Chapleau citizens rattled by possible Post Office closure

etition sheets have been distributed throughout our community this week and everyone is urged to sign them.

The content of the petition is as follows: The federal government is allowing Canada Post to close public post offices in spite of a moratorium on closures in rural and small towns. The government expects Canada Post to inform

people at least one month prior to closing, moving or amalgamating their public post office and explore options that address people's concerns. A month is an inadequate amount of time for a whole community to discuss a closure and explore options.

Public post offices connect communities throughout this vast land, helping us to overcome differ-

ences and distances and play a key role in our social and economic life by providing the infrastructure that healthy communities need to thrive and businesses need to grow.

Carol Hughes brought a petition from residents of Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing to the attention of MP s today in the House of Commons.

In the spirit of

participatory democracy, Hughes tabled the petition opposed to rural post office closures and the use of remailers while calling for improvements to services in rural areas.

"The petition asks the government to ensure moratoriums on post office closures and that these be maintained," said Hughes. "(It) also opposes the legalization of remailers and asks that the proposed legislation be withdrawn."

The petition is timely with fears that more communities will lose their local postal service as money becomes tight.

Hughes continued to call on the government to "ensure that Canada Post expands and improves postal services within rural areas, given the key role that these services play in the social and economic life of our communities in these rural areas such as Val Rita, Kapuskasing, Moonbeam, Chapleau, Wawa, Manitouwadge and White River."

A reply from the government is expected within 45 days. If none is received the document is sent to committee to determine what the response should be and why the government has not





Buddy Swanson shares story of the founding of Chapleau Junior "B" Huskies in 1966

To set the stage for the arrival of the 1966-67 champion Chapleau Junior "B" Huskies, let's go back in time to 1929 and the arrival of Mac McAllister in Chapleau to work for Canadian Pacific Communications and play hockey for the Chapleau All Stars Junior team.

Doug Greig recently sent me a note that Mac, who became one of the community's great hockey stars and later a referee, wrote after the death of Mrs. A.W. Moore in 1979. Mac revealed that the Chapleau hockey board of directors was deciding on a uniform and he suggested that since the original Ottawa Senators had just won the Stanley Cup three years in row why not use their barber shop pole stripes. The committee agreed.

Mac also noted that the committee decided to have a Husky dog with the letter C around it, thus the Chapleau Huskies. Mrs. Moore, Chapleau's greatest hockey fan, made the Husky dogs, the letters C and the number for each uniform. She then stitched them on to each uniform. What an incredible lady Mrs.

Moore was, and thanks Doug for sending me Mac's note.

Fast forward to 1966 and the arrival of the Chapleau Junior "B" Huskies, the first major beneficiaries of the artificial ice in the Chapleau Memorial Community Arena, largely made possible by Mrs. Moore's efforts. I am delighted to be able to use Chapleau Moments to bring you highlights from the founding year of the Junior "B" Huskies as told to me by Keith "Buddy" Swanson, who devoted much of his life to sports, particularly the Huskies, in Chapleau and until recently was a township councillor. Thanks so much Buddy for taking time to answer questions, and to your sister Sharon for starting it

Here is Part one of the story as told to me by Buddy:

Junior B hockey came to Chapleau in 1966 as a result of a chance summer meeting on our golf course between Tom Welch and a visiting director of the Wawa Travellers who were already a part of the NOHA International Jr. B Hockey League that had been

formed in the 1965-66 hockey season. It was suggested that since Chapleau and Wawa had already established a fierce rivalry through the Intermediate Wawa Ironmen and the Chapleau Huskies, our participation in the league would be a natural fit.

In 1965-66 Lorne Riley and I had coached and managed a very good Midget team and with the other overage midgets in town we discussed the proposition and knew we probably had a pretty good nucleus of players to start with. Lorne and I travelled to our first meeting of the League in Wawa in the summer of 1966 on Highway 101 West which was being completed that year. We were well received and tentatively approved for entry in the League by Wawa Travellers, Sault Michigan Indians, Soo Ontario Rapids and the Elliot Lake Vikings. With no arena in Elliot Lake at the time, the Vikings played their home games in Thessalon and a few on their outdoor rink in Elliot Lake.

Our next challenge was where would we find the money to operate a Junior "B" hockey club with a budget of approximately \$15,000.00? First we needed to find and hold an election from a

group of people to form an organization. Three meetings were called and only Tom, Lorne and myself showed up and Jack

Shoup at the third meeting. It did not look good but on the urging of Tom Welch, who was the owner of the Chapleau Sentinel weekly newspaper at the time it was decided to go ahead anyhow, and we would all solicit people to be on the executive. Tom was on board from the start and was elected President of the Club.

