# Inaugural address sets tone for next four years

obs, economic development and hard work were on the minds of the newly elected Mayor and Chapleau Township Council, as they were sworn in during ceremonies last Monday. And if the council members act on the list of priorities laid out by Mayor Earle J. Freeborn they will be a busy and hard working crew. T h e local council made history along with all others in the province as it's the first time in Ontario councils were elected to the four year term, which is favoured by many to facilitate long term planning.

for 100 new jobs and a renewed vision for community and e c o n o m i c development by Mayor Earle Freeborn, shortly after he was sworn into office.

"The election is over and now it is time for the new Council to get down to business and I am looking forward to working with Council to do just that. For the first time we will have a four year window of opportunity to fulfill our mandate and move this community forward."

"The last 9 years have been rewarding," stated councilor K.J. "Bud" Swanson, and looking ahead to the next fourvear term added, "I'm going to be busy."

The two newcomers to the council, Doug Creig and Jacques Tremblay echoed this view.

Describing Mayor Freeborn's inaugural address as progressive, councilor Creig said council better get on to working and stop talking.

Councilor Tremblay also called for hard work and said he was looking forward to working with Mayor and council for the next four year. "I'm young and dedicated and will work hard," he stated. This led emcee for the ceremonies Remi Bazinet, to exclaim: "We've got a good working crew here." Much of the hard work councilors referred to would be a result of the initiatives contained in Mayor Freeborn's inaugural address.

Prior to laying out a list of nine initiatives the Mayor told council the challenges they face are many and varied. He pledged however, to provide the leadership required to address these ongoing issues throughout the council term. "That being said it is also my intention to seek full council support for a number of initiatives that I believe will set our community on a course of progressive recovery and sustainable growth.

In the next term of office the municipality would see the incorporation of the Master Heritage Museum Plan.

Mayor Freeborn wants a definitive Downtown Beautification Plan and commitment to do it. And he has called for the elimination of downtown parking

# **Brown applauds decision to reduce** fees for after-hours use of schools Youth And Community Groups In Conseil scolaire de district catholique du Nouvel-Ontario to Benefit

The investment will be applied to the annual funding for the board through its school operating grants. Additionally, school boards are helping community groups access school facilities more easily by providing application forms, rate schedules and contact information online. higher quality of life." said Minister of Health Promotion Jim Watson. "Schools are



## Hydro consumers pay price Children sharing the joy and warmth of Christmas for credit card waste

NDP Leader Howard Hampton says hydro consumers are getting zapped by the dubious spending practices of hydro executives.

"For most of us, Christmas comes once a year. For hydro executives, with all the credit card abuses going on, apparently it's Christmas every day," Hampton said.

"Hydro consumers deserve better," the NDP Leader said.

Today's auditor general report documents widespread credit card irregularities at Hvdro One and Ontario Power Generation.

At Hydro One, staff purchased \$127 million worth of goods and services using corporate charge cards but provided few credit card slips or documentation to justify the charges.

At Ontario Power Generation, the auditor was "unable to verify the existence and whereabouts" of printers, monitors, fax machines and digital cameras purchased with company credit cards - and "OPG could not provide evidence that they were in its possession."






