Premier Owes Northern Ontario Communities answers On MPAC Assessments

During question period this morning, Norm Miller, Progressive Conservative critic for Northern Development and Mines pressed the Premier for her plan to provide assistance to Northern communities. Specifically for those that are currently being forced to pay huge

amounts in back-taxes due to retroactive recalculations by the Municipal Property Assessment Corporation.

"These Northern communities are facing tough decisions and uncertainty for their citizens; the Premier needs to outline what she plans to do to assist communities who are trying to operate with massive burdens due to MPAC recalculations" said Miller.

"Many of these communities have already appealed the MPAC rulings, and in doing so, have paid out thousands of dollars in legal fees; dollars that should be going to help

improve infrastructure and local services for their citizens" added Miller.

The MPAC recalculations, many of which have costs that run into the millions of dollars, involve mills that have been staples of the small communities and are affecting many towns and municipalities across the North.

In response to the question, the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing has announced, on the record, that she will meet with affected Northern municipalities on Monday, April 29th to address these concerns.

Water treatment costs put small communities in dire straits: NDP

In the legislature today Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Michael Mantha called on Premier Wynne to renew the Ontario Small Waterworks Assistance Program (OSWAP) and ensure smaller communities continue to have access to clean,

affordable water

"The Ontario Small Waterworks Assistance Program was set up to alleviate the costs of water treatment for small communities, but the final wave of funding came in February 2012. Small communities in Algoma-

Manitoulin and across the province are forced to shift the high costs of operating heavily regulated water treatment to the backs of the few users on those systems. This results in increased taxes and a financially unstable water treatment system.

"Small municipalities are facing dire situations as a result of the increasing costs of providing clean water and the disappearance of OSWAP.

"Small municipalities depend on this funding to help alleviate the costs of public drinking water sys-

tems. The community members of Assinack on Manitoulin Island have been notified of a 41% increase in water rates for the coming year, and the township of the North Shore has been facing similar problems for the past ten years."

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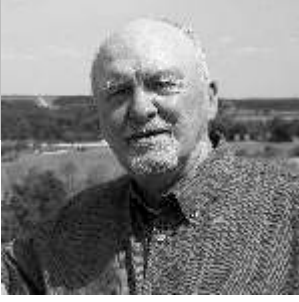

First rough drafts of history started in Chapleau 56 years ago as high school columnist for Mid-North News

Chapleau Moments

Just over a month ago now I started writing a weekly column for the Cranbrook Guardian, a blog published by the Citizens for a Livable Cranbrook Society. Along with Chapleau Moments and my own blog, I also write

features and edit the Uneek Luxury Tours blog which is based in Orlando, Florida. I agreed to write for the Guardian after being asked by so many people why I lived in Cranbrook and wrote about "some place" in Ontario all the time.

After having lived here for almost 24 years I agreed.

Anyway, it struck me that I have been doing and teaching communications, journalism and related things for at least 56 years now, starting with a Chapleau High School column in the long gone Mid-North News in 1957. Shortly after Joy (Evans) Heft joined me.

By late 1958 I was also co-hosting a weekly teen television program on CHAP-TV with Phyllis Chrusoskie and Gary Foran.

Never did I think that all these years later I would still be writing about Chapleau, but it is now coming up on four years since Mario Lafreniere invited me to write for the Chapleau Express. Never did I think when I was a student at CHS that I would spend most of my life as a storyteller working on those first rough drafts of history.

And other than covering the 1968 World Series between Detroit Tigers and St. Louis Cardinals,



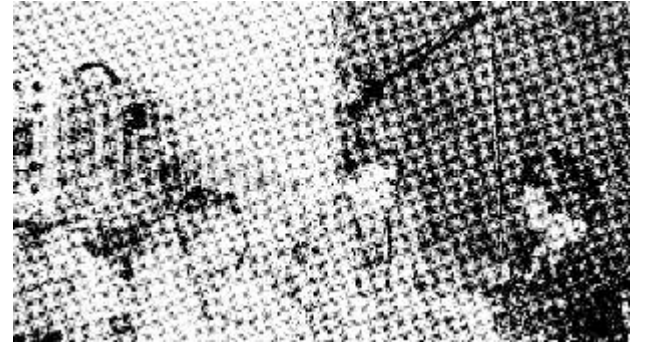

interestingly two of the major stories I covered, occurred in Chapleau.

Robert 'Bob' Fife, now Ottawa Bureau Chief for CTV News, but a "Chapleau boy" contacted me to ask if I would cover a test of the nuclear winter theory that would be conducted near Chapleau in the early 1980s for the United Press news service. The story appeared on the front page of many newspapers in the United States.