Bob St. Pierre became the Treasurer later replaced by Sonja Vaughan. I was the Secretary and team Manager. Lorne Riley was appointed Coach. Andre Rioux accepted the Trainer's job. Directors of the club included Art Grout, Earle Freeborn, Ross Perrigard, Albert Tremblay, Jack Shoup,

Ken Stevenson. Roger Mizuguchi handled the advertising and Public relations position. The executive was tasked with the responsibility to fundraise and find sponsors for the Club. As always, the businesses and people of the Town of Chapleau came through in grand style. Tom Welch and I attended the next League meeting in Sault Ste. Marie where the Huskies were officially accepted into the League. We were ready to roll.

Practices started and our roster was quickly set. Richard Morin was appointed team Captain. Richard had already played a pivotal role with the Intermediate B Huskies and had

scored the winning goal the season before in Wawa to eliminate the Ironmen and pave the way for the Huskies to go on to the win the NOHA Intermediate B crown in a tense series with Espanola. Merrick Goldstein and Reg Bouillon would be the anchors of our defence having played in the Wawa series with Goldstein recovered from a broken leg suffered in the Int. B playoffs in Wawa. Ted Swanson and John Laframboise were also available. The versatile Gerry Boucher played both forward and defence.

Up front J. C. Cyr, George Swanson and Richard Morin formed an experienced Cont'd on P.4

Northeast Superior Regional chiefs and mayors celebrate landmark awards gala

The Northeast Superior Regional Chiefs' Forum and the Northeast Superior Forest Community took the time on November 10, 2009 to recognize the accomplishments of both organizations over the past several years. At a Gala affair at the Wawa Community Centre, the leaders of this region celebrated the beginning of a relationship of working in partnership to develop new economic opportunity in our region.

Mayor Earle Freeborn of Chapleau, and President of the Northeast Superior Forest Community told those in attendance "This is a day for celebration. We have worked hard to strengthen our relationships with our First Nation Partners and we have made great progress. Economic hardship in the Northeast Superior region has been increasing, and there is a need to

develop a new strategy. Coming here, together, today, shows the willingness of all of us here to work together. We must speak with one voice for the residents of this region, for all the residents in our region."

Chief Keith Corston, of Chapleau Cree First Nation, and Chairman of the Northeast Superior Regional Chiefs' Forum reinforced Mayor Freeborn's position and expressed confidence that by working together we can find a way to bring greater economic wealth to the region, rebuild the ecological integrity of the land as well as resolve outstanding Aboriginal issues all at the same time. He added that the other NSRCF Chiefs are looking forward to presenting a draft partnership



model to their respective communities in the near future.

Both organizations handed out awards of recognition for the hard work and perseverance of some specific individuals. The Northeast Superior Regional Chiefs' Forum (NSRCF) recognized Gilles Brunet of Indian and

Northern Affairs Canada's Sudbury office for his support and assistance to the NSRCF. They also recognized the Ministry of Northern Development, Mines and Forestry's Denis Rochon for his assistance in making the NSRCF a resounding success.

The Northeast

Superior Forest Community handed out a Regional Entrepreneurship Award to Trevor Laing of Level Plains in Wawa. The Blueberry Plantation being undertaken by Level Plains is the first of its kind in our region and is a testament to what hard work and determination can lead to.

line. Midget grads Corky Bucci, Greg Vaughan and Mickey Jurynec formed a formidable trio and Raymond Larcher, Robert Morin, John Babin, and Bruce Pellow rounded out the forwards. The only Junior aged goaltender available at the time was Jamie Broomhead to start the season. Freddie Coreau of White River was signed after our first two games and became the starter. We started the season with a decisive win over the Elliot Lake on November 5 in Chapleau.

The turning point in our season took place in the 10th game of the schedule against the 1965-66 champion Sault Ont. Rapids team which was the debut for new no. 1 goalie John Loyst from Timmins. Loyst was outstanding all year and was the only out-of town player we had. He was a winner in his first game as Mickey Jurynec scored in overtime to give the Huskies a hard-fought 4-3 win.

Unfortunately

it was after that game that Coach Lorne Riley became ill and on Doctor's advice could not carry on behind the bench. Secretly, I was at first reluctant to take over the coaching reins because we had my two brothers in the lineup, Ted and George Swanson but I quickly became Manager-Coach for the remainder of the season and the playoffs without regret. Lorne and I confided in each other throughout the season and he attended all the games as a spectator while I handled all the practices and ran the bench. The Huskies committed themselves well and finished the season in 3rd place with a 14 win, 8 loss and 2 ties record and had to meet the first place Wawa Travellers in the playoffs first round.

