Chapleau **Moments**

"1181 Chapleau High School Cadet Corps, General Salute, Present Arms," Company Commander Cadet Major Stanley Barty ordered at 1400 hours precisely, the Girls Bugle Band played, and the annual inspection and social event of the school year was underway 53 years ago on May 22, 1957 on the grounds behind the old school on Pine Street.

Following the

Ian Macdonald, who was Second in Command as Cadet Captain and David McMillan, the Company Sergeant Major, kindly shared some of their memories about the Cadet Corps from their time at CHS.

Ian explained that "the Cadet inspection included a drill exhibition by the Precision Squad and a

salute taken by Central Command Area Cadet Officer, Captain H.G.L. Hutton, there was the inspection in line, and the march past followed by the demonstrations. Neil Ritchie was in charge of the precision drill while Bren l.m.g., first aid and rifle were Sergeants Jim Evans, Roger Mizuguchi and

demonstration of how to dismantle and assemble a Bren Gun. CHS had a war surplus Bren Gun with the firing pin removed along with some extra ammunition clips and spare barrel. I think that the rifles that the cadets carried were standard army headed by Cadet Enfields modified for 22 calibre barrels. Target shooting was

part of the Cadet program."

In 1957 Neil Ritchie who headed the precision drill was taking Grade 13 in several annual stages, according to Ian, and "had earned a lot of seniority and was given the rank of Cadet Lieutenant Colonel which was the highest rank possible in Cadets. Usually a Cadet Lieutenant Colonel commanded a battalion rather than four platoons but we moved Neil up because it was the only way that the rest of us could be promoted up the chain of command."

Platoon commanders were Cadet Lieutenants Jim Hong, Lucien Bouillon, Leona Paquette and Naomi Mizuguchi while the bugle band commanders were Margaret Rose Payette and Mary Serre. Gail Leon was drum majorette.

Ian also recalled that CHS Principal George Lemon participated at the 1957 cadet inspection in full army uniform but John McClellan who had retired the year before did not appear uniform although the Cadet Inspection and the Cadet movement was very important to him. Mr. Lemon had served in the Canadian forces in World War II and Mr. McClellan in World War I.

D a v i d McMillan recalled a humorous incident that apparently

occurred while Mr. McClellan was still principal at CHS. "There was a humorous incident that I have tucked away in my memory box that I often look back on and wonder if it was fact or folklore. At any rate, the Corps was out on the ballfield practising the march past, under Mac's watchful eye, in advance of the upcoming Inspection. For whatever reason Mac saw something he didn't like in the routine and took over temporary command with instructions not to deviate from the program until he gave the order.

"What he failed to realize was that the Corps were facing north towards the River when he gave the 'Quick March' order immediately prior to being distracted by someone or something close at hand. By the time he returned his attention to the marchers, (the leaders) had led the troop into the River between two boathouses and up to their waists in water. This was not an isolated incident by any means because I recall ending up behind the Public School on another occasion simply because marching orders were either not heard, understood or simply ignored."

Ian noted that

"male Cadets wore a standard Canadian Army issue style khaki uniform with a woolen tunic and pants, web belt, spats, parade boots and khaki beret. This really wasn't much of a fashion statement so the decision was made to add a bit of panache and provide the cadet officers with white spats, web belt and a white lanyard. I can't recall how we managed to do that but it helped immensely." David added that two things came to mind about the uniforms: "their ability to

create an itchy effect and retain heat on

those hot June days when we were in uniform on a dusty ballfield."

David also remembered that CHS had been designated a Signal Corps and "had a monstrosity of a main transmitter that I believe was referred to as the 4880 and if this is indeed correct, I have no idea as to why this number comes to mind after all these years. At any rate, it was set up inside the High School and groups of cadets would be scattered around the ball field with satellite radios attempting to transmit and receive messages with the base unit which, more often than not, was a futile and frustrating exercise."

Ian pointed out that the Cadet Inspection itself was only one of many official roles that the Corps participated in." Earlier in 1957, we participated in a sporting competition Con'td on P.4

with Terrace Bay High School. We were fully attired in our cadet uniforms and marched from the CPR station in Terrace Bay to their High School gymnasium. I remember being a bit concerned about damaging their slick hardwood floor. The gym floor at home really wasn't worth worrying about."

The CHS band usually led the parade at the Winter Carnival and also marched over to the CPR station when Governor General Vincent

Massey was passing through Chapleau.

The day did not end with the inspection and march around town as it continued as one of the annual major events in Chapleau community life. Activities moved to the Town Hall where the school's commencement, the Cadet banquet and dance were held.

The day's program noted that: "Along with the fine performance of the Cadet Corps, including the smart stepping precision squad, the

colourful bugle band and the various demonstrations, the students have illustrated their artitsic talents through the decorating of the Town Hall and the organizing of the banquet itself."

In 1957, Thane Crozier was master of ceremonies while Stan Barty, the cadet company commander and students council president gave the response to the toast to the Cadet Corps. Bert Lemon's toast to the ladies was responded to by Nancy Honda.

At the commencement, school board member J.G. "Jiggs" Goldstein presented graduation certificates while Leona Paquette presented tabloid sports awards to captains of their respective teams who were Jim Hong, Naomi Mizuguchi, Ronald Morris and Dawn Goldstein.

The day ended with dancing to the music of Connie De Salle and his Orchestra from Sudbury.

