Tembec closing newsprint mill, sawmill in northern Ontario, affecting 200

CP/ Citing weak markets and other factors, Tembec Inc. (TSX:TBC) is shutting down a paper machine at its newsprint mill in Kapuskasing, Ont., and a sawmill in Cochrane, Ont., for an indefinite period starting next week, affecting a total of about 200 employees.

The sawmill will shut down Friday, Oct. 19, while the idling of the paper machine will take effect Tuesday, Oct. 23, the Temiscaming-based firm said in a release.

At the paper mill, the company blamed a combination of

poor newsprint market conditions and a woodchip shortage that has occurred largely as a result of numerous sawmill curtailments in northern Ontario.


"The company has reviewed alternate sources of fibre supply, however all options were detrimental to the (paper) mill's financial performance," said Chris Black, senior vicepresident for the newsprint division.


Paper machine No.3 at the newsprint mill in Kapuskasing has an annual capacity of 100,000 tonnes. The idling will impact about 50 employees.

The indefinite shutdown at the Cochrane sawmill is due to "a combination of factors," said Dennis Rounsville, president of Tembec's forest products group. "These include poor demand for lumber, declining product pricing and the continued impact of the high value of the Canadian dollar."

The Cochrane sawmill employs about 150 people.

Tembec's operations are principally in North America and France. employing about 9,000.

How to avoid encounters with black bears while enjoying the outdoors



If you are a hiker, cyclist, jogger, berry picker or anyone who plans to spend some time in "bear country", you need to know how bears behave and what to do if you encounter one. Bears are shy and usually avoid humans; often, you won't see a bear even if they are close by. But real bears

aren't like cartoon bears. Real bears are smart, curious, powerful and potentially dangerous and they don't like surprises. When enjoying the outdoors in bear country, you should:

• Make noise as you move through wooded areas especially in areas where background noise is high such as near streams. Singing, whistling or talking will alert bears to your presence giving them a chance to avoid

• Travel with others if possible.

you.

- Be aware of your surroundings: - Do not wear music headphones – Keep an eye out for signs of bears such as tracks, claw marks on trees, flipped over rocks or logs or fresh bear droppings.
- Carry and have readily accessible a whistle or an air horn, and bear pepper spray.

Know how to use the spray – practice on a stationary object to get a feel for how the canister sprays and to know its limitations.

- Consider carrying a long-handled axe, particularly if you are in "back country."
- · Avoid strong fragrances that may cause a bear to be curious; put any food you are carrying in sealed containers in your pack.
- If you are out with a dog, control it; uncontrolled, untrained dogs may actually lead a bear to you.
- Occasionally scan your surroundings, while berry picking, to check for bears, and rise slowly from your crouched position so you don't startle any nearby bears. They may not recognize you as human in a crouched position. If you encounter a bear:
- Drop any food that you are carrying.
- If the bear is not paying any attention to you, slowly and quietly back away while

watching the bear to arms and throw make sure it is not following vou. Do not approach the bear to get a better look.

• If the bear obviously knows you are there, raise your arms to make yourself look as big as possible and speak in a firm but nonthreatening voice while looking at the bear and backing away. • Watch the bear to gauge its reaction to you. Generally, the noisier the bear is, the less dangerous it is. If a bear huffs, pops its jaws or stomps its paws on the ground, it wants you to back away and give it space. • If the bear approaches you, be aggressive – use your whistle or air horn, yell, stand tall, wave your objects.

- If a bear keeps advancing and is getting close, use your bear pepper spray and anything else to threaten or distract the bear – bears will often first test to see if it is safe to approach you.
- Stand your ground do not run or climb a tree. Bears can run and climb better and faster than you.
- If the bear makes contact, fight back with everything you have. If you are concerned, contact the local Ministry of Natural Resources office in the area you are going to be in to determine whether there have been any reports of bear encounters or conflicts.



