George Edward Young, the son of the late George and Mabel Young, born on December 2, 1914, graduated from Chapleau Public and Chapleau High Schools, then attended Queen's University to study medicine starting in 1936. Upon graduation in 1942, "Ted" Young interned at the Columbia University School of Medicine in New York City. He was also predeceased by his brothers, Dr. William and Eric.

In 1944, a Dr. Crozier in Chapleau asked Dr. Young to return home for "six months." In 1994, Dr. Young retired after serving Chapleau and area, sometimes as the only medical doctor, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

From 1944 to 1992, Dr. Young was the CPR doctor in Chapleau, and was Chief of Staff at Lady Minto Hospital for 20 years. He was also the local Medical Officer of Health for 20 years and also served as Medical Director of Cedar Grove Lodge.

From 1944 to 1982 he served as coroner and was recognized for his service by the Government of Ontario.

On several occasions he was recognized by the people of Chapleau who held an appreciation party for him in 1987 and another in 1992 marking his 50th anniversary of graduation from Queen's in medicine. On March 31, 1994 a retirement party was held.

In the early Sixties, Dr. Young established a cable television system for the community, and was always undertaking projects -- most never quite finished.

He also served on the township council for six years and shortly after returning home, at his own expense, transformed a garbage dump into a beautiful beach for the citizens of Chapleau. Dr. Young was a member of the Chapleau Recreation Committee for many years, and was a founding member of the Chapleau Rotary Club.

For many years Dr. Young's medical practise included not only Chapleau but the surrounding area. He would travel to Missanabie, Franz, and Renabie Mines to the west, and to Sultan, Nemegos and Biscotasing to the east, catching rides on CPR freight trains. He also went to the lumber camps at Racine Lake, Island Lake, Kormak and Pineal lake.

Although he was involved in many aspects of Chapleau life, Dr. Young will be primarily remembered for his unfailing concern for his patients for 50 years. He was also there when needed no matter the time of day or the weather.

Chapleau Moments

When I was growing up in Chapleau and had come down with one of the common childhood diseases, after my mother left for school, I would suggest to my grandmother that we call Dr. Young who for sure would come and make me better.

Almost momentarily, or so it seemed, Dr. Young would appear with his black bag, and sit beside my bed. take my pulse and termperature, and my favorite, take out his stethoscope and have me take deep breaths to make sure I was still alive. Then he would talk with Nanny, my grandmother, Edith Hunt, who assured me she would follow his


instructions and in due course, I would be "all better" and head back to school.

When my dog Rex was hit by a car while I was still in public school, I carried him into the house, in tears, shouting at my mother, Muriel E. Morris, "Call Dr. Young." She did and once again, it seemed within moments, he arrived. After examining Rex, he told me to put a blanket near the wood stove as well as food and water, and let him be. Amazingly, Rex recovered and lived another 10 years. Dr. Young had done it again.

With the news on November 14, that Dr. George Edward "Ted" Young, who served Chapleau and area for 50 years as a medical doctor had died at age 95, Chapleauites everywhere I am sure have been sharing Dr. Young stories.

For almost a century, born in Chapleau on December 2, 1914, to George and Mabel Young, he strode like a colossus through every aspect of community life -- as a young athlete who became famous for swimming to Mulligan's Bay, as an officer in Number 1181 Chapleau High School Cadet Corps, as a medical student at Oueen's University who came home to practise for six months and remained 50 years before he retired in 1994, as the builder of the Chapleau beach, as a member of township council, as a cable television pioneer, and as one who was constantly undertaking new projects, many of which were never quite completed.

In his long life,



November 14 that Dr. Young had died, like so many from whom I have heard, I reflected on his life and times in Chapleau. On a very personal basis, Dr. Young looked after me as a patient, and for all his care I will always be most appreciative. When I was reeve of Chapleau, I recall meeting with Ministry of Health officials in Toronto, and one doctor there remarked, "Dr. Young is considered one of the best diagnosticians in Ontario." No argument from me on that one. I likely would not be writing these words if he had not been.