The other was an interview with Pierre Trudeau, when he was prime minister of Canada, at the Chapleau CPR station for CBC Television News. Mr. Trudeau was travelling by train across Canada with his sons, one of whom Justin is now leader of the Liberal Party of Canada. In Revelstoke, BC, just down the road from me now, hecklers had thrown eggs at Mr. Trudeau's railway car.

In Chapleau, Walter Broomhead, in a ceremony on the station on the station platform, presented the prime minister with a dozen

eggs. CBC Television News wanted the story. We got it.

Let's go back to Chapleau 1958 for a moment and see some of the happenings at CHS and in the community. And thanks to Doug Greig for sending me some of those columns from the Mid-North News.

The CHS hockey league was underway and the

Redmen and Eskimos met in the season opener at the Chapleau Memorial Arena. In an exciting start to the season, the Redmen won 5-3 -- only one problem. As yet the teams did not have sweaters, and it was difficult to distinguish between the teams. Problem was solved when always generous Chapleau merchants

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A Tax By Any Other Name

Premier Kathleen Wynne and her Liberal government are going to raise taxes. It's just a matter of time.

Ontario's structural deficit is reaching a tipping point. Our public debt will surpass Greece's in a matter of years, our debt-to-GDP ratio is pushing an insurmountable 40 per cent, and servicing the debt is the third largest expense in government.

Ontario cannot keep on going as it has for the past few years. It cannot ignore the deficit and hope it will go away. It will not. Our government has only two choices when it comes to addressing the debt and structural deficit. They can rein in spending. Or they can raise taxes.

Unfortunately, this government is signaling it will be raising taxes.

But you won't

hear Premier Wynne using the words "tax increase." In fact, she goes out of her way to tell journalists that she will not raise taxes. Instead, she uses soft phrases like 'finding new revenue tools' or 'financing our infrastructure deficit.'

Politicians have mastered the art of prying more money out of your pocket without admitting to new taxes. We've all heard expressions like 'raising premiums,' 'closing tax loopholes,' 'reversing a tax cut,' or 'implementing new revenue streams.' It's all just clever spin to disguise massive tax increases.

The popular television show, The Simpsons, even picked up on this in an old episode where future President Lisa created the "temporary refund adjustment program" as a way to hike taxes.

These poll-

tested, carefully-crafted phrases all translate to tax hikes.

Premier Wynne is taking a page from her predecessor's playbook. In 2003, Dalton McGuinty imposed a new health tax, after signing the Taxpayers Protection Pledge promising not to raise taxes.

And she's not wasting any time in doing just that.

Despite a guarantee not to raise taxes during the last election, the Liberals hiked fees on driver's licenses and registration, and starting next week, Ontario will face another tax hike - this one disguised as an "eco-fee." Consumers are being hit with an increased tax on electronics and other recyclable products. Farmers and truckers are being hit especially hard, as the tax on tires is estimated to increase to

\$1,646, the largest eco-fee in the country. The second largest is in BC, where the same set of tires would be hit with \$210 eco-tax.

It doesn't stop there. The Wynne government wants to spend \$50 billion to give Toronto's transit system a much-needed overhaul. They are looking for "revenue tools," to fund this latest pet project, including hikes to payroll tax, property tax, sales tax and gas tax. They've also mentioned imposing a new 'vehicle kilometres travelled' fee, highway tolls, lane tolls, parking space levies, development fees and land capture fees. These "Toronto-only" tax hikes will surely be felt across the entire province.

For a government fraught with spending and waste scandals, that shamelessly pays subway toll collectors over

\$100,000 and happily caves to unions over gold-plated pensions, new taxes are a tough sell. So instead of selling it, this government is just dressing it up and pretending it's something else. Don't be fooled.

When you see a bird that quacks like a duck, walks like a duck, has feathers and webbed feet and is surrounded by ducks, you should assume that the bird is a duck. When you hear a

politician talk about raising revenues, creating new government programs, addressing social injustices and continuing massive expenditures, you should assume tax increases are on their way.

Premier Wynne can try to distance herself from McGuinty's record. But when it comes to her own record, she appears to be just another tax-and-spend Liberal.

and others supplied them.

Twenty-five potential players showed up for the school all-star team tryouts with B. Kingsley as coach. That team played in the town mercantile league -- full body contact.

Back at the school, Angelo Bucciarelli, and Des Delaney, president and chairman of the vocational services committee of the Chapleau Rotary Club respectively, presented a plaque to the school. The 120 students

attended an assembly where several melodies were sung with Alison McMillan as pianist. The plaque was presented to Jim Schafer, Student Council president.

For the first time CHS had entered a curling team in a schoolboy bospital in Espanola. Players were Brian Demers, Jim Cockburn, Vince Crichton and Bill McLeod and apparently they gave a "credible performance".

