Exercise by local man leads to a cleaner environment

You may have seen his blue vehicle parked on the side of our local highways wondering what this man was up to. The mystery is over!

After retiring

in November 2000 Jean-Pierre Côté kept busy catching up with the upkeep of his home and vehicles along with his yearly summer camping treks.

In 2006 Mr. Côté wanted to increase his physical activities and keep in shape by walking regularly. Having decided to take his daily walks along our local highways, Mr. Côté noticed a large amount of empty cans and bottles strewn all about.

This led to a yearly ritual of

collecting empty cans and bottles, covering local Northern Ontario highways up to Sultan on Highway 129 South, past Horwood Lake on Highway 101 East and to Wawa on Highway 101 West.

He covers both sides of the road by parking his vehicle, walking 3 kilometer up one side of the road then returning to his vehicle covering the other side of the road.

Since 2006, Mr. Côté picked up 6,368 cans which in itself saved 1,356 liters of gasoline that would otherwise have been

used to fabricate new cans and 2,928 bottles. What make this somewhat worrisome is that the aforementioned cans and bottles are all of the beer variety. An additional 80 large industrial garbage bags of crushed soft drink cans were also collected in that time period.

Mr. Côté has kept fit while cleaning up the environment and possibly preventing a few forest fires.

"Sometimes you can hardly touch the bottles because of the heat from the sun"

Mr. Côté says "And there they are laying in dry grass" he adds.







Although never declaring himself a recycler, Mr. Côté seems to be comfortable with the idea of recycling as piles of cardboard and boxes of tin cans can be seen in his garage waiting to be properly disposed of.

Once the walking exercises are over, the real work begins as each and every can is crushed, one by one with a modified hand press before it is delivered to the recycling facility. "The word seems to

have gotten out that I collect cans" Mr. Côté says. "Sometimes I come home and find a bag full of cans at my door step" he adds.

As stated in previous Chapleau Express articles, recycling is possible if we put our mind to it and if we make a legitimate and honest effort in preserving our environment thus extending the life of our landfill site and saving valuable taxpayers dollars. All it takes is the individual efforts, like Mr. Côté demonstrates, to really get the ball going.

Hornepayne. Perhaps this board member should be asked to attend Parent Council Meetings. See what issues for your community that board member is supporting. Let that board member know the issues you want taken back to the board. Again, a Parents' Committee may not have the power to make changes but they have the right to have their views heard.

One fairly controversial issue that emerged over a year ago, March 19, 2007, was the announcement of the Minister of Education that "Three New Grants Are Latest Improvements To Funding Formula". Specifically, one announcement referred to the intention of funding a minimum of 14 teachers at the secondary school level and 7.5 for the elementary (with over 50 students). The Ministry of Education obviously believes that 14 teachers are necessary to provide an adequate high school program. That funding was provided to the boards. Chapleau does not have 14 teachers. Running a small school is very expensive. We are burden on the Algoma District School Board. Since Mike Harris

amalgamated school boards and eliminated the Chapleau Board of Education I have seen the program decline. Some courses have been cut due to lack of staff while others have been combined. Over the years I have seen it all. Combining Grade 9 academic and applied science students together in one classroom, trying to teach two different senior level math courses at the same time, having students take correspondence courses and even some online learning. The success rates of these students is poor. The small change of guaranteeing fourteen teachers in a high school would offer these students far more opportunities to be successful. This, in my opinion, when all past changes are examined, when all options are explored, is the one that would make the greatest difference to the success of the individual student in a small school. If our school is so expensive to operate that the money intended to pay for 14 teachers must be spent on computers or oil to keep the building heated than the Ministry must be persuaded to look at the funding of small schools once again.