Save for an education



(NC)—Postsecondary education can be an expensive proposition for many families but opening a Registered Education Savings Plan (RESP) now, can help ease the burden later.

Chartered Accountant Terri Heggum-Allen, Partner, Loftus Allen & Co. in Oakville says RESPs are a win-win situation. Not only are they designed to encourage parents to put away money for post-secondary education, but they help save taxes too.

"An RESP is similar to an RRSP. It's a savings plan that earns investment income year after year, tax-free while your child is growing up. Then, when the funds are withdrawn for educational purposes, they are taxed in the child's hands at a lower rate. Unlike an RRSP, you do not receive a tax deduction for an RESP contribution."

RESPS have changed significantly since 1998 and now have fewer restrictions, so make sure you purchase a new self-directed plan, with no management fees. These plans are also useful investment opportunities for grandparents or other family members to help finance the education

of the next generation. How RESPs work

"Your financial adviser can explain the various rules governing how RESPs work," explains Chartered Accountant Cynthia Kett, a Principal of Stewart & Kett Financial Advisors Inc. in Toronto.

The laws governing RESPs have changed since June 12, 2007. There is no longer an annual limit of \$4,000 per child, and the lifetime limit has now been increased to \$50,000 from \$42,000.

According to

Kett, parents can also take advantage of government matching grants. "Under the Canada Education Savings Grant (CESG) each year the federal government will contribute 20 per cent of RESP contributions to a maximum of \$500 per child, per year, and \$1,000 per child, per year if you have unused room from previous years."

This grant also provides additional income for families earning below certain thresholds that are adjusted yearly based on inflation. For families earning \$37,178 or less in 2007, the government matching grant is 40 per cent on the first \$500 toward the annual contribution limit. The grant is 30 per cent for families in the \$37,178 to \$74,357 income range on the first \$500 of RESP contributions. The government grant then reverts to 20 per cent for any contributions over the first \$500."

If your child does not pursue higher education, up to \$50,000 in RESP income can be rolled into either your own or a spousal RRSP, provided there is contribution room and your plan meets certain requirements. Alternatively, you can put it into your bank account and pay 20 per cent tax in addition to the regular tax that has to be paid on the income in the year it is taken out of the RESP.

Financial Planning and RESPs Allen advises, "An RESP can be an easy way to save because a certain amount is automatically set aside each month, which is usually less painful than saving on an ad hoc basis. You also end up with more funds overall because of the CESG and you don't have to pay tax on the investment income."

Take care when borrowing money for an RESP – the interest on your loan is not tax-deductible.

More information is available through your Chartered Accountant or the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Ontario.

Gordon Cosens Forest 2010-2020 Forest Management Plan

The Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR), Tembec Enterprises Inc. and the Kapuskasing Local Citizens' Committee invite you to participate in the development of the 2010-2020 forest management plan for the Gordon Cosens Forest (see map). The purpose of this notice is to announce that work has started on the new plan and to encourage you to get involved at this early stage of planning. This forest management plan will outline the long-term management strategy and provide details of where harvest, planting and tending operations and access road construction will take place for the first five-year term 2010-2015. The plan will also identify, in a more general manner, the proposed areas of operations for the second five-year term 2015-2020.

At this stage of the planning process, we want you to tell us what kind of forest and benefits the plan should strive to provide in the short and long-term. As well, we want you to know that background information that will be used during the preparation of the plan will be available for review by the public throughout the planning process. Any additions that you can provide to the background information will be appreciated. Your comments and information will help us to make balanced, well informed and fair decisions as we proceed through the planning process.

Summary maps showing information such as fish and wildlife habitat features (e.g. lake trout lakes, heronries), parks and protected areas, tourism facilities as well as many other features on the Gordon Cosens Forest are available on request. These maps, known as "values maps", will be useful for anyone with a general or specific interest in this management unit.



