'Hinge students' at Chapleau High School participated in locked door rebellion during exciting days at new school, Tom Corston recalled

Chapleau Moments

Tom Corston referred to those who attended both the "old" and "new" Chapleau High School as "hinge students" as he recalled the exciting days in 1966 as the school moved from Pine Street to its present location on the hill.

Writing in the souvenir newspaper published for the 75th anniversary in 1997, Tom says they were exciting days moving from the old to the new.

"We were leaving behind a venerable building that we were aware held valuable memories for our elders. Their initials were well carved into many an old desk and their portraits hung on every available wall space.

"But the old building had become overcrowded and a firetrap." Tom recalled classes being held in the converted basement gymnasium, "freezing in gym shorts out on the back field on cold autumn days because we had no gym; and learning of all things in the 60s to fox-trot. as part of gym class, in the dusty



me of a decade earlier when we learned to waltz at dances in the old high school basement when Dr. Karl A. Hackstetter was a teacher at the old high school... He had returned as principal for three years just before the new school opened.... and it appears that the foxtrot became the dance of choice.

When I received a message from Graham Bertrand advising that a meeting is planned for November 24 in the council chambers of the civic centre in Chapleau at seven p.m. to start organizing the 90th anniversary celebration of Chapleau High School in 2012, Tom's article came to mind and I contacted him about using parts of it in a column. Tom, who is now the Anglican Bishop of Moosonee, replied quickly, "Just fine."

In 1982 and 1997, CHS marked its 60th and 75th anniversaries respectively with hugely successful celebrations, and if the positive reaction on a Facebook page is any indication, the 90th will be quite a chairs of both reunions.

Tom wrote that the new school was "indeed, beautiful. We who were among its first residents, were so very proud. It required a bit of a longer walk for most of us, in a day before school buses, but it had fully equipped labs, bright classrooms with big windows, a library, a beautiful gymnasium and shiny floors, kept so diligently by a custodial staff to three from the one elderly janitor who cared for the old school.

"Suddenly a great change for us, as well, was that we were all assigned a locker and no longer just a hook upon which to hang our coats."

Tom outlined some of the rules at the new school, some of which were the usual, but he noted that girls had to wear dresses and boys dress pants and no jeans. That rule was not changed until a vote by students in the 1970s several years after I had returned to teach at CHS, and I recall that although a the dress code was changed the results were closer than I thought.

But the rule that led to a student rebellion was the one where students had to stay outside the school during the lunch hour, except for bus students.

Tom shared the story of the student

those who were our masters. As I remember it, it was a cold winter day and we had to wait outside the new building during the lunch hour. After all, we could never be let loose to have the run of the new building while the staff was off for lunch.

"We were cold and disgruntled. We pounded on the door but to no avail. Then it started small but the rabble rousers among us began to agitate and before long we were a crazed mob of unruly demonstrators, the likes that CHS had never seen before

"We rebelled! And when the doors were finally opened we moved as a yelling, unruly mob into the new gym not even taking off our shoes.

"We went on

were strong . We spoke with one voice. It was heady stuff. No one could control us or change our minds."

But, as Tom reported, things changed quickly. The rebels were doing well until the school principal Bill Mair returned from lunch, walked into the gym, and "with one great yell sent us all scattering. It had all lasted 20 minutes and the rule stood!"

H o w e v e r, there was one very significant change at CHS during Tom's time there in 1968 when he was president of the student council-- the new school colours.

"Students had become disgruntled with the old school colours of green, white and red. .. The opinion was that a new school were a bit disgruntled about changing the colours, finally a decision was made and the chosen colours became dark blue and light blue.

"It was a drastic change and some of our parents disagreed, "Tom wrote. "But we were undaunted in our choice. It was ours -we liked the new colours, and liked even more the stamp we were able to put on our new building and on the history we were making."