The Cadet inspection and ban-

quet were a tradition long established at Chapleau High School bring back inevitable memories. As I wrote this column so many fond memories of my years as a student at CHS returned, and I extend my sincere thanks to Ian Macdonald and David McMillan for taking the time to share their memories from 53 years ago when were members of 1181

Putting Our Wood To Work: A New Model For Forest Tenure

We all know the vital role that the forestry sector plays in Northern Ontario's economy.

I believe that all of us have a role to play in revitalizing this sector. We must make the bold decisions necessary to re-position our province as a global leader.

These important changes include modernizing and improving the tenure and pricing system for the long-term prosperity of our forest sector.

While some improvements and modifications have been made over time, the basic business model remains largely unchanged: that is, large companies holding Sustainable Forest Licences over large forest areas, and paying prices set by the

Province.

What we need is a system that meets the needs of the emerging forest sector. A system that is sensitive to the needs of the communities that rely on forest resources, is more broadly accessible, is more market based, and safeguards Ontario's world-class forest management system. Such a system would also support some of the key recommendations from northerners that have been incorporated into the Proposed Growth Plan for Northern Ontario.

Last August I launched a review of the forest tenure and timber pricing systems.

During those consultations we heard loud and clear that Ontarians want change. We also heard that they want a more active role in the management of their Crown forests.

That feedback has led us to develop a proposed new model for forest tenure in Ontario. There is no doubt that this is a bold move. If implemented, this proposed model would significantly change the way forestry is done in Ontario.

These changes would include establishing Local Forest Management Corporations (LFMCs). These corporations would hold a licence that requires them to manage Crown forests and competitively sell the available Crown timber.

Currently, existing licence holders, usually operating mills, have a broad array of forest management responsibilities, including forest management planning, harvesting, road construction and maintenance, and silviculture.

Under the proposed tenure framework, LFMCs, as the new licence holder, would be required to undertake these responsibilities. This new system would allow mills to put their focus on product innovation and marketing.

We realize that large companies may be concerned about long-term access to wood. In this model LFMCs would be able to provide short-, medium- and long-term contracts for wood supply. We would also put significant measures in place to ease transition to the new system.

Each of these LFMCs would have a board of directors with positions designated for local and Aboriginal community representation.

Decisions haven't yet been made on the size of the area each LFMC will manage. However, the area needs to be large enough for each one to be financially viable, yet small enough to provide for more local and Aboriginal involvement. We anticipate that between five and 15 LFMCs would be established.

We are also seeking to establish a system that is more responsive to market forces by generating greater competition in the pricing and allocation of Crown timber.

Health Unit Reminds Pet Owners To Vaccinate Their Cats And Dogs Against Rabies

May is when we start spending more time outdoors, and chance encounters with neighbourhood pets and wild animals increase. It's also a time when we could come in contact with rabid animals. We should assume that rabies is always present in our wildlife and the possibility of a domestic animal becoming infected cannot be overlooked.

"Cats and dogs in the Sudbury & District Health Unit area must be vaccinated against rabies and have a current certificate of vaccination to protect both you and your family," said Carolyn Legge, an environmental support officer in the Health Unit's Environmental Health Division.

In 2009, in the Health Unit's service area, over 50

per cent of the bites from dogs occurred to children 10 years of age or younger. Sometimes these dogs are strangers, but more often they are family pets or the pets of close relatives or friends. Children can avoid these encounters by following some simple rules when around animals.

Do: 1. Always ask the owner's permission before touching a pet. 2. Always approach pets slowly and carefully. 3. Stay away from strays and wild animals. 4. Stay calm around animals. Don't scream. Stand still.

Don't: 1. Don't make loud noises around pets. 2. Don't bother a pet while it is sleeping or eating. 3. Never tease an animal. 4. Never try to help a hurt animal; get an adult to help.

By teaching your child how

to behave responsibly around animals, you will reduce the chance that your child will be bitten, and you will also enhance the relationship they have with their pet.

In 2009 the Health Unit investigated 260 animal bites or suspect rabid animal contacts. Human contact occurred in all of the cases and resulted in 44 people being vaccinated with postexposure prophylaxis treatment.

Rabies is a virus that is fatal if you are infected and do not receive post-exposure prophylaxis treatment within an acceptable period of time.

If you come in contact with, or are bitten by any animal, immediately wash the wound with soap and water and get medical attention as soon as possible.

For the 2009/2010 academic term, we were pleased to present four students in our community with scholarships. Alicia Doyon, Kelsey Scheer, and Sara Doyle were recipients for Registered Nurse Scholarship and Mélissa Dionne was the recipient for the Registered Practical Nurse Scholarship.

The Purpose of the Program:

This scholarship is intended to: (1) increase the number of Chapleau students/residents enrolled in a one of the identified programs, (2) support those already attending registered practical nurse, registered nurse, occupational therapy and physiotherapy educational programs (3) and encourage students/residents to return to Chapleau to practice their profession. Studies have shown that people from rural and remote towns are most likely to return to practice in those areas. On the basis of these studies, supporting our own citizens will help to ensure that there will always be enough Registered Practical Nurses, Registered Nurses, Occupational Therapists and Physiotherapists to provide a high quality of health care in the community of Chapleau.

Scholarships are for one year only, however students may reapply each year. The amount is based on the student's overall average:

Occupational Therapist / Physiotherapist: \$2,000 - \$4,000 Registered Nurse: \$1,000 - \$2000 Registered Practical Nurse: \$800 - \$1,500

Applicants must meet the following criteria:

- Be a resident of Chapleau for a minimum of 2 years (Students already attending a post-secondary program are still considered Chapleau residents)
- Be accepted in one of the identified programs
- Be committed to live and work in Chapleau after graduating from the
