Bill Mcleod to launch third Northern Ontario book in Chapleau

illiam E. B i 1 1 " McLeod has just published his third book on Chapleau and area history and will launch it at the Public Library in Chapleau on September 30. From 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. and 7:00 to 9:00 p.m., Mr. McLeod will be available to sign copies and to chat with Chapleau folks.

The new book "Chapleau: Retrospective on Life in an Isolated Northern Community" is, among other things, a follow-up to McLeod's previous two books -The Chapleau Game Preserve: History,



Murder and other Tales (2004) and Murder in the Schoolhouse (2007).

The new book updates five murders and the disappearance of Merle Newcombe

and George Weeden that took place between 1922 and 1959. In addition, Mr. McLeod shares new information on John Ceredigion-Jones, the Sultan poet and the 1948 plane crash.

One chapter critically examines the Ministry of Natural Resources 2006 decision to encourage Aboriginals to hunt moose in the Chapleau Game Preserve. А subsequent chapter outlines a business plan that could be used to encourage ecotourism in the Game Preserve.

Chapter Five deals with the exploding black bear population and Mr. McLeod's friend Kyle Cachagee's first person account of his experience with an angry bear near the Cachagee family camp on Borden Lake.

In response to feedback from readers, Bill McLeod has included sixteen new funny and whimsical anecdotes about people and events from the 1950s when he was growing up and he also reviews twenty books about Chapleau and Northern Ontario.

Ian Macdonald spent many of his growing up years in Chapleau and retired as Head of the School of Architecture at the University of Manitoba in 2005. He has graciously contributed a fascinating chapter on the architecture of Chapleau from before the railway went through up to and including the modern era. Ian's drawings, photographs and descriptions of Hudson's Bay, C.P.R., Y.M.C.A., church, residential and institutional buildings are simply stunning. He

devotes several pages to Chapleau's Post Office and its designation as a Federal Heritage Building. Included in Ian's chapter are contributions from Michael Morris, Harry Pellow and Earle Freeborn.

Chapter Ten recalls many amusing tales of curling on natural ice in the old Pine Street rink.

"Retrospective" concludes with a look back on some of the troubling aspects of religion and education in Chapleau.

through an MRI. with this comes seizures, paralysis, fluid in the brain, poor muscle tone and much more. Kristopher cannot talk, has seizures and has paralysis on his left side which means he relies on his wheel chair to get around.

We have had four meetings starting in January 2010 to help prepare the school for Kristopher's needs. The first meeting, made me realize that our backs were against the wall and Kristopher's best interests were not the priority to some people, from a principal retiring and announcing it at every meeting to the Special Ed Coordinator from the Algoma District School Board throwing curve balls left and right at us certainly made us feel like we didn't have a chance at all. We left the last meeting we had in June feeling that things would be in place for our son to attend school in September.

Arrangements would be made in the summer to have the ramps built, his room ready for him, secondary fire route in place, an EA worker and the equipment Kris would need including automatic doors. As Kris's first day was coming closer and closer there was no signs of anything being done. They did have an unsteady wooden ramp built and the removal of a bathtub was the only thing done in his room. Although we were told that there would be no ramps available for him to access the playground, it looks like one was built even though there are no railings. Apparently other pieces of equipment are due in this week.

We found out that the list of items discussed in June are not on the present to do list. It is clear that a lack of communications has occurred between then and now.

It is obvious that some people did not have Kris's best interest at heart and now Kristopher is the one suffering the most. By all means Kris's first day of school should have been with the rest of his JK class and not o n the 13 th of September.

All this should have been accomplished prior to Kris beginning school. As parents we have decided to place Kris back in full time Daycare as we felt that it was a safety issue.

I must note that the new principal has been doing her utmost and we realize that she is not at fault.

Everything was dumped on her lap and we thank her for everything she has done to this point. We are scheduled to have a meeting and hopefully my son and I will taken seriously. I am aware that this isn't the first child the Algoma District School Board has had difficulties in



Personals column in Chapleau Press of 1962 reveals travels of citizens for business and pleasure as part of community life

Chapleau Moments by Michael J. Morris

After receiving the Personals column from the Chapleau Press of October 11, 1962 recently, it struck me that the news about the comings and goings of citizens and their visitors was a very important part of community life, and yes, it sold newspapers too.

