Building A Better Future For Ontario Students

As summer winds down into fall, children everywhere are gearing up for the challenge of a new school year.

It brings with it an opportunity for students to reconnect with friends, but also the challenge to shoot higher and achieve more, to build a better future for themselves.

As a province, improving education is the single most important thing we can do to secure our future and the future of our children. We want every student to

succeed and reach their full potential.

As this year's Education Quality and Accountability Office (EQAO) results show, we are continuing to make progress. Student achievement is continuing to rise, and we remain committed to ensuring that publicly funded education is the very best education.

Dr. G.E. Young a pioneer in Canada's cable television industry

Chapleau Moments

If someone asked you who the pioneers of cable television were in Canada, immediately you may be inclined to say Rogers or Shaw, the giants of the industry in English Canada today. And to a great extent, you are right.

But although most Canadians have likely never heard of him, Dr G.E, Young who practiced medicine in our small isolated northern Ontario community of Chapleau for more than 50 years, deserves a place right up there among the giants of the cable industry. In the 1960s Dr Young placed microwave towers on the top of a hill, originally called "Slaughterhouse Hill"

and later "Dr Young's Hill" and started his "clothesline" cable system with green and white poles and wire in all the back lanes of the town, with dishes atop his medical and apartment complex in downtown Chapleau.

In the early years reception was limited and snowy, and the stations few, but Dr Young's efforts brought cable television to a community that would otherwise have likely been limited to the CBC affiliate station in Timmins for many years.

I am of course

aware that it was A.J. Grout the president of Smith and Chapple Ltd. who brought the first cable system to Chapleau in the late 1950s. Mr. Grout also founded Mid North News and brought Basil Scully, who had been with CKSO TV in Sudbury to run it. Mr. Scully also gave the local news on CHAP TV each evening. In 1958 I had a weekly teenage program on the station, with Phyllis

But, it was Dr. Young who kept his system going after Mr. Grout's closed down, and we had television, albeit the good doctor had many trials in keeping it going.

Chrusoskie, Bill

McLeod and others as

co-hosts.

He waged many battles with the CRTC, the regulatory agency, as he had little patience for the bureaucracy as he brought us as many channels as he could find without much regard for the arcane rules of Canadian television broadcasting.

However, in 1982, when his license was up for renewal, once again Dr Young made history. He convinced the CRTC that the people of Chapleau had a right to be heard live at the hearing, but as the hearing was in Toronto, very few would be able to attend. So we launched a letter writing

campaign in support of Dr. Young's applications, so that all those who wrote could be heard at the hearing.

To its credit the CRTC agreed that Chapleau supporters could be heard without being physically present at the hearing room. So, an audio link was established over phone lines from Dr Young's office in Chapleau to the CRTC hearing in Toronto, and Chapleau citizens were able to make their case live. And I was so privileged to host the Chapleau end of the hearing and broadcast it live with video over the system's community channel. It was the first time in Canadian history that the CRTC had permitted a hearing of this kind where everyone was not physically present in the room.

Before you ask, no, at the time we were not able to provide video links in 1982. Today it is commonplace in Canada for hearings to be conducted with video links, but not so

27 years ago.

Graham Bertrand assumed responsibility for all the technical aspects of the production. Dr. Young and Tony Byvank were in Toronto.

When I visited Dr Young in 2001 on the occasion of the 100th anniversary of the incorporation of Chapleau, he had recently sold the cable system, bringing to an end about 40 years of his involvement in providing television to the community.

Dr G.E "Ted" Young, born and raised in Chapleau, graduated from Queen's University in medicine and never planned to return home. He interned at Columbia University in New York and went home to replace a doctor for six months and he stayed making Chapleau a better place for being a true visionary who despite many challenges worked for his people.

At 94 years of age, Dr Young lives in retirement in Chapleau.

Rusty Crayfish (Orconectes Rusticus)

Hi there folks, this will be my last article for the summer and I just want to say Thank you for reading my articles and would like to thank the Chapleau Express for printing my articles. The rusty crayfish is native to North America but has

been introduced to many northern lakes and streams where they cause a variety of problems. It is highly likely Rusty Crayfish was introduced as bait by non resident fishermen. The first findings of Rusty Crayfish in Ontario were as early as the The Rusty 1960s. Crayfish is one of 350 crayfish species that be found in North American waters. The native crayfish are one of the highest at-risk groups among plants, and animals with more than half of the species being vulnerable, imperilled or presumed/possibly extinct.

Characteristics:

The Rusty Crayfish has a brown body, and with greenish rusty coloured claws with dark black bands near the tip. Rusty Crayfish has more robust claws and is also larger then any other native species of crayfish. There are rusty patches on either side of the carapace (may or may not always be present) it is like you picked up the rusty crayfish with your rusty paint on your finger and thumb. On average a rusty crayfish can grow up 10 cm (3.9 inches) in length not including the claws.

Rusty Crayfish will inhabit lakes, rivers, ponds, and streams with adequate rock, logs, and debris cover. They prefer bottoms of clay, silt and gravel, and are most active from spring to fall when the temperatures are above 8 degrees Celsius. When reproducing, they can lay from 50 to 575 eggs at one time.