Thanks for the memories Tom of those years over 30 years ago when you were a student at CHS. As plans evolve for the celebration of the 90th anniversary in 2012, out of the mothballs of memory will come more stories from all those who have been





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NDP launches bill to create national suicide prevention strategy

Says Canada falling behind other countries that already have strategies

Megan Leslie, New Democrat Critic for Health, announced the introduction of legislation, An Act respecting a National Strategy for Suicide Prevention, that will direct the Federal government to establish a national suicide prevention strategy, in consultation with the provincial, territorial and First Nations Governments.

"We need national coordination of best practices for service provision, training professionals, as well as education for the public," said Leslie. "Australia has had a national strategy for over 10 years, and is continuing to improve upon their system. Countries like the US and UK also have strategies, and lower suicide rates than Canada."

Every year over 3,500 Canadians die by suicide. It is the 3rd leading cause of death amongst 25 to 49 year olds and the second leading cause of death in the 10 to 24 age group. The suicide rate for aboriginal youth is four to six times that of nonnatives.

"Northern and

First Nations communities are suffering disproportionately and would greatly benefit from coordinated support and program development from around the country," said Carol Hughes, New Democrat Deputy Aboriginal Affairs Critic (Health). "We have an opportunity with this bill to greatly improve the lives of all Canadians, but in the North, this could also save entire communities from the long-term negative emotional and societal effects of losing loved-ones, especially youth."


"Suicide is not just a health issue it is a social and community issue, it is complex, it is a national tragedy and most importantly it is preventable," said Tim Wall, Executive Director of the Canadian Association for Suicide Prevention. "We can save lives and keep more families from being torn apart if we work together, across parties and across jurisdictions. We know what to do to prevent suicides. There is hope.

Keeping that hope alive and saving lives however requires everyone's involvement and support, and must include the Government of Canada."

The bill will be tabled in the House of Commons on Friday, November 5, 2010 by Megan Leslie, and seconded by Carol Hughes. Both Leslie and Hughes are calling for the government to examine the strategy laid out in the legislation after it is tabled, and urge the Health Minister to take immediate action to establish such a strategy.

Xeneca Power Development Inc. is planning to undertake an environmental evaluation and assessment of four proposed Generating Stations located at Kapuskasing Lake Outlet, Lapinigam Rapids, Middle Township Buchan (Clouston Rapids) and at Near North Boundary (Cedar Rapids). Each site is located on the Kapuskasing River, between the community of Elsas and the Town of Kapuskasing. If approved and constructed, these waterpower projects on the Kapuskasing River will generate clean and renewable energy at a total installed capacity of about 19.45 MW. Each generating station will have water control structures (spillway and earthfill dams) with attached powerhouses (with the exception of the Kapuskasing Lake Outlet which will have a spillway dam and an open approach channel to the powerhouse). New roads and possible upgrades of existing roads will be required to access the sites. Transmission lines connecting at Weston Lake Transformer Station/Distribution Station will be installed in order to connect the stations to the provincial power grid. The projects' study areas are presented in the attached map. Further project information can be obtained by visiting the Xeneca website at <u>www.xeneca.com</u>.

Construction is expected to take place between 2013 and 2014 and the in-service date for the proposed projects is expected to be in early 2015.

The projects are subject to the provisions of the Ontario Waterpower Association's "Class Environmental Assessment (Class EA) for Waterpower Projects" (2008). Pursuant to the Class EA, the projects are considered to be on a managed waterway.

The Class EA process requires Xeneca Power Development Inc. to undertake an evaluation of the proposed waterpower projects to evaluate the potential effects to the environment (positive and negative) and prepare a detailed Environmental Report. The projects are also expected to require review and approvals under the *Canadian Environmental Assessment Act, Fisheries Act, Navigable Waters Protection Act, Lakes and Rivers Improvement Act (location approval and water management plan), Endangered Species Act, Ontario Water Resources Act, Environmental Protection Act and other legislation. This notice and the public consultation process for the projects under the Class EA, are intended to coordinate and meet the notification requirements relevant to the planning stage of the projects under these statutes.*

The evaluation and environmental report will assess the potential effects of construction and operation. Xeneca Power Development Inc. has identified certain environmental components that are expected to be the focus of the proposed Projects. Public consultation will be an integral component of this process.

