
Venture into the darkness (NC) - A home's crawlspace is often used for storage and may be a place that homeowners rarely explore. With their low ceilings, minimal light and often cluttered space, venturing into this unchartered territory might be a little scary. Though you may not have any idea what you are storing in your crawlspace it is important to know that air can flow in and out and can affect the overall health of your home.

Crawlspaces are built directly above the ground, which means moisture-laden air rising into the home from the ground below may lead to condensation and possible mould growth. This condensation may cause paint to blister, form stains on drywall ceilings or walls, or even damage your home's structure. An uninsulated crawlspace can also lead to higher energy consumption during the

heating and cooling seasons.



Tobacco displays banned after May 31: Protects children, helps smokers quit

When you go into your local convenience or grocery store after May 31, 2008, you might notice a difference: no more "in-your-face" displays of tobacco products.

Tobacco use is one of the toughest addictions to break. It is the number one cause of preventable death in Ontario, responsible for 36 deaths every day. It costs Ontario an estimated \$1.6 billion in direct health care costs and \$4.4 billion in productivity losses each year. Everything we do to lessen its impact is something worth doing.

As of May 31, 2008, the Smoke-Free Ontario Act prohibits

any display of tobacco necessary step in 31: Out of sight, out of ducted, a compliance hand smoke, help productsincluding cigarettes, cigars, cigarillos; pipe tobacco; and other specialty tobacco products, including chewing tobacco, Snus, and snuff, and most notably what are currently known as tobacco "powerwalls."

"Tobacco manufacturers will no longer be able to use these powerwalls as a way to market to young people and influence smokers especially smokers who are trying to quitto buy on impulse," said Dr. Vera Etches, Sudbury & District Health Unit Acting Medical Officer of Health. "Banning the display of tobacco products is an important and tackling the leading cause of preventable death: tobacco use."

A powerwall is a wall of cigarette packages that is typically behind the counter wherever those products are sold. Not only do these displays cause impulse buying among smokersespecially smokers who are trying to quitthey also lead young people to think that cigarettes are as normal as the candy and milk they buy from the same stores. Research indicates that these walls can make it easier for young people to try smoking and makes it more difficult for smokers to quit.

The Province of Ontario announced the introduction of the display ban with the passage of the Smoke-Free Ontario Act in June 2005. At that time, the government outlined a two-stage process: the first stage imposed restrictions on the display and promotion of tobacco products effective May 31, 2006; the second stage provided for a two-year period before the complete ban came into effect on May 31, 2008.

The tobacco display ban is just the latest step in an ongoing effort by the Sudbury & District Health Unit, in partnership with the province, to protect people from secondsmokers quit and prevent youth from starting.


