Public meeting airs health concerns

A crowd of Chapleau residents left a public meeting on health services in the community last Tuesday evening with a better understanding of how those services are delivered, although concerns over the turnover of medical doctors in Chapleau in recent years was apparent.

The meeting ended with an impassioned plea by Lucy Bignucolo, the interim chair of the board of directors of Services de santé de Chapleau Health Services, which operates the hospital. "We really have to work together in the community," she stated. "You can't make progress if you have one side working against the other," said Bignucolo, adding: "I don't know what it is out there in the community."

She challenged those at the meeting to come forward and

become board members. After the meeting, at east one member of the audience took up the challenge and indicated a desire to sit on the board.

While the meeting explained in detail, the status of medical services under the administration of Services de santé de Chapleau Health Services, the large, and polite audience kept questioning the reasons surrounding why as many as 8 physicians have cycled through the community in the past 20

The answer may have come from Doctor David Cotterhil, who left Chapleau to practice in Wawa. When asked by an audience member what could have been done to keep him in Chapleau, Doctor Cotteril said there were several reasons, including being able to practice with a group of physicians in Wawa and quality of life. "We had friends in Wawa and it

seemed like a nice place to practice. He pointed out that community has a large medical team.

He also had some advice for the crowd. "Get on the Board and see what's going on. Attend the annual meeting," said Doctor Cotterill.

Chapleau has two physicians and one of them, Doctor Stanley Shapiro, used the meeting to vent his frustration in dealing with the local situation. He told the board of directors of the hospital, who attended the meeting along with the township municipal council, that Chapleau is not a friendly place.

"Despite the good intentions of the board members, I have not been a part of the process" adding: "I have never been approached by board members for my opinion." At the same time, Doctor Shapiro noted the interest shown at the meeting and in the past

few weeks. "It's fine for all of us to complain, but we have to have positive follow up," he stated.

The board told him there were several avenues open to him to become involved.

At the same time, the board's chief executive officer, Gail Bignucolo, said the board should formalize the process and send a letter each year to doctors. She also stated that the hospital's current Chief of medical staff, Doctor Frank Broomhead, has told her he would be happy if the board could find someone else.

Mayor Earle J. Freeborn agreed there should be another doctor to serve the community. "But look at your community," he said. "You can call today and get an appointment for tomorrow." The Mayor also suggested the new Northern Ontario Medical school should help to eleviate the doctor shortage in the

Councillor Richard Bignucolo, a former chairman of the hospital board said he was like many others who volunteered. "When we recruited Doctor Shapiro there was a commitment. "The community should be proud of Doctor Shapiro's accomplishments."

The quality of life comparison between Chapleau and Wawa came as the answer to a question by another audience member who wanted to know how Wawa, with no shopping malls, has a total of six doctors, while Chapleau has just two.

She was told doctors in Wawa participate in the Northern Group Funding program, under the province of Ontario, and Chapel can't force doctors to do that. The doctors in Chapleau are not employees of the hospital, and operate independently.

The meeting heard that Chapleau has pursued doctors through recruitment campaigns but finds it difficult competing with larger cites and communities.

A third party review of working conditions at the hospital has been completed and one of its recommendations is hiring another chief of medical staff to relieve some of the current pressure.

And if patients have a complaint with service, there is a local process and provincial mechanisms as well.

There were many views on the status of health care in the community offered.

One audience member stated that Chapleau has got a bad reputation, while Nellie Mitchell had another view."If you have to be in hospital, Chapleau is the place to be," stated Mitchell to a round of applause from the audience.

New column: for the green thumb

Gardening from the ground up **Cutting Back**

Summer blooms are dying off, and even the late bloomers of the garden are beginning to fade. The once cheery and colourful flowerbed, now with browning stems and tattered petals, begins to serve as a sombre reminder that winter is on its way. Cutting back your herbaceous perennials is not necessary to the health of the plants, but it can help to keep your garden looking tidy

until the snow comes. 'Herbaceous' is the term applied to those plants that die back right to the ground in winter, and then grow again in the spring. Cutting the stems down in autumn saves having to pick dead plant material out from among delicate new growth next season. It is really only done for looks, so don't feel too guilty if you are

too busy to get around to it this year! people, especially those with naturalistic or country style gardens, prefer to let plants die back naturally. Lowgrowing plants, like rock plants and ground cover, do not need to be cut back.