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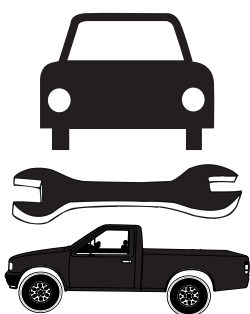

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Survey finds Canadians are dedicated to being green



(N C) — Some lengths in their environmental-Canadian commitment to friendliness. In fact, to go to extraordinary

the first TD Friends of the Environment Foundation 'How Green Are You?' Survey revealed that 2% of Canadians even ended a relationship with someone who didn't care about the environment.

While most won't go to those extremes, when it comes to being environmentally responsible 96% of Canadians give themselves a passing grade. In fact, when asked to grade their environmental-friendliness, 25% gave themselves an "A" and nearly 60% gave themselves a "B." Only 2% gave themselves an "F" and said that they did not really care about the environment.

"Our survey was designed to identify how many Canadians 'walk the

talk' when it comes to being environmentally-friendly," says Matthew Fortier, Regional Manager, TD Friends of the Environment Foundation. "The results overwhelmingly demonstrate that Canadians are dedicated to making green choices as part of their daily lives."

- The survey also found:
- 94% of Canadians report that they recycle - 43% recycle everything and 51% recycle when convenient
 - 82% of Canadians say they use reduced-energy light bulbs in their home
 - Close to one-third say that they regularly walk or bike to work or school
 - 64% report using energy-efficient appliances in their homes
 - One-half of respon-

dents say they unplug appliances, like the toaster, when not in use

- 21% take public transportation regularly

"One way that Canadians can take their personal 'green' commitment to the next level is to donate or volunteer with an environmental organization such as the TD Friends of the Environment Foundation," says Fortier. "The survey showed that while 43% go out of their way to buy local grown products, only 20% of Canadians donate to an environmental charity and just 12% volunteer for environmental causes."

Ontario Weather Review: August 2008

Rainfall this summer has either been a deluge or a dearth.

For some areas, record-breaking rainfall was on tap. At Toronto's Pearson Airport, it was the wettest June, July and August ever for this location. The three-month total of 396.2 millimetres shattered the former three-month, high-water mark, set in 1986, of 335.9 millimetres. And Peterborough washed away both its one-month and three-month standards. Its June-July-August total

was 430 millimetres, more than the 2004 mark of 412.6 millimetres. On the other hand, Windsor established a new low rainfall record this month.

The rain has been unusually heavy at a few locations in Southern Ontario, but the dry spots are more widespread, with many locations reporting less than half their typical monthly allotment.

Temperatures were generally within a degree or two of normal, but Pickle Lake stands out with a value well above normal. A few other locations in Northern and Northwestern Ontario also tended to be on the warmer side.

Severe Weather

There was quite a contrast in active weather from the first half of the month to the last half. The first half of the month continued the trend started earlier this summer of a

number of days with shower and thunderstorm activity throughout much of the province, with little in the way of breaks in between. The weekend of August 9-10 was likely particularly memorable for many, given its soggy nature at a number of locations. For example, Sudbury picked up 26.6 millimetres of rain on August 9, followed by an additional 33.0 millimetres the next day. Hamilton wasn't much better off, recording 37.2 millimetres on the Saturday and an extra 12.0 millimetres on the Sunday.

A well-defined cold front on August 18 brought showers and strong thunderstorms to portions of Central Ontario during the late morning and midday hours. It then made its way south to bring more showers and thunderstorms to Southern Ontario during the afternoon

and evening hours. Some tree damage was reported due to gusty winds in a small community to the west of Sudbury around midday. Significant shower and thunderstorm activity that occurred in the Peterborough area during the early evening hours that day dumped 61.5 millimetres. This was not far off the single-day rainfall record for August of 70 millimetres, which occurred on August 31, 1995.

