

Chapleau Moments

With the 90th anniversary reunion festival now less than a month away, if you attended and/or taught at Chapleau High School, I am sure you are starting to dig into the mothballs of memory recalling those days when you were part of "Chapleau's high school" as George Evans put it so well in his article for the 75th anniversary.

George added:
" "When Chapleau's high school celebrates, the whole community celebrates. The high school is the place where the community comes together."

The school, for 90 years has been an integral part of Chapleau life, and I have discovered that writing about CHS usually means writing about the community too.

I decided to share some Chapleau **High School Moments** with you spanning the history of CHS from 1922 on in no particular chronological order in the next four columns. Hopefully, some will provide you with talking points at the reunion from June 29 to July 1. Thanks to Ken Schroeder, my friend and classmate at both Chapleau Public and Chapleau High schools for giving me the idea from an article he sent about growing up in the 1950s and 60s.

If any of you have memorable CHS moments or about life in Chapleau generally that you would like to share, please feel free to email them to me at mj.morris@live.ca.

Let's start with the annual wiener roast which was held at Bucciarelli's Beach in my time as student from 1955 to 1959, but according to a talk given by Jack Whitney, it was a highlight of the school year when he was a student in the late 1920s. The "outstanding event" of the evening according to one writer, was the initiation of Grade Nine students in the 1940s, but by the 1950s initiation lasted the better part of a week with the wiener roast as the social event bringing it to a

... we played basketball in the Memorial Hall gym ... now the Legion Bisco Room?

... the town curfew rang at nine p.m. and all young people headed home unless accompanied by an adult?

... parents knew their children were in class from nine to four and spares were for studying and no one left the school without permission?

... Elmore Leigh was leading the cadets and "Mr. Mac" (John McClellan) was called away so when Elmore came to the gym wall he was reprimanded because no command had been given. The following day the performance was repeated, only this time outside so when Mr. Mac was again called away even when it involved going right into the river? (There are other versions of this one)

... cracks between the boards of the wooden sidewalks claimed dimes, rings and other small things?

... hitching rides on horse sleds hauling ice for the CPR and sliding on barrel staves on the water tank hill was standard practice? ... the annual Cadet banquet was planned and executed by the Students Council and mothers were called in to cook and clean up. Students set up the tables, decorated the hall (either legion or Town Hall) planned the menu. No liquor, beer or wine even considered? For years the turkeys were cooked by B.W. 'Bubs' Zufelt in the big oven at Chapleau Bakery.

... the old swimming hole -- the 'Pig Pen' -located on the river behind the convent was popular?

... the dances with the printed programs that had all the dances listed, waltz, fox trot, etc. When a young lady was asked for a dance she wrote her partner's name opposite the dance he wanted to have with her? The writer of the column noted that Jim Broomhead and Wilf Simpson were among those who provided the "good music" for dances.



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"Fibre to the Home" service launched in Chapleau

It may only be a small town of 2,900 people in Northern Ontario, but as of this week, residents of Chapleau, Ontario, are getting some of the fastest fibre-optic

telecomm service in Home (FTTH) network Canada.

On Tuesday, May 1st, Vianet, a Northern Ontario based telecommunications company, launched their new Fibre to the in Chapleau, about 190 kilometres northeast of Sault Ste. Marie. This next generation network will give people in Chapleau High Definition TV, super-fast Internet and reliable, affordable telephone services better service than many people get in large centres like Toronto and Vancouver.

Dan Regaudie, Vianet's Director of Broadcast Services, says the company is expanding its FTTH services in other larger centres as well. Chapleau was just the first to be completed simply given its smaller community size.

"This service will provide the residents of Chapleau some of the overall fastest Internet speeds in Canada today. There are very few communities in Canada that can boast a similar next generation network," says Regaudie, "Going to an all-Fibre network gives us unlimited capabilities, higher quality and excellent reliability. We're very proud of this achievement."

Vianet, meantime, is providing Fibre Optic services to many businesses and some homes in Sudbury and continues to invest in infrastructure to wire the entire city. The feedback from initial customers has been excellent with expansion ongoing.

"After 25 years in business, 18 of those as an Internet Service Provider, Vianet continues to innovate," adds Regaudie. "For example, we were one of the first Independent Internet Service Providers in Canada to provide Internet through cable modems. Now it's Fibre Optic services to the Home at prices that are lower than most of our competitors providing slower speeds."

Canada union representatives and management from CP. Both sides rejected a proposal made by a government-appointed mediator.