Over the years I came to know Dr. Young even better when he was a member of council, and then as a dear and close friend. Interestingly, my father, James E. Morris was about three weeks older than Ted Young, and they grew up together in Chapleau. Dr. Young shared many stories with me about life in Chapleau in his growing up years, usually beginning them with, "As I tell you..."

On the occasion of Chapleau's 100th anniversary in 2001, I was so delighted to travel home and stay at Dr. Young's, just enjoying his company and sharing Chapleau

tales. In 2004, he travelled across the country in his motor home and visited me in Cranbrook BC. Many may not be aware that his mother was from Creston, just an hour away from me, and we travelled there one day to visit his grandparents' grave and the church where his parents were married.

Upon arrival at the cemetery, I was concerned that we may not find the grave, but he walked directly to it even though he had not been there in many years. We then visited the church. I was so privileged to be able to share these moments in his family history with Dr. Young.

I could go on and on with my own Dr. Young stories but others have their memories of Dr. Young and have shared them with me these past few days.

From over 100 email and Facebook messages, here is a sample.

Jamie Thibault: "May God Bless Him and that special place that we all have in our hearts for those people that have touched us in our lives be made extra large for all he has given to Chapleau and its citizens. Today Chapleau has lost a bit of its identitity and I hope something will be done to commemorate this fine Man. R.I.P."

Darlene (St. Denis) Lafontaine whose stepfather Raymond "Rusty" Campbell and other members of her family worked with Dr. Young for years wrote. "My tears for him are of great sadness. He lived a long and fulfilling life and his support towards our family will always be Cont'd on P5

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Business Retention and Expansion (BR+E) Program: Support for Local Businesses

The Township of Chapleau in partnership with The Chapleau Express and FormationPLUS will be undertaking a community economic development project, according to Mayor Earle Freeborn. The project, the Business Retention and Expansion (BR+E) program, is designed to stimulate economic growth by assisting existing businesses. The project is sponsored by the Northern

Ontario Heritage Fund Corporation (NOHFC), Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs (OMAFRA), and Superior East Community Futures Development Corporation's Local Initiatives Fund (LIF). The Task Force will include members of the Chapleau Economic Renewal Committee (CERC), partners and local business leaders of the community.

"Helping our existing businesses is the primary objective of the project. Other communities have had very good results with BR+E projects," said Mayor Freeborn. "Before considering this project, we talked to community leaders in several other areas that have used this approach to business retention and expansion. They were very positive about the results," said Mayor Freeborn.

Before a community can assist existing businesses, it must identify the businesses' needs, concerns, and problems. Through the BR+E project, local volunteers visit businesses and gather information. The local leaders running this program then try to solve the problems or better meet those needs identified by the businesses. Helping businesses become more compet-

itive increases the chances of those businesses staying in the community; hence, the name of the project.

"This project respects the need for confidentiality and the information on individual businesses will not be published" according to Linda Bouchard-Berzel, Coordinator of the BR+E.

The information gathered from the visits is compiled and analyzed. The Coordi-

nator and Task Force review this analysis and then write recommendations for future economic development initiatives for the community of Chapleau. "One of the reasons for the popularity of the BR+E project is that it not only provides a long range plan for the community, but also yields some shortrange tangible results," said Linda Bouchard-Berzel.

Donation to the Museum

On November 7th of this year the Canadian Pacific Railway celebrated the 125th anniversary of the driving of the Last Spike.

To commemorate this historic day in Chapleau the Canadian Pacific Railway has donated to the Chapleau Heritage Museum a complete original Table Setting that was used in the dining cars of the Canadian Pacific Railway passenger trains.

This Table Setting will be on display in the Chapleau Heritage Museum for all to see and admire. I am sure that it will rekindle the memories of many of our Chapleau citizens who traveled the Canadian Pacific Railway passenger trains during these early times.

On behalf of the citizens of Chapleau and our Council we take this opportunity to publicly express our appreciation to the Canadian Pacific Railway for this valuable authentic gift.

The Canadian Pacific Railway has a rich history in Chapleau going back to the early steam engine days and progressing on to the diesel electric era of today.

