Mason Windows closing down Pineal Lake Lumber mill

fter 57 years as a functioning lumber mill, Pineal Lake Lumber will be closing down on July 15th, 2005.

The 1 5 remaining employees have been given their notice, and once there is no more wood in the yard to mill, they will be moving on. Since most of the workers live in company owned houses, they will be heading back to Elliot Lake or Sault Ste. Marie where they came from to work at the mill.

Ted Porter, Mill Supervisor and manager, and his wife, who is also an employee of the mill, originally came from Cochrane and Island Lake before settling in Pineal Lake in 1981. Although they stay in a company house, they have purchased a home on Mulligan's Bay and they plan to stay in the Chapleau area.

P o r t e r explained that there were several factors, which resulted in the decision to close the lumber mill.

The mill, a division of Mason Windows since 1979, supplies the company with the white pine that they use to build windows and doors. Because of the increase in popularity of vinyl windows, sales for wooden windows have dropped drastically. People prefer vinyl windows because of the lower maintenance that they require compared to wooden windows.

Another problem that the mill faced, according to Porter, is that there were labour problems. Because of the distance from Chapleau, there has been a lack of labourers and part of the operation had to be curtailed. Porter admits that the changing demand for windows has also caused a fluctuation in the workforce over the years. Up until about 5 years ago, the mill e m p l o y e d approximately 40 people.

Since the supply of short and

knotty pine was not acceptable, the mill brought in wood from Wawa, Gogama, and Timmins. With new restrictions, it became increasingly difficult to get a good supply of wood off of their limits.

An increase in hydro and insurances compounded the problems for the mill.

M a s o n Windows contracted out truckers to haul the lumber back to Pickering and will continue with this until the yard is empty.

The lumber mill at Pineal Lake is currently up for sale. There are 2 or 3 interested parties looking at purchasing the mill. Ted Porter stated that the mill is fairly up to date. There is also interest in purchasing some of the machinery.

If the mill does not sell, it must be completely dismantled and the land must be brought back to it's original state as per the Land Use Permit.





Gardening from the ground up

Digging in

By Mary Lynne Ivey

Once a new planting bed has been cleared and is ready for digging, take a look at the soil to determine what you will need to add to improve it.

Wet, heavy soil will need improved soil structure for drainage, and light, sandy soil will need organic matter for added nutrients and to help hold moisture. Because sandy soil is very common in our area, you will very probably need to add organic matter. This can be leaves and grass clippings, compost, or manure.

These will hold more moisture in the soil, and will break down over a period of time to provide nutrients for the plants. Peat moss can also be used, but it is very acidic. In addition to

organic matter, you may also wish to add bone meal or another organic slow-release fertilizer high in potassium and phosphorous.

Always before beginning heavy work in the garden, such as digging, take a few minutes to warm up and stretch your arms, legs, and back. A quick warm-up can go a long way to preventing soreness, as can working carefully.

Use your legs when lifting or shovelling, and never twist your back. Tightening your stomach muscles as you lift will take some of the strain off your back when digging. Stop often to straighten up to give your muscles a break. Take your time and enjoy working outside in your own bit of earth!

Dig a trench one spade-depth deep along the bed, placing all the soil you remove on a tarpauline or wheelbarrow. Place a layer of organic matter and fertilizer into the trench. Use a spade or a digging fork to dig down another spade-depth in the trench, turning the soil over in place. This method adds organic matter



and nutrients to the soil without bringing the subsoil to the surface.

When you have turned the soil over all along the trench, begin a second trench next to it, but this time turn the top spade-depth over into the first trench. Repeat the process of adding organic matter and digging it in, and then moving over to make another trench beside that one. When you have turned over the subsoil of the last trench, fill in the trench with the soil you had set aside at the beginning.

This method of soil preparation, called double-digging, is only one of many different methods, but it is one that has long been practised by gardeners as the quickest way to provide long-term benefits in the garden. Adding nutrients and improving soil structure deep down encourages deeper, stronger root development, and the benefits will last for years to come.

TOWNSHIP TO FLUSH WATER MAINS

Their family came from the Ottawa Valley to Sultan and then to Pineal Lake in 1947. Elwood worked on building the road into Pineal Lake from Highway 129. His car was pulled in by machinery and was therefore the first car to

In 1979, the mill was purchased by Mason Windows. Elwood worked for the lumber mill for 57 years, finally retiring when he turned 75. Maynard returned to Pineal Lake from Toronto when he retired and bought a company house beside his brother Elwood.





NEW annual all year pike fishing derby

An exciting new twist to fishing for pike in the Chapleau area has been created to commemorate the coming 10th anniversary of the Annual Northern Pike ICE Fishing Derby.

The ICE fishing derby committee is sponsoring a year-long

which will result in prizes of \$4,000 and \$1,000 for the two heaviest pikes caught.

In order to qualify for the prizes, a contestant must pay a \$20 entry fee at least one day before entering a fish. Entry fees are available at 12 locations so far.

In town, Home Hardware, Aux Trois Nature Variety Store, and Camille's offer entry forms for the allyear derby. Except for Home Hardware and Aux Trois Moulins, each of these locations are agents who will weigh, measure and take a picture of your pike. Fish do not have to be brought back to where the contest entry was purchased to be weighed.

In order for a pike to qualify for the contest it must be 24 inches long and heavier than the reigning one registered. All locations will be made aware of the current weight to beat.

Another crucial detail to qualify a pike is that it must arrive ALIVE at the weigh-in station of your choice.

Although pike are very hardy, keeping

your prize catch in a cooler of fresh water will help to ensure that it won't expire before being weighed. A battery operated aerator might be worth investing in, considering the prize!

Live release can also be practiced during the all year pike derby for those who prefer to let the smaller ones get even bigger for the years to come. Live release outfitters can also participate in this derby since they will have a photo and all the fish's data.

For a very small investment towards a scale and a camera, (which most outfitters will have already anyway) outfitters have another tourist drawing factor in the form of a contest that they can offer at no extra expense. So far, 7 outfitters from the Chapleau area are agents for the all-year pike derby. Those participating are Pellow's Cottages, Paquette's Camps, Como Lake Resort, Golden Route Motel and Lodge, Moose Horn Lodge, Flame Lake Lodge, and Mache Kino Lodge.

There is no age

limit to win the prizes but those who normally would need a fishing license to fish in Ontario, must have a license. Also, entry registration can not be transferred from one person to another or shared. The winning




