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National Aboriginal Day to be held this Saturday

National Aboriginal Day, June 21 each year, is the recognized first full day of the summer solstice. The summer and winter solstices represent the extremes in our hemisphere of the longest daylight day and the shortest, respectively. The summer solstice has, from time immemorial, been held special by Aboriginal peoples, greeted with sacred ceremony at sunrise, celebrated through the day, and marked at sunset with a sacred ceremony.

This year Chapleau Cree First Nation, Fox Lake Reserve, is serving as the host locale for National Aboriginal Day celebrations, inviting all residents of its sister First Nations and friends living off

reserve to come and participate in a day of ceremony, of activities for all ages, of excellent food, traditional teachings, and great company.

Partnered with Celebrations Canada, this is also a special year because it makes possible a day's events coordinated through the joint efforts of Chapleau Cree First Nation and Brunswick House First Nation.

The day will start very early with pre-dawn preparations by Elders (starting just prior to 5:00 AM) in advance of the 5:34 AM EST sunrise for Chapleau's longitude and latitude. This sunrise ceremony will take place at the ceremonial grounds on Fox Lake Reserve, situated on Margaret Ann Road, which intersects with Fox Lake Road on the Fox Lake Reserve.

The Aboriginal Peoples' Alliance of Northern Ontario (A P A N O) new building at #8 Lorne Street South in Chapleau will be open in the very early morning (4:30 AM) in advance of a bus making it possible on

one early run for persons living in town to make it to the sunrise ceremony. The building will be closed once that bus leaves, but a schedule for the bus's other runs will be posted on the APANO door, as will a roster of the full day's great activities.

Children, accompanied by adults, have the mid-morning games with prizes at the beach area to look

forward to, followed by a BBQ lunch, a family baseball game and the annual NAPS Aboriginal Day Bike Rodeo. Amongst other fun, adults and young people will enjoy a morning tug-a-war, canoe rides and races and, at 2:00 PM, bingo.

This year marks the beginning of special initiatives in the united endeavours between local First Nations.

Later afternoon (3:30 PM) Elder's teachings will be followed by an inter-community potluck feast that will include a Brunswick House First Nation fish fry.

The 2008 Aboriginal Day celebration is honoured to have the participation of both visiting and local Elders. Preceded by drums and song, the sunset ceremony

preparations will commence at about 9:00 PM.

There's a piece of celebration cake for everyone. Weather permitting; the day will end with warm smiles, stories, laughter and the crackling fire at the beach wiener roast. Look for the activity schedule wherever better posters are to be found!

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

Elle est convaincue que l'accent de l'EMNO sur les défis et les récompenses de l'exercice de la médecine dans des régions rurales et



Kendra est née à Winnipeg et a déménagé à Chapleau lorsque son père, le Dr Frank Broomhead, a terminé ses études en médecine. À l'époque, Kendra avait un an. Tout en fréquentant la Chapleau Public Shcool et la Chapleau High School, elle a fait de la gymnastique, du ski et de nombreux autres sports offerts à l'école secondaire. À 18 ans, elle a quitté Chapleau pour préparer un bac-calauréat en troubles de la communication et une maîtrise en orthophonie. Elle a obtenu son diplôme d'orthophoniste de l'University of North Dakota en 1995.

Au cours de ses douze années en orthophonie, elle a travaillé dans différents

milieux du Nord et du Sud de l'Ontario. Son dernier emploi, avant de décider d'aller à l'école de médecine, était directrice des services de réadaptation du Centre d'accès aux soins communautaires de Manitoulin-Sudbury (aujourd'hui appelé le CASC du Nord-Est).

L'ouverture de l'EMNO a été pour elle et son époux, Stephen, une occasion qu'ils ne pouvaient pas manquer. Ce choix a exigé des sacrifices de leur part et de leurs deux jeunes enfants, Megan, 8 ans, et Jack, 3 ans, et a eu d'énormes conséquences sur la famille, émotionnellement, mentalement et financièrement. « Nous avons eu un grand soutien de la famille. Sans elle, nous n'aurions pas pu nous lancer dans cette

immense entreprise », dit-elle.

Kendra a l'intention de se concentrer sur la médecine familiale et l'obstétrique, et elle apprécie les classes de petite taille (56 étudiants par année 32 à Sudbury et 24 à Thunder Bay) qui facilitent l'apprentissage. Elle se réjouit à la perspective de retourner dans la communauté où elle a grandi et de fournir des soins à la population de Chapleau.

Stephen Saari

Du droit à la médecine, Stephen est la preuve vivante qu'il n'y a pas d'excuses pour ne pas changer radicalement de carrière quand on sait que c'est le bon choix. Né et élevé à Chapleau, Stephen a fréquenté la Chapleau Public School et la Chapleau High School. Après l'école secondaire, il a travaillé pendant six ans avec sa famille (Saari Contracting) dans l'industrie forestière. Il est parti pour l'université à 22 ans. En 1996, il a obtenu un baccalauréat spécialisé en science politique de l'University of Winnipeg puis un

baccalauréat en droit de l'University of Western Ontario en 1999. En 2001, il a été reçu au barreau et a déménagé peu après à Sudbury pour travailler chez Weaver Simmons.

