In the past, The Chapleau Nature Festival has successfully catered to both Canada's official language groups and this year the trend continues.

While the Friday and Saturday stage shows have been filled with two of Canada's most recognizable acts, the Canadian Idol and Jeff Healy, the Festival committee has been able to attract La Bottine Souriante, a group with a reputation as one of the best of its kind in the world for the stage show on Thursday evening.

La Bottine Souriante first appeared on the Quebec music scene in 1976 and is considered to be a living legend of French North American roots music. The group is not just a Québécois/ Canadian musical phenomenon, with its explosive sound it has crossed borders the world over. Its distinctive sound pays homage to tradition with a dash of jazz, salsa and pure folk, while at the same time perfectly representing the symbol of vitality and pride of its mother culture.

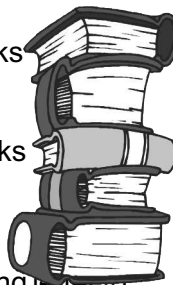
Area lakes and rivers promise to be very popular with anglers, beginning this long weekend.

Whitney, this year, has won once again the most outstanding athlete for her age group at the annual banquet of the Timmins Marlins Swim Club.

Even though she soon will be turning twelve, she already has qualifying times for that age category and will be off to Junior Long Course Provincials in Toronto which will be held July 7-10th. Her swimming season does not end there, as she recently qualified for Club Nationals (competition at the national level)

which will be held in Winnipeg July 21-24th. Reaching this goal is very exciting for Whitney and even though summers are usually spent relaxing, Whitney looks forward to her first national competition. And her next goal?? We'll have to wait and see....

Whitney would like to thank all those who generously sponsored her for swim-a-thons these past years.

Elections were held at this time for vacant positions on the executive. Holding their positions for the second part of their two year term are President Bill Guthrie, Secretary Carla Guthrie, and Treasurer

Ashley Sweeney.

Gary Chambers accepted his nomination for 1st Vice President. The position of Public Relations Representative was accepted by Chantal Dionne and Larry Cachagee accepted his nomination for the Equipment Convener position. The Initiation Program Director position was accepted by Ray Orton. Three positions remain to be filled on the executive.

Although no one has stepped forward to coach the anklebiter or novice divisions, coaching positions were filled for the other four levels.

Open forum township meeting

Business discussed at the open forum meeting on May 10th, 2005 included a request by a resident who would like to install a wood burning boiler in his detached garage to heat his home economically. If the request is approved, the resident offered to work with the township in any way such as chimney height and/or limit burning between certain dates.

A by-law is currently in place

pertaining to this issue. No person shall install or permit to be installed, any solid fuel burning appliance in any building, ...unless that solid fuel burning appliance is wholly contained within the building, ... it is intended to heat.

Council agreed to look at the by-law and may consider changing it. Council mentioned that possibly a pilot study could be done with a higher quality appliance with a fan

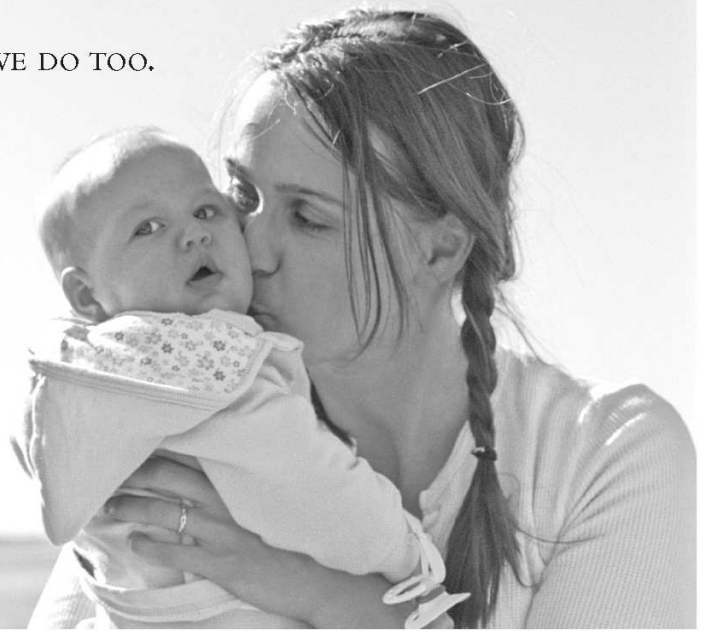
and maybe higher chimneys. It was agreed that with the rising cost of fuel it may be a positive idea.

