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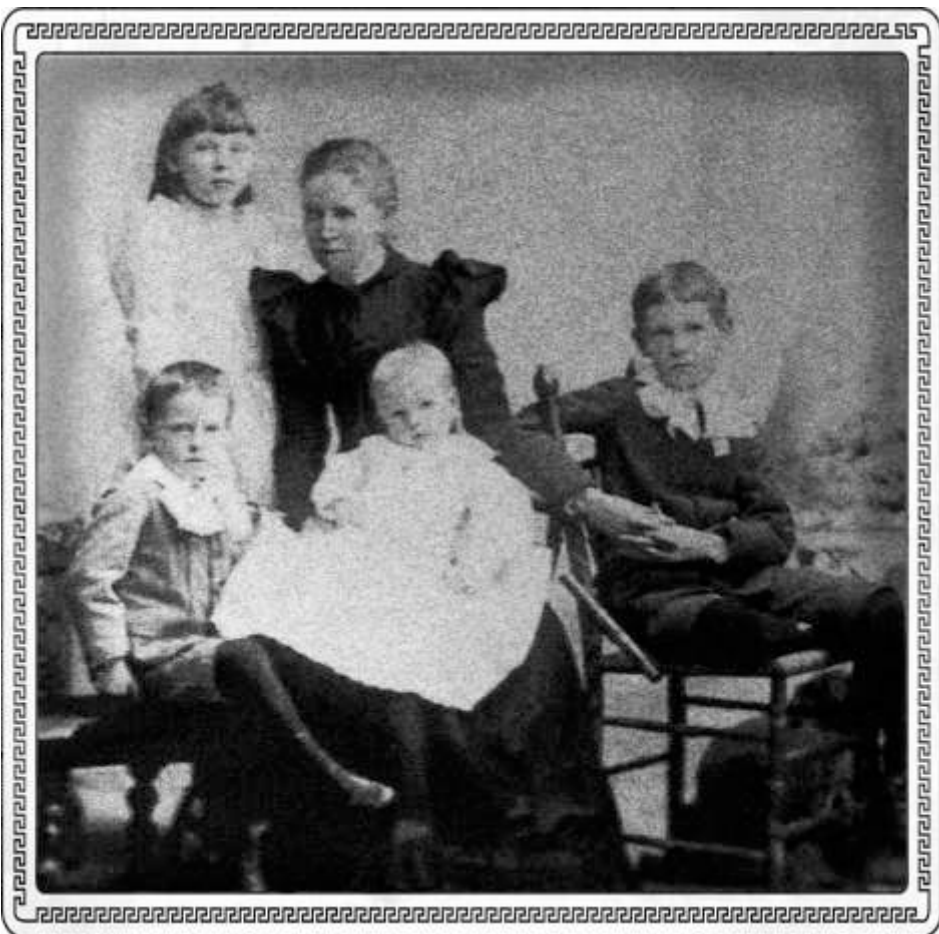


Chapleau's Saddest Day



Under the names is the mind-numbing inscription, "Died by fire, Mar. 19, 1895."







Thanks to the tireless research of Joanne Laughland and the generous co-operation of Claudia Dollard of Quebec City, it is now possible to recover much of the story of the nightmarish fire that struck the ten-year-old village of Chapleau, over a century ago. Claudia is the grand-daughter of John Dollard, one of two children who survived that fire.

This coming Monday will mark the 117th anniversary of the saddest day in Chapleau's history.

As a reminder, there stands in the south-east quarter of the Old Roman Catholic Cemetery a modest grey headstone with the family name, DOLLARD, engraved across the top. Beneath are listed the names and ages of three of the five children of Patrick Dollard, locomotive fitter, and his wife, Ellen. These three youngsters were "Gertrude A., aged 12 yrs, Michael D., aged 7 yrs, James A., aged 3

In 1895, the Dollards and their children shared a two-story wooden duplex with Alfred and Matilda Baker and their two small children. The building was owned by Murray & Company.

It was the night of Tuesday, March 19, 1895, the day after Patrick Dollard had his 40th birthday. Darkness had fallen on Chapleau and, up on the second floor, the younger Dollard children were asleep and the older ones may have been preparing for bed. It was just after 9 p.m. when a lamp, spilling kerosene or oil, rolled down the wooden stairs. Almost

instantly the stairway was in flames. Upstairs, the five children were quickly separated by a wall of fire from their horrified parents downstairs.