The Chapleau Heritage Museum will incorporate this new gift with the other Railroad artifacts in the Museum including the 5433 which stands proudly on the Museum property.

Soon the citizens of Chapleau will be able to view another historic monument to the early Railroad days when the Township will be placing the CPR Van 434627 on the Museum grounds which is also a gift which we have received from the Canadian Pacific Railway.


Au nom du conseil et des citoyens et citoyennes de Chapleau je tiens à remercier publiquement le Canadian Pacifique de ce don inestimable.

remembered. When I moved to Timmins, he actually came into my new workplace with my brother in 1994 to make sure that things were going well...He will be remembered in an honorable way!! Thanks Michael, he was one of the reasons education became important to me....His support will forever be remembered.

"He was truly a great man....Chapleau was all the better because of him...It was an honor to know him and the time he shared with our family will certainly be remembered. My charm bracelet from him at my grade 8 graduation will always be near and dear to my heart...."

Gwen MacGillivray:

"Chapleau has lost a great man. He was the last of the "town" doctors who knew everyone and their families...who made house calls and truly cared about each of his patients, friends, neighbours...he was a good and kind man who will be remembered fondly by generations of us. RIP Dr. Young."

Dave Doig who lived almost across Pine Street from the Young family home wrote: "Decent, fair, intelligent, generous man. Safely delivered me (and I think most of my siblings as well) to this world. Gave back more than he took from Chapleau. He'll always be one of

Chapleau's iconic in Ottawa. citizens...missed but not forgotten." Dave also advised that he shovelled the snow for Dr. Young's mother, to earn a few dollars and sometimes he even got a butter tart.

Patty(Riley) Burton "He was always good to our family. When my dad's mom passed away he was the first to call and give sympathies to my father, shortly after that he had to do it again when my father passed away. (Patty's grandparents were Mr. and Mrs. Harry Riley and her father, Lorne Riley)

"I remember him most by saving my son's (Wesley) life when he was an infant. No other doctor knew what was wrong with him. Dr Young looked at him and within 2hrs we were flying out in a snow storm to the Soo. He also called the Soo on a daily basis to check on Wes. He later would tell me one more day and we probably would have lost Wes. Wesley was also the last baby Dr. Young delivered...he will always be remembered as a caring, loving doctor and person...I owe him because without him I wouldn't have my son...so thank you Dr Young for everything you have done and given to the Riley family!! Rest in peace!!"

Patty's son Wesley, who happens to be a very good writer, is now in his first year as a student at Carleton University

Darlene (Bouillon) Ranger wrote that she had many Dr. Young stories but "this one I love.

"I was a nurse's aid at the old Lady Minto. I would of been seventeen and lived in the nurses' residence. Those were the days... Party party party... The director of nursing was Mrs. Crozier who ruled her hospital with a wooden spoon as well as an iron tongue. I can still hear her keys clanging as she made her rounds in the am.

I /we as I would of never have been alone did party this one time and was so sick and could not go to work. I knew that would not sit well with you know who. I need a good excuse...

"Call the Doctor.... Good thinking... Dr. Young came to residence quickly and checked me over.. He had a bit of a smirk on his face but oh well he is here and will help me....

"Help me? He put me in hospital...Remember, I am not really sick and I know he knew... Off you go my dear. You are too sick to stay here and too dehydrated....i am very worried about you ? Hello.... i am not really sick.... I get admitted not for overnight but for five days... Every day he visits me and states oh Darlene you are still to sick to go home... He kept this up and knew exactly what he was doing... Made me stay in hospital on total bed rest .. Could not get out of bed Doctor's orders... He was bound and determined to teach me important life lessons..

"As the years progressed Dr. Young and I had many laughs and this laugh was the one he enjoyed the most....What were you thinking Darlene?...In my mind today as well as yesterday he was my A list Doctor... We will miss him and the lessons he taught me stays with me even today...God bless you my dear friend rest in peace."

Later, Dr. Young delivered both Darlene's sons Derek and Sean.

