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# Revamping of committees a positive step forward

**D**espite the recent focus on the ill-judged actions of certain councillors, it is also important to recognize the legitimate and honest progression that has been made by our local administration.

Recently, a revitalization process has benefitted several committees, including the Leisure Services and Culture Committee. The new-look committee is now comprised of a group of local volunteers, with a representative council member acting as an

advisor. The members of the committee include: Michael Levesque (Chair), Councillor Lisi Crichton-Bernier (advisor), Richard Beaudoin, Michael Fortin, Pamela Morin, and Giselle Noel; Kevin Morris is the recording secretary.

The new committee is already hard at work establishing a sound plan of action, looking to address various issues and improve upon what seems to be neglected areas in the recreation department. Furthermore they will also listen to and help

resolve any concerns brought forth by groups and facility users. Cases will be dealt with on a case by case basis and problems will be resolved appropriately.

Priorities for the Leisure Services and Culture Committee include expanding current committee activities to such things as leisure programs, special events, the waterfront, park planning, the museum, and the promotion of our heritage. Health and Safety issues at the arena facilities and our local parks will also be a main priority. Some of the shortcomings

were rectified at the Vault, and other pending deficiencies will be dealt with expediently. There are also plans to introduce surveys to identify needs for recreation and leisure activities, while also establishing better communications with service clubs and other leisure providers.

"Too often people are quick to tell you that something can't be done, that you'll fail, that nothing ever changes. What a shameful legacy to leave our children and grandchildren. I believe, firmly, that all you need is a few good

ideas with a group of committed people willing to put in a lot of work and things will turn to the good" said Michael Levesque, Chair of the Committee, in an interview with the Chapleau Express.

"Spirits are high and good results will certainly be attained" he adds.

Success is inevitable when committees such as these, with no hidden agendas, are formed with willing volunteers to honestly represent the will and best interest of local taxpayers. The recogni-

nition of volunteers, which was part of the 1988 Recreation Master plan, needs to be revisited. Our community benefits greatly from the many volunteers willing to donate their time and effort, and they deserve some acknowledgement.

It is good to see that our community's collective interest in participating in the local democracy is being renewed. In the wise words of Abraham Lincoln, a "...Government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the Earth."

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## LE POINT DE VUE DE L'ÉDITEUR

Les derniers mois se sont avérés plutôt pénibles au plan politique, autant sur la scène locale qu'internationale. La tournure de ces événements nous fait réaliser, y compris moi-même, comment l'abus de pouvoir peut s'infiltre lorsque des particuliers dénoués de scrupules saisissent le pouvoir selon leurs propres idéologies. Comme le dit l'expression, le pouvoir absolu corrompt absolument.

Hosni Mubarak, simple soldat au début de sa carrière gagnant un salaire de \$5000 US par année, est passé de

vice-président à la présidence de l'Egypte en 1981. Il a gouverné son pays pendant 30 ans sous un édit d'état d'urgence, entraînant suspension des droits constitutionnels, censure et emprisonnement sans motif de ses concitoyens, pendant que lui et sa famille s'enrichissaient à raison de \$70 milliards. Enfin il n'a pas dû être surpris de voir « son peuple » se révolter.

Muammar Gaddafi a été chef de la Libye depuis un coup d'état survenu en 1969. Comme numéro un d'un pays possédant les plus vastes réserves de pétrole en Afrique, il n'est pas surprenant qu'il se soit, lui aussi, amassé une énorme fortune. À l'heure actuelle la Libye est

aux prises avec sa propre révolution en vue de renverser le régime de Gaddafi. Même si la Libye est devenue un important partenaire commercial parmi plusieurs pays, la brutalité avec laquelle Gaddafi a répondu aux protestations récentes devrait nous faire réaliser que son régime est non seulement corrompu et oppressif mais a été lié au terrorisme à plus d'une reprise.

