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FedNor Management Team visits Chapleau project

A group of 14 members of FedNor's Management Team made a stop in Chapleau on June 1st during their tour of projects that they have funded.

Members of the team, who come from Sudbury, Thunder Bay, Sault Ste. Marie, Timmins, and Ottawa, meet face to face quarterly in conjunction with making visits to the sites of the projects.

The group flew into Chapleau after making a stop in Cochrane to visit the Polar Bear Exhibit and Heritage Museum.

Unfortunately, the FedNor management team didn't have any luck spotting wildlife during their adventure on Big Pine Lake but, ironically, were greeted by a moose on the side of Highway 101 on their way back to Chapleau for dinner!

After an afternoon meeting with local CRDC, MNDM and Municipal Leaders at the Aux Trois Moulins conference room, the group boarded two small buses for a half hour drive to Four Seasons Guiding off of Highway 101.

Camille Robitaille, guide and owner of Four Seasons Guiding, met the group at one of his cottages and prepared them for

the scenic 10 minute boat ride to their remote destination on Big Pine Lake. A prototype of the viewing stations, which will be set up in the game preserve, has been constructed on site as part of a five year project with Chapleau's Regional Development Corporation.

Three boats carried half of the team over to see the newly constructed viewing station, which has been keeping Camille quite busy. He has begun to bait areas near the viewing station in order to increase chances of viewing bear, wolf, lynx, and marten. Electronic fence has been installed around the viewing station to protect those who are inside.

Louise Paquette, Director General of FedNor, remarked: "Since tourism plays such an important role in the northern economy, it is exciting to see the community of Chapleau working in partnership with tourist organizations to market attractions and showcase them."

Once back on shore, the group was transported by bus back to Chapleau, where they were treated to a fish fry at the waterfront pavilion before flying back home.

Open letter to the citizens of Chapleau

Policing costs to increase in Chapleau

Recent changes made by the Provincial government to municipal transfer payment formulas will lead to an increased burden on the municipal tax base related to downloaded service costs.

In 1998, changes to education funding resulted in the downloading of costs related to programs such as policing, land ambulance and social services to name a few. These costs were offset by new Provincial funding to ensure the outcome would not result in new municipal taxes.

In Chapleau policing costs were capped at \$90.00 per household. As program costs rose, the funding to the municipality increased to offset those costs. The new funding formula will no longer ensure revenue neutrality. Using the example of policing, per household costs will rise to \$268.05 in 2005. While transition funding ensures 2005 funding is stable, it fails to consider the approximately

\$123,000.00 increase in program costs the municipality experienced in 2004. Programs such as land ambulance do not form part of the new funding formula at all.

It is clear we no longer have a partnership which will ensure that there are no local tax impacts as a result of the downloading exercise. Preliminary calculations show that the base funding shortfall is on the order of 8.5% of the municipal tax levy. With the provincial plan to phase out transition funding, the full impact of the policing charges alone will rise to the equivalent of 24.88% of the municipal tax levy or \$349.26 per household by 2008.

On May 13, 2005 Mayor Earle Freeborn, Councillor Keith Swanson and CAO Allan Pellow met with the Honourable John Gerretsen in Parry Sound while attending the annual Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities (FONOM). It was made clear to Minister Gerretsen the

destabilizing impact these funding changes will have on our community. The matter was also raised with MPP Michael Brown in Chapleau at a May 25th meeting. The Provincial representatives were advised that such late changes to the funding formula makes it extremely difficult to manage the obvious financial problems created.

Municipal council and staff continue to press the community's case with the Province. A meeting has been requested with Ministry of Finance staff to discuss the specifics of Chapleau's funding shortfall. Mayor Freeborn comments that "It is clear that local taxpayers are now assuming costs transferred in 1998, contrary to the promise by then Minister of Municipal Affairs Al Leach that this exercise would be revenue neutral and result in no new taxes to municipalities."

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



Gardening from the ground up

Making the bed

If you are putting a new planting bed in your garden, begin by measuring out the boundaries. Stand back and look at it to make sure it is in proportion to the rest of the yard, but still practical. Will it look too small next to the big tree, or in the center of the lawn? Is there room to manoeuvre the lawnmower around it, if necessary?

Adding a few inches to each side if it is too small, or rounding off square corners if it is too big, are simple ways to help blend a new bed into the garden.

Remove any weeds or turf before beginning to dig. A square spade works well for removing grass turf. Use the spade to

cut the turf into squares. Two spade-widths on each side is a good size for the turf chunks, so that they can be easily pried up and lifted. To lift the turf, slide the spade under the side of a cut square at a shallow angle, starting about three inches down from the surface.

Because lawn grasses tend to form a thick mat of shallow roots, you want to slide the spade just under that mat to peel it off from the looser soil beneath. Prepare the soil well, adding organic matter and slow-release fertilizers according to your soil type and what is to be planted. (Watch for next week's article for more details on soil preparation.)

Don't be shy of adding a lot of soil and

organic matter. The soil will settle quite a bit within a few weeks. Also, mounding the soil slightly higher in the center of the bed, so that it slopes toward the edges, offers more planting space without taking up more room in your garden.