Lost Canadian Veteran / War Bride Child Just Wants His Citizenship

By Melynda Jarratt A 1 1 I a n Munroe wants is his Canadian citizenship.

The 65 yearold Scottish-born son of a War Bride and a Canadian World War Two veteran has lived in Canada since June 16, 1946, when he and his mother arrived at Halifax's Pier 21 on board the Queen Mary.

Ian grew up in Nova Scotia, went to school, worked, paid taxes and voted in elections. He even served in the Canadian Navy for 18 years, leaving with an honourable discharge in 1985. He never had cause to think about citizenship until the day nearly 25 years ago when he found out he wasn't Canadian.

Ian's problems began when he applied for a passport. As a m e m b e r o f th e Canadian navy, he had seen the world - but because he was in the Forces, a passport was not required. Now that he was a private citizen, he needed one for travel.

"Imagine my surprise!" says Ian, of finding out he was not a citizen. "I'd been here since 1946, was married to a Canadian, my mother and father were both Canadians, my children were all Canadian, my brother was a Canadian as were all my cousins on this side of the ocean. I'm the only misfit."

Luckily, the person working at the passport office issued Ian temporary documents and advised him to apply for citizenship upon his return, but Ian didn't have any plans to travel overseas so he didn't follow up.

"I thought, 'I'm not going anywhere, only to the United States,'" so for the next 20 years, Ian never thought about it again. Then 9/11

happened and the US tightened security measures at the border. In 2007, Ian's best friend who lived in Maine was dying but Ian couldn't get a passport. "I couldn't even attend the funeral," he said.

By this time, Ian was approaching age 65 and retirement.


"My wife said 'You'll be eligible for pension in two years. We better get this straightened out."

Ian was told the best he could get was Permanent Residence Status, which is reserved for immigrants.

" I ' m a Canadian. I'm not an immigrant, but I had no choice. I need my pension."

So Ian applied for Permanent Resident Status as would any other immigrant.

Problem is, it doesn't guarantee a passport.

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
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

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
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Lost Canadian Veteran

2009, the so-called "Lost Canadian" provisions of the Citizenship Act were enacted and War Bride children like Ian finally believed they had a chance at citizenship. But as Ian soon found out, theory and practice are two different things: the CIC website is confusing and the call centre in Sydney, Nova Scotia no better, sending War Bride children around in circle trying to solve their citizenship problems.

Frustrated, Ian wrote to his Member of Parliament, Hon. Gerald Keddy, to the Prime Minister Stephen Harper, and to Hon. Jason Kenney, the Minister of Citizenship and Immigration.

"I received a phone call from Mr. Keddy's office last February and they told me I had to fill out some forms at CIC and pay \$400 but it would take up to 16 months for an answer. After that, I said to heck with it. I've received no response from Jason Kenney or Stephen Harper and I'm seriously thinking about getting my British passport if this doesn't get resolved soon," he says.

Over the last year, Ian has become more vocal: he's written letters to the editor of the Halifax newspaper and he even appeared on Canada AM, which led him to the Lost Canadian organization. Last month he was on the international radio program Voice America with Don Chapman, leader of the Lost Canadians.

This week, with the help of the Lost Canadians, Ian untangled the forms on the CIC website and found out that all he has to do is apply for h i s " P r o o f o f Citizenship", pay \$75 and wait four months for his citizenship card. Then he can get his passport.

He's feeling better, but wonders how many other War Bride children have given up?

"There have been times when I felt completely hopeless and let down," said Ian. "It really hurts when you don't belong."