Comparer le Canada à la situation qui existe dans ces pays est non seulement mal à propos, mais un affront à tous ceux qui ont sacrifié leur vie au profit de ce pays. Cependant, s'il fallait citer un exemple d'activités louche près de chez nous,regar-

dons la commission Ontario Energy Board. Selon un jugement de la Cour Suprême du Canada, Hydro One a écoper une amende de \$18 millions pour avoir imposé des taux d'intérêt trop exorbitants pour les factures en souffrance. La Ontario Board of Energy décida pour sa part de permettre à Hydro One de récupérer sa perte de revenus en imposant un tarif sur sa clientèle. Pourquoi revient-il à nous de payer pour les gaffes d'une société dont la présidente/directrice générale (Laura Formusa) soutirait un salaire de presque \$1 millions en 2009? Même si ces comparaisons semblent disproportionnées, il n'en reste pas moins que la corruption et l'injustice existent partout dans le monde, du moins à tous les paliers gouvernementaux. Que ce soit au niveau municipal, provincial, ou fédéral, la leçon à en tirer c'est que cupidité et corruption sont au détriment du peuple, et ne doivent pas être prises à la légère ni tolérées. Ce qui aggrave la situation, c'est de constater le démenti presque total des coupables.

## Lady Minto Hospital in Chapleau described as 'splendid institution' when it opened in 1914 also served communities between Sudbury and Fort William along CPR line

After the Lady Minto Hospital was opened on April 18, 1914 to serve the needs of Chapleau and communities along the Canadian Pacific Railway, it was described as a "splendid institution" in a Chapleau Headlight editorial.

"The citizens of Chapleau feel they have a right to be proud of their public institutions, and a visit to the hospital will convince anyone that they are not being over egoistical" the editorial said. It is a "splendid institution". Construction began in August 1913.

When it opened, Lady Minto Hospital was the only hospital between Sudbury and Fort William, now Thunder Bay. In those days Chapleau was primarily a railroad town with lumber operations also opening up along the CPR line. There were many serious injuries and the need for a hospital between the two larger communities became apparent. Dr. J.J. Sheahan, who arrived in 1907 was one of the prime movers behind getting a hospital at Chapleau. J.J. Scully, then the CPR superintendent at North Bay agreed and Chapleau got the hospital.

The funds for construction were

raised through a public subscription campaign with the CPR being the largest donor with \$5,000, followed by the Victorian Order of Nurses with \$3,000, with the latter assuming responsibility for the hospital with a local board.

The hospital had four private and two semi-private wards as well as women's and men's public wards with 20 beds in each at normal capacity. The Headlight reported that it had up-to-date operating and sterilizing rooms, and baths, lavatories and overall "in every way a modern and up-to-date institution."

The furnishings were described as the best "giving the whole institution an appearance that would be difficult to excel.

"There are no doubt many larger hospitals than the Lady Minto at Chapleau but we believe it will be hard to find any more complete and up-to-date in every detail and appointment."

By 1914, Chapleau citizens were justifiably proud of the progress in the community. Led by G.B. Nicholson, the first reeve from 1901 to 1913, who was also secretary of the first hospital board, the new Town Hall was also opened in 1914, and

Chapleau was a busy place.

The first president of the hospital board was Dr. J.J. Sheahan, who practised medicine in Chapleau until his death in 1942.

Fast forward to about 1950, and the hospital board realized it was time for renovations. At the annual meeting of 1952, Charles W. Collins, the chair of the board and D.O. Payette, secretary, presented plans which would also include a nurses' residence.

Mr. Collins urged the board members to go on record as supporting the project "100 percent" which they did.

By 1955 the renovations including the nurses' residence had been completed. The sun parlours on the east and west ends of the hospital located on Elm Street, across from Queen Street (I just realized that not all readers would know

where the Lady Minto Hospital was located). were enclosed and the space provided turned into wards.

Of all the improvements perhaps the most important was an elevator that became a reality through a generous gift from the W.E. Mason Foundation. Mr. Mason was a great supporter of Northern Ontario and founder of the Sudbury Star newspaper.

The kitchen had been moved to the basement with all new equipment described

as 'the last word in cooking convenience for large scale service. Miss Sophie Herner had donated a spacious dining room for the nurses, which doubled as a room for hospital board meetings. Lab technician Sigvard Pearson had a new "bright room well stocked with testing materials and equipment."

Arthur J. Grout, the chair of the board estimated the total cost of the renovations at \$315,000.

By this time, Dr. G.E. Young was

chief of the medical staff, while Mrs. S. Crozier was director of nursing.

In the early 1970s, planning started for the replacement of Lady Minto Hospital and that is a story for another day!. My sincere thanks to Anne (Zufelt) McGoldrick and Doug Greig for their tremendous assistance in researching the history of Lady Minto Hospital. Any errors are mine. A belated Happy St. Patrick's Day. 