In the life of Chapleau, George Edward "Ted" Young, singlehandedly at times, through his actions strongly influenced the course of events both as a medical doctor and in many other aspects of community life. He was an exceptional person. Rest in peace my friend, and thank you.



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Updated Notice of Commencement under the Class EA for Waterpower Projects Kapuskasing River Waterpower Projects



Xeneca Power Development Inc. is planning to undertake an environmental evaluation and assessment of four proposed Generating Stations located at Kapuskasing Lake Outlet, Lapinigam Rapids, Middle Township Buchan (Clouston Rapids) and at Near North Boundary (Cedar Rapids). Each site is located on the Kapuskasing River, between the community of Elsas and the Town of Kapuskasing. If approved and constructed, these waterpower projects on the Kapuskasing River will generate clean and renewable energy at a total installed capacity of about 19.45 MW. Each generating station will have water control structures (spillway and earthfill dams) with attached powerhouses (with the exception of the Kapuskasing Lake Outlet which will have a spillway dam and an open approach channel to the powerhouse). New roads and possible upgrades of existing roads will be required to access the sites. Transmission lines connecting at Weston Lake Transformer Station/Distribution Station will be installed in order to connect the stations to the provincial power grid. The projects' study areas are presented in the attached map. Further project information can be obtained by visiting the Xeneca website at www.xeneca.com.

Construction is expected to take place between 2013 and 2014 and the in-service date for the proposed projects is expected to be in early 2015.

The projects are subject to the provisions of the Ontario Waterpower Association's "Class Environmental Assessment (Class EA) for Waterpower Projects" (2008). Pursuant to the Class EA, the projects are considered to be on a mahaged waterway.

The Class EA process requires Xeneca Power Development Inc. to undertake an evaluation of the proposed waterpower projects to evaluate the potential effects to the environment (positive and negative) and prepare a detailed Environmental Report. The projects are also expected to require review and approvals under the Canadian Environmental Assessment Act, Fisheries Act, Navigable Waters Protection Act, Lakes and Rivers Improvement Act (location approval and water management plan), Endangered Species Act, Ontario Water Resources Act, Environmental Protection Act and other legislation. This notice and the public consultation process for the projects under the Class EA, are intended to coordinate and meet the notification requirements relevant to the planning stage of the projects under these statutes.

The evaluation and environmental report will assess the potential effects of construction and operation. Xeneca Power Development Inc. has identified certain environmental components that are expected to be the focus of the proposed Projects. Public consultation will be an integral component of this process.

Chapleau Teachers Bring Arts Alive With Touring Aboriginal Play

Theatre production a catalyst for Arts education in 33 North Ontario communities.

A play about two Aboriginal children that challenges cultural stereotypes is igniting imaginations—and the arts—in classrooms across Northern Ontario this fall. That's the goal of a 33-community tour of Roseneath Theatre's production of Spirit Horse organized by the Elementary Teachers'

Federation of Ontario (ETFO) and the Ontario English Catholic Teachers' Association (OECTA).

Spirit Horse was performed locally for Grades 3 to 8 students attending Chapleau Public School and Our Lady of Fatima Catholic School. A minimum of 40 teachers in each of

the local public and Catholic boards will also receive 10 hours of hands-on professional development (PD) provided by the Algoma ETFO local and Huron-Superior OECTA Unit. The Ontario Ministry of Education has funded this project.

"Along with raising issues of

identity, the professional development piece provides teachers with the tools to make drama, dance, music and visual arts come alive in the classroom," says ETFO Local President Kelly Holley. "The Spirit Horse initiative supports the new arts curriculum released by the Ministry of Education last year." Spirit Horse is a

powerful adventure about the challenges faced by two Aboriginal children whose family is caught between the traditional ways and contemporary urban culture. The cast, including a live musician and three actors who play over 65 characters, are all of First Nations descent. Canada's Roseneath Theatre commissioned celebrated Ojibway playwright Drew Hayden Taylor to do an adaptation of the internationally acclaimed British play TIr Na N'Og written and directed by British Olivier Award winner Greg Banks. Canada is standing at a crossroad and the government needs to decide whether the country will chart its own course or be a branchplant for foreign corporate entities like the Australian multinational, BHP.

