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Harper can only say yes to oil companies

The recent BP spill in the Gulf of Mexico should serve as a wake-up call to all governments wrestling with how to regulate and develop offshore oil and gas supplies. These 'unconventional' oil and gas sources are expected to be developed and all signs point to this going ahead in a business-as-usual manner. New Democrats are concerned that additional controls are not being considered or that time is not being injected into the equation, as more licences for development in the Beaufort Sea are set to be auctioned in mid-

At a press conference last week New Democrat Leader Jack Layton called on the Prime Minister to keep his promise for a full and complete review into the safety of Canada's unconventional oil and gas sector. A development that is unlikely to happen given the government's full and

time is not being injected complete support of the oil into the equation, as more industry.

In June, all government and opposition MPs voted for a review of all relevant federal laws, regulations and policies regarding the development of unconventional sources of oil and gas, including oil sands, shale gas and arctic and deep sea drilling. Unfortunately the Conservative government has so far only committed to a limited and inadequate review by the National Energy Board (NEB).

This is not too surprising since they argued against the review they later voted for as part of a public relations exercise.

The National Energy Board has been in the centre of a storm lately. This past spring parliament wrestled with an omnibus budget that, among many other things, handed the power for environmental assessment over to the industry-friendly NEB.

More recently the Harper government decided to continue subsidies to the oil sector despite G-20 motions that

called for an end to the type of industry assistance. In a leaked document, Canadians learned that the Government will continue with \$2 billion in subsidies to an industry that does not require such gifts.

What is important for Canadians to consider is that, as oil reserves become more remote and difficult to bring to market, much of the technology and techniques being used are unproven and experimental. For that reason New Democrats are calling on the Government to take additional measures that will ensure Canada's review of industry safety is expanded to cover all unconventional activities in Canada.

There is an old saying, 'actions speak louder than words.' For this government, when judged on their actions it is abundantly clear, they are a government whose primary concern is the oil and gas industry.

Although they support measures like the review they voted for in the House, they refuse to act in a manner that will help those decisions along. This should be disturbing news for Canadians. A disaster similar to the one in the Gulf of Mexico could well happen in the Arctic and if this government is unwilling to tighten regulations the odds of an environmental catastrophe increase.

International media descend on Chapleau to cover test of nuclear winter theory as mushroom cloud blacks out sun in August 1985

Chapleau Moments

If you were living in the United States and reading your Sunday newspaper on August 5, 1985, it is quite likely that on the front page you would have noticed a story datelined Chapleau, Ontario, reporting on the results of a test of the nuclear winter theory conducted near the community the previous day.

Writing in the Chicago Tribune before the test, Janet Crawley explained that Canadian and U.S. scientists planned to study a controlled forest fire in northern Ontario to test the newly proposed theory that a catastrophic "nuclear winter" would follow a nuclear war.

The observers wanted to study the behavior of the smoke from the blaze, which had been scheduled as part of the province's regular program of burning out dead trees so land can be replanted.

A n d r e w Forester, an environ-

mental scientist and research associate at the University of Toronto, had said the study was believed to be the first such large-scale research into the possibility of "nuclear winter," a theory proposed in the early 1980s by Cornell University scientist and author Carl Sagan.

As a result, national and international media descended upon Chapleau, including reporters from major dailies in the United States and television crews from the big three U.S. networks. And yes, I was there to cover the story for United Press International, an assignment I got through Robert "Bob" Fife who had previously worked for UPI. I had forgotten about the nuclear winter test 25 years ago until I received an email from Dave Way-White suggesting it as a column.

So from the mothballs of my own memory and a Google

search, here is the story of the weekend when a Chapleau moment became international news.

The Orlando

Sentinel on August 5 captured the test results: "A giant mushroom cloud blacked out the sun over a Canadian forest Saturday. It cast a dark shadow over the northern Ontario wilderness as far as the eye could see. Cause: A fire set by scientists in a test of the "nuclear winter" theory. The experiment began when a helicopter dropped napalm over 2 1/2 square miles of a diseased forest 400 miles north of Detroit. The cloud rose thousands of feet into the air and spread over 80 miles. Theory's prediction: A nuclear war would blow millions of tons of smoke into the air, blocking out the sun and freezing the Earth."

The New York Times used an Associated Press story: "The fire was set in 1,600 acres of pines trees bulldozed last year in preparation for the burning. The trees, killed by a spruce budworm infestation, were burned to allow replanting. Thick white smoke billowed thousands of feet into the sky, where a gentle wind blew it directly over Chapleau, a town of 3,500 people about 15 miles southeast of the fire."

The New York Times also reported

that the test was watched by seven scientists who were testing the "nuclear winter" theory. The theory holds that a nuclear war could blast so much smoke and debris into the atmosphere that it would block the sun for months, chilling the earth and resulting in greater death and devastation than the nuclear explosions.

Using UPI story, the Los Angeles Times reported that "It will embody some of the characteristics of the firestorm that will follow a nuclear blast," said Andrew Forester, of the University of Toronto who brought the researchers together.

Forester, who directed a Royal Society of Canada study on Nuclear Winter and Associated Effects, said the scientists would attempt to learn more about the effects of smoke in the atmosphere and how smoke and ash block out sunlight.

Forester told UPI that the experiment would be the first test of the nuclear winter theory proposed in 1982 by Cornell University astronomer Carl Sagan and Richard Turco, a consultant with R&D Associates of Marina del Rey, Calif. They suggested a nuclear war would create a blanket of smoke and ash, blocking out the sun and chilling the Earth. Turco was

those planning to observe the experiment.