# Pour certains conseillers les bénéfices économiques pour notre collectivité ne sont pas une priorité

À deux reprises depuis le dernier mois, le conseil municipal a rejeté des propositions qui auraient avantageé économiquement notre communauté, portant atteinte à notre relance économique.

La première proposition concernait un tournoi de hockey Bantam. Une activité qui aurait sans doute promu l'économie de la région a été supprimée parce qu'il aurait fallu remettre la fermeture de la patinoire de l'arena à une semaine plus tard; je répète, une simple semaine. Ce manque de prévoyance de la part du conseil est pour le moins dire, déconcertant.

Faisons le calcul. En principe, devenir ville hôte d'un tournoi à cinq équipes (sans compter la nôtre) apporterait chez nous une centaine de joueurs, leurs équipes d'entraîneurs et jusqu'à 176 membres de familles. En terme d'hébergement cela se traduit par 70 chambres d'hôtel pendant deux nuits (ce qui équivaut à 140

chambres). À raison de \$69.00 la chambre, cela représente \$9600.00 au profit des hôteliers.

Et que dire des repas? On peut évaluer le nombre de repas servis au cours de la fin de semaine à 1656. Si l'on calcule qu'un repas moyen vaut \$10.00, le total des recettes pourrait dépasser \$19,872.00.

Que dire des coûts de déplacement? Tout comme nos athlètes ont besoin de se ravitailler, la même chose s'applique à nos véhicules. Comptenu du volume de déplacements associés à un tournoi de hockey, nous aurions pu nous attendre à des dépenses de l'ordre de \$7000.00 à nos postes d'essence.

Tous comptes faits, les pertes économiques en raison de l'annulation de cet événement se chiffrent à \$36,535.

La solution de rechange consistait d'organiser le tournoi conjointement avec un tournoi Midget qui devait avoir lieu en fin mars et qui s'avérait impossible en matière de logistique.

Le deuxième

événement qui avait été proposé se rapportait à une course de motoneiges organisée par le club Chapleau Arctic Watershed Snowmobile Club et qui devait se dérouler pendant le carnaval. On a refusé au club le don annuel de \$1000.00 qu'il lui fallait aux fins d'assurance et de services paramédicaux.

Dans le passé,

cette activité très populaire attirait au-delà d'une centaine de participants de partout du nord de l'Ontario. L'évaluation des pertes encourues est difficile à estimer, vue l'absence de familiarité avec cet événement.

Cependant, les pertes économiques sont indéniables.

Au-delà des pertes économiques, notre collectivité s'est privée de quelque

chose d'encore plus important: l'occasion de briller comme "Ville la plus accueillante du Nord". Bien au contraire, il se peut que notre réputation en ait été ternie.

Comme représentants des contribuables, les conseillers municipaux se doivent d'être

au service de la collectivité et mettre de côté leurs intérêts personnels. Les

citoyens de Chapleau ne toléreront pas les conflits d'intérêt ni le népotisme. Comme pour toute municipalité, la nôtre devra affronter plusieurs défis qui nécessiteront un leadership courageux et fort et rien de moins.

N'oublions pas, c'est à eux que nous avons remis le pouvoir d'améliorer l'avenir de notre collectivité.



# Building Forest Professionals for the Future

## The NSFC Sponsors Chapleau High School's Envirothon Team



The Northeast Superior Forest Community (NSFC) acknowledges that the youth in our region are our future. It is important to provide our local youth with educational opportunities at an early age to help ensure students begin to develop a deep understanding of the many uses of our forests. As the organization grows and continues to develop new opportunities, the NSFC hopes that these students will grow with them, becoming increasingly interested in innovative uses for the forest.

This year, as

part of the NSFC's education program objectives, the organization is sponsoring the Chapleau High School (CHS) Envirothon team as a pilot project. The Ontario Envirothon is an opportunity for high school students to take what they learn at school and through their own research and apply their skills in an outdoor setting with like-minded peers, to interact with nature directly. The Envirothon involves a competition that tests each team's environmental smarts, and provides students with an opportunity to build friendships

while learning about and exploring the natural environment.

Through sponsoring the CHS team, the NSFC hopes to spark an interest in Envirothon that can be expanded to other schools in the Northeast Superior region. Becky Hodgson, the NSFC's Education Coordinator says "ideally, the NSFC will generate enough interest in the program to create our own region for Envirothon competition purposes within the schools and communities of the Northeast Superior region".

