Municipality clarifies the use of bear bins

The municipality is asking for public cooperation in a program designed to eliminate hazards associated with bears in residential areas and which is now being abused.

For the past four years, steel bear bins have been placed in strategic locations across the municipality in an effort to minimize dangers to residents and to put an end to household waste being strewn about by the animals. There are a total of fifteen of the heavy steel bins, each placed in a location, which was identified by the Ministry of Natural Resources in a bear management survey. They were

located so that residents on those streets could take advantage of them.

While the bins, which were paid for by provincial government grants, have been successful in keeping bears from getting at their contents, a trend has developed recently which had led the municipality to clarify use of the bins.

For instance, they are not to be used as drop off points for other than what is considered normal household waste. And it must be placed in the bins.

Recently, municipal pick-up crews have been faced with having to deal with items not accepted by the bear bin program. These include mattresses, large cardboard packing boxes, carpeting and even a full set of dishes. Some was stuffed in the trash bins, although much of it was left lying around creating additional problems.

If persons have this type of waste to dispose of there is an

easy and efficient way to do this as the municipality does have a protocol in place. For disposal of large items such as mattresses all it takes is a phone call to the municipal office and it will be picked up. Construction waste is not included.

While the municipality is pleased that the bins have been successful in dealing with the bears, it is hoped those who have abused the policy will cooperate with the knowledge of what the bins were designed for initially.



West Nile virus confirmed in the city of Greater Sudbury

Tests confirm that a dead crow found in the Lillian Street area of Hanmer was positive for West Nile virus (WNV). This is the first confirmed report of WNV in the City of Greater Sudbury for 2008. Other health units in the province have also confirmed WNV positive birds.

"In any year it's just a matter of time before we confirm the presence of WNV in our service area," said Ed

Gardner, a manager in the Sudbury & District Health Unit's Environmental Health Division. "Now that we have found a positive bird in the Lillian Street area of Hanmer, we will set up additional mosquito traps in that area as part of our standard practice."

To date the health unit has submitted 16 birds for testing: one tested positive. None of the mosquitoes collected in the 44 traps set by the health unit

throughout the Sudbury and Manitoulin districts have tested positive for the virus.

Gardner encourages people to continue protecting themselves against mosquito bites by covering up, using an insect repellent when outdoors, and cleaning up areas around their houses and gardens where mosquitoes like to breed or rest.

West Nile virus is a mosquito-borne disease that normally causes only mild illness

in humans. Severe illness, such as meningitis and encephalitis, is also possible, particularly in people over 50 years of age and among those who have weakened immune systems.

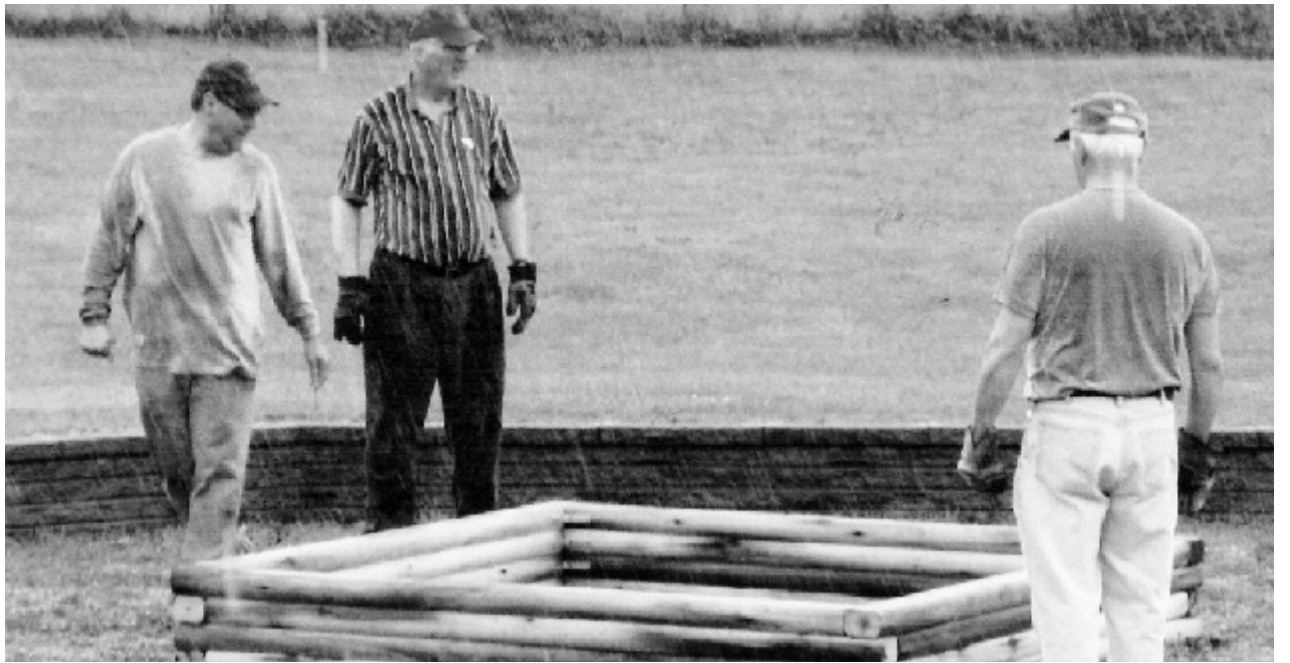
Rotarians work on the greening of Chapleau

This week, we're offering you simple tips that you will be able to practice with your vehicle. A lot of pollution is created with the use of vehicles, but these few tips will help diminish it.