The Los Angeles Times - UPI report went on to explain that in in northern Ontario, "a helicopter was to drop a napalm-like substance on the area near Chapleau, 400 miles north of Detroit, to set fire to thousands of fir trees killed by a budworm infestation that began in the 1960s."

Forester added he hoped when the blaze fanned out, it would create a 20.000foot convection column of smoke, ash and gas to simulate some effects of a nuclear explosion. He described the fire as a "partial representation of one aspect of a nuclear explosion" without the blast or radiation. The helicopter was to carry a "flying drip torch," moving in concentric circles to drop an oilbased substance on pre-selected spots-literally dropping fire on the forest.

High in the convection column, scientists expected to see a ring of ash that would filter down, said Brian Stocks of the

forest fire research unit at the Canadian government's Great Lakes Forest Research Center in Sault Ste. Marie. Above the ash, scientists expect gases and condensation that could trigger firestorms, Stocks said, according to the Los Angeles Times report.

I recall flying over the test area into the mushroom cloud and one of the scientists excitedly proclaimed, "We've got it."

I have always thought it was so cool that Bob Fife, a former student at Chapleau High School and great friend, would be responsible for getting me an assignment as a reporter, particularly on such a major assignment as a test of the nuclear winter theory. When he was a student at CHS, Bob would pepper me with questions on everything -- a certain clue that he was headed for a distinguished career in journalism.


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

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
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Tips for first-time homebuyers

For many, buying a home is one of the first – and biggest – goals in life. But the process of finding that first house and arranging to pay for it can also be one of the most complicated tasks in life. Especially when finances are limited, the market is pricey and there's so much choice.

Chartered Accountant Suzanne Schultz is a financial planner with RBC Dominion Securities and host of HGTV's House Poor, a show that gives advice to people who find they've bitten off more house than they can really chew...financially. Here are her top 10 tips for first-time home buyers who don't want to be the next guests on her show!

1. Crunch the numbers yourself before shopping for financing - Banks and other lenders have

formulas to determine how much you can afford to borrow. But they don't tell the whole story. Things like child care, which can be a huge expense for young parents, are not always factored into the budget unless you specifically mention them.

2. Find financing, then a house - In other words, don't fall in love before knowing what you can realistically, all-costsin, afford. Know, too, about the cost of money, and how much that mortgage is really going to add to your bottom line each month.

3. Read up on interest rates - They've begun to rise, but how far they'll go and by when is anybody's guess. Imagine the worst cast scenario for the next five years and build your financial plan around that number. If things turn out better, you'll be ahead of the

game.

4. Reconcile your dreams with your bank account - Be realistic. Start with a small mortgage at an amount that lets you sleep at night. Your first house probably won't be your dream house, but it can be a good place to start working towards it.

5. Find out what that "great deal" really buys you - Financing homes is a competitive industry, and there are lots of incentives. Make sure you understand the full cost of any discounts, cash-back offers or insurance associated with the property and its purchase.

6. Add in upkeep - Home ownership comes with a whole new category of expenses. Whether it's a new roof and shrubbery, or a few flowers in a planter on the balcony, you'll be wise to put aside

another two per cent or so each year for upkeep. 7. Start saving before you start shopping - The greater the down payment, the cheaper the financing. 8. Get government help
- Under the Home
Buyers' Plan, you can
withdraw up to \$25,000
from your RRSP to buy
your first home. But the

money must have been in your RRSP for at least 90 days before the withdrawal. So, be sure to make any additional contributions to your RRSP before activating the Home Buyers' Plan. 9. Know what constitutes a good real estate investment -Location, location, location...and value, value, value. Don't be tempted by things like swimming pools or other amenities that can have limited appeal on

10. Speed up your repayment plan - No better way to get your

money working for you than by paying down your mortgage ahead of schedule. Make sure your mortgage agreement allows this, and make it a priority to increase or even double-up on payments as often as vou can. Also, consider a shorter amortization period or increase the payment frequency to shave years off your mortgage, and even thousands off your interest costs.

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Low Complexity Prescribed Burns in the Shoals Provincial Park Public Notice for a Category B Project Evaluation

The **Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR)** invites public comment on its proposal to undertake low complexity prescribed burns in the Shoals Provincial Park, located 48 km west of the town of Chapleau along Highway 101. Three small burns are proposed for the fall of 2010, located on an island (0.4 ha) and peninsula (1.0 ha) of Little Wawa Lake, and on the mainland (1.4 ha). These beneficial ecological and hazard reduction burns will help to maintain and restore the natural park ecosystem.

The Shoals Provincial Park is located in the boreal forest, a fire dependent ecosystem that requires periodic natural fire disturbance to maintain and regenerate native species. The lack of fire and the past logging within the Shoals Provincial Park is believed to have caused the local disappearance of White Pine and Red Pine forests. Prescribed burning presents an opportunity to help naturally restore some of these native forest stands in these areas.

Additional benefits from these proposed burns include reducing the future wildfire risk in the Park's development area. Removing years of vegetation growth (a fire hazard) will increase visitor and staff safety, protecting infrastructure and values at risk by preventing future fire starts and potential for uncontrollable fire spread.

Mitigative actions to ensure a safe, controlled burn will be addressed through a Low Complexity Prescribed Burn Plan developed and delivered in compliance with the Ministry of Natural Resources's Prescribed Burn Operations Policy and Prescribed Burn Manual.

Under the Class Environmental Assessment for Provincial Parks and Conservation Reserves, this proposal is being evaluated as a Category B project. Further to this public notice, a notice of completion will be sent to those who submit comments or request further notice upon completion of the project evaluation. The Ministry of Natural Resources may proceed to implement this project without issuing a further general notice.

Any comments on the proposed prescribed burn must be received within the 30-day comment period, ending on **August 28, 2010.**