As part of the Envirothon team, the CHS students will participate in a fun field testing competition, take part in outdoor workshops, find solutions to environmental problems, gain exposure to career opportunities, and discover ways to improve the environment. The environmental areas that students are responsible for learning about are: soils, aquatics, wildlife, forestry, and an annual current issue. This year's current issue is "salt and freshwater estuaries". The CHS

Envirothon team meets twice per week to learn and study together.

On March 3rd, the CHS team attended an Algoma Region Envirothon Forestry & Wildlife Workshop Day held in Sault Ste. Marie. In the morning, the students took part in two educational workshops: a tree identification workshop led by Matt Kendrick, and a forest field equipment and forest management plan writing workshop led by Laurie Thompson, both of the Sault's MNR, Forests Division. In the afternoon, the group participated in four wildlife focused workshops led by second year Fish and Wildlife students from Sault College.

The topics of these workshops were: Nocturnal Creatures, Animal Tracks & Signs, The Four Ungulate Species (deer, elk, moose, and caribou), and Invertebrates. The team had a great day, and are looking forward to more opportunities to build on their skills before competition day.

In mid April, Chapleau High School will match their skills against W.C Eaket Secondary School (Blind River), Central Algoma Secondary School (Desbarats), Korah Collegiate & Vocational School (Sault Ste. Marie) and Superior Heights Collegiate & Vocational School (Sault Ste. Marie) at the Algoma regional

competition. The winning team from the regional competition will then advance to the Ontario Envirothon provincial competition to be held at the Tim Horton Onondaga Farms in St. George Ontario in early May. The winning team from the provincial competition will represent our province at the North American Canon Envirothon competition to be held in New Brunswick during July.

## JOURNÉES MONDIALES OU INTERNATIONALES

Il y a plusieurs journées soit mondiales ou internationales qui auront lieu durant les prochaines semaines dont celles-ci:

### Journée internationale de la francophonie

La date du 20 mars a été retenue en commémoration de la signature du Traité portant sur la création de l'Agence de Coopération Culturelle et Technique (ACCT) à Niamey (Niger) en 1970, première institution intergouvernementale de la Francophonie devenue l'Agence intergouvernementale de la Francophonie (AIF) en 1998.

### Journée internationale des forêts

C'est vers la fin des années 1970 que la FAO (une Organisation des Nations unies pour l'Agriculture et l'Alimentation) institua le 21 mars Journée internationale de la Forêt afin de promouvoir l'importance des différentes fonctions des écosystèmes forestiers du monde.

### Journée mondiale de la poésie

L'objectif de cette journée, 21 mars, est d'encourager la lecture, la rédaction, la publication et l'enseignement de la poésie dans le monde entier et de « donner une reconnaissance et une impulsion nouvelles aux mouvements poétiques nationaux, régionaux et internationaux ».

### Journée mondiale de l'eau

En 1992, l'Assemblée générale des Nations Unies a adopté une résolution qui déclara le 22 mars de chaque année « Journée mondiale de l'eau ». Cette résolution invitait les États à

concrétiser des actions telles que la sensibilisation du public liée à la conservation et au développement des ressources en eau et à la mise en œuvre des recommandations d'Action 21.

### Journée mondiale de la météorologie

Cette journée commémore l'entrée en vigueur, le 23 mars 1950, de la Convention qui a institué l'Organisation météorologique mondiale (OMM), sous le thème « Le temps, le climat, l'eau et le développement durable ». La création de l'OMM a contribué au progrès rapide des sciences météo-climatiques, des technologies connexes et de la coopération internationale. Cette évolution s'est vite traduit par la mise en place de systèmes opérationnels d'envergure mondiale pour la protection des personnes et des biens et l'atténuation des effets des catastrophes naturelles, ainsi que par la mise en œuvre de toute une série d'activités socio-économiques menées au profit d'un développement durable défini comme le développement qui satisfait les besoins du présent sans compromettre la capacité des générations futures de satisfaire leurs.

### Journée mondiale du théâtre

C'est à Vienne en 1961 au cours du 9e Congrès mondial de l'Institut International du Théâtre que sur la proposition de Arvi Kivimaa faite au nom du Centre finlandais a été créée une Journée mondiale du Théâtre. Depuis 1962, chaque année, le 27 mars (date de

l'ouverture de la saison 1962 du Théâtre des Nations à Paris) la Journée mondiale du Théâtre est célébrée par les Centres Nationaux de l'IIT qui existent actuellement dans une centaine de pays du monde ainsi que par d'autres membres de la communauté théâtrale internationale.