House parties were the rage in the 1950s, as well as dances in the CHS gymnasium,

the Legion and Town Halls, church basements as well as moccasin dances on the natural ice in the arena. My lifelong friend Ken Schroeder organized many of them year round as well as playing in orchestras of the day.

Speaking of house parties, Jim Ennis threw a big one, which as I recall was open to all CHS students. I don't recall how many showed up but after reading the column Joy and I wrote about it, his house was packed, and to this day I remember it as a great get together.

Jim and friends had decorated and we danced to the music of records on the new hi-fi Jim had built. It was an evening of "fun and frolic".

I saw the letter in the Chapleau Express from Joanne Moyle in which she wrote that "Mike Morris was the best dancer in town." Thanks Joanne, it was good for my ego, but I

think many could challenge me for the title. But, just in case, some do challenge, I warn them that I have just started a cardio aquafit program at the local swimming pool.

I wrote in my first column for the Cranbrook Guardian that I am one of those most blessed people who have never really worked one day

because I have been able to spend it living, in the words of Reynolds Price, the American writer, with the sound of story as the dominant sound in my life.

Story has been central to me whether I was playing in the living room with my grandfather George Hunt bringing the history of England

 alive, or listening to other grandfather Harry Morris share stories of hunting and fishing and portaging. or creating my own plays for the Junior Red Cross Society performances in Grade 4 at Chapleau Public School. Brian and Teddy Demers, Alison McMillan and I created a real swash-buckler, sword fights and all, with costumes

made by Mrs Marianne Demers.

Thanks to my mother, Muriel E (Hunt) Morris, who instilled a love of reading in me before I could hardly walk, and gave me the freedom to explore all the great children's literature of my time, story has been the place where I have lived.

Little did I realize that my experience as the Chapleau

High School reporter for the long gone Mid North News, and a television program on CHAP TV would lead to a lifetime spent telling stories, talking about the stories of others and helping students write their own stories, in classrooms in Ontario and British Columbia. And people even hired me to write stories about people and events for daily news-

papers, television, magazines and the internet. I have been most privileged to have worked with great storytellers in Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta, the United States and now British Columbia.

Floods, Wells, And Septic Systems

Flooding and heavy runoff can damage wells and septic systems, and create health risks.

"If surface water enters the top of a well, the well water becomes contaminated and unsafe to drink," said Burgess Hawkins, a manager in the

Sudbury & District Health Unit's Environmental Health Division.

Important precautions need to be taken if a well may be contaminated. In the short-term, water should be brought to a rolling boil for at least two minutes

before it is safe to use for drinking; brushing teeth; making infant formula, juices, and ice; or to use it for washing foods such as fruit and vegetables that will be eaten raw.

Once the flood recedes, wells should be disinfected using the instructions below. Well water can be used without boiling once the well has been disinfected and two consecutive, satisfactory laboratory test results are received for the well water.

Once floodwater recedes, wells should be disinfected by adding bleach to them. This will kill any bacteria or viruses. The following steps should be followed in order:

1. Mix a specific amount of bleach with water and pour it down the well. Call the Health Unit or visit our website at www.sdh.u.com for advice on the amount of bleach to use.
2. Let the water sit in the well for one hour to allow the bleach to mix.
3. Remove and discard any carbon filters.
4. Run the water at every faucet fed by the well until the smell of bleach is strong at each one.
5. Turn the power off and shut the water supply line to the hot water tank; drain the tank; then turn the power back on and open the supply line to refill the tank.
6. Backflush the water softener and all water filters (except the carbon filters).
7. Let the system stand for

at least 12 hours.

8. Run a cold water tap until you no longer smell bleach. Important: don't run the water into the drains and into the septic system the large amount of bleach and water can damage the system. Use either an outdoor faucet or attach a hose line to an indoor cold water tap and run it outside.

9. Follow the same steps to run the water from a hot water tap.

10. Install new carbon filters.

11. Take and submit a water sample 48 and 72 hours after completing step #10.

12. Boil water until the laboratory sample results show that the water is safe.

Note that septic systems do not work properly when the area is flooded or the ground is saturated with water. Septic systems should not be used if this is the case. The power to any pumps or other electrical equipment should be disconnected. Silt should be prevented from entering the pump chamber and septic tank.

After the floodwater recedes and the soil is no longer saturated, the septic tank should be pumped. The tank should not be pumped while the soil is

saturated because soil and silt could wash into the tank. Pump chambers and electrical connections should be checked before using the system. Equipment should not be driven over the septic bed when the ground is saturated because the soil will get compacted, which can damage the system. Flooding will not nor-

mally harm a septic system, but if damage to the tank or bed is suspected, a licensed septic installer should be contacted.