However, after this noteworthy frontal passage, the weather settled down

some-what with a string of relatively quiet weather days. In a summer that has seen its fair share of interesting occurrences (i.e., early onset of waterspouts on the Great Lakes and Lake Simcoe, numerous funnel cloud reports including reports from downtown Toronto), yet another occurred in August: the relative lack of thunderstorm activity in the Windsor area. Windsor is the thunderstorm capital of Canada. Yet, this past month, aside from a few days of thunderstorm activity, Windsor was

relatively quiet while other parts of the province continue to rumble and roar.

No new tornadoes were added to the list this month, so the number still stands at nine so far this year. Two events are still under investigation from earlier this year as possible tornadoes: June 23 in the Scarborough area and July 18 in the Madoc area. Once the investigations are completed for both of these events in early September, they could both be added to this year's tornado list.

Plus de 2 000 enseignants canadiens ont participé au sondage réalisé par Bureau en Gros et la

Hunter syndrome sufferer left behind by Ontario drug plan: 11-year-old boy's family forced to consider U.S. for treatment



(NC)—At only 11 years of age Szymon Cajmer is already in a fight for his life.

That's because Szymon is living with a rare genetic disorder known as MPS II or (Hunter Syndrome) and his family is in a race against time to gain access to a potentially life-saving drug therapy.

The Windsor, Ontario family is threatening to move out west or to the U.S. so that Szymon can receive a life-saving enzyme replacement drug therapy called Elaprased which was approved by Health Canada last year, but is not funded in Ontario. It is the first and only therapy approved for

the treatment of MPS II, and halts the progression of the disease. It is funded in B.C. and Alberta, and in many other countries throughout the world.

Hunter Syndrome is a very rare (four patients in Ontario) but devastating genetic condition caused by an

enzyme deficiency. It appears in children as young as age two and nearly always occurs in males.

It occurs when the body lacks the enzyme necessary for breaking down molecules called mucopolysaccharides. Because the body can't break down these complex molecules, they build up in harmful amounts in certain cells and tissues and cause permanent, progressive damage throughout the body, including the heart, bones, joints, respiratory system and central nervous system leading to a vastly shortened lifespan.

Szymon's mother, Justyna Cajmer, is living the nightmare of helplessly watching her son's health deteriorate knowing there is a treatment available that could help.

"If Szymon doesn't receive the enzyme replacement therapy the progression of the disease will continue," explained Cajmer. "His organs will be more affected. His life expectancy will become shorter and shorter and his quality of life will worsen. There will be no more hope for us."

Szymon was diagnosed with Hunter Syndrome at the age of four. Since then the disease has taken a toll on his entire body. Three years ago he lost his hearing, his organs are now being compromised, his joints and hips are stiff and contracted, he has developed Carpal tunnel syndrome and his respiratory system has been affected.

According to

Kirsten Harkins, the Executive Director of The Canadian MPS Society, MPS II is a progressive disease, so early intervention is critical. "We are fortunate that children in Alberta and B.C. with MPS II are receiving enzyme replacement therapy. It is urgent that children in Ontario have access as well to this treatment."

"I think it's a matter of basic human rights, that we're all equal from coast to coast and that we have the rights to the same treatment," added Cajmer. "It's in the Ontario Government's hands now, we need quick actions."

If the treatment

will not be funded in Ontario Cajmer said the family will not have many options left. "Do we have to leave Ontario to go to another province or the U.S. to have access to treatment?"

She hopes not as uprooting their established life in the community would be a difficult and an unnecessary reality to bear. But not more so than the anguish of watching her son's health and quality of life deteriorate before her eyes. Back to school time for both kids and dogs

(NC)—For as long as many of us can remember, everyone from our mothers to our doctors has been telling us that we need to get a good night's sleep. But we typically focus on the number of hours we get versus thinking critically about the quality of our time spent sleeping. The Better Sleep Council Canada tells us that the average adult needs seven to eight hours of sleep per night, but in

the end it's better to get six hours of solid sleep than eight hours of fragmented sleep.