**Journée mondiale de la santé**  
Cette journée commémore la fondation de l'Organisation mondiale de la santé (OMS). Elle donne l'occasion d'attirer l'attention sur des questions importantes de santé publique. Le thème de cette année est la sécurité sanitaire internationale. Le 11 avril, date anniversaire de la naissance de James Parkinson, est devenu, depuis 1997, la Journée mondiale du Parkinson. C'est en 1997 que la journée devient mondiale.

## MNR and Liberals Ignore Northern Concerns

In Northern Ontario in recent years there has been a public outcry concerning public access to crown land. Basically the citizens of Northern Ontario are concerned that they are losing traditional access to much of Ontario's publicly owned backcountry because of the MNR's efforts to create remote based tourism opportunities. The Ontario Outdoor Recreational Alliance (OntORA) is a group of concerned citizens who

have banded together to fight what they see as an erosion of their rights to use the back country whether to hunt, fish, hike or pick blueberries.

The MNR and the Liberal politicians in Toronto have been ignoring the groups concerns. OntORA has made a case that crown lands belong to the public and as such access to crown land should not be restricted to wealthy Americans who can afford to stay at the wilderness lodges. OntORA has pointed out examples where local citizens who have had traditional access to crown land for fishing, hunting, hiking, snowmobiling etc have had access denied to them. Just to clarify the point for our inept present Minister of the MNR...this does not mean access to a park but access to crown land (land that belongs to all the citizens of Ontario).

As part of the process of fighting for

equitable and fair access to crown land the OntORA group uncovered information that showed the MNR did not have the legal authority to gate roads, block access or fine citizens for trespass on crown land.

Allegations also surfaced that certain MNR employees had benefited from access restrictions and established hunt camps on crown land. The MNR is supposed to be governed by conflict of interest legislation.

Like us guys in Temagami the OntORA group took their concerns to the Ombudsman and received no satisfaction. They lobbied local politicians and had the issue brought up in the Legislature only to be shuffled aside. They asked for a meeting to try and find an equitable solution and were denied.

They finally hired a high profile lawyer from Toronto. When word got out they were contacted by a local Liberal MPP and promised a meeting... time went on... no meeting. They contacted the MPP to find the meeting had been cancelled. The Liberal

government of Ontario had passed bill 68, The Open For Business Act 2010. Hidden in the document were amendments to legislation legalizing the actions of the MNR to restrict access to crown land.

Apparently Minister Jeffrey and MPP Orazietti did finally meet with the OntORA executive on January 28th when they visited The Sault to announce the flight-training center. They would not discuss any of the concern brought up by the OntORA group... offering OntORA the opportunity to be involved in the Wawa CLUAH project. The members of the OntORA Board voted the offer down, as they question the legality of the CLUAH group and partnering with the MNR would jeopardize their right to

pursue legal action against the MNR.

The OntORA group has brought forward several concerns about how the MNR has done things that are important to the citizens of Northern Ontario. As a citizen of Ontario I resent the fact that a government elected to serve the people and a branch of the public service hired to serve the people of this province could so blatantly disregard the concerns of the citizens they are supposed to serve. I recall a newly elected McGuinty promising once upon a time that his government would be open and more democratic. Integrity is not a quality that can be attributed to the MNR or the McGuinty Liberals.



### The info

Thousands of people in Ontario suffer from food-borne illness each year. Most food-borne illness is caused by bacteria you cannot see, smell, or taste. Keeping your kitchen **clean and sanitized** will help prevent you and your family from getting sick.



Remember to **always wash your hands** for at least 20 seconds with soap and warm water before and after preparing different food tasks.

### Smart tips

- ! Bacteria can live in kitchen towels, sponges, and clothes. Wash these often and throw away sponges.
- ! Sanitize cutting boards and utensils by submerging them in a bleach solution of ½ teaspoon bleach per 4 cups of water (2.5 ml per litre of water) for at least 45 seconds. Sanitize countertops, sinks, and appliances with a bleach solution of 1 teaspoon bleach per 4 cups of water (5 ml per litre of water).

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