Next week, in Part Two, Buddy shares the exciting playoffs that led to tremendous success for the first year team.

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Registered Practical Nurse – an education you don't have to leave home for

As many of you have probably heard by now Services de santé de Chapleau Health Services (SSCHS) and Northern College struck an innovative partnership to address the growing Registered Practical Nursing (RPN) shortage in Chapleau. On a one-time basis the two organizations have partnered to offer the Practical Nursing program in our community.

By offering the

community students can go to college full time while remaining in Chapleau. The financial and emotional stress of having to relocate out of the community will be eliminated.

In order to offer the program in Chapleau, SSCHS had to commit to provide and subsidize the full cost of the clinical educators for the program. The total cost of this over the span of the two-year

program in our program is projected to be \$150,000. While SSCHS continues to explore different funding sources for this significant investment in our community, our Chapleau General Hospital Foundation has committed to lending the money to SSCHS in the short term in order for the program to commence on schedule in January


> "Chapleau Health Services needs this program in order

to address our emerging RPN staffing crisis" cites Gail Bignucolo, CEO. "We've worked aggressively trying to attract RPNs to our community for many years now – working job fairs, visiting colleges and endless media and web advertising - all with minimal success. We need to grow our own health professionals, who are then more likely to stay and work in our community. Without this, our ability to maintain sufficient staff to safely operate programs will be in ieopardy."

James Cranney agrees, "Today we have several vacancies and expect several retirements in the next couple of years. Being proactive and investing in our own citizens is essential for stable health care services in our community."

A total of 15 students will be accepted into this 2 year program, which due to the cost, will only be offered on a one time basis. Spaces are filling quickly. 

congratulating the twenty-four newest graduates of the 'NP' Program. 1996 saw the first NP graduates from this university and further positive impact for the north will be felt when the current NP students graduate next year.

Offered via distance

education, the NP program attracts nurses from across Ontario. Nurses qualifying for the NP program have a university nursing degree, years of relevant professional experience and meet the requirements for previous academic achievement. Each

graduate from a Nurse Practitioner Education program must then pass a grueling licensing exam in order to practice as an NP.

"Nurse Practitioners order laboratory tests, diagnose illnesses and prescribe medication and treatments, states Marilyn Butcher, Nurse Practitioner and Clinic Director of the Sudbury District Nurse Practitioner Clinics. Butcher adds, "NPs also practice with a team approach which means that they consult with a variety of health care providers. Among these are physicians, pharmacists, social workers, midwives and more, ensuring that the

individual and family receive the best possible care."

Jana Carter, a resident of Lively, has accepted a position with the Sudbury District Nurse Practitioner Clinics. "The NP program was an incredible amount of work, but well worth it. I'm looking forward to working in an environment where I can use the full scope of practice to optimize patient care." Making history as the first NPled clinic in Canada, its impact on access to care is significant in that only orphan patients are accepted.

"Each new NP graduate is excited about entering practice

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University finance programs – what counts?

Thinking about a career in finance, but you're not sure where to begin? Start by looking at the finance programs at a number of Ontario universities to see what they offer. When you decide which universities that you want to visit, make sure you see two business and finance professors at each of those schools.

Chartered Accountant Martin Bates, Retired Associate Professor in the Department of Business at the University of Guelph, suggests that you clarify any misconceptions about a finance degree and understand what your responsibilities will be when you graduate.

"Ask questions and identify your ultimate goal. What industry interests you and offers career opportunities? Look at each program individually, and ask how each finance program fits your goal. Will this program provide the background you need to work in that industry?"

Chartered Accountant Jim Barnett, Director of the School of Accounting and Finance at the University of Waterloo advises prospective students to also ask what they are prepared to bring to their studies.

"Be prepared to work hard. Finance is a highly complex area that has changed radically in recent years, demanding a much more sophisticated understanding and approach, especially in the global economy. You need focus and determination to be successful in your education and ultimately a finance career. The business climate today also demands a strong ethical grounding, so ensure that you're prepared personally and the program offers an ethical component."

What is Finance?

"Talk to professors and administrators about the content of the program," Barnett continues. "Finance is a broad field that generally encompasses a number of different areas. Know what you would like to

do, and then take the courses that contribute to the end goal."