Les études en médecine ont toujours été un sujet dont sa femme, Kendra, et lui ont parlé. L'occasion s'est présentée en 2005. Stephen a été accepté pour faire partie de la toute première classe de l'EMNO en 2005. Il

se concentrera sur la médecine familiale et la médecine d'urgence.

« Le programme d'études et la technologie font de l'EMNO un chef de file. L'école est vraiment axée sur la population du Nord et sur les besoins du Nord. La majorité de ses étudiants viennent de communautés du Nord et y ont donc de solides liens familiaux et communautaires. »

Son conseil aux

futurs étudiants en médecine : « Ne laissez personne vous dire que vous ne pouvez pas faire quelque chose peu importe d'où vous venez », et, bien entendu, « On n'est jamais trop vieux pour retourner à l'école ».

Stephen et Kendra remercient les Services de santé de Chapleau Health Services de leur soutien constant et se réjouissent à la perspective de revenir à Chapleau.

Chapleau School Earns New Gym Equipment for Successfully Completing the Go Active! Fitness Challenge

Chapleau Public School has successfully completed the Go Active! Fitness Challenge, earning \$500 in Wintergreen phys-ed credits to use towards purchasing new gym equipment. More than 22,000 students from 300 schools across Ontario have successfully completed the Go Active! Fitness Challenge. The Go Active! Fitness Challenge, presented by McDonald's Restaurants of Canada Limited with support from the Canadian Olympic Committee, was designed to promote physical activity amongst students.

Ontarians are being challenged to plant trees in their yards, their neighbourhoods and their communities to help green the environment and fight the effects of climate change.

Planting trees is vital to the health of Ontario. Trees clean the air, help combat climate change,

increase wildlife habitat, provide shade and help prevent flooding.

This challenge complements the McGuinty government's plan to plant 50 million trees, which is the most ambitious project of its kind in North America and the single largest commitment to the United Nations Billion

Tree Campaign.

The Ministry of Natural Resources has set up a website at ontario.ca/plantatree where people can tell the world how they're fighting climate change by planting trees. They can send in stories and photographs of their tree-planting events, highlight how many trees they've planted,

and find useful information about planting trees and its benefits.

"I'm proud that Ontarians are working together across the province to fight climate change by planting trees," said Minister of Natural Resources Donna Cansfield. "I look forward to seeing many more people join the fight and take a leading role in our

Plant A Tree challenge."

While they are growing, trees absorb carbon dioxide, a greenhouse gas which contributes to climate change, and convert it into the main components of wood, including cellulose, to form stems, branches and roots. Planting 50 million trees will result in the storage of about 3.8 million tonnes of carbon

This week, we're offering you simple tips that you will be able to practice in the washroom. A lot of water is wasted in the washroom, but there are a lot of solutions to prevent this from happening. Here is a couple:

+ While lathering up your hands or brushing your teeth, turn off the tap. This is a simple gesture that will save many liters of water and which requires little effort on your part.

+ Flushing the toilet uses up a lot of water, in order to use up less water consider putting a water bottle with rocks in it into the water holding tank on the back of the toilet. Now every time you will flush your toilet you will save a little water (1 liter bottle = 1 liter of save water).

+ Taking long showers uses lots of water. For every minute spent in the shower, 15L of water is used. Try cutting a few minutes out of your shower time to help save some water or even stopping the water when lathering up your body or hair.

Make sure you look every week for tips that you could do every day to live in a better, greener environment.

BE PREPARED BEAT THE HEAT

Hot weather will soon be upon us, and in anticipation the hotter temperatures, the Sudbury & District Health Unit is encouraging everyone to be ready to beat the heat.

Exposing yourself to extreme heat can lead to illnesses such as heat exhaustion and heat stroke. Those most at risk for developing heat-related illnesses during periods of hot, humid weather include the very young, the elderly, people who exercise vigorously or are involved in strenuous work outdoors for prolonged periods, and the chronically ill.

"Anyone can suffer a heat-related illness," said Gisèle Henderson, a public health nurse with the Sudbury & District Health Unit's Environmental Health Division. "Everyone should take precautions."

Here are some tips on how to prevent heat-related illness:

- Drink lots of water and natural juices. Avoid drinks made with alcohol or caffeine.
- Avoid going out in the sun or heat when possible.
- Keep electric lights off or turned down low.
- Take a cool bath or shower periodically, or cool down with cool, wet towels.
- Wear loose-fitting, light clothing.
- Avoid heavy meals and using your oven.
- Try to take it easy, and rest as much as possible.
- Place a dish of ice cubes in front of your electric fan. It has a cooling effect.

Signs and symptoms of heat-related illness include breathing rapidly, feeling weak or fainting, being more tired than usual, developing a headache or confusion. If you or someone in your care experiences these symptoms, contact a health care professional, friend, or family member for help. In emergencies, call 911.