+ First off, make sure that the use of your vehicle is necessary. Meaning that when possible, use your bike or walk instead; it is good for your health and the environment. If you do have to use your vehicle make the trip worth while, plan it out and try making all of your stops in the same trip. For example going to the grocery store and picking up a package at the post office;

+ Don't leave your vehicle idling. Leaving your vehicle running for more than 10 seconds while it remains stationary will actually use up more gas than turning it off and then restarting it. Therefore, with a little consideration for our environment turn your vehicle off while it will be remaining stationary even if it is only for a matter of two minutes;

+ Use the air conditioner as little as possible. This increases your gas consumption. It is wiser to run the air conditioner while traveling the highway due to wind resistance but for simple around town driving, rolling down your windows will work just as well;

+ Slow down!!! Your gas consumption increases with speed. If you're driving at 120 km/h, you are actually using 20 % more gas than if you drive at 100 km/h. So obviously traveling at 120 km/h will cost a lot more in gas and that is without taking into consideration how much greater your chances of getting a speeding ticket are. Also, the use of your cruise control helps to decrease gas consumption while you are traveling the highways;

Recycling Computers And TVs To Get Easier

Beginning next spring, Ontarians will be able to take old computers, monitors, printers and televisions to hundreds of locations across the province thanks to a new electronics diversion program developed by Waste Diversion Ontario.

The plan, approved by Environment Minister John Gerretsen, includes 420 drop-off locations in year one, up from the current 167, and more than 650 in year five. Drop off locations, free to the public, will include charities, municipal depots and recycling companies.

Ontario's e-waste diversion program will

be the first in Canada to set environmental performance targets for collection, reuse, recycling and accessibility. Currently, about 27 per cent of e-waste is reused or recycled, a number that's set to more than double to 61 per cent by year five.

One of the most important components of the program is that it will manage electronic waste from businesses.

"Ontarians need options for getting rid of their used electronics," said Environment Minister John Gerretsen. "Far too many computers, printers and televisions, along with their toxic compo-

nents, end up in landfills and that's got to end."

"This is another example of industry and government working together toward a common goal of environmental stewardship," said Waste Diversion Ontario Chair Gemma Zecchini. "Our plan builds on the producer responsibility programs already in place for Blue Box materials and the hazardous or special waste programs."

For the first time in Ontario, industry will pay 100 per cent of the costs of the diversion program. Stewards pay 50 per cent of the Blue Box

program, and about 80 per cent of the municipal hazardous or special waste program.

The costs to

manufacturers, brand owners or importers of the products work out to about \$13 for a desktop computer and \$10 for a TV.

Most anglers obeyed the rules

Check of 3,100 anglers leads to 140 charges

A four-week enforcement blitz by Ministry of Natural Resources in the northeast region found most anglers obeying the rules. Special emphasis was placed on sensitive walleye fisheries throughout the northeast.

The blitz began on May 17, which corresponded to the opening weekend of walleye fishing in the northeast region, and ended on June 14. The blitz covered an area from the Hudson Bay and James Bay coasts in the north, to the French and Mattawa rivers in the south, and from the Ontario-Quebec border in the east to Lake Superior and Manitowadge in the west.

Conservation officers checked over 3,100 anglers and laid 140 charges including:

- 69 for fishing related offences including fishing without a licence

- Catching and retaining more fish than permitted by quota, and
- transporting fish in a manner that they could not be identified or counted.

In total, 168 fish were seized including 130 walleye, 36 white bass, northern pike and yellow perch.

Other charges were also laid during the period for various offences under the Public Lands Act, The Liquor Licence Act, and The Small Vessel Regulations of the