I learned first hand the importance of social news and personals columns shortly after I became a newspaper reporter in 1964 at the Daily Press in Timmins. Most contributions were handwritten in those days and quite often news reporters were called upon to type them out into a news story. And woe betide if you made a spelling error in someone's name. Actually it was a great experience in 'getting the name right" one of the first principles young reporters learn, made more difficult as you had to transcribe all manner and forms of



handwriting.

But the Personals column and other social news were a very popular section of the newspaper, maybe even moreso than sports or comics. I realized quickly that "hard news" was not always the main reason people bought a newspaper.

Doug Greig sent me the clipping on the very day that Bill McLeod sent out a news release announcing the launch of his new book 'Chapleau: A Retrospective on LIfe in an Isolated Northern Community.' Doug had coincidentally received the clipping that day and Bill and I are mentioned in the Personal column.

Bill advises that he will hold a book launch in Chapleau on Thursday, September 30 from 2-4 and 7-9 p.m. at the Chapleau Public Library.

It read: "Michal (sp) Morris and Billie (sp) McLeod students at Waterloo



College were home for the Thanksgiving weekend." Of course it should have been Michael and Billy, but those were the only misspelled names in the column that I could detect. And yes, Bill and I attended Chapleau Public and Chapleau High School in the same grade and also attended the same university, now Wilfrid Laurier in the same years, different progams.

Here is a sampler of moments in the lives of some Chapleau citizens as reported in the Chapleau Press in the fall of 1962.

Mary and Grant Campbell were busy.

"Mrs. Mary Campbell, Worthy Matron of Melba Chapter 313 was the delegate from Chapleau to the 7th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star of Ontario held in the Royal York Hotel. Mrs. L.T. Green also attended."

"Mr. Grant Campbell left for Halifax where he will be the delegate from the Royal Canadian Air Force Association Wing 423 to the R.C.A.F. convention. Mrs. Campbell accompanied him."

Frank Coulter, who served many years on the public school board was off to a convention. "Mr. and Mrs. Frank Coulter spent the week in Sarnia where Mr. Coulter attended the public school convention as the representative from the Chapleau Public School Board."

On a business trip: "Mr. Ovide Cote and Mr. George Collins were business visitors to Montreal where they had the opportunity of attending the Shoe and Leather Fair held in the Mount Royal Hotel which proved very interesting. Mrs. Cote and Mrs. Collins accompanied their husbands and had an enjoyable time sightseeing and shopping."

Meanwhile, "Mr. and Mrs. Mel Richardson and son Paul have returned after a pleasant motor trip to Toronto and Montreal", and "Mrs. Agness Freeborn has just returned from vacation in eastern parts of Ontario and Quebec."

Visiting Chapleau, "Mr. Alvin O'Hearn of Burlington was a visitor with his parents Mr. and Mrs. George O'Hearn", and "Mr. and Mrs. Joe Shannon of Falconbridge were visitors to Chapleau." Mr. and Mrs. Shannon had been long-time employees of Smith and Chapple Ltd.

Chapleau Citizens' Report

In this issue I will discuss some of the ideas and concerns raised by the citizens of Chapleau over the past several weeks on my blog at www.bill pellow.com. In addition, I will also highlight a few of my thoughts for the future of Chapleau. This will not be change for the sake of change, but change for progress with ultimate economic success as the goal for Chapleau and all its citizens.

In the past two weeks I have been watching, listening and recording your findings to turn around the direction that Chapleau is heading. We must take time to look at the conditions before us.

The following are my thoughts on some of the recently raised issues and areas of concern by Chapleau citizens as well as some of my own:

1. **Monk Street:** The Street that provides the first impressions for everyone that visits our town. Monk Street has just been face lifted a n d e n h a n c e d. Residents on Monk Street have done an amazing job to their respective properties with landscaping and building improvements that meld in b e a u t i f u l l y . **Congratulations!**

What cautionary instructions are in place, if any, for the snow plow and snow removal crews from chipping and defacing all this new construction. Look at the curbs and gutters on your street to remind you of the need for this precaution. Many are ruined and need replacement.