Canadians are seeing more and more foreign ownership of natural resources and important pieces of our industry. The fire sale of Canada does not make a lot of sense to relinquish domestic

control and place outcome changed the attached to any blind-faith in foreign investors who, naturally, are preoccupied with the bottom line.

Northern Ontario residents are all too familiar with the phenomenon. We watched Essar buy Algoma Steel, Vale buy Inco and Xstrata take o v e r Falconbridge. Northern Ontario is under siege and our best assets have been the first to go.

Everyone saw what can happen with foreign owners who are not committed to their new communities during the long and bitter strike in Sudbury. When Vale flexed its muscles and ground the workers down during a yearlong battle, the

culture in that workplace and the communities that depend on it, forever.

The culture has changed because new hires face an uncertain future. They saw those before them look forward to secure and reasonable pensions. They were able to buy houses, buy camps, or do things like take trips—secure in the future they were building with their hard work. The person who gets hired-on next will not be able to count on a secure and reasonable pension. That doubt will force them to limit their expectations and accept that the fruits of their labour will not be as abundant as the generation that went before them.

The NDP motion on the Investment Canada Act, that parliament debated in early November, is a good place to start changing the expectations placed on foreign owners. The motion called on the government to amend the Investment Canada Act, making it more transparent and placing a priority on the interests of Canadians.

Hughes Calls For Action On Poverty: Food Bank Use Grows As Stimulus Set To End

Ontarians are being forced to do more with less and the growth in poverty statistics has been mirrored by a huge increase in the number of people dependant on Food Banks, according to Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing MP, Carol Hughes. Hughes is calling on the government to take action on the issue and is questioning the value of ending federal stimulus in the face of such dire circumstance.

"The increase in the number of people who use food banks indicate a long standing problem which has only gotten worse due to the recession," said Hughes in Question Period Tuesday. "The

situation will only get ing 10.4%. worse with the end of the economic stimulus program, the implementation of new budgetary constraints, and the government's refusal to table a plan to eliminate poverty in our communities."

Hughes question comes as poverty statistics show Ontario is slipping in all areas tracked. With the fourth highest poverty and child poverty rates in the country, Ontario lost over half of all jobs lost in Canada at the onset of the recession, shedding 3.1% of its economy between October 2008 and October 2009. During the same period, food prices grew by 4.7%, with the price of vegetables rising by an astonish-

"It is becoming clear that the high price of food is pushing more people into poverty," said Hughes. "This government is going to have to come

address this unacceptable trend, including questioning whether this is the best time to stop the stimulus program."

Chapleau Public Utilities Corporation (« Chapleau ») a déposé une requête auprès de la Commission de l'énergie de l'Ontario (la « Commission ») le 26 octobre 2010, aux termes de l'article 78 de la Loi de 1998 sur la Commission de l'énergie de l'Ontario, L.O., c. 15 (Annexe B), en vue d'obtenir l'approbation de la modification des tarifs que Chapleau exigera pour la distribution de l'électricité à compter du 1er mai 2011. La requête a été déposée aux termes des lignes directrices de la Commission sur la réglementation par incitatifs de troisième génération, lesquelles prévoient un rajustement mécanique des taux reposant sur des formules qui est appliqué entre les requêtes sur le coût de service. La Commission a assigné à cette requête le numéro EB-2010-0073. La décision de la Commission concernant cette requête peut avoir un effet sur tous les clients de Chapleau.

Toute modification apportée aux tarifs de distribution de Chapleau entraînera des changements aux frais de livraison qu'elle exige. Les frais de livraison sont l'un des quatre articles qui figurent systématiquement sur les factures d'électricité des consommateurs résidentiels et des services généraux et qui varient en fonction de la quantité d'électricité consommée.