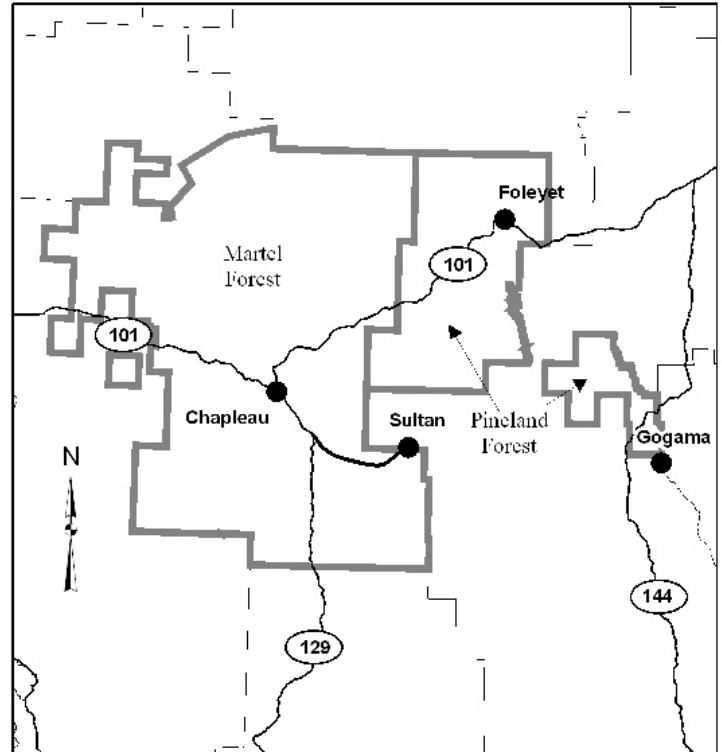

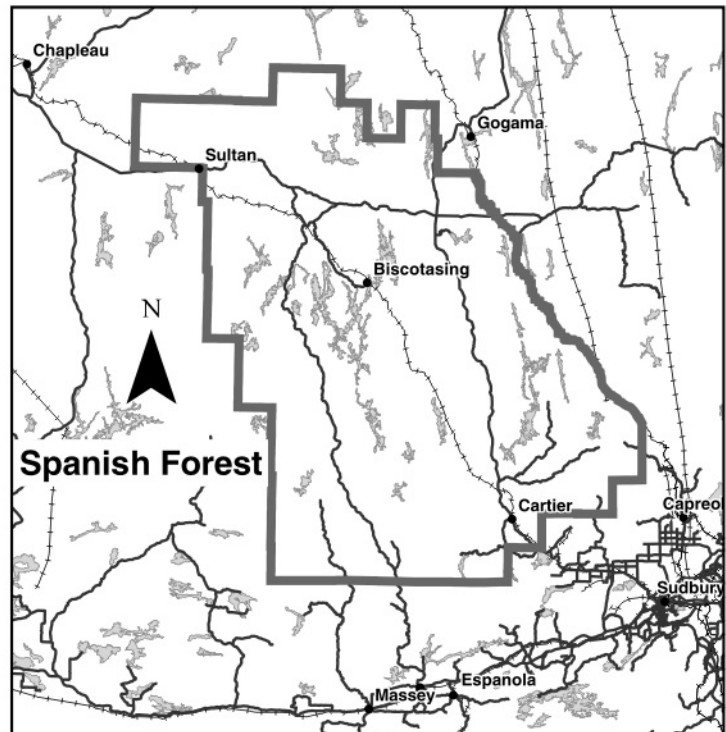

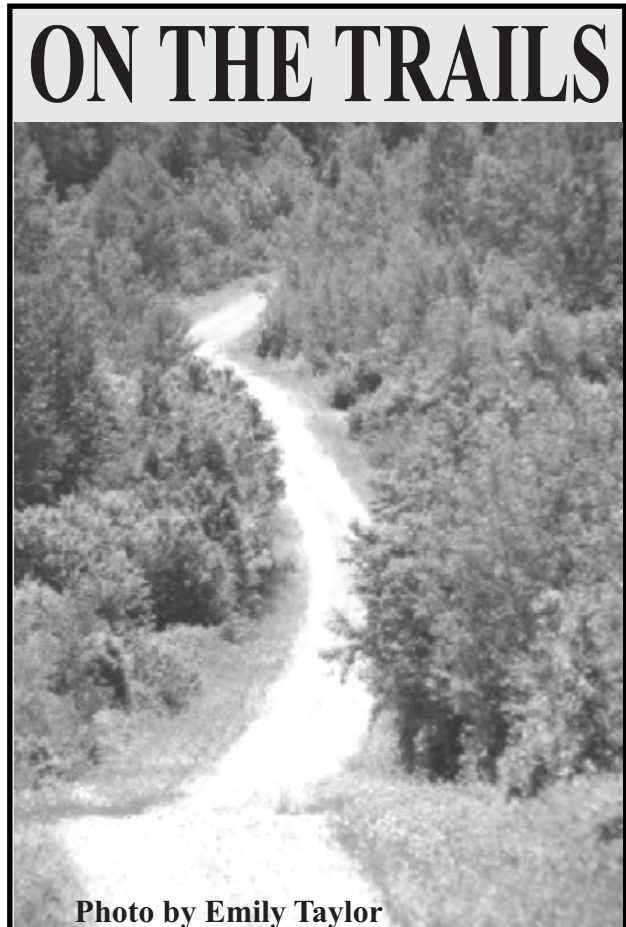
