is an honour for me to represent the North's interests as the McGuinty government's first Minister of Northern Development

and Mines. In my nine months as minister, I've enjoyed meeting and listening to citizens hailing from across the vast regions that constitute Northern Ontario.

My conversations with you have

underlined the fact that we share many of the same concerns. We're all looking, for example, to provide meaningful opportunities for our youth so they can build lives and prosper in their home communities. We all want to pursue innovation and diversity in our economy, and improve access to quality health care.

It's equally clear, from my visits to the Far North, that the most pressing needs of remote communities often differ from the needs of cities and towns in other areas of the North. There is no simple, one-size-fits-all solution to realizing the diverse, rich potential of Northern Ontario.

The McGuinty government recognizes the opportunities and the challenges of the North. This was abundantly clear in last fall's Speech from the Throne, as well as May's budget, both of which laid down the foundations for building prosperity in the North.

In nine short

months, our government has set the stage for fundamental change in Northern Ontario.



Developing a Business Plan for a Value-Added Cedar Manufacturing Facility
for the Chapleau Cree First Nation

Abstract:

Chapleau Cree First Nation, in its progress towards self-sufficiency, is initiating the development of a business plan for a value-added cedar manufacturing facility to be located on their land base. The facility would utilize 100 percent of the tree for four primary products. The butt of the tree would be used to cut cedar shingles for roof or wall applications. The center of the log would be used for saw-log processing and various specialty cuts, such as tongue and groove siding, square timbers and other value added specialty products. The top of the tree would be used for post products, such as outdoor/indoor furniture, guard rails posts, etc. All waste from this facility would be processed into mulch for playgrounds, parks, and gardens. Preliminary discussions, presentations, research, site visits of other facilities, and meetings have taken place between various business people, harvesting companies, cedar marketing companies, forestry companies, communities, the Ministry of Natural Resources, lumber companies, and the Ministry of Northern Development and Mines regarding the underutilized cedar species in north eastern Ontario.

Scope of Work:

The business plan will include various in depth research components required to establish the value added cedar facility. Market research will identify markets for the variety of products which this facility will create. The study will show what markets are available in North America and possibly other countries to which we may export the products. The manufacturing equipment will also be identified along with the costs and labour involved in setting up the equipment in the facility. A wood supply study will also be completed which will include timber cruising, destructive sampling, and the review of two Forest Management Plans. The wood supply study is required to ensure that the proper tree specifications for this facility are present in the local area. Because major cedar volumes have not been harvested in the area some silviculture research will have to be completed to ensure that the harvested areas are treated properly for future regeneration. Since a new entity will have to be created, some research will have to be conducted as to how the organization should be structured with a separate board of directors. The document that Chapleau Cree First Nation wishes to follow is the Ministry of Natural Resources "Direction for the Licensing of Forest Resource Processing Facilities" to ensure that all required components of this business venture are addressed. These guidelines are available at any local Ministry of Natural Resources office.

Proposal Requirements:

All proposals must be submitted in hard copy format and also in MS Word digital format. The final date for proposal submission must not be any later than 4:00 PM on Tuesday, July 27th, 2004. Proposals submitted by facsimile will not be accepted.

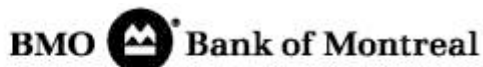

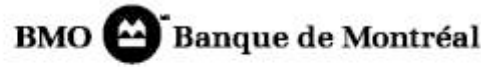
