# Outdated committee system to be reviewed by Township Council



**Councillor Tremblay** raises question

here is going to be a review of the Township's

system as a result of a discussion at the municipal council table last Monday evening.

The review was called for after the subject was raised by Councillor Jacques Tremblay who questioned whether the Council was enforcing its own bylaw which set out the committees.

The committee system was instituted at least 14 years ago. The council at the time said

standing committee it was meant to encourage citizens to get involved in local decision making.

There are standing committees on recreation, public works, the museum and most recently youth. The public library board also recruits volunteers. Although the committees, which have a mix of Mayor, Council and public representatives have been successful in influencing council in its decisions,

attracting citizens into the process has met with only marginal success. The township has even advertised in the newspaper asking for members.

One of the issues raised by councillor Tremblay is the tenure of members sitting on the various committees. He noted the existing bylaw limits terms to no more than 6 years although some members hold office longer.

"I'm not saying to click these people off,"







## NAN leadership sign a letter of political agreement with Ontario

Aski Nation (NAN) Grand Chief Stan Beardy together with members of the Northern Table NAN Chiefs steering committee signed a letter of political agreement with Minister of Natural Resources and Minister Responsible for Aboriginal Affairs David Ramsay to continue exploratory discussions with the Government of Ontario this morning at Queen's Park.

"NAN leadership has high expectations that the Northern Table

CNW - Nishnawbe will assist in developing a meaningful relationship with the Government of Ontario reflective of our understanding of treaties 9 and 5 signed 100 years ago," said NAN Grand Chief Stan Beardy. "Our intent is through changes in policy and legislation to allow active participation by First Nation people in the economy, revenuesharing, and proper implementation of Aboriginal and Treatyrights as outlined in the Canadian Constitution

and recent Supreme Court rulings, this forum will provide a good basis for a better future for the people of Nishnawbe Aski."

The letter commits NAN Chiefs and the Government of Ontario to a 90 day interim period to finalize exploratory discussions related to revenue-sharing, Ontario Parks Act, Ontario Mining Act, impact benefits agreements, and land use planning.

The Northern Table was originally announced March 2006 with the intent to

provide a forum to address the unique challenges specific to NAN First Nation communities, while addressing the gap in socioeconomic status between the residents of NAN territory (an area covering twothirds of Ontario) and non-Aboriginal Ontarians.

Nishnawbe Aski Nation is a political organization representing 49 First Nation communities in the territory of James Bay Treaty 9 and Ontario portion of Treaty 5 - an area covering twothirds of the province.



## Ontario To Build One Of World's Largest Solar Farms

CNW-Ontario's electricity grid will soon get a boost from 14 new renewable energy projects including North America's largest solar farm - awarded through the Standard Offer Program, Energy

Minister Dwight Duncan announced today.

"The Standard Offer Program is transforming the way we generate electricity in Ontario," said Duncan. "This program is giving Ontarians the opportunity to help strengthen our energy system and clean up our air."

One of the projects announced today is one of the world's largest solar farms, to be built in Sarnia. OptiSolar Farms will install over one million

ground-mounted solar panels to convert solar power into electricity. This project will comprise four solar

farms and will contribute 40 megawatts to the grid by 2010 - enough to supply electricity for 6,000 homes.

"I am very pleased that our community was chosen as the site for this major new project," said Caroline Di Cocco, MPP for Sarnia-Lambton. "It just goes to show that Sarnia-Lambton has the right mix of infrastructure and people, making it a great place to invest. I am very proud of the work that everyone has done to make this happen."

"The Ontario government has chosen to take a world-leading role in encouraging the development of renewable energy, and the Standard Offer Program is making things happen," said OptiSolar Farms vicepresident Peter Carrie. "Our goal is to make solar power a mainstream energy

source."

The projects include two residential-sized solar photovoltaic installations, several 10-megawatt wind farms and two waterpower projects with First Nations participation. The Gitchi Animki Bezhig project will produce more than eight megawatts of electricity; the Gitchi Animki Niizh project will produce 9.9 megawatts. All of the contracted projects are expected to be in service by 2010.

"This program continues to demonstrate Ontario's international leadership in developing small renewable generation,"

said Paul Shervill, a vice-president of the Ontario Power Authority, the developer and manager of the Standard Offer Program. "But I am most pleased by the number, scope and provincewide geography of the projects - it demonstrates that Ontarians are truly engaged in our electricity future."

Today's announcement brings to 36 the number of projects awarded under the Standard Offer Program since February. Taken together, these projects will generate 250 megawatts of renewable energy, enough to power more than 55,000 homes.





## Canada's Food Guide: moving the meat from centre stage

Last week you may have read part three of a six-part series on Canada's new Food Guide. This is the fourth article in the series, and it focuses on the Meat and Alternatives food group. For many of us, meat is at the centre of our meal planning. However, according to Canada's Food Guide, a healthy meal is one that puts less emphasis on meat and gives

greater attention to vegetables, fruit, whole-grain foods and meat alternatives such as beans. The new Food Guide provides information on how we can make the most of our meat and alternatives servings.

Meat and alternatives are an important part of healthy eating because they provide essential nutrients including protein, iron, B vitamins, magnesium and zinc. The recommended number of servings of meat and alternatives may be smaller than you think. It ranges from one to three servings each day depending on your age and gender.