Different plants go dormant (begin their winter hibernation) at different times. Right up until dormancy, the plant needs its leaves to make food that will be stored in the roots for spring growth. It is best to wait until the leaves and stems begin to turn brown or to flop over before cutting them.

Cut stems off a few inches from the ground. The stubs will help to insulate and protect the crown of the plant underneath the snow. Plants that will be buried under heavy snow, like at the side of a



walkway or under the edge of a roof, are better left uncut. Instead, bend the top half of the stems downwards to form a protective cover over the crown.

Even if the leaves are still green, old flower heads can be removed. Removing dead flowers is called 'deadheading'. Cut the flower stalks back to the nearest leaf, or right to the ground if it is a bare stem. If the plant has gone to seed, keep any seedheads you remove, and I will tell you what to do with them next week!

The quest to have an All Terrain Vehicle (ATV) club organized in

(ATV) club organized in this community got off to a good start last Monday, when the township council indicated it strongly supports the idea.

The reasons why such an organization should be established in Chapleau were outlined to council by Roger Perreault and Kathleen Johnston. Perreault, who is the president of the Chapleau Arctic Watershed Snowmobilers Inc. and Johnston, who is an executive member of that organization, indicated a strong partnership between the two groups would be forged, if an ATV Club materializes.

Predicting ATV activity in Chapleau will be "big in the future," Perreault said he came to council to talk about allowing the use of ATVs in town, similar to what is now enjoyed by the snowmobile club. He also noted other

municipalities have already allowed the vehicles on town streets.

ATV club moves a step closer

While the councillors generally agreed with the concept, they also decided more information is needed before a decision is made.

At the suggestion of Councillor Richard Bignucolo, Elliot lake and Sturgeon Falls, two communities who have adopted ATV bylaws, according to deputy mayor Bud Swanson, will be contacted.

In discussion on the proposal, what appeared to concern councillors most was the issue of liability and insurance coverage.

Mayor Earle J. Freeborn who said Chapleau should learn from the mistakes of other municipalities, said this will come with the ATV committee working with council.

Favouring further information, Councillor Paul Bernier noted most of the communities in Northwestern Ontario already have ATV clubs

and some have become larger than the snowmobile clubs.

C o u n c i l l o r Richard Bignucolo said the provincial government is still considering whether the ATV clubs should be a part of the Ontario Federation of Snowmobile Clubs. "There are a lot of unknowns, but it looks like it is going ahead," he said.

Perreault said the ATV club would look a lot like the snowmobile club, which although it faces an ongoing campaign for active members, continues to be a success with over 500 kilometers of groomed trails locally.

The visit with council paid off for the fledgling club which signed up at least one member for the executive, when councillor Andre Byham offered his services.

The council and ATV proponents agreed to meet again when more information is gathered.

The public is invited to witness the unveiling of a new sign to be erected at the entrance to the Chapleau Crown Game Preserve.



Chapleau hunters encouraged to play it safe during moose hunt

Moose hunting season is about to get under way in Chapleau District and hunters should know and follow the rules, and take necessary safety precautions.

Residents must have a valid Ontario Hunting Outdoors card and a licence to hunt moose.

PARTY HUNTING:

Party hunting means two or more persons hunting together. The rules around party hunting have changed for the 2004 hunting season.

All members of the hunting party must hunt together in the same wildlife management unit as the person who holds the seal for the moose being hunted and licence. must be within five kilometres of the seal holder.

Each member of the hunting party must be able to communicate reliably and immediately with other members of the party.

Each person in a hunting party must have a valid moose hunting



The total number of moose of a specified sex and age, killed by the party, cannot exceed the total number of seals validated for that sex or age that members of the party hold.

The person who kills the moose while hunting in a party must immediately notify all other members of the party.

HUNTING RULES:

All hunters must wear solid hunter orange clothing (minimum of 400 sq. inches) and a hunter orange cap, except during a "bowsonly" season.

A hunter cannot transfer his/her game seal or possess a game

seal issued to another person.

Hunters must make sure they are targeting a moose for which they are licensed. They need to be able to distinguish between a bull, cow and calf moose. It is illegal to hunt or shoot an elk.

A hunter who has killed a moose must immediately attach the game seal to the moose in the manner prescribed on the seal, and it must remain attached during transportation.

Hunters must disassemble and remove any temporary structures erected for hunting moose.