The 4,800 workers began a legal strike last Wednesday, walking off the job and shutting down CP's freight service across the country.

Doug Finnson, vice-president of Teamsters Canada Rail Conference, said Monday after Raitt's announcement that he believes the employer has been counting on the government to step

"The talks didn't really go anywhere and I don't believe they were going to go anywhere. I think CP was always going to rely on the government to act," Finnson said.

Pensions, health spending accounts and fatigue management are the key issues in negotiations. If the employer would remove its planned changes to the pension plan, Finnson said, a deal would likely be achieved.

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CP has said the President Robert company needs to make changes in order to remain profitable. But the union accuses management of clawing back a pension program employees have worked for years to build, while managers are scheduled for increases to their own pension program.

"The company is hiding behind the usual excuse: i.e. that the company should be more and more profitable. Meanwhile, the workers suffer the consequences," said Teamsters Canada Bouvier in a news release. In its own statement on Sunday, CP said it was "disap-

pointed" that a negotiated settlement couldn't be reached to end the "unnecessary" strike. "While the parties met this weekend, the federal mediator withdrew from the

negotiations this afternoon, and the talks between CP and the TCRC ended," said the statement issued Sunday by Ian MacKay, vicepresident of customer service.

"CP is disappointed that a negotiated settlement was not reached, and will cooperate with any decision by the minister of labour and Parliament."

Raitt said CP Rail employees shouldn't be surprised by the government's intervention. In the past 10 labour disputes involving Canada's major railways, the federal government has intervened each and every time to legislate employees back to work, she said last week.

Raitt has also intervened in recent labour disputes at Air Canada and Canada Post. In each case, she has said a strike would inconvenience Canadians and harm the economy.

Chapleau on the list for the fifth Annual Interprovincial Air Tour May 31 – June 3, 2012

Organizers of the Interprovincial Air Tour (members of Canadian Owners and Pilots Association) are excited to announce the details of the fifth annual Air Tour May 31 –June 3, 2012.

The participants fly in small private airplanes for this four day weekend adventure! The tour encompasses six different communities and covers 600 nautical miles of Northern Ontario & Quebec wilderness. This year the Air Tour will visit the following Communities: Muskoka, St. Bruno de Guigues, Kapus-kasing, Chapleau, Sault Ste Marie and Gore Bay.

In addition to exploring some unique areas of the two provinces while enjoying their favourite pastime, the pilots present a commemorative plaque to each community visited. The presentation highlights the value of the Airports to their communities and showcases the value of General Aviation to the Canadian economy.

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Ontario Power Generation reports 2012 first quarter financial results

Ontario Power Generation Inc. ("OPG" or the "Company") today reported its financial and operating results for the three months ended March 31, 2012. Net income for the first quarter of 2012 was \$154 million compared to \$153 million for same quarter in 2011.

Tom Mitchell, President and CEO of OPG said, "The Company had a successful first quarter in holding down costs while reliably and safely providing almost 60 per cent of the power produced in the province."

"I understand that Ontarians are concerned about their electricity bills. I can assure them that OPG continues to look at internal cost savings in order to continue to moderate its impact on the total bill for consumers."

"The average revenue that OPG received for a kilowatt hour of electricity in the first quarter of 2012 was 5.0 cents. This is slightly

below the average revenue that we received in the same period a year earlier of 5.2 cents, and it is well below the prices currently paid by consumers under Ontario's regulated price plan, which range from 6.5 cents to 11.7 cents per kilowatt hour."

Mr. Mitchell noted the following regarding the performance recognition for OPG's largest nuclear station, "I am very pleased to share that in March, our Darlington nuclear station received its best ever safety and performance peer review by the World Association of Nuclear Operators ("WANO"). In its review, WANO found twelve different areas of strength, which they noted as worthy of international benchmarking - including our response to the Fukushima nuclear event last year. This achievement demonstrates our strong focus on safety and our commitment to performance excellence and reliability. It was a tremendous opportunity to receive feedback and continue to further improve our performance to the benefit of the people of Ontario."

Highlights

Net income for the first quarter of 2012 of \$154 million increased by \$1 million compared to the first quarter of 2011. The increase in net income was primarily a result of higher earnings from the Nuclear Fixed Assets Removal and Nuclear Waste Management Funds ("Nuclear Funds") primarily due to a greater increase in the valuation levels of global equity markets, and lower operations, maintenance, and administration ("OM&A") costs primarily due to the impact of deferral and variance accounts established by the Ontario Energy Board. The increase in net income was partially offset by the impact of lower spot market electricity prices for production from unregulated hydroelectric stations, and higher depreciation and amortization expenses.