Patrick Dollard raced upstairs through the smoke and flames. As the father gathered up his 13-month old son, William Emmett, he shouted to rouse his other four children, and rushed back down the flaming stairs with the toddler in his arms.

Patrick was badly burned about the face and hands but William was safe. When Patrick turned to save the children still on the upper floor, the inferno consuming the stairwell made any attempt at more rescues impossible.

What then happened upstairs will never be known. Three newspaper accounts from the time provide varying accounts. Most of the witnesses to that

night's events on the second floor died. One survivor, Johnny, aged 11, jumped out a window and was so badly burned that onlookers felt that he would not live. Given the smoke, the fire, the terror of the moment, and the pain that followed, one doubts that Johnny had any coherent memory of what happened to his siblings and could not therefore bear witness. 

Jack Shoup named Chapleau Winter Carnival king and Rita Morin won queen contest in 1960 with 'spontaneous jollification' popular at midnight in 1939

Chapleau Moments

J.M. 'Jack' Shoup was honoured by being named King of the annual Chapleau Winter Carnival in 1960, two years after he retired as principal and Grade 8 teacher at Chapleau Public School after about 30 years there.

Active in community affairs, Mr. Shoup also served in Canada's armed forces in World War I and World War II, and as president of the Chapleau branch of the Royal Canadian Legion and in other executive positions over the years. He also has the distinction to this day of having served on the township council for 16 years -- all one year terms - which gives him the record for longest serving councillor since 1901 when the municipality was incorporated.

Well known for organizing children's

races and parade for July 1 and Beach Day celebrations and skating races at the winter carnival, Mr. Shoup did not have to do double duty the year he was King of the Carnival: Foy Wright, his successor as public school principal had taken over responsibility for the skating races.

Mr. Shoup was also a founding member of the Chapleau Rotary Club in 1960, chairman of the Chapleau Recreation Committee for many years, and active in Trinity United Church. In the summer months he was an umpire for the highly competitive Chapleau Fastball League -- a distinction he shared at one time with Vince Crichton and Bunt Burrows.

Buddy Swanson also noted in his stories on the Chapleau Junior "B" Huskies that Mr. Shoup

was among the earliest supporters to found the team in 1966-67.

Rita Morin, the Chapleau High School contestant for Winter Carnival Queen emerged the winner in 1960, while the others in the contest were Paulette Pilon, Raija Saari and Colette Gilbert.

A news report on the carnival said that it attracted one of the largest crowds in years with people coming from many parts of the district to enjoy the parades, music, games, hockey, skiing and other entertainment.

Symbolically, the carnival parade in the early years of the winter carnival, started at the CPR station, where everyone arrived, and headed over the old horsehoe bridge to the ice palace located either across from the arena (the "old old" or the "old") on Lorne Street or across from the old pool room and liquor store in the downtown area.

Times sure have changed. When the first carnival was held in 1937, people came from "up and

down" the CPR line --- from Biscotasing in the east to Franz in the west -- to enjoy and to participate in the activities. All they had to do was hop on one of the passenger trains and come to town.

As winter hopefully is drawing to a close, I have been reading newspaper clippings and looking at photos from Chapleau's early winter carnivals sent to me by Doug Greig. So I started with Mr. Shoup as carnival king and Rita Morin as queen in 1960 and went back to 1937. Here are some of the discoveries I made about carnivals past. They sure seemed to have a great time, even during the depression.

The idea for a Chapleau winter carnival was apparently first discussed in the office of D.O. Payette, an early Chapleau citizen, with his business partner Arthur Grout taking the more public role in getting it off the ground. For those of us who remember Mr. Grout, he was

indeed the person to promote the carnival.

Winona McAdam was the first winter carnival queen and Fred Depew was king in 1937. Mr Depew was manager of the Chapleau YMCA, which was also conveniently located from the arena, and could be described as Chapleau's best "hotel" in those early years.

In 1938, it seems like the Sudbury Star must have assigned its fashion writer to cover the carnival as the news reports emphasized "dressing for beauty and warmth" and the winners of

"sartorial honours" in the snow parade. Eric Young, the brother of Dr. G.E. Young and Dr. Bill Young, with Marguerite Hartley won the prize for best dressed couple in the parade.