Why? Because uninterrupted sleep has a much more positive impact on our overall health. One-fifth of Canadians consider only 40 to 60 per cent of their sleep to be good quality sleep – not great! Disrupted sleep prevents the body from restoring itself and leaves you feeling tired and drowsy the next

day. Broken sleep can even impact your daily life, preventing you from functioning at your most productive level.

We can't always control the factors that wake us up at night, like babies and kids. But sleep research has shown that street noise, eating too much before bed and pets are also top factors disrupting Canadians' sleep. So at the very

minimum, take the following steps to help you get the best sleep possible:

- Do what you can to make sure your as dark and quiet as possible
- Keep pets and other distractions, like computers and other electronic devices, out of the bedroom
- Avoid very heavy meals at night, and stop eating within three hours of bedtime

Thinking about

what you're sleeping on is also critical, since an uncomfortable or old mattress can cause you to toss and turn throughout the night. Family physician Dr. Alan Kaplan recommends checking your mattress regularly and replacing it every eight to ten years. "Looking at your mattress is one of the first steps in

ensuring better quality sleep – it's a no-brainer," says Kaplan. "You spend one third of your life sleeping on your bed, so make sure it's as comfortable and supportive as possible."

How to make pizza a nutritional powerhouse



(NC)—Pizza has mixed reviews when it comes to its virtues – or lack of them.

On one hand, a slice of pizza often contains ingredients from each of the four major food groups: Vegetables and Fruit; Grain Products; Dairy and Alternatives; plus

Meat and Alternatives. On the other hand, it's the quality and quantity of choices that determine the nutritional punch in each bite.

Pizza can be a nutritional powerhouse, but standard toppings like pepperoni, sausage,

bacon and extra cheese, can deliver as many as 700 calories in a two-slice serving. That represents as much as 40 percent of the total daily calories recommended for women and 30 percent for men. Imagine the excess calories for those who eat more

than two slices!

If you would like to know more about your favourite foods like pizza, consider making a toll-free call and speaking directly to a registered dietitian. The Eat Right Ontario call centre (1-877-510-510-2) is available Monday to Friday, from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., ET and provides trustworthy nutrition and disease prevention information free-of-charge to all residents in the province.

Here's a snapshot of the type of pizza ingredients that a dietitian might recommend:

- Vegetables are by far the best topping for a pizza and offer a wide range of options. Experiment with different varieties such as green and red peppers, zucchini, broccoli, or be adventurous and pick a

fruity topping like pineapple or mango.

- Cheese belongs to the Milk and Alternatives food group and is an excellent source of calcium and protein. Keep the fat content to a reasonable amount by ordering regular cheese, rather than "double."

- Meat is a source of protein – and fat. Leaner choices are

chicken and ham. Typically, pepperoni is leaner than beef and sausage. Multi-meat pizzas contain high levels of fat, calories and salt.


- Crusts made from whole wheat or multigrain are more nutritious. They deliver a boost of fibre and fewer calories than traditional dough crusts.

Canadian political facts

- Canada became The Dominion of Canada on July 1st, 1867. We officially became a country in 1982.
- Canada is a constitutional monarchy and a federal state with a democratic parliament.
- The Parliament is in Ottawa and is comprised of the House of Commons (Lower House) and the Senate (The Upper House -whose members are appointed)
- Members of Parliament are elected approximately every 4 years.
- Elections may be called early or terms can be as long as 5 years. A vote of non-confidence in the government (where the government no longer has the support of 50 percent of the House) may also force an election. This occurred in 1979 when PM Joe Clark's government lost the support of the House and an election was called within a year of that government coming to power. Senators are appointed by the Prime Minister and hold their positions until they are 75.
- Right now there are currently 5 officially recognized parties in the House of Commons: The Liberals, Canadian Alliance, Bloc Quebecois, Progressive Conservatives and the New Democratic Party.
- Canada currently sits on the United Nations Security Council as a non-permanent representative.
- Canada is a member of many international organizations including NATO, OSCE, OAS and APEC.