OPG's income before interest and income taxes from the electricity generation business segments was \$157 million for the first quarter of 2012 compared to \$244 million for the same period in 2011. This decrease in income from the electricity generation business segments was primarily due to lower Ontario spot electricity market prices and higher depreciation and amortization expenses, partially offset by lower OM&A costs. The Regulated - Nuclear Waste Management business segment recorded income before interest and income taxes of \$24 million for the first quarter of 2012 compared to a loss before interest and income taxes of \$34 million for the same period in 2011. This increase was primarily due to higher earnings from the Nuclear Funds in 2012.

Total electricity generated during the first quarter of 2012 of 22.0 TWh was slightly lower than the 22.2 TWh produced in the first quarter of 2011. The slight decrease was primarily due to lower unregulated hydroelectric generation as a result of below normal precipitation and water flows across the northwestern Ontario river systems, largely offset by an increase in regulated hydroelectric generation due to higher water flows on the St. Lawrence River.

The capability factor at the Darlington nuclear station was 95.6 per cent in the first quarter of 2012 compared to 97.9 per cent for the same quarter in 2011, and reflected a marginal increase in unplanned outage days. Pickering stations had a 77.0 per cent capability factor compared to 78.0 per cent in the first quarter of 2011, primarily as a result of higher planned outage days. The availability of OPG's regulated and unregulated hydroelectric generating stations remained at high levels. The Start Guarantee at the thermal generating stations for the first quarter of 2012 was 94.1 per cent, which was consistent with the result for the same period in 2011. The high Start Guarantee for the first quarter of 2012 and 2011 reflects the ability of the thermal generating stations to respond to market requirements when needed.

Generation Development

OPG is undertaking a number of generation development projects to support Ontario's long-term electricity supply requirements. The status of these capacity expansion or life extension projects is as follows:

Nuclear

For the refurbishment of the Darlington generating station, OPG awarded the Retube and Feeder Replacement contract on March 1, 2012. The contract is one of several contracts that will be awarded. The next major contract to be awarded is the Turbine/Generator contract. Construction on the Darlington Energy Complex ("Complex") remains on target for occupancy in the fall of 2013. The Complex will house the full-scale reactor mock-up, a warehouse, and office space to support the Darlington Refurbishment project.

In May 2012, the federal government approved the Darlington New Nuclear Project Environmental Assessment ("EA"). The approval of the EA provides independent review and confirmation that the project will not result in any significant adverse environmental impacts, given mitigation.

OPG is continuing to undertake a coordinated set of initiatives to evaluate the opportunity to continue the safe and reliable operation of Units 5 to 8 at the Pickering nuclear generating station for approximately an additional four to six years beyond its nominal end of life. OPG completed the necessary inspection and equipment improvements of the Unit 8 reactor in May

2012 and began planning work for the Unit 7 outage. OPG expects to complete the necessary work by the end of 2012 to demonstrate, with sufficient confidence, that the pressure tubes will achieve the additional life as predicted. Hydroelectric

The installation of the permanent concrete liner, as well as other lining and grouting activities continues at the Niagara Tunnel. tunnel is expected to be completed within the approved budget of \$1.6 billion, and by the approved completion date of December 2013. As at March 31, 2012, the life-to-date capital expenditures were \$1.2 billion.

The Lower Mattagami River project continues to progress. During the first quarter of 2012, concrete work was in progress at the Smoky Falls, Little Long and Harmon sites. Cofferdam installation continued at the Kipling site. The project is expected to be completed within the approved budget of \$2.6 billion by the approved completion date of June 2015. As at March 31, 2012, the life-to-date capital expenditures were \$897 million.

OPG and the Ontario Power Authority ("OPA") are in the final stages of negotiating the Atikokan Biomass Energy Supply Agreement, and in the early stages of negotiating an Energy Supply Agreement for the Thunder Bay thermal generating station. OPG is continuing to proceed with related detailed engineering work to burn biomass at the Atikokan generating station and natural gas at the Thunder Bay generating station.

Thermal

As outlined in Ontario's Long-Term Energy Plan and Supply Mix Directive to the OPA, OPG continues to explore the possible conversion of some units at the Lambton and Nanticoke generating stations to natural gas, with an option for cofiring with biomass, if required for system reliability.