Rusty Crayfish are omnivores so they will eat anything but prefer high protein foods. They feed on aquatic plants, benthic invertebrates (which include aquatic worms, snails, leeches and insects). They also eat decaying plants and animals, fish eggs, and small They have a fish. more aggressive nature than the native species in the areas where they are introduced to.

Distribution:

Rusty Crayfish are originally from the streams of Ohio, Kentucky, and Tennessee regions.

Used as baitfish by angles and have invaded portions of Ontario, Minnesota, Wisconsin, New York, Vermont, and Maine. The first Ontario reports of Rusty Crayfish were from the Kawartha Lakes in the early 1960s, since then Rusty Crayfish have invaded several areas in the Southern and North western parts of the province. In the Northwest they are found in Lake of the Woods, Quetico Provincial Park, Lake Superior and it's tributaries near Thunder Bay. In the Southern part of Ontario they are found in the Ottawa River Drainage; the upper Mississippi drainage in Lanark and Frontenac counties; the Trent-Severn waterways: Eastern Toronto region; Bedford Lake on the Bruce Peninsula and Eramosa River near Guelph. There are two confirmed lakes in the Chapleau area that

have Rusty Crayfish in them; they are Borden Lake and Windermere. It is possible that Rusty Crayfish will continue to spread through out Ontario lakes and rivers and possibly spread into the neighbouring provinces of Quebec and Manitoba.

Impact:Rustv

Rusty Crayfish can consume twice as

much food as Native Species of the same size due to a higher metabolic rate. They have a ravenous appetite for Aquatic plants; they can degrade aquatic plant beds to the detriment of the aquatic invertebrates and juvenile fish that depend on these for habitat. It is said what Rusty Cont'd on P.7



Alcohol was a factor in 3 of the boating occurrences.

"The many fast moving water drowning deaths this spring and summer are all the more tragic given that life jackets were available to the victims who simply chose not to wear them," explains Chief Superintendent Scott Tod - Regional Commander-North East Region. "Please, expect the unexpected and wear your life jacket-always!"

Police will be concentrating on highway traffic patrols during the peak travel days of Friday and Monday, and on waterway/trail patrol Saturday and Sunday, when boat and ATV enthusiasts are more likely to take to the water and trails, themselves.

"Our main enforcement objective is to slow traffic down," explains Inspector Garry MacPherson. "Officers will take a no nonsense approach to tailgating and other aggressive driving behaviour that tend to force other road users into dangerous situations. The higher the speed - the more severe the impact and even a small reduction in speed can make a big difference in a driver's ability to avoid a collision."

Crashes not

only include other vehicles. If you drive in Northern Ontario, the possibility of meeting nature's wildlife is present at every turn. Animals are difficult to spot - even harder to avoid. Colliding with a moose is like hitting a car. Drivers are urged to stay alert behind the wheel.

Crayfish do to theaquatic plants is as equivalent to clearcutting a cutting a forest. The juvenile Rusty Crayfish feed heavily on benthic invertebrates like mayflies, stoneflies, midges, and side swimmers. Byconsuming large quantities of benthic invertebrates, fish eggs, and young fish, these Crayfish could

also compete with juvenile game fish, and forage fish species for food.

The Rusty Crayfish out competes the native crayfish for food, and can also chase them out of the best daytime hiding spots, which can make the native populations vulnerable to being eaten by birds and fish. Fish prefer native crayfish because they have a softer shell

compared to the Rusty Crayfish which has a harder shell. A decrease in the native crayfish population could limit the food source for fish. The Rusty crayfish is more aggressive then native crayfish. Under attack a Rusty crayfish will now swim away like the native crayfish but will hold its claws up in a defense manner.

crayfish because they N a t i v e have a softer shell crayfish species

Orconectes virilis and Orcenectes Propinquus have been displaced in the areas of the Kawartha Lakes region Northern Ontario and the Wisconsin by Rusty crayfish. Rusty crayfish can also mate with the native crayfish species such as Orcenectes Propinguus which can hasten the local


extinction of the native species.

Prevention/Control

Once Rusty crayfish invades a water body it is difficult to control, it's vital to prevent their spread to other water bodies. Crayfish must be used in the same water body where it was caught. Crayfish may not be transported over land, and make

sure to dump any unused live crayfish bait in the trash.

Mesures pour réduire les risques de propagation de la grippe dans les écoles

Cette année, la saison de grippe est différente des précédentes. Deux types de virus de la grippe circuleront parmi la population cet automne – les virus de la grippe saison-nière, et le nouveau virus de la grippe H1N1. Des cas de grippe H1N1 ont été signalés dans quelques camps d'été en Ontario, y compris un camp de jeunes dans le Grand Sudbury. Il faut donc s'attendre à des cas de grippe dans les écoles après la rentrée scolaire.