Portfolio Management is geared to the investment industry and includes wealth management and portfolio analysis. A career in corporate finance can include treasury, debt/equity financing, corporate asset purchases and sales, and risk management.

Broad Business Context

Make sure the finance program you're interested in is rooted in a business context. Bates suggests looking for a finance program that offers the broadest background with options to study individual areas in depth.

"The key is being able to integrate finance knowledge into the larger business context. Does the program prepare you to do that? More than just a specific knowledge of finance is required to be

able to succeed in business today. Students should think big — and perhaps consider learning Mandarin!"

Take Long-Term View

Students should also look ahead and determine how each program will provide the background necessary should they wish to pursue a further designation. Both educators say that undergraduate degrees are certainly useful but further qualifications help students in the job market.

"Employers also look for a professional designation or a post-graduate degree," explains Bates.

"For a Chartered Accountant (CA) designation, a background in accounting and finance is essential, while an economics degree, as well as accounting and finance, can lead to a Chartered Financial Analyst (CFA) designation and maybe a career

on Bay Street."

"Also anticipate additional skills you will need," says Barnett, "because in the global economy we cannot succeed with only technical skills.

"Communication skills are essential, and particularly when you're operating in different countries and cultures. It's not just having the information that counts; it is understanding how to apply that information in a way that people who are not experts in the area can understand."

Finally, in determining which finance program best prepares you for a career, be ready to hone your independent learning and problemsolving skills. The workplace is a tough classroom with no professor to help you find the answers.

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Pork barrel politics still the rule in Harper's Ottawa

REPORT from OTTAWA by Carol Hughes



Stephen Harper's spending spree by way of Canada's Senate is a real departure for a fiscal Conservative out to conquer the waste and largesse of the federal government. You may recall that when he was still running for the job of Prime Minister, Harper was talking about reforming the Senate and moving toward electing Senators and making them more accountable. Considering that Harper's roots are in the Reform Party, a party that called for a Triple-E Senate – Equal, Elected, and Effective – there was little to be surprised about when it came to his stand during that campaign. Also, there was an appetite for his message at that time, Canada being fresh off the sponsorship scandal

that ultimately resulted in the Liberals losing their tenuous grip on government.

Despite his previous stance, and most Canadian's distaste for pork barrel politics, the Prime Minister has appointed 27 Senators in the last year alone. It is important to note that this represents the most Senators ever appointed by a Prime Minister in a one year period. Among the most notable of these appointments were Mike Duffy and Doug Finley. Duffy is well known as a former iournalist and Finley was the campaign manager for the Conservatives latest electoral wins.

What is truly worrisome is that these Senators, Mr. Duffy in particular, seems to be charged with one thing only; promoting the Conservative Party and preparing the ground for the next election. Mr. Duffy, a Senator for

P.E.I., has spent twice what any of the other three Senators for the tiny island has in travel and office expenses - \$108,848 over a three month period. At that rate he will cost Canadians more than a million dollars every two and a half years. The majority of that will go toward promoting the Conservative Party

Consider also the amount of money spent by the government on self-promotion by way of advertising - \$100 million for their economic action plan - and it becomes apparent that the Conservatives will spare no expense to make sure Canadians are receiving their message.

of Canada.

If this type of behaviour continues it will catch up to the current government the way it has with every other government that puts their party fortunes ahead of the job of governing and uses the public purse to do so.

Duffy, ne semblent avoir qu'une mission: faire la promotion du Parti conservateur et préparer le terrain pour la prochaine élection générale. M. trois autres sénateurs de l'Île en déplacements et dépenses de bureau, soit 108 848 \$ en trois mois. À ce rythme, il coûtera aux Cana-diens plus d'un million de dollars tous les deux ans et demi. La majorité de cet argent ser qu'il s'agit grand nombre atteurs jamais trois autres sénateurs sénateurs de l'Île en déplacements et dépenses de bureau, soit 108 848 \$ en trois mois. À ce rythme, il coûtera aux Cana-diens plus d'un million de dollars tous les deux ans et demi. La majorité de cet argent sert à la promotion du Parti conservateur du Canada.

Si on compte aussi l'argent dépensé en publicité par le gouvernement pour se promouvoir – 100 millions de dollars pour le Plan d'action économique – il devient clair que les conservateurs ne lésineront pas sur les moyens pour que les Canadiens reçoivent leur message.

S'il continue d'agir de la sorte, le gouvernement actuel risque de se faire rattraper par ses actions, comme tous les autres gouvernements avant lui qui ont placé leurs intérêts avant ceux du pays et qui se sont servis des deniers publics pour le faire.

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