Superior East CFDC Local Initiatives Fund Approaches \$2 Million in Community Projects

Throughout the past seven years the Superior East CFDC has administered the Local Initiatives Fund (LIF) to all First Nations and the communities of Chapleau, Dubreuilville, Wawa and White River as part of our Community Development Initiatives. Funding for the LIF Program is provided by FedNor.

This is a grant program made up of \$50,000 annually to support regional and locally based community initiatives for not for profit organizations. Individual project contributions do not exceed \$5,000 and are approved on a case-by-case by the CFDC Board of Directors. For a complete listing of additional eligible projects please see www.superioreast.on.ca.

During 2007, the Superior East CFDC supported a total of 14 community projects contributing a total of \$62,748.73. The total dollars leveraged with local partners for community projects totalled \$315,014.94.

The 2007 LIF recipients are; Chapleau Regional Development Corporation, Chapleau Ojibwe, Municipality of Wawa (2), Superior East Regional Business Workshop, Economic Development Corporation of Wawa, Wawa Francophone Summer Camp, Dubreuilville ATV Club, White River Museum, Township of White River, White River Food Bank, Dubreuilville CDEC, Wawa Tourism Group, and the Township of Chapleau.

Each of the 2007 LIF projects certainly made a positive impact on the communities where each project was delivered. As Clara Lauziere, the Township of Chapleau's Economic Development Officer describes the ongoing benefits of Chapleau's 2007 LIF project "The Dimestore Fishermen Package". "With the help of the LIF program, the Township of Chapleau was able to successfully host the Dimestore Fishermen TV program in our community. With a 14 pound, 33 inch walleye caught in local waters, the marketability of our area as a stellar fishing destination is increasing exponentially. We now have access to some first class footage that will help us well beyond this one fishing episode."

Since the program's inception in 2001 there has been a total of 86 LIF's approved and disbursed. The grand total disbursed throughout the region for community projects has been \$348,450.36. When combined with the contributions of our community partners, which totalled \$1,647,070, the fund has supported almost \$2 million in local projects across the region.

Although the 2007 LIF season is completed, we look forward to once again kicking off a new LIF season starting January 2008. Please watch for a small workshop scheduled in early December where the CFDC staff will present the application process and some minor changes to the program going forward.



Senior Psychological Abuse



This sometimes called emotional abuse. Some researchers refer to it by formal terms such as "chronic verbal aggression".

Psychological abuse involves actions that diminish a person's sense of identity, dignity, and self-worth.

Psychological abuse can make the older person feel "less of a person". Some abused people state that psychological or

emotional abuse is the most hurtful form of abuse.

Psychological abuse may make an older person fearful or cause the person mental anguish. This may be done in several ways, including by making the people uncertain about themselves and their abilities (lowering their self esteem), threatening some form of violence, or threatening to abandon or neglect the person.

Psychological abuse includes behaviours such as:

Name calling, Yelling, Insulting the person, Threatening the person or threatening to take away something that is important to them, Imitating or mocking the person, Swearing at them, Ignoring, Isolating the person, Excluding them from meaningful events or activities.

Psychological abuse also happens when the older adult is excluded from decision making when the person is capable and wants to be included (in other words. "making decisions for them"), and depriving them of their rights.

Justice Canada includes these as some examples of psychological abuse:

Threatening to use violence Threatening to abandon them Intentionally frightening them. Making them fear that they will not receive the food or care they need. Lying to them. Failing to check allegations of abuse against them Insulting, swearing, or name calling. Making derogative or slanderous statements about them to others. Socially isolating them, or failing to let them have visitors.

It can also include:

Withholding important information that they have a right to know Demeaning them because of the language they speak Intentionally misinterpreting their traditional practices

Repeatedly raising the issue of death with them. disrespectful. Telling them that they are too much trouble.

Ignoring or excessively criticizing them. Being overfamiliar and

Unreasonably ordering them around. Treating them like servants. Treating them like children.
