





DSSAB surplus funds returned to municipality

The organization which is responsible for delivery of a number of social programs in Chapleau is returning money to its member municipalities for the sixth consecutive year.

The Manitoulin and Sudbury District Social Services Administration Board (DSSAB) reported it ended 2006 with a

surplus being returned to its nineteen member municipalities, including Chapleau, which is represented Mayor Earle J. Freeborn.

In a news release, the Board noted the DSSAB has a history of conservative budgeting practices. Kirby Houle from the firm of Freelandt Caldwell and Reilly

\$206,311 operating said the DSSAB's overall financial position is a strong one with a very good level of reserves.

> Board Chair Ray Chénier remarked that this was the sixth consecutive year that the DSSAB was returning money to its member municipalities.

> The DSSAB is responsible for administering such services and programs

as OntarioWorks, providing subsidies for child care, Social Housing, which provides accommodation in places such as the Cedar Grove complex.

One of the most visible benefits of Chapleau's membership in the DSSAB is the new structure housing the land ambulance, one of the Board's major projects last year.

When the Board opened its new \$400,000 ambulance garage in Chapleau last autumn, Chenier acknowledged the strong lobbying for the new facility by Mayor Freeborn. The Mayor, during his nine-year tenure on the board, has served as chairman of Human Resources and Property Committees.

"In the little more than seven full

years that the DSSAB has existed, it has constantly lived within its operating budget. When one adds this \$206,311 to sums previously returned to our m e m b e r municipalities, this brings to over \$3.7 million the amount that the DSSAB has returned to its member municipalities," stated Chenier in the news release.

Minister outlines position n Children's Aid services

The Chapleau municipal council has authorized Mayor Earle J. Freeborn to get assurances from the province it will continue its children's aid services in both official languages.

The request is a result of a letter to council from the provincial Minister of Children and Youth Services, Mary Anne

Chambers, and follows the recent move to transfer services previously delivered by The Children's Aid Society of the Districts of Sudbury and Manitoulin from its Chapleau office to the Kunuwanimano Children and Family Services headquartered in Timmins.

The move, when it was announced earlier this

year was termed "totally unacceptable" by Mayor Freeborn. As a result of last Monday's Council meeting, the Mayor will tell the Minister that while the municipality congratulates Kunuwanimano, "we are requesting services for non-First Nations people in both official languages."

In her letter, the Children and Youth Services Minister says her Ministry expects the Sudbury and Manitoulin Children's Aid Society will continue to be in a position to provide mandatory services.

"While my Ministry has agreed to pursue designation for Kunuwanimano, my ministry has not received or approved any plans for changes in jurisdiction of the







Be active today and every day!

Canada's new Food Guide has many additions. In the latest version, there is a stronger emphasis on active living. This component builds on Canada's Physical Activity Guide, which recommends 30 to 60 minutes of moderate physical activity for adults on most days and 90 minutes for children and youth every day. By using both guides together, everyone can get help to lead healthier lifestyles!

Healthy eating and being active go hand in hand. Healthy eating gives you the essential nutrients and energy you need to keep your body moving. By eating well and being active, you can expect to: -increase your overall health

-lower your risk of

disease
-maintain a healthy
body weight

-feel better

-increase your energy
-maintain strong
muscles and bones
-decrease your stress

We live in a society where everything is at our convenience: using elevators and escalators, eating prepackaged foods and shopping online, for example. Physical inactivity is dangerous to our health. In 2000/01, 51 per cent of Sudbury residents were considered inactive. Our bodies are made to move, so make an investment in your health and commit to leading an active lifestyle!

Physical activity doesn't have to be hard or take a lot of time to help your body stay healthy and reduce the risks of disease. You can achieve your daily physical activity

goals by including various activities in your daily routine. This doesn't mean you have to run on the treadmill for an hour, unless that's what you enjoy doing. Simply choose to do something that vou like. Remember to start slowly and build up. Start by doing three 10-minute sessions in your day and you will be off to a healthier you! If you are already doing some light activities, move up to

more moderate ones.

Here are some ideas on how you can incorporate physical activity into your day:
-Do light stretches and bending at your desk to keep your muscles relaxed and joints mobile.

-Park further from the entrance and walk.

-Take a brisk 10minute walk on your lunch or after supperbring a colleague or a friend! -Walk, cycle and rollerblade when doing quick errands.

-Get off the bus one stop earlier and walk the rest of the way.



The cuts are effecting not only local Ministry operations but also your local Provincial Parks. The MNR has a long and proud history; a history which has been deteriorating with years of budget cuts. In an age where the environment should be of utmost concern, it government has missed the mark.

May is rabies awareness month May is when indoors at night. For more Health Unit's

we start spending more time outdoors, and chance encounters with neighbourhood pets and wild animals increase. It's also a time when we could come in contact with rabid animals. Rabies is always present in our wildlife, and the possibility of a domestic animal becoming infected cannot be overlooked.

"Pets should be immunized against rabies and have a current certificate of vaccination to protect both you and your family," says Bob Moulton, an environmental support officer in the health unit's Environmental Health Division.

There are several things you can do to help identify and prevent the spread of rabies:

- •Don't let your pets roam free.
- •Keep your pets

wild animal.

•Learn to identify the signs of rabies in animals.

•Teach children to stay away from wild or stray animals, and animals that are behaving strangely.

•Report all animal bites to the health unit.

In 2006, the Sudbury & District Health Unit investigated 216 animal bites or suspect rabid animal contacts. Twentythree people were vaccinated with postexposure prophylaxis treatment. Rabies is a virus that is fatal if you are infected and not treated.

If you come in contact with, or are bitten by any unfamiliar animal, immediately wash the wound with soap and water and get medical attention as soon as possible.

Province expands restricted fire zone to Northeastern Ontario






The Ministry of Natural Resources is expanding the Restricted Fire Zone already in place for Northwestern Ontario to include Northeastern Ontario. Implementation of a Restricted Fire Zone is aimed at reducing the number of humancaused wildfires, especially brush and grass fires that are threatening people and property. The fire hazard is extreme because of prolonged dry conditions and strong winds.

Effective at 12:01 a.m. Thursday, May 10, 2007 until further notice, all open burning is banned outdoors. The restrictions apply to the Ministry of Natural Resources districts of Hearst, Kapuskasing, Cochrane, Timmins, Wawa, Chapleau, Kirkland Lake, Sudbury, North Bay, Sault Ste Marie and Manitoulin Island. The exception is the far north and south of the French River A Restricted Fire Zone remains in place in Northwestern Ontario in the districts of Red Lake, Kenora, Fort Frances, Dryden, Sioux Lookout, Thunder Bay and Nipigon. The exception is the far north and the northern part of Nipigon District. Please contact your local ministry office to see if your area is affected. Under the Restricted Fire Zone regulations, all burning permits are suspended and all open fires are prohibited. Campfires may be allowed at some organized campgrounds or parks that use approved fire pits and meet certain other criteria. Campers should check with the owners or operators first. Within the

Restricted Fire Zone area, people can still use portable gas stoves for cooking and warmth but the public is asked to use extreme caution. Ministry fire staff and conservation officers will strictly enforce the ban on open burning.