The Chapleau Education and Training Coalition suggested to council that a meeting be set up with Michael Hill, President of Northern College to brainstorm and gather thoughts regarding enhanced funding to colleges which will enable them to offer services to communities with little access to college

programming.

The idea of Nortel's Wireless Network may be an inviting factor to educational institutions to be involved in our community, as was suggested by the coalition. "Colleges are always interested in "pilot projects" which allow them to promote their research capabilities and access 'development funding'," remarked Mrs. Joan Longchamps in her letter to council.

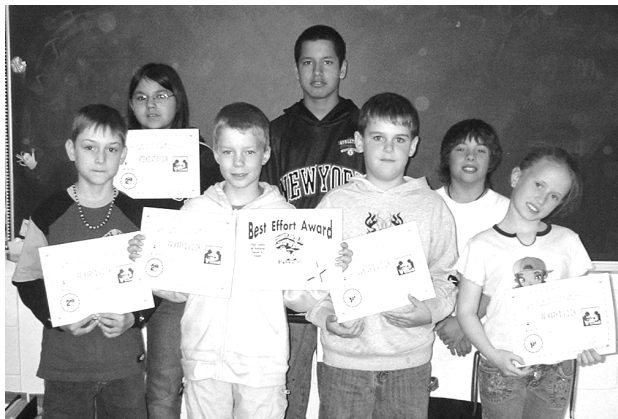

Gardening from the ground up

A rose, by any other name...

Plant names are confusing. The same common name might be used for two very different plants, or one plant might be known by two very different names.

Scientific names are a confusing arrangement of Latinized Greek, or names of people or places.

And then there are cultivar names. Plants in garden centers

might be labelled with all three names, or simply labelled as something like "Pink Perfection".

There is a system to plant names, and once you get the hang of it, it can make things like looking up how to care for your new plants much easier.

The scientific name is usually written in italics. There are two parts to the name (three if it is a subspecies). The first name begins with a capital letter. This is the

generic name; it tells you what genus the plant is in. The generic name is like a surname. There can be many different species in one genus, and many different genera ('genera' is the plural of 'genus') in a family.

The second name has no capital. It is the specific name; it tells you what the species is. Sometimes plants are labelled only with the generic name. They are never labelled with the specific name alone, as the same specific name can be used in many different genera. For example, *Mitchella repens* and *Trifolium repens* share the same specific name, but are not related.

To continue with the example of *Trifolium*

(Clover): We have three species of Clover that are common here. *Trifolium repens*, *T. pratense*, and *T. hybridum* are three species (White, Red, and Alsike) of the genus *Trifolium* (Clover). The genus *Trifolium* is in the Pea family (Leguminosae).

The generic name is also often used as a common name. A Daffodil is often called a *Narcissus*, which is the scientific name of the genus. *Hosta* is also a generic name that is used commonly. A Yellow-Edged *Hosta* is *Hosta fortunei* 'Yellow Edge'.

Whenever you see a name in regular type with " around it, and usually in bold lettering, that is a cultivar name. Cultivar is just a

shortened version of the term "cultivated variety". That means that one *Hosta fortunei* 'Yellow Edge' is exactly the same as another.

The cultivar name, on its own, says nothing about the identity of the plant. Like the specific name, the same name can be used for very different plants.

So, when you read a plant label, and it says something like this: "Golden Ninebark - *Physocarpus opulifolius* 'Dart's Gold'", you will know that the regular lettering is the common name, the italicized names are the scientific names, and that 'Dart's Gold' is the name of that particular cultivated variety.

Knowing this, you can then look up the genus *Physocarpus* in a gardening book, and discover that it prefers acidic soil. Because plants of the same genus



share similar characteristics, care for the different species will be much the same. Different species will be listed under the genus, so if you find *P. opulifolius* in the book, you might read that it is hardy to zone 2, whereas other species of *Physocarpus* need a warmer climate.

Cultivars will be listed under the species. *Populifolius* 'Dart's Gold' is one of many popular cultivars, and is known for its pale golden-green leaves.

So you see, there is a system to all of the names of a plant, and it's not just for the experts. They can help you learn more about the plants in your own garden.

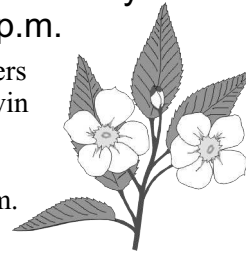

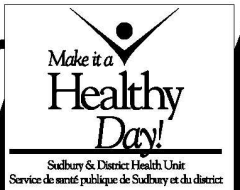