Chapleau indique que si la requête est approuvée telle que déposée, le consommateur résidentiel qui utilise 800 kWh par mois constatera une augmentation d'environ 22,0 % de ses frais de livraison actuels. Le consommateur du service général qui utilise 2 000 kWh par mois et dont la demande mensuelle est inférieure à 50 kW constatera une augmentation d'environ 17,7 % de ses frais de livraison actuels. NOTICE OF APPLICATION AND HEARING FOR AN ELECTRICITY DISTRIBUTION RATE CHANGE Chapleau Public Utilities Corporation

EB-2010-0073

Chapleau Public Utilities Corporation ("Chapleau") filed an application with the Ontario Energy Board (the "Board") on October 26, 2010 under section 78 of the Ontario Energy Board Act, 1998, S.O. 1998, c.15 (Schedule B), seeking approval for changes to the rates that Chapleau charges for electricity distribution, to be effective May 1, 2011. The application was filed under the Board's guidelines for 3rd Generation Incentive Regulation, which provides for a mechanistic and formulaic adjustment to distribution rates between cost of service applications. The Board has assigned the application File No. EB-2010-0073. The Board's decision on this application may have an effect on all of Chapleau's customers.

Any change to Chapleau's distribution rates will cause Chapleau's delivery charges to change. Delivery charges are one of four regular items on residential and general service customers' electric bills and vary depending on the amount of electricity consumed.

Chapleau indicates that if the application is approved as filed, residential customers consuming 800 kWh per month would experience an approximate 22.0% increase in their current delivery charges. This is a \$7.22 per month increase on their total bill. General Service customers consuming 2,000 kWh per month and having a monthly demand of less than 50 kW would experience an approximate 17.7% increase in their current delivery charges. This is a \$11.77 per month increase on their total bill.

The proposed changes to the delivery component of the bill are separate from other potential changes to the electricity bills, which could include changes to the electricity component and other charges included on the bill. This application deals only with the potential change in the delivery component of the bill that may result from changes in the delivery rates.

How to see Chapleau's Application

Copies of the application are available for inspection at the Board's office in Toronto and on its website, www.oeb.gov.on.ca/OEB/Industry, and at Chapleau's office and may be on its website.

How to Participate

You may participate in this proceeding in one of two ways:

1. Become an Intervenor

You may ask to become an intervenor if you wish to actively participate in the proceeding. Intervenors are eligible to receive evidence and other material submitted by participants in the hearing. Likewise, intervenors will be expected to send copies of any material they file to all parties to the hearing.

Your request for intervenor status must be made by letter of intervention and be received by the Board no later than December 10, 2010. Your letter of intervention must include a description of how you are, or may be, affected by the outcome of this proceeding; and if you represent a group, a description of the group and its membership. The Board will not award costs in this proceeding as the applicant has not made any proposals that deviate from the Board's guidelines for rate adjustments.

You must provide a copy of your letter of intervention to Chapleau.

Note that as an intervenor, everything you file with the Board will be placed on the public record, including your name and contact information. This means that it will be available for viewing at the Board's offices and it will be placed on the Board's website and available to anyone with internet access.

The Board intends to proceed with this application by way of a written hearing. If you object to the Board proceeding in this fashion, your letter of intervention must state the type of proceeding you believe to be necessary and the reasons why.

Interrogatories and Submissions

Board-approved intervenors or Board staff wishing information and material from Chapleau that is in addition to the evidence filed with the Board and that is relevant to the hearing shall request it by written interrogatories filed with the Board and delivered to Chapleau on or before December 10, 2010. Chapleau shall file with the Board complete responses to the interrogatories and deliver them to all intervenors no later than **January 6, 2011**.

Written submissions by an intervenor or Board staff must be filed with the Board, and copied to all other parties, by **January 26, 2011**. If Chapleau wishes to respond to the submissions, its written response must be filed with the Board and delivered to all other parties by **February 16, 2011**.

If you already have a user ID, please submit your intervention request through the Board's web portal at www.errr.oeb.gov.on.ca. Additionally, two paper copies are required.

If you do not have a user ID, please visit the Board's website under e-filings and fill out a user ID password request. For instructions on how to submit and naming conventions please refer to the RESS Document Guidelines found at www.oeb.gov.on.ca/OEB/Industry, e-Filing Services.

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
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