Here is an excerpt from another piece: "What the well dressed feminine skier is wearing for northern sports was certainly on display at last week's winter carnival in Chapleau when the lovely ladies turned out by the hundreds dressed both for beauty and comfort and displaying

was busy saving the baby of the family and spent little time on the upper floor. The details in the printed reports of what happened upstairs necessarily owe much to the writers' imaginations.

Mrs. Ellen (née Kelly) Dollard watched helplessly and despairingly from the street as her children, home, and possessions perished in flames.

The Baker family all escaped with their lives but their home and most of their possessions were ashes.

In less than an

hour the duplex was reduced to a pile of "charred embers". The reel and hoses from the C.P.R. shops, once they arrived on the scene, could not save the house but managed to extinguish the flames when they repeatedly attacked nearby commercial buildings owned by T. and W. Murray of North Bay and Patrick Mulligan of Chapleau.

Around 11 p.m., three little bodies, huddled together, were recovered and taken to the Mechanics' Institute, where the remains were placed in a single coffin and carried to

the home of Mr. W. Lowe, C.P.R. conductor.

Mrs. Dollard, crushed by events, "was taken charge of by friendly neighbours who feared for a time that her reason would be permanently deranged". "Unremitting kindness and sympathy such as the Chapleau people know how to bestow" and "the judicious treatment of our resident physician, Dr. McKenzie...placed her out of danger". (According to Dollard family tradition, Mrs. Dollard's hair turned white immediately after the fire.)

The funeral took place on Thursday, March 21, 1895. Businesses closed their doors. "Every one in town" attended. At 4 p.m., the cortege followed the coffin from Mr. Lowe's house to the Catholic Church where the Rev. Father Hamel, S.J., conducted the funeral Mass. As the coffin was carried out of the church, the choir sang "Nearer My God to Thee". The walk to the grave yard was led by the pall bearers, followed by the horse-drawn hearse. Next, wearing their regalia, came members of the two fraternal organizations to which Patrick Dollard belonged, (the Catholic Mutual Benefit Association and the Ancient Order of United Workmen). School children, teachers, and citizens completed the long procession.

A hundred and seventeen years ago, all of Chapleau, a population then

numbering fewer than 700 people -Catholic and Protestant, English-speaking and French-speaking, young and old--gathered at a fresh grave near the Back River to mourn the deaths of a pre-teen girl and her two younger brothers.

To this day, visitors can pay their respects in the Old Catholic Cemetery on Birch Street at the headstone later placed on the grave by "The Chapleau Band", a proud civic organization to which Patrick Dollard had belonged.

Shortly after the funeral, Patrick and Ellen Dollard took their two surviving sons, Johnny, 11 years, and William, 13 months, to seek solace with relatives in Quebec. There Patrick and Ellen produced a final child, a daughter, Catherine Hilda.

Patrick, who had been born in Ireland on March 18, 1855, died in Canada on December 27, 1914, as the world was settling into the Great War. He had outlived his three young children by fewer than twenty years. His widow, Ellen, died in Quebec City, just after Japan's surrender ended World War II. Ellen survived her husband, Patrick, by almost thirty-one years and her son, Johnny, by one year.

Johnny Dollard had four children, the youngest of whom, Francis, was the father of Claudia Dollard, our collaborator. It is said that Johnny had no finger prints and took care never to be seen

shirtless.

The baby, William, as an adult, developed tuberculosis. He never married.

The post-fire baby, Catherine Hilda, did marry.

Back in Chapleau, immediately after the fire, the horrified townspeople gave thought to providing better fire-protection to the village. It seems probable that the formation of the volunteer Chapleau Fire Brigade "some-time about 1895" (according to historian Vince Crichton) may have been one positive result of the ghastly fire of March 19, 1895.

None of the newspaper accounts of the fire address the biggest question of all: what caused the lamp to tumble down those stairs, spreading fire, destruction, and death? Perhaps, at the time, this question was too painful to think about. There is an oral tradition in the Dollard family that the two older children were having a pillow fight and a flying pillow


knocked the fatal lamp down the stairs. It is useful to reflect that, of those present and surviving that night, only two could possibly pass on this information, the father, Patrick and the 11-year-old son, John. At this late date, there will never be a verifiable explanation of what caused that lamp to roll down the stairs.