2.**Sidewalks:** Grass has overgrown and overtaken the borders of our sidewalks. Sidewalks are the responsibility of the town to maintain. In some sites there is only a narrow path of concrete left visible and the sidewalks are almost obscured and obliterated.

3.Property Values: Property values have plummeted. Several sites both commercial and residential are "up for sale for taxes." When the town negotiates a sale for property "up for taxes", everyone breathes a sigh of relief that another property is again re-instated into the tax base portfolio. This is good for all taxpayers but has Chapleau placed any covenants on the sale and purchasing agreement? In their hurry to unload a burden have they ruined long range plans for the town? Will these hasty sales be a real improvement for the town in the long run or are they a mistake in administration? Have they researched all the negative implications for these sales in long

we have several vacant lots in our downtown core area: demolitions were not perfect and huge areas of concrete are exposed; and uncompleted building on Birch Street. This large building should never have reached this state of construction without meeting adequate parking requirements if building codes had been enforced and administration was astute. We have motels boarded up and a large multi-apartment complex boarded up at the entrance to town on Monk Street There are others, all rendering an unsightly prospectus for visitors and tourists to our town. All depict a negative growth image for Chapleau as a progressive and vibrant town in Northern Ontario. They are a deterrent and a stumbling block to interest new property owners and new businesses to Chapleau. What are the plans of the new owners? We do not want their property boarded up forever or the vacant lots in disuse. It is unsightly and produces a very negative image. А beautiful mini park was architecturally designed for Birch Street; however, with a lack of foresight and long range planning it may have to be scrapped. How unfortunate for Chapleau. Myopic vision is just not good enough. The basic principle of "best land use" has been overlooked. Death and income taxes are inevitable. There is no income tax levied on

range planning? Now

your principal residence when you sell or die and there is no income tax payable on your insurance. If one of the principal industries leaves Chapleau your property value will fall off the charts and be worth a fraction of even today's low values. Your home has been your forced savings and normally would be a solid and golden retirement source for your retirement income. As your mayor I will do everything to prevent this disaster from happening to Chapleau and to you. There are alternate solutions that must be instigated long before this black day arrives. Remember what happened when Chapleau lost some of its key players in the lumber industry and Chapleau's economy began to decline. There are still many golden attributes left but repair and revitalization are now extremely difficult, but not insurmountable. I have the business expertise to address these issues. 4.Laneways: The town has been remiss and negligent in a weed control program. Check the lanes in your area of town. Lanes are the responsibility of the town. Lanes are an archaic feature that is seldom used in urban planning today. They are expensive to upkeep and much inter- township land is non-taxable. The overgrowth of weeds in the lanes invades your property and ultimately your property value in Chapleau decreases and diminishes. How can the town enforce a by-law on the citizens

if the town is violating its own mandate? Manicured property elevates your basic property sale value. It is important to you.

5. Long-Range Planning: The tender to demolish Dr. Ted Young's clinic and apartments has now been let. The foundations are to be tumbled into the excavation site and back filled. (Cost factor savings for the town) However, who would want to purchase this site knowing they have to spend thousands and thousands of dollars to complete the site preparations, design and build a new structure? I have to wonder, again is this good long range planning?

6.Building Codes: Water, sewage, streets, hydro and roads are a constant, regardless what residual population is left in Chapleau. We must keep our status up to attract others to our town and survive. We have the Ontario Building Code and the township of Chapleau Building codes to adhere to. Our local guidelines are partially in sheet form and have to be organized, updated and

bound in a binder for the immediate use of and for immediate referral for contractors and builders and even for home repairs. Building permits are a good source of revenue. We should look at definitive articles on setbacks and land use. These details will ensure your property value remains stable and your town is donstructed in the future with common sense stability and uniformity. These are a few of the facts that you have provided and I have noticed.

There are many many more to be published. These are not generalizations but specifics. We need specifics. Many have written to the discussion forum and I thank you for that. Chapleau needs an infusion of FRESH IDEAS to provide a rebirth and a revitalized outlook.