As part of the Hot Weather Response Plan prepared by the City of Greater Sudbury and Sudbury & District Health Unit, the health unit provides information to keep the public safe from hot, humid weather. In addition to general heat-related information, the health unit offers information on beating the heat in apartment buildings, keeping your pets safe, doing outdoor activities in heat and smog, and keeping your children safe during hot weather.

From the Arctic to Africa: How Climate Change is affecting the Health of our Planet

Renowned experts say Science Centres can inspire a better understanding of Global Warming and Sustainability Issues

CNW - Sheila Watt-Cloutier, Inuit leader, Nobel Prize Nominee, advocate/activist on Arctic climate change, and Dr. Mohamed Hassan, executive director of the

Academy of Sciences for the Developing World, described the dramatic effects of climate change in their respective regions at the 5th Science Centre World Congress, taking

place this week at the Metro Toronto Convention Center.

In their combined keynote speech, *Planet Earth: Living on It, Changing It and Sustaining It*, Ms. Watt-Cloutier and Dr. Hassan spoke about the need for more science centres to address sustainability and climate change within local contexts.

"We need science centres in the North that present traditional knowledge in equal partnership with Western science," said Ms. Watt-Cloutier. "Science centres need to be defined by the community's priorities."

Dr. Hassan outlined a four point plan of action suggested to encourage scientific and technological innovation in Africa.

"Each country should have at least one science centre and science centres should expand their function to

cover sustainability issues," he said. "We should promote inquiry based science education in partnership with science centres and become portals of innovation to solve real world problems."

During the plenary session, CEO's from five science centres and the CEO of Siemens Canada, Guenther Scholz, discussed how their institutions demonstrate a commitment to social responsibility.

"We must understand that business and the

scientific community need to work together to share that responsibility to shape the future, this is the way we will be able to have a much bigger impact on society," said Mr. Scholz.

Le CSCNO maintient d'excellents résultats au TPCL!

Les écoles du CSCNO ont préservé l'excellent taux de réussite de 81 % au Test provincial de compétences linguistiques (TPCL) effectué en mars dernier.

« Ces excellents résultats sont tout à l'honneur des enseignantes et des enseignants de nos écoles catholiques de langue française et témoignent ainsi d'un apprentissage de haute qualité », estime M. Michel Chrétien, surintendant de l'éducation. Selon lui, plusieurs stratégies d'enseignement et d'évaluation fondées sur une pédagogie éprouvée ont permis d'atteindre ces bons résultats. « Notre personnel enseignant est de plus en plus soucieux des

différents styles d'apprentissage et adaptent leurs stratégies aux divers besoins de ses élèves, ajoute-t-il. Ces stratégies insufflent donc à chaque élève le désir d'apprendre et l'incitent à donner son plein rendement. »

La directrice de l'éducation, Mme Lyse-Anne Papineau, abonde en ce sens : « Nous voyons nos écoles catholiques offrir à l'élève un milieu linguistique de plus en plus cohérent, où tout contribue à enrichir ses compétences en français. Ces résultats confirment la validité de nos stratégies et nous motivent à viser de plus hauts sommets. » Le Conseil scolaire catholique du Nouvel-Ontario et les écoles examineront, au cours

des prochaines semaines, les tendances illustrées par les données produites par l'Office de la qualité et de la responsabilité en éducation (OQRE) et cerneront les stratégies qui assureront une augmentation des taux de réussites de chacune des écoles lors des prochains tests.

Les résultats des tests provinciaux produits par l'OQRE ont été dévoilés la semaine dernière. Ces tests permettent de fournir des renseignements précis, clairs et objectifs sur le rendement des élèves, que le personnel enseignant et les parents peuvent utiliser pour améliorer l'apprentissage des élèves.

Three Ontario hunters, all residents of Stoney Creek, have been fined a total of \$5,655 for night hunting.

Maurizio DiTullio, 41, pleaded guilty to hunting moose at night, having an illegally killed moose and making a false statement to a conservation officer. He was fined \$4,500 and banned from hunting moose in Ontario for five years.

Giovanni Dimarco, 38, pleaded guilty to hunting moose at night. He was fined \$1,000 and banned from hunting moose in Ontario for two years.

Lawrence Bortolotto, 44, pleaded guilty to illegally having a firearm at night, and

was fined \$155.

The moose was forfeited to the Crown. Ministry of Natural Resources conservation officers received complaints of a bull moose shot in the dark on the morning of October 7, 2006. An investigation revealed that DiTullio and Dimarco hunted moose on the opening day of the moose hunt before the legal hunt time. Moose hunting is only allowed from a half hour before sunrise to a half hour after sunset. Outside the legal hunt time, firearms must be unloaded and encased.

DiTullio shot a bull moose in the dark and, with Dimarco's help, attempted to conceal the fact that it was shot during prohibited hours.

When shooting the moose, DiTullio fired two shots from a high-powered rifle in the direction of three other hunters walking a trail about 400 yards away. This was the third adult moose shot illegally by DiTullio since 2003.

Justice of the Peace Marielle Quinn heard the case in the Ontario Court of Justice, Chapleau, on June 11, 2008.

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

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