Post Script

Despite the cooperation of the Municipality of Chapleau, the Parish of Sacré-Cœur, the staff at the Chapleau Public Library, the staff at the Sudbury Public Library, private individuals in the Land Registry Office in Sudbury, such local people as Councillor Doug Greig and Bruce McCarthy and former Chapleauians, Anne McGoldrick, Michael McMullen and Ken Leclair, we have so far failed to identify the location of the house that burned down on March 19, 1895. Any help in identifying this site would be greatly appreciated.

every colour of the rainbow and many others besides." Wow!

The crowning of the carnival queen Marie Perpete was described as a "grand spectacle" at the ice palace on Main Street. Miss Perpete, a teacher at Sacred Heart Roman Catholic Separate School was also active in the Revellers Ski Club and theatrical productions. The carnival king was C.J. McGregor, the CPR superintendent from Schreiber.

In 1939, Reeve George Fife, who ended up having a very "Royal" year, turned over the key to the city to Dan Jessup of Sudbury who was the carnival king. Rita Crichton won the carnival queen contest. Miss Crichton became a pharmacist and later a professor of English at the University of British Columbia after completing a Master's degree in English.

Small world that it is, I met a faculty colleague of Rita's when I was a member of the BC Communications Articulation Committee which approves standards for university courses offered by colleges in British Columbia and are transferable to universities as full credit courses. I represented College of the Rockies on the

committee.

Later in 1939, Mr. Fife would welcome King George VI and Queen Elizabeth to Chapleau when the Royal Train passed through the community at two a.m. No appearance was scheduled but when the reeve requested that he meet them, it was arranged. Robert Fife, now the Ottawa Bureau Chief of CTV News, is Mr. Fife's grandson.

News reports said that 500 visitors were in Chapleau for the carnival as it seemed the Great Depression did not prevent people from coming together and having a good time. A popular place was the toboggan slide located on the site that came to be known as Dr. Young's Hill in later years. The population of Chapleau was about 2800 in 1939.

Another activity at the 1939 carnival that was very popular was midnight serenades and lamp-post singing under the heading of "spontaneous jollification." Groups would get together and sing at various locations in the community. That sounds like such fun, and maybe, just maybe, it might be something some of us might do at the CHS 90th anniversary reunion festival. Just a bit of blue skying an idea but who knows.

We had great fun singing lustily on sleigh rides, way back when in the 1950s.

In 1940, Ina Robinson won the carnival queen contest as Dr. J.J. Sheahan was named carnival king. Ina married Frank Coulter and they raised their family in Chapleau.

Yes, hockey, the carnival parade and all the major activities associated with winter carnival were prominent in the early years, but now you know they also enjoyed "spontaneous jollification" with an emphasis on high fashion. Public Inspection of Annual Work Schedule

The **Sault Ste. Marie Administrative District** of the Ontario **Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR)** has reviewed and approved the **Clergue Forest Management Inc.** April 1, 2012–March 31, 2013 Annual Work Schedule (AWS) for the **Algoma Forest**.

Availability

The AWS will be available for public inspection at the Clergue Forest Management Inc. office in Sault Ste. Marie and the MNR public website at ontario.ca/forestplans beginning **March 14, 2012** and throughout the one-year duration. Ontario Government Information Centres at Sault Ste. Marie, Wawa and Chapleau District, and Blind River Area offices provide access to the Internet.

Scheduled Forest Management Operations

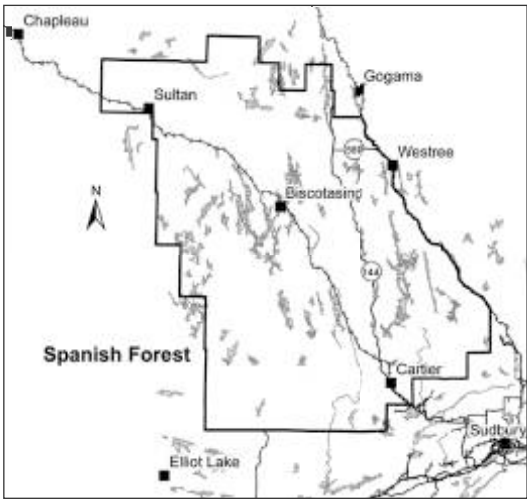
