

H u g h M c K e c h n i e was instrumental in the destruction of many a history class, according to the yearbook, and I assume George Evans who arrived at CHS in 1961 was the teacher. Ironically H ugh returned as a teacher when George was assistant principal.

Ron Doig was a member of the Table Tennis Club, which I seem to recall may have been located above the old Bank of Montreal building at Birch and Young streets by Dr. Karl A Hackstetter, who became principal in 1963 as the school's student population was growing and there was no room in the Pine Street building for physical education classes. Dr. Hackstetter taught at CHS from 1954 to 1957.

Plans were underway for the new school "on the hill" which opened in 1966.

Myrtle Turner enjoyed curling and Charlie Purich was "a credit to the hockey team." In the fifties and sixties, until about the arrival of the Chapleau Junior "B" Huskies in 1966-67, CHS had very good hockey teams. There were hockey teams much earlier in the school's history too. In 1964, Alex



### **First Public Notice** Proposed Disposition of Land

The Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) Chapleau District, and the Ministry of Aboriginal Affairs (MAA) are inviting members of the public to comment on a proposed disposition of land for the use and benefit of the Chapleau Ojibwe First Nation. A disposition of land means that the Government of Ontario will transfer Ontario Crown land to the Government of Canada to be added to reserve for the exclusive use of the Chapleau Ojibwe First Nation.

The Chapleau Ojibwe First Nation and the governments of Canada and Ontario are now negotiating the proposed settlement of an outstanding treaty land entitlement (TLE) claim. TLE settlements are intended to compensate First Nations communities who did not receive all the land to which they were entitled under historic treaties. Ontario's Ministry of Aboriginal Affairs is leading these negotiations on behalf of the provincial government, with the support of the MNR and other ministries, as necessary.

The parties have identified a parcel of land to the south of the Municipality of Chapleau, approximately 4,000 hectares in size, within which the final disposition area of approximately 3,360 hectares will be selected (see map).


The proposal is being evaluated in accordance with a Category 'B' project under the Class Environmental Assessment for MNR Resource Stewardship and Facility Development Projects. A Notice of Completion will be provided to parties who have provided input or requested further notice. Where concerns can be resolved, the MNR may proceed to implement the project without issuing a Notice of Completion

A public open house will take place on June 28, 2011 from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. and 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. at the Chapleau Civic Centre, 21 Pine Street, Chapleau, ON. Please join us to find out more about the status of negotiations and the proposed disposition of Crown land.

You may direct any questions or comments regarding the proposed land disposition to Peter Ittinuar, Negotiator, Ministry of Aboriginal Affairs. Comments must be received within the 45-day comment period, which expires on August 12, 2011.

Comments and personal information regarding this proposal are collected by the MNR and MAA to assist with decision making and to allow for follow-up with individuals as required concerning the proposed disposition of Crown land. This activity occurs under the MAA mandate to resolve land claims and is in compliance with the requirements of the Environmental Assessment Act and the Public Lands Act. The MAA will provide the MNR with copies of all comments

received. Comments not constituting personal information as defined by the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act will be shared with others as appropriate and may be included in documentation available for public review. Personal information will only be used and disclosed in accordance with the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act. 

Premier avis public Projet d'aliénation d'une terre

Le ministère des Richesses naturelles de l'Ontario, district de Chapleau, et le ministère des Affaires autochtones invitent le public à présenter des commentaires sur un projet d'aliénation d'une terre qui sera cédée à la Première nation ojibwe de Chapleau pour qu'elle puisse l'utiliser et en jouir. L'« aliénation d'une terre » veut dire que le gouvernement de l'Ontario cédera une terre de la Couronne de l'Ontario au gouvernement du Canada, afin que cette terre soit annexée à une réserve pour l'usage exclusif de la Première nation ojibwe de Chapleau.

La Première nation ojibwe de Chapleau et les gouvernements du Canada et de l'Ontario sont en train de négocier le projet de règlement d'une revendication territoriale se rapportant à des droits fonciers découlant d'un traité. Le règlement de revendications territoriales vise à indemniser les collectivités autochtones qui n'ont pas obtenu tous les terrains auxquels elles avaient droit en vertu de traités historiques. Le ministère des Affaires autochtones de l'Ontario dirige ces négociations au nom du gouvernement provincial, avec l'appui du ministère des Richesses naturelles et d'autres ministères lorsque cela est nécessaire.

Les parties ont relevé, au sud de la municipalité de Chapleau, une parcelle d'une superficie d'environ 4 000 hectares où sera choisie une terre d'environ 3 360 hectares (voir la carte) qui sera cédée à la Première nation.


Le projet est étudié conformément aux modalités des projets de catégorie « B » d'une Évaluation environnementale de portée générale visant les projets du MRN en matière d'intendance environnementale et d'aménagement d'installations. Un avis d'exécution de projet sera remis aux parties qui auront présenté des points de vue, commentaires, etc. ou qui auront demandé à être tenues au courant de l'évolution du projet. Si des préoccupations sont exprimées et qu'elles peuvent être résolues, le ministère des Richesses naturelles pourrait mettre le projet à exécution sans émettre un avis.

As an officer of the House, the Speaker is required to remain impartial in his duties and only votes in tiebreaker scenario.