Meat and alternatives include cooked fish, shellfish, poultry, lean meat, cooked legumes (beans, peas, and lentils), tofu, eggs, peanut or nut butters and shelled nuts and seeds. One serving of cooked fish, chicken, beef, pork or game meat is 2 ½ ounces (75 grams). This is about ½ cup (125 ml) of meat. Two eggs, 1/4 cup (60 ml) of nuts or seeds, <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup (175 ml) of beans or tofu and two tablespoons (30 ml) of nut butters are all equivalent to one Food Guide serving of meat and alternatives.

Canada's Food Guide suggests eating meat alternatives such as beans, lentils and meat alternatives to your menu can be easy. Try these tips:

-When making a casserole, stew or chili, cut out half of the meat from the recipe and replace it with double the quantity of beans, peas or lentils. -Top your salad with beans, a hard-cooked

egg, or nuts or seeds. -For an easy snack, make your own trail mix by combining your favourite wholegrain cereal with a handful of nuts and

seeds. Eating fish helps reduce the risk of cardiovascular disease. Canada's Food Guide recommends eating at least two servings of fish each week. Char, herring, mackerel, rainbow trout, salmon and sardines are all good choices. Deepfried fish or fast-food fish sandwiches do not

cardiovascular benefits as baked, poached or broiled fish.

When you eat meat, select lean meat prepared with little or no added fat or salt. Lean or extra lean cuts of meat include inside round roast, outside round roast, eye of round steak or roast, and lean and extra lean ground meat or ground poultry. To reduce added fat, bake, broil, poach or roast vour meat instead of frying or deep-frying it. Allow the fat to drip off the meat once it is cooked. Instead of deli and luncheon meats such as ham, hot dogs and salami, which are

tofu often. Adding provide the same higher in salt, try lean roast beef, turkey or chicken.

> To help you balance your dinner plate according to Food Guide recommendations, try the easy- to-use "Quick Check for a Healthy Meal". Visually divide vour dinner plate and fill half the plate with vegetables, one quarter with grain products and one quarter with meat and alternatives. This quick check can help you enjoy meat and alternatives even if they aren't "centre stage" on your plate.



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
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# Moments from the past



Here is a photo of the first diesel locomotive to come through Chapleau in early December of 1951. It was about 11:30 a.m. on a cold grey early December day. My brother Noel and I positioned ourselves on the upper east slope of the bridge where we could look over the scene below the railing and took our photos from there. Several of the spectators can be identified on the photograph.

We processed the film after lunch and had prints available later that day. One of our friends, Murray Hazen, helped us with a water pump we were using to supply our print washer.. .perhaps Murray can still recall that day. The event captured in the photo was a historic event followed shortly after by the building of the diesel shops and the gradual transformation and downsizing of Chapleau's railroad infrastructure.

Your March 31st edition was very interesting with Mr. McLeod's letter plus the historic photos of old Chapleau. The photo of the 1948 forest fire was only one of a series that my brother Noel and I photographed on a beautiful Sunday afternoon. We processed the film and posted a display downtown in hopes of attracting sales. And it certainly did...we sold dozens of sets. We had one scene photographed at the CPR station with the ominous bellowing cloud dominating the sky over the "Chapleau" station board. We sent it to the Toronto Star and it appeared on their front page a few days later...their cheque followed later.

It appears that you may be lacking a nice photo of the old convent taken prior to its destruction so I am sending you one taken from my company archives. My father, Alexandre, was the general contractor for its construction in 1928 and he often commented on its sturdy construction. Unfortunately, though it was still a solid building it lacked modern essentials such as elevators and modern wiring.





## **OPP** inspects more than 1 million vehicles in province-wide seatbelt campaign

Provincial Police (OPP) made more than 1 million seatbelt and child seat checks province-wide during the two-week annual spring seatbelt campaign, which ran April 16-30.

The OPP carried out 1,110,144 inspections, up from 802,947 during the 2006 campaign. They laid 13.367 charges for non-compliance in 2007, compared to 9,194 last year. During the campaign in 2007,

collisions. Of the 11 collisions where seatbelts were available to occupants, occupants were not wearing a seat belt. Of the 17 victims, 35 per cent were not buckled

"Officers did an outstanding job throughout the campaign," OPP Commissioner Julian Fantino said. "I appreciate their efforts to protect the people of Ontario. While it's

there were 18 fatal encouraging to see that regularly assigned to more than 90 per cent of motorists comply with the law, it's distressing to see that a 36 per cent of the time small minority still doesn't get the message. A disproportionate number of people not buckled up continue to die in collisions. Many of those deaths could have, and should have, been prevented."

> Under the OPP's new Provincial Traffic Safety Program, traffic safety and enforcement is the job of the more than 5,000 uniform officers, not just those

traffic enforcement, Fantino added.

"The national Road Safety Vision 2010 target of a 30 per cent reduction in roadway fatalities could be achieved through 100 per cent compliance," Chief Superintendent Bill Grodzinski, Commander of the Highway Safety Division said. "Traffic safety is our core business. We monitored the inspection statistics daily during the campaign and concentrated on the

areas of the province where we felt we could be most effective in changing motorists' driving habits.

"However, motorists shouldn't think that just because the campaign is over that they're safe from inspections. We will continue our proactive approach of education, enforcement and the use of media to ensure seatbelt use provincewide."

During vehicle stops, the OPP found

more than just noncompliance with seatbelt and child seat use. In one inspection in the Greater Toronto Area, officers doing a routine inspection discovered two loaded handguns in a vehicle.

The fine for not wearing a seatbelt is \$110 and two demerit points for drivers. The OPP and Ministry of Transportation jointly participated in the province-wide Seatbelt Safety campaign.