If the bed is surrounded by grass, you may want to put in a weed barrier. Various types of plastic edgeings are available for this purpose. The barrier runs around the outside edge of the bed, preventing the grass from creeping in. It must reach down to a depth of at least four inches below the surface of the soil in order to block the grass roots out. A wall of brick or wood around the bed will do the same thing, but it also must



be dug down into the ground so as to keep roots from creeping under and sprouting up in the bed.


A nother method of edging is the formal-style dropped edge. In this style, the turf is cut straight downwards at the edge of the bed, leaving a ledge of about 3 inches. The soil in the bed is raked up in a gentle slope away from this ledge. Eventually, the soil around the edge begins to subside, so dropped edge beds need to be re-edged every year or two.

Once the edging is done, rake and water the bed to settle the soil, and then it is ready for planting.

The second year of the Bear Wise program aims to reduce human-bear conflicts through education and awareness, reporting, response and prevention.

On April 15th, 2005 an electronic educational book was

launched about black bears. This book which highlights facts about black bears and ways to avoid problems is designed for kids between 10 and 14. It will be available soon on the MNR's website and will be distributed to schools in mini CD format.

Most people don't realize how big bears actually can be. Males can be 6 foot tall and weigh up to 650 pounds. Female bears can be up to 400 pounds.

Black bears, although normally not dangerous, are omnivores and will eat

just about anything, including smaller animals. They are also opportunistic and will do whatever or go wherever to get food. An easy meal is the best meal.

During a "good food year", bears live on what nature provides due to cool weather and generous rainfall.

In the early spring, bears will eat mainly plants such as dandelion and will supplement their diet with protein such as fish or even newborn animals.

Throughout the summer, available berries and currants are

the main staple of the bear's diet with added protein coming from ants or bees and wasp nests.

Once fall arrives, bears favour nuts such as hazelnuts and acorns as well as mountain ash berries.

To put on as much weight as possible for hibernation, bears will feed for 20 hours/day.

If the female isn't at least 150 pounds, even though she may mate successfully, she won't reproduce. Fertilized eggs won't implant to form cubs until her body reaches the right weight.

The close proximity of communities and the amazing sense of smell a bear has are open invitations onto people's property. Once they get a food reward, their excellent memories will bring them back again and again. Cubs will also learn from the mother. They will travel up to

100 km. for food. This is how they become nuisance bears.

Dr. Martin Obbard, MNR research scientist and black bear expert explains, "Only by repeatedly finding nothing will bears continue to move on. But it is up to people to ensure that they find nothing."

Garbage is the main concern although compost, pet food, fruit trees, vegetable gardens, bird feeders, and dirty barbecue grills all play a part in attracting bears into our community.

Besides the obvious things like storing your food away from your tent or keeping it in the trunk of your car when camping, sleeping in the clothes that you cooked in or eating snacks in your tent can also cause bear problems.

Last year, 137 incidents were reported concerning

bears. Sixty-four traps were set and the 23 bears, which were caught, were relocated. All of these cases were due to garbage being available.

The township of Chapleau applied, through the Ministry of Natural Resources, for a government-funded program where money is made available to purchase bear-proof garbage dumpsters. The dumpsters are set up in the spring and are removed in the fall. The township was able to purchase several of these containers and have them placed at trouble spots on the outskirts of town, such as Bucciarelli Road.

So far this spring 10 to 15 calls have come in to the MNR concerning nuisance bears. Only one black bear has been trapped to this point but the month of June promises to become busier as the bears' source of food changes before summer.

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
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Ontario government increasing access to doctors

The 15 per cent increase will result in 104 new first-year undergraduate positions being added to Ontario's medical schools. This increase will be phased in from 2005/2006 to 2008/2009.

This is part of a \$95 million investment over five years to improve programs in the five existing medical schools, better fund the clinical education for health science students, and create a new nursing program in northern Ontario.

This announcement

is only one of several initiatives in the budget to improve access to doctors. These include:

Creating the doctors of tomorrow

- \$16.4 million in 2005/2006 to fund new family residency positions and to build two new medical clinics to help accommodate the increase in Family Residency positions. There will be a further investment of \$16.7 million by 2007/2008. This will produce 340 new family doctors, providing care to 400,000 Ontarians by 2008.

- More than doubling the number of training opportunities from 90 to 200 for international medical graduates.

- The opening of the Northern Ontario School of Medicine in

August 2005.

Supporting doctors today

- The new Ontario Medical Association agreement makes Ontario a very attractive place to practice medicine. Investments beginning this year will bring more doctors to communities with physician shortages, support doctors who spend more time treating seniors and people with chronic conditions, reduce wait times for key medical procedures, and support doctors to work as a team and deliver preventative care.

Better access to better care

- The budget will continue to support the creation of 150 Family Health Teams by 2007. In April the govern-

ment established the first 52 new Family Health Teams, plus three networks of Family Health Teams in Barrie, Peterborough and Hamilton, where doctors work in teams with nurses, nurse practitioners and other health care professionals providing comprehensive care to patients, close to home.

This announcement is part of the government's plan to improve health care that includes Family Health Teams, increasing the number of doctors and nurses, and investing heavily in community-based health care in order to ease the pressure on hospitals and deliver care close to home where patients need it most.

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


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Tips for the BBQ season