« La grippe est une maladie que nous connaissons bien, et nous savons comment réduire les risques de propagation » a déclaré la Dre Penny Sutcliffe, médecin-hygiéniste de Sudbury et du district. « Cependant, les jeunes enfants sont plus vulnérables, probablement à cause de leur difficulté à suivre les consignes concernant le lavage des mains, la toux et l'éternuement. Nous collaborerons étroitement avec les autorités scolaires afin de surveiller et d'évaluer chaque situation de manière à protéger la santé du personnel, des élèves et des bénévoles » a ajouté la Dre Sutcliffe.

Il n'est pas recommandé, à l'heure actuelle, de fermer des écoles. Cependant, si les responsables d'écoles ou un conseil scolaire songeaient à

fermer des écoles, ces personnes devront communiquer avec le Service de santé publique afin d'examiner leur situation particulière. La décision de fermer une école tiendra compte de plusieurs facteurs comme le nombre de personnes affectées, et les conséquences opérationnelles, sociales et économiques de cette fermeture.

Par son enseignement, ses comportements et ses décisions, le personnel éducatif joue un rôle important en matière de protection de la santé des élèves, du personnel et des membres de la collectivité. En guise de soutien au personnel, le ministère de la Santé et des Soins de longue durée a distribué des nouvelles lignes directrices pour la prévention et la gestion de la grippe H1N1 dans les écoles élémentaires et secondaires de l'Ontario. Ces nouvelles directives sont également disponibles dans le site du Service de santé publique de Sudbury et du district, www.sdhu.com.

Les directives adressées aux écoles é l é m e n t a i r e s e t secondaires font la promotion des mesures suivantes pour réduire la propagation de la grippe, notamment se

laver les mains, tousser e t é t e r n u e r c o r r e c t e m e n t , demander aux gens malades de rester à la maison, et veiller à la p r o p r e t é d e s installations scolaires.

Voici ce que vous pouvez faire pour vous maintenir en santé, vous et votre famille:

- 1. Lavez-vous les mains souvent avec du savon et de l'eau chaude pendant au moins 15 secondes. Faites-le après avoir éternué ou toussé et après avoir touché des surfaces que d'autres ont pu toucher.
- 2. Ay ez à la portée de la main un désinfectant pour les mains à base d'alcool, au travail, à la maison et dans la voiture.
- 3. Toussez et éternuez sur votre manche ou sur un mouchoir, et non dans vos mains. Jetez le mouchoir immédiatement après usage.
- 4. Nettoyez et désinfectez les surfaces que l'on touche fréquemment.
- 5. Assurez votre protection et celle des autres en parlant à votre professionnel de la santé au sujet des vaccins de la grippe saisonnière et de la grippe H1N1.

6. Si vous êtes malade, restez à la maison.

En Ontario, la majorité des cas de

grippe pandémique H1N1 ont été signalés chez des jeunes adultes en santé, et la plupart des cas étaient bénins. Le groupe des 5 à 24 ans rapporte la plus grande proportion de cas compara-tivement aux autres tranches d'âge.

Quels sont les symptômes de la grippe saisonnière et de la grippe H1N1?

Les deux types de grippe ont des symptômes semblables, allant de bénins à graves : une fièvre soudaine, une toux, un mal de gorge, de la fatigue et des douleurs musculaires. Chez les enfants de moins de

c i n q a n s , l e s vomissements et la diarrhée sont plus fréquents et la fièvre pourrait être très légère.

Research shows that effective literacy and numeracy, well designed learning pathways, effective assessment practices and a positive learning environment of commitment, culture and caring make a difference to improve student learning for all. To continue our progress on our key priorities, this year we have set our system smart goals to focus on these pillars:

Literacy and Numeracy: The number of students achieving Provincial standard in the EQAO Assessments in Literacy and Numeracy will increase 7% in Elementary and 4% in Secondary by June 2010.

Pathways: By June 2010, 100% of elementary and secondary schools will have engaged all Intermediate (Gr. 7&8) and Senior (Gr. 11&12) students in transition projects to support the transition to secondary school or to a post secondary pathway.

Assessment: School Improvement Plans will indicate that a minimum of 5% of ADSB teachers utilize student portfolios and student-led conferences as assessment for/as learning for the 2009/2010 school year.

Community, Culture and Caring: By June 2010, data from the biannual ADSB School Climate Survey will indicate a minimum of a 75% satisfaction rate in all areas.

And so, as we begin our new school year, we know that our teachers and support staff are very optimistic and ready to do the very best they can for our students. As always, we will be relying on our strong relationships with parents and community partners to strengthen our efforts to improve student learning, make our schools safer and meet the needs of students with specific needs.

It is inspirational to know that as we deepen our understanding and reflect on the role each of us plays in achieving our key priorities, the impact spreads. You see, every time we help lead another student to a successful destination, another person in our community benefits. Whether the benefit is to a family member, a co-worker, an employer or a community partner, we, as a community get stronger when our students succeed. The success of our students needs to be everyone's priority as they are our future.

That should leave us with a very good feeling! We are excited about the possibilities that await us as we provide the best possible education for our students in preparing them to "Reach to the Future".
